AMBĀSAMUDRAM TALUK.

Adaichchāni.

1. 556 of 1911.—(Tamil.) On a stone lying near the sluice on the tank. Records in Ś. 1539 and K.A. 792, Naḷa, gift of certain privileges in respect of tanks and ponds to the residents of Adaichchāni, by Śinna-Tipparāhuttaraiyan, for the merit of Muttuvīrappa-Nāyakkar of Madura (1609—23).

Āladiyūr.

1-A. In the local Śiva temple. A record, dated K.A. 811 (A.D. 1635), recording a gift of lands to the temple by Tirumalai Nāik of Madura (1623—59).

1-B. On the east side of the sluice of the tank. A record of Tirumal Nāik (1623—59).

Ambāsamudram.

2. 70 of 1907.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the central shrine in the Tirumūlanāthasvāmin temple. An unfinished record in the sixth year of the Chōḷa-Pāṇḍya king Jaṭavarman *alias* Śrī-Sundara-Chōḷa Pāṇḍyadēva (feudatory of Rājendra Chōḷa I). Mentions Rājarāja-chaturvēdimaṅgalam, a *brahmadēya* in Muḷlināḍu, a district of Muḍigoṇḍa-Chōḷa-vaḷanāḍu in Rājarāja-Pāṇḍināḍu. See Nos. 7, 8, 12, 13, 14, 15, 17, 20 and 26 below for the same Chōḷa-Pāṇḍya ruler (1021—43).

3. 71 of 1907.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A mutilated and unfinished record in the eighth year of the Chōḷa king Parakēsari-varman *alias* Śrī-Rājendra-Chōḷadēva (I, 1012—43).

4. 72 of 1907.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record in the seventh year of Chōḷa-Pāṇḍya king . . . Chōḷa-Pāṇḍyadēva. Built in at the beginning. Records gift of a lamp.

5. 73 of 1907.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record in the eighth year of the Chōḷa king Parakēsari-varman *alias* Śrī-Rājendra-Chōḷadēva (I, 1012—43). Built in in the middle. Records gift of a lamp.

6. 74 of 1907.—(Tamil.) On the west wall of the same shrine. A record in the eighth year of the Chōḷa king Parakēsari-varman *alias* Śrī-Rājendra-Chōḷadēva (I, 1012—43). Records gift of a lamp to the temple of Tiruśālātturai-Āḷvār in Iḷaṅgōkkuḍi, a hamlet of Rājarāja-chaturvēdimaṅgalam, by a native of the Chōḷa country.

7. 75 of 1907.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. An incomplete record in the fourteenth year of the Chōla-Pāṇḍya king Jaṭavarman *alias* Śrī-Sundara-Chōla-Pāṇḍyadēva (feudatory of Rājendra-Chōla I).
8. 76 of 1907.—(Tamil.) On the west and north walls of the same shrine. A damaged and incomplete record of the Chōla-Pāṇḍya king Jaṭavarman *alias* Śrī-Sundara-Chōla-Pāṇḍyadēva, the date of which is lost. Records gift of a lamp.
9. 77 of 1907.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the same shrine. An incomplete record in the sixteenth year of the Chōla-Pāṇḍya king Jaṭavarman *alias* Uḍaiyār Śrī-Sundara-Chōla-Pāṇḍyadēva. Records gift of a lamp. The temple is called Tiruchchālit-tuṟaiuḍaiya-Mādēva in Rājarāja-chaturvēdimāṅalam. See No. 5 above.
10. 78 of 1907.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record in the ninth year of the Chōla king Parakēsarivarman *alias* Śrī-Rājendra-Chōladēva (1011—43). Records gift of lamps. An army officer staying in the village referred to.
11. 79 of 1907.—(Vaṭṭeḷuttu.) On the south wall of the maṅṭapa in front of the same shrine. A record of the Chōla king Rājarāja I. Built in. Contains only a portion of the historical introduction of the king.
12. 80 of 1907.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A fragmentary record of the Chōla-Pāṇḍya king Jaṭavarman *alias* Śrī-Sundara-Chōla-Pāṇḍyadēva, the date of which is lost. Mentions Muttūṟṟukūṟṟam.
13. 81 of 1907.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the same maṅṭapa. A record in the eighth year of the Chōla-Pāṇḍya king . . . Sundara-Chōla-Pāṇḍyadēva. Built in at the beginning. Records gift of a lamp.
14. 82 of 1907.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the Perumāḷ shrine in the same temple. A record in the thirteenth year of the Chōla-Pāṇḍya king Jaṭavarman *alias* Śrī-Sundara-Chōla-Pāṇḍyadēva. Records a gift for the merit of the *Nānādēsittisāi*—one thousand and five hundred of Rājendra-Chōla-maṅḍalam. The temple is called after Tiruchchālit-tuṟai-Āḷvār.
15. 83 of 1907.—(Tamil.) On the west wall of the same shrine. A much damaged record in the eighth year of the Chōla-Pāṇḍya king Jaṭavarman *alias* Śrī-Sundara-Chōla-Pāṇḍyadēva.
16. 84 of 1907.—(Vaṭṭeḷuttu.) On the base of a ruined shrine in the Tirumūlanāthasvāmin temple. The king's name of the record is damaged and the date lost. First three lines are almost illegible; seems to register the gift of a lamp.
17. 85 of 1907.—(Tamil.) On the same base. A mutilated record of the Chōla Pāṇḍya king Jaṭavarman *alias* Uḍaiyār

Śrī-Sundara-Chōla-Pāṇḍyadēva, the date of which is lost. Records gift of a lamp. Mentions the city of Kshatriyaśikhāmanipuram and the shrine of Karumāṇikkadēvar in the temple called Tiruchchālaitturai.

18. 86 of 1907.—(Vaṭṭeḷuttu.) On the same base. A mutilated record of the Pāṇḍya king Śaḍaiyamāran in his eleventh year. Mentions Iḷaṅgōykkuḍi. [Śaḍaiyamāran or Māran, the son of Śaḍaiyan. It is difficult to say which of the kings of the name is referred to.]

19. 87 of 1907.—(Vaṭṭeḷuttu.) On the same base. A record in the eighth year of the Pāṇḍya king Vīra-Pāṇḍya, “who took the head of the Chōla.” The temple is called Tiruchchālaitturai niṅṅaruḷina Emberumān at Iḷaṅgōykkuḍi, a *brahmadēya* in Muḷḷināḍu.

20. 88 of 1907.—(Tamil.) On the same base. A fragmentary record of the Chōla-Pāṇḍya king Jaṭavarman *alias* Śrī-Sundara-Chōla-Pāṇḍyadēva.

21. 89 of 1907.—(Vaṭṭeḷuttu.) On a stone set up at the entrance into the gōpura of the same temple, left side. A damaged record of the Pāṇḍya king Māraṅjaḍaiyan. Mentions Iḷaṅgōykkuḍi. See No. 18 above.

22. 98 of 1905.—(Vaṭṭeḷuttu.) On the north wall of the Erichcha-Uḍaiyār shrine in the Erichcha-Uḍaiyār temple. A mutilated record in the eighteenth year of the Chōla king Rājarājakēsari-varman. Records gift of twenty-five sheep for a lamp to the temple of Tiruppōttuḍaiyadēvar.

23. 99 of 1905.—(Vaṭṭeḷuttu.) On the same wall. A record in the fourteenth year of the Chōla king Rājakēsari-varman. Records gift of a lamp.

24. 100 of 1905.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record in the twentieth year of the Pāṇḍya king Jaṭavarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Śrīvallabhadēva. Records gift of land to the temple of Tiruppōttuḍaiya-Mahādēvar at Rājarāja-chaturvēdimaṅgalam, a *brahmadēya* in Muḷḷināḍu. [This king was probably the same as the contemporary of Māravarman Sundara Pāṇḍya I (1216—35). See *Ep. Rep.*, 1909, p. 79 and *Ep. Rep.*, 1916, p. 121, paragraph 24.]

25. 101 of 1905.—(Vaṭṭeḷuttu.) On the south wall of the same shrine. A record of the Pāṇḍya king Vīra-Pāṇḍya, “who took the head of the Chōla,” the date of which is lost. Records gift of land.

26. 102 of 1905.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record in the eighteenth year of the Chōla-Pāṇḍya king Jaṭavarman *alias* Uḍaiyār* Sundara-Chōla-Pāṇḍyadēva (feudatory of Rājēndrachōla I). Records gift of sixty sheep for a lamp. The temple is said to have

been situated in the southern hamlet of Rājarāja-chaturvēdi-maṅgalam.

27. 103 of 1905.—(Tamil.) On the east wall of the same shrine. A mutilated record in the second year of the Pāṇḍya king Māravarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Vikrama-Pāṇḍyadēva. Records gift of a lamp. [This king was not improbably the sovereign who came to the throne in A.D. 1282.]

28. 104 of 1905.—(Vaṭṭeḷuttu.) On a slab built into the floor of the first circuit of the same temple. Records in the thirty-ninth year (of ?) gift of three lamps. The temple is called Tiruppōttu-daiya-Bhaṭārar at Ilaṅḍōykkuḍi, a *brahmadēya* in Muḷli-nāḍu.

29. 105 of 1905.—(Vaṭṭeḷuttu.) On a slab built into the same floor. A record in the sixteenth year of the Pāṇḍya king Varaguṇa-Mahārāja. Records gift of money. The village is called Ilaṅḍōkkuḍi. From his camp at Araśūr on the Peṇṇār in Toṇḍa-nāḍu he granted 290 *kāśus* to the temple of Tiruppōttudaiyār at Ilaṅḍōkkuḍi in Muḷlināḍu. The village assembly received the money and the *savai vāriyar* or committee of the assembly and the temple servants had jointly to provide for offerings to the God, according to a fixed scale, from the interest on the 290 *kāśus*. Venkayya identifies the king with the celebrated Varaguṇa Pāṇḍya who came to throne in A.D. 862. See *Ep. Ind.*, Vol. IX, pp. 84—94. Here Venkayya discusses the king's expedition against Iḍavai and Vembil north of the Kāvēri, his battle with the combined army of Aparājita and Prīthvīpati I at Tiruppirāmbiyam, and points out that this should have been in the course of a campaign against Aparājita which took him as far as Araśūr. As for the date of these Venkayya points out on the authority of the Aivarmalai inscription that his stay at Araśur should have been in A.D. 877-878, his campaign against Vembil in 872-3, and the battle of Tiruppirāmbiyam in 877-8 or next year. See *Ep. Ind.*, Vol. IX, p. 88.

Ālvārkurichchi.

30. 118 of 1907.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the central shrine in the Āvuḍai-amman temple. A record in Ś. 1315, expired, and K.A. 568. The temple is called Naraśiṅga-Īchchuramuḍaiya-Nāyinār.

31. 119 of 1907.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in K.A. 725 the gift of the village of Śettikuḷam by Rāmappa-Nāyakar-Ayyan. The inscription subsequently mentions a gift by Viśvanātha-Nāyaka (1559—63) in K.A. 736. See *Ind. Antq.*, 1914, pp. 230-1, and 1915 for the circumstances under which Viśvanātha Nāyaka established the kingdom of Madura.

32. 120 of 1907.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the same shrine. A record in the sixth year of Tribhuvanachakravartin

Kōnērinmaikoṇḍān. The temple is called Naraśiṅga-Īśvara-muḍaiya-Nāyinār at Kollaṅgoṇḍa-Pāṇḍya-chaturvēdimaṅgalam.

33. 121 of 1907.—(Tamil.) On a north wall of the central shrine in the Vaṅṅiyappar temple in the same village. A mutilated record of Tribhuvanachakravartin Kōnērinmaikoṇḍān. The temple is called Tiruvaṅṅichchuramuḍaiyār at Kādēru, the north-western hamlet of Rājarāja-chaturvēdimaṅgalam, a *brahmadēya* in Muḷli-nāḍu.

34. 122 of 1907.—(Tamil.) On the stone set up at the entrance into the eastern gōpura of the same temple, left side. Records in Ś. 1532, expired, and K.A. 787, gift of land for the merit of Viśvanātha-Nāyakkar Vīrappa-Nāyakkar Muttuvīrappa-Nāyakkar Ayyan (1609—23) to the temple of Nāyanār Tiruvaṅṅīśuramuḍaiya Tambirānār on the bank of the Vaṅṅitīrtha. For the details of the reign of Muttu Vīrappa see *Ind. Antq.*, 1916, p. 132 ff.

35. 123 of 1907.—(Tamil.) On a stone set up at the entrance into the western gōpura of the same temple, right side. Records in Ś. 1534, expired, and K.A. 788, Parīdhāvin, gift for the merit of Viśvanātha-Nāyakkar Muttuvīrappa-Nāyakkar. See note to the above.

Brahmadēśam.

The following inscriptions have been taken from *Ins., S. Dts.*, p. 286, Nos. 83—87:—

35-A. On a stone in the inner temple of Kailāsanātha. A Telugu record granting fifteen *tūms* of rice.

35-B. On a stone in the gōpuram. A gift to the *sthānattār*.

35-C. On a stone in the southern wall. A Telugu record of the seventeenth year of an unknown king. Damaged.

35-D. Two damaged records in the same place.

Kalladakurichchi.

36. 90 of 1907.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the central shrine in the Nāgēśvaramuḍaiyār temple. A record in the eleventh year of the Pāṇḍya king Māravarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Śrī-Vikrama-Pāṇḍyadēva (1282—?). Records sale of land to the temple of Nilaiyuḍaiya-Pāṇḍya-Īśvaramuḍaiyār at Kallaḍakurichchi, the southern hamlet of Śrī-Rājarāja-chaturvēdimaṅgalam, a *brahmadēya* in Muḷli-nāḍu.

37. 91 of 1907.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record in the eleventh year of Tribhuvanachakravartin Kōnērinmaikoṇḍān. The date is given a second time as the ninth year and the 1438th day. Records gift of land. The temple seems to be described as in the above. Another inscription of the ninth year and 1430th day is found at the bottom of this.

38. 92 of 1907.—(Tamil.) On the west wall of the same shrine. A record in the ninth year of the Pāṇḍya king Māravarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Sundara-Pāṇḍyadēva (I, 1216—35), “who was pleased to present the Chōḷa country.” Registers an endowment for those who recite the *tirumurai*.

39. 93 of 1907.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the same shrine. A record in the sixth year of the Pāṇḍya king Māravarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Śrī-Sundara-Pāṇḍyadēva (I, 1216—35), “who was pleased to take the Chōḷa country.” Records gift of money for a lamp by Āchchān Tikkan of Mayilaikōḍu in Malai-maṇḍalam.

40. 94 of 1907.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A fragmentary record of the Pāṇḍya king Jaṭavarman Kulaśēkhara I (1190—1217). Contains a portion of the introduction commencing with the words *pūvinkilattimēvi virṅiruppa*, etc.

41. 95 of 1907.—(Grantha and Tamil.) On the south wall of the maṇṭapa in front of the same shrine. An incomplete record. Mentions the temple of Nālāyira-Īśvaramuḍaiya-Nāyanār at Kallaḍaikurichchi and the village of Tirumāḍavanūr in Aṇḍanāḍu, a district of Pāṇḍi-maṇḍalam.

42. 96 of 1907.—(Tamil.) On the east wall of the maṇṭapa in front of the central shrine in the Nāgēsvaramuḍaiyār temple. A record in the twenty-first year (Kumbha Pūrva 6, Thursday, Śatabhishaj) of the Pāṇḍya king Māravarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Sundara-Pāṇḍyadēva (I, 1216—37), “who was pleased to take the Chōḷa country.” Records gift of money for oil by a native of Malabar (Malai-maṇḍalam). See *Ep. Ind.*, Vol. X, p. 138, where the date is pointed out to be Thursday, January 29, A.D. 1237.

43. 97 of 1907.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the shrine of the Goddess in the same temple. A record in the ninth year and 1403rd day of the Pāṇḍya king Jaṭavarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Kulaśēkharadēva (I ?). Records gift of land to the temple of Nālāyira-Īśvaramuḍaiyār at Kallaḍaikurichchi.

44. 98 of 1907.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record in the thirty-third year of the Pāṇḍya king Māravarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Kulaśēkharadēva (1268—1308), “who was pleased to take every country.” Registers a gift by the artisans (*kanmāḷar*) of Kallaḍaikurichchi *alias* Kshatriyaśikhāmaṇipuram to the shrine of the Goddess in the temple of Nālāyira-Īśvaramuḍaiya-Nāyanār. The English equivalent of the date (Mithuna 12, New Moon, Mrigaśīrsha) was June 7, A.D. 1301, Wednesday. Mr. Sewell infers from this that the outer limits for the king's accession should be June 8 and June 27 of 1268.

45. 99 of 1907.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record in the twenty-fifth year of the Pāṇḍya king Jaṭavarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Kulaśēkharadēva (I, ? 1190—1217). Records gift of

money for offerings by Āchchān Tiruvikkīraman of Malaikōḍu in Malaimaṇḍalam. Mentions Śrīvallabhan *alias* Uttama-Pāṇḍya-Brahmādhīrājan.

46. 100 of 1907.—(Tamil.) On the west wall of the same shrine. A record in the fifth year of the Pāṇḍya king Māravarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Sundarā-Pāṇḍyadēva (I, 1216—37) “who was pleased to take the Chōḷa country.” Records gift of money for offerings and twilight lamps.

47. 101 of 1907.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the same shrine. A mutilated record in the twentieth year of the Pāṇḍya king Māravarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Kulaśēkharadēva (I or II?). Seems to record the laying out of a flower-garden in the name of the king.

48. 102 of 1907.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record in the sixth year of the Pāṇḍya king Māravarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Sundara Pāṇḍyadēva (I, 1216—37) “who was pleased to take the Chōḷa country.” Records gift of money for a lamp to the temple of Nālāyira-Īsvaramuḍaiyār.

49. 103 of 1907.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the central shrine in the Kīrikriṣṇan temple in the same village. A record in the fourth year of the Pāṇḍya king Jaṭavarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Kulaśēkharadēva (I, 1190—1217). Records gift of money for a twilight lamp to the temple of Nālāyira-Viṇṇagar-Emberumān at Kallaḍaikkurichchi.

50. 104 of 1907.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record in the twelfth year of the Pāṇḍya king Jaṭavarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Kulaśēkharadēva (I, 1190—1217). Records gift of money for offerings to the temple of Nālāyira-Viṇṇagar-Emberumān.

51. 105 of 1907.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record in the sixth year and one hundred and forty-seventh day of Tribhuvanachakravartin Kōṇērinmāikoṇḍān. Provides for the celebration of a festival called *Avanivēndarāman śandhi* after the king's name. Mentions Karumāṇikkāḷvān *alias* Vēṇavuḍaiyān, who seems to have built the temple of Nālāyira-Viṇṇagar.

52. 106 of 1907.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record in the sixth year and one hundred and forty-seventh day of Tribhuvanachakravartin Kōṇērinmaikoṇḍān. Records the restoration to the temple of lands granted by Karumāṇikkāḷvān *alias* Vēṇavuḍaiyān but misappropriated by the assembly of Rājarāja-chaturvēdi-maṅgalam.

53. 107 of 1907.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the central shrine in the same temple. A record in the twenty-second year of the Pāṇḍya king Māravarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Sundara-Pāṇḍyadēva (I, 1216—37), “who took the Chōḷa country

and was pleased to perform the anointment of heroes at Muḍigoṇḍa-Chōlapuram." Provides for offerings at the temple of Nālāyira-Viṇṇagar Emberumān.

54. 108 of 1907.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record in the twenty-second year of the Pāṇḍya king Māravarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Sundara-Pāṇḍyadēva (I, 1216—37), "who took the Chōla country and was pleased to perform the anointment of heroes at Muḍigoṇḍa-Chōlapuram." Records gift of money by a native of Talaichcheṅgāḍu in Śrīvaikuṇḍam *alias* Rājēndra-Chōlachaturvēdimāṅgalam, a *brahmadēya* in Tiruvaḷudi-nāḍu.

55. 109 of 1907.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the same shrine. A record in the third year and one thousand seventy-second day of Tribhuvanachakravartin Kōnērinmaikoṇḍān. Refers to the fifth year of Kulaśēkharadēva and to the fourth year of the same king. Transfer of some land from the possession of Sundara-Pāṇḍya Malaiyarāyan to the temple.

56. 110 of 1907.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. An unfinished record in the second year of the Pāṇḍya king Jaṭavarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Kulaśēkharadēva (I, ? 1190—1217). Refers to the time of Periyānāyanār Śrīvallabhadēva and to the city of Kattiriyaśigāmaṇipuram. [Periyānāyanār Śrī Vallabha was evidently Jaṭavarman Śrīvallabha who was the contemporary of Jaṭavarman Sundara Pāṇḍya I.]

57. 111 of 1907.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record in the tenth year of the Pāṇḍya king Tribhuvanachakravartin Kōnērinmaikoṇḍān Kulaśēkharadēva. The date is also expressed as the third year and two thousand five hundred and ninety-fourth day. Mentions *Punal* *alias* Kshatriya-śikhāmaṇipuram and Mānābharāmaṅgalam.

58. 112 of 1907.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A mutilated record of the Pāṇḍya king Jaṭavarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Kulaśēkharadēva (I, ? 1190—1217). The first five lines are engraved in older characters than the rest of the inscription. The latter portion contains the date eleventh year.

59. 113 of 1907.—(Tamil.) At the entrance into the Kulaśēkharamuḍaiyār temple in the same village, left side. A record of the Nāyaka chief Virappa-Nāyakkar Ayyan in Ś. 1480, expired, and K.A. 735. Records a gift in favour of blacksmiths and carpenters.

60. 114 of 1907.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the central shrine in the Vināyaka temple in the same village. The king's name is not mentioned. Registers in his sixteenth year the boundaries of the land belonging to the temple of *Puravuvari-Vighnavināyaka*.

61. 115 of 1907.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the central shrine in the Kośakkudi-Perumāḷ temple in the same village. A

much damaged record. Mentions Nāyanār-Nālāyira-Īchchuvaramudaiyār.

62. 116 of 1907.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Mentions in K.Ā. 663, the village of Maditkurichchi in Muḷli-nāḍu and Vīrakēraḷan śandi. The temple is called Nāyanār-Periyapirān.

63. 117 of 1907.—(Tamil.) On the east wall of the maṅṭapa in front of the same temple. A record in the twenty-eighth year of the Pāṇḍya king Jaṭāvarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Vīra-Pāṇḍya-dēva. Seems to provide for feeding Brāhmaṇas and for the *bhiksha* of *ēkadāṇḍa* and *tridaṇḍa* sanyasins. [The *Ēkadāṇḍins* and *Tridaṇḍins* are Advaitic and Viśiṣṭadvaitic sanyasins respectively. The king might be the same as he who came to the throne in 1253 and who “conquered Koṅgu, Īlam and Śōḷamaṇḍalam and anointed victors at Perumbaṅṅappuliyūr.”]

64. C.P. No. 9 of 1913 (*called the Vellāṅgudi plates of Venkata D.*)—A record, dated in Ś. 1520, Viḷambi, in the time of Emperor Venkaṭapati I, making the gift, to several Brahmans, of the village of Vellāṅgudi, the hamlet of Kallaḍaikurichchi, renamed Vīrabhūpasamudram, in Muḷli-nāḍu in Tiruvaḍi dēśa. The gift was in 261 shares and at the instance of Vīra Kṛiṣṇa Nāik of Madura. [The latter was the same as Kumāra Kṛiṣṇappa or Periya Vīrappa, joint ruler with Viśvanātha II, 1573—95.]

Kiḷachchevval.

65. 523 of 1911.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the central shrine in the Venkaṭāchalapati temple. Records gift of land (made tax-free) to a certain Kanaviniya-Perumāḷdāsar by a native of Kāritturai in Malai-maṇḍalam. The temple is referred to as Kanaviniya-Pāṇḍiya-Viṅṅagarāḷvār at Ten-Tiruvayōttiyai. Built in at the beginning. The document is signed by a number of officers in “the department of taxes” (புரவுவரி திணைக்கள நாயகம்).

66. 524 of 1911.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record of the Pāṇḍya king Māravarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Sundara-Pāṇḍyadēva (II, 1239—51). Refers in the fourteenth year to the same Kanaviniya-Perumāḷdāsar who was maintaining the flower-garden named Vīraśēkharan-tirunandavanam, and to the land granted to him at Dēśimāṅikkanallūr. The record begins with the historical introduction *Pūmalar tiruvum*, etc. The Madura throne is called after the minister mentioned in the next inscription.

67. 525 of 1911.—(Tamil.) On the west and south walls of the same shrine. Records in the fourteenth year of the Pāṇḍya king Tribhuvanachakravartin Kōṇērimēlkoṇḍān the same facts as in the two previous numbers. The order of the king made at the request of Aṅṅan Tamilappallavaraiyan is, perhaps, recorded here.

68. 526 of 1911.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the same shrine. Records in the eighth year of Tribhuvanachakravartin Kōnērinmaikoṇḍān gift of land at Śevval to the same temple for repairs and for worship, with the permission of Pammiyakkan. The land was made tax-free (*iṛaiyili*) by the king at the request of Gāṅgēyarāyan, chief of Tuñjalūr. Built in at the end. See note to the next epigraph.

69. 527 of 1911.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in the ninth year of Tribhuvanachakravartin Kōnērinmaikoṇḍān (Māra-varman Sundara Pāṇḍya II) that Tiruppullaṇidāsar of Śērvanmahā-dēvi-chaturvēdimāṅgalam, having built the temple of Kanaviniya-Perumāḷ, a certain Pammiyakkan endowed it with the necessary land (*nattam*) required for temple buildings, gardens, and the Brāhmaṇa village called Tentiruvayōttiyai. At the request of Gāṅgēyarāyan, chief of Tuñjalūr, the king made the *nattam* under reference, tax-free (*iṛaiyili*). At the end of this record is engraved another of the eighth year of the king, which refers to the same temple and to the Brāhmaṇa village Tentiruvayōttiyai-viḷagam. [Mr. Krishna Sastri believes that Pammiyakkan was probably the mother of Sundara Pāṇḍya and sister of the Hoysala king Virasōmēśvara.]

Kōvilkuḷam.

70. 549 of 1911.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the central shrine in the Tennaḷagar temple. Records in the thirteenth year of the Pāṇḍya king Jaṭavarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Kulaśēkharadēva (I or II?) gift of money for a festival, to be celebrated each month of the Śravaṇa-nakshatra, in the temple of Śrīpativiṅṅagar-Emberumān at Rajārāja-chaturvēdimāṅgalam, a *brahmadēya* in Muḷli-nāḍu.

71. 550 of 1911.—(Vaṭṭeḷuttu.) On the same wall. An incomplete record of the Pāṇḍya king Śaḍaiyamāran, dated twenty-first year. Mentions the temple of Tiruppodiyil-Viṅṅagarttēvar and a gift made to it on behalf of Śēynōkki. [The king has not been identified.]

72. 551 of 1911.—(Vaṭṭeḷuttu.) On the south wall of the same shrine. An incomplete record of the Pāṇḍya king Śaḍaiyamāran, dated twenty-first year. Records gift of twenty-five sheep for a lamp to the temple of Tiruppodiyil-Viṅṅagarttēvar at Kuḷam in Muḷlināḍu. See note to the above epigraph.

73. 552 of 1911.—(Vaṭṭeḷuttu.) On the same wall. Records gift of twenty-five sheep for a lamp, by Naṛchēynōkki, the wife of Kōdan.

74. 553 of 1911.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in the fourth year of the Pāṇḍya king Māra-varman *alias* Tribhuvana-chakravartin Vikrama-Pāṇḍyadēva gift of money for a lamp by a

resident of the fourth hamlet of Rājarāja-chaturvēdimāṅgalam, a *brahmadēya* in Muḷli-nādu, to the temple of Sundarattōl Emberumān. It is difficult to say whether this was the king who came to the throne in 1282 or his namesake of the fifteenth century 1433-4.

75. 554 of 1911.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. An incomplete record of the Pāṇḍya king Vikrama-Pāṇḍyadēva, dated fourteenth year. Records gift of money for a lamp.

76. 555 of 1911.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. An incomplete record of Tribhuvanachakravartin Kōṇērinmēlkoṇḍān, dated second year. Records gift of land for offerings to the temple of Śrīpativiṅṅagar-Ālvār at Rājarāja-chaturvēdimāṅgalam.

Kūniyūr.

76-A. A C.P. grant of the Vijayanagara king Veṅkaṭa II, in Sanskrit verse and Nandināgari character. Records that on the full-moon day of Vaiśākha of Ś. 1556 (A.D. 1634-5), Bhava, Vīra Veṅkaṭapati Mahārāya granted to a number of Brahmans the village of Kūniyūr or Muttukṛishṇāpuram in the Viravanallūr Māgāṇa in Muḷli-nādu, Tiruvaḍirājya. The inscription gives not only the pedigree of the last Vijayanagara dynasty but also that of the feudatory Madura Nāiks. The inscription was issued by the great Tirumal Nāik who thus in 1634 acknowledged his suzerain. See *Ep. Rep.* 1891, p. 6, and *Ep. Ind.*, Vol. III, pp. 236--58. See also my *History of the Nāik kingdom of Madura* in *Ind. Antq.*, November 1916, p. 185.

*Mannārkōvil.**

77. 106 of 1905.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the central shrine in the Gōpālasvāmin temple. A record in the fourteenth year of the Chōḷa-Pāṇḍya king Jaṭāvarman *alias* Uḍaiyār-Sundara Chōḷa-Pāṇḍyadēva (feudatory of the Rājēndrachōḷa I). Records sale of land to the temple here called Rājēndra-Śōḷa-Viṅṅagar.

78. 107 of 1905.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record in the fourth year of the Chōḷa-Pāṇḍya king Jaṭāvarman *alias* Sundara-Chōḷa-Pāṇḍyadēva (1021--43). Records gift of land to the temple which is here named as in No. 77.

79. 108 of 1905.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record in the sixth year of the king. Mentions Mānābharana-chaturvēdimāṅgalam. The temple is called Rājēndra-Śōḷa-Viṅṅagardēvar.

* The *Mack. MSS.*, as given in *Ins., S. Dts.* (pp. 286-9, Nos. 38-111), give thirty-three inscriptions in this place. Of these Nos. 103--110 seem to be the same as those given in the departmental list. Two are damaged (Nos. 98 and 99). The rest are included above.

80. 109 of 1905.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record in the thirteenth year of the Chōla-Pāṇḍya king Jaṭavarman *alias* Uḍaiyār Sundara Chōla-Pāṇḍyadēva (1021—43). Records sale of land. See No. 77.

81. 110 of 1905.—(Tamil.) On the north, west and south walls of the same shrine. A record in the thirteenth year of the Chōla-Pāṇḍya king Sundara-Chōla-Pāṇḍyadēva (1021—43). Records sale of land.

82. 111 of 1905.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the same shrine. A record in the sixteenth year of the Chōla-Pāṇḍya king Jaṭavarman *alias* Sundara Chōla-Pāṇḍyadēva (1021—43). Records gift of land. Mentions the Chēra king Rājarājadēva. This and the next two inscriptions show that the claims of Rājarāja I and Rājendra Chōla I to have conquered the Chēra country were not mere boasts.

83. 112 of 1905.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record in the twenty-fourth year of the Chōla king Parakēsarivarman *alias* Uḍaiyār Rājendra-Chōladēva (I, 1012—43). Records gift of land. Says that the shrine was called Rājendrachōlaviṇṇagar after the reigning king and that it was built by the Chēra king Rājasimha. The latter may be the king referred to in 710 of 1905 at Paḷni in Madura district (Md. 281.)

84. 113 of 1905.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the central shrine in the Gōpālasvāmin temple. A record of the Chōla-Pāṇḍya king Māravarman *alias* . . . the date of which is lost. Built in at the end. Mentions the Chēra king Rājarājadēva.

85. 114 of 1905.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record of the Chōla-Pāṇḍya king Jaṭavaram *alias* Sundara-Chōla-Pāṇḍyadēva, the date of which is lost. Built in at the end. Mentions the Chēra king Rājasimha. See *Ep. Rep.*, 1905, p. 56, where it is pointed out that Sundara-Chōla-Pāṇḍya's accession must have taken place about A.D. 1020-1 and that his rule ended after A.D. 1043-4. No. 18 of 1894 at Kalugumalai is his latest inscription.

85-A. In the west wall of the Kulaśekhara Āḷvār temple. A Telugu record of the reign of Sundara Pāṇḍyadēva relating an agreement between the local Vaishnavas and superintendent of the temple.

85-B. In the same place. Records that Chaṇḍalaṅkāradāsa settled a dispute and fixed the landmarks of a village in the fourth year of Rājendrachōla.

85-C. On the west wall. (Tamil.) Grant of land to a watchman in the fourth year of Sundara Pāṇḍyā. *Ins., S. Dts.*, p. 287, No. 90.

85-D. In the same place. Grant of land to the God in the fourth year of Sundara Pāṇḍya. *Ibid.*, No. 91.

85-E. In the same place. A grant in the thirteenth year of Kulaśekhara dēva by the people of Vēndanallūr. *Ins., S. Dts.,* p. 237, No. 92.

85-F. In the same place. Sale of land by one Muttukkannan to a daughter of Kulaśekhara Perumāḷ in the twenty-second year of Sundara Pāṇḍya. *Ibid.,* No. 93.

85-G. In the same place. Grant of land in the reign of Rājēndrachōḷa to Kulaśekhara-perumāḷ. *Ibid.,* No. 94.

85-H. In the same place. A record of the third year of Rājēndrachōḷa. *Ibid.,* No. 95.

85-I. In the same place. Grant of land in the fourth year of Sundara Chōḷa Pāṇḍya by the Mahāsabhā of Brahmadēśam to the Aḷvār of Rājēndrachōḷa-ṅṅahar. *Ibid.,* No. 96.

85-J. On a stone in the Mannār temple. A grant by Udaya Mārttāṇḍa to Kulaśekhara-āḷvār in K. 764, Sarvadhāri. *Ibid.,* No. 97.

85-K. In the same place. Gift of measures of ghee by Sundara Pāṇḍya. *Ibid.,* No. 100.

85-L. In the same place. In the reign of "Kumāra Vīra Mārāyan Vadayār." *Ibid.,* No. 101.

85-M. In the same place. A gift of land by "Carren Rāja Rāja Chintapum" in his fifteenth year to Rājēndrachōḷa Viṅṅahar.

85-N. On a stone in the inner gate of the gōpuram. A gift by Udaya Mārttāṇḍa in Ś. 1510, K.Ā. 765.

Pāpanāśam.

85-O. On a stone in the local temple. Records that "Teroo-vahanayakur and Vadamalapilla" erected a stone maṅṅapam. *Ibid.,* p. 291, No. 112.

Pāpaṅṅulam.

86. 124 of 1907.—(Tamil.) On the south and west walls of the maṅṅapa in front of the Rāmasvāmin temple. A record in the twentieth year and eight hundred and forty-ninth day of the Pāṇḍya king Māravarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Sundara-Pāṇḍya-dēva (I, 1216—35), "who took the Chōḷa country and was pleased to perform the anointment of heroes at Muḍigoṅṅa-Chōḷapuram." Built in at the beginning. Records gift to the temple of Pagavadi-Viṅṅagar-Āḷvār at Vēḷarkurichchi, the north-western hamlet of Rājarāja-chaturvēdimāṅṅalam.

87. 125 of 1907.—(Tamil.) On the west wall of the kitchen in the Siddhajñānēśvara temple in the same village. A record in the eighth year (Dhanus II, Aparā? Tuesday, Svāti) of the Pāṇḍya king Māravarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Kulaśekhara-dēva (II?). Records sale of land to the temple of Karutt-aṅṅindu muḍitta

Pāṇḍīśaramuḍaiya-Nāyanār. See *Ep. Ind.*, Vol. X, p. 146, where Mr. R. Sewell discusses the date and shows that it is irregular.]

88. 126 of 1907.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the same kitchen. A record in the eighth year (Tulā 2, Pūrva 9, Wednesday, Śravaṇa) of the Pāṇḍya king Māravarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Kulaśēkharadēva (II?), “who was pleased to take every country.” Records sale of land to the same temple, here said to be *Śēranai-venṟān-tirumadaivilāgam*, situated in Mulli-nāḍu. See *Ibid.*, where Mr. R. Sewell discusses the date and surmises that Wednesday, September 30, A.D. 1321, is probably the date intended.

89. 127 of 1907.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A damaged record of the Pāṇḍya king Māravarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Kulaśēkharadēva (I, 1268—1308), the date of which is lost. Records sale of land to the same temple, by the villagers of Kār-kurichchi *alias* Vikkrama-Pāṇḍyanallūr in Mulli-nāḍu.

90. 128 of 1907.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the first prākāra of the same temple. A mutilated record in the eighth year of the Pāṇḍya king Māravarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Kulaśēkharadēva (I, 1268—1308). Records sale of land by the same villagers to the same temple.

Rāvaṇasamudram.

90-A. In the agrahāra, on a slab. A record, dated in Ś. 1549, K.A. 805 (A.D. 1627), recording a private grant of lands to a Brahman.

Sērmādēvi (Shermadevi).

91. 531 of 1911.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the first prākāra in the Bhaktavatsala temple. Seems to record in the thirteenth year of the Pāṇḍya king Kulaśēkharadēva a gift of money. Mentions Śēraṇmahādēvi-chaturvēdimaṅgalam, a *brahmadēya* in Mulli-nāḍu. Stones out of order and damaged. Another detached stone on the same wall refers to a gift of land and to the *Mahābhārata-vritti*, one of the requirements provided for in the temple.

92. 532 of 1911.—(Tamil.) On the west wall of the same prākāra. A damaged record of the Pāṇḍya king Tribhuvanachakravartin Śrīvallabhadēva, dated twentieth year. Records gift of money for a lamp to the god Paramasvāmin “who was pleased to stand” in the temple of Bhaktapriya at Śēraṇmahādēvi-chaturvēdimaṅgalam, a *brahmadēya* in Mulli-nāḍu.

93. 533 of 1911.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in the sixth year of the Pāṇḍya king Māravarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Śrīvallabhadēva gift of one *āṇai-achchu* to the temple

of Bhaktapriyattu-Emberumān at Śēraṅganmahādēvi-chaturvēdimāṅgalam by Kōttūr-Kṛishṇabhaṭṭa, a native of . . . in Mēl-Vēmba-nāḍu. [Was the king the same as Periyānāyanār Śrīvallabha who had his palace at Tirunelvēli and who is supposed to be the predecessor of Jaṭavarman Kulaśēkhara (I, 1190—1217)?]

94. 534 of 1911.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. An incomplete record of the Pāṇḍya king Māravarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Śrīvallabhadēva, dated sixth year. Records gift of money for a lamp by a Brāhmaṇa lady. See note to the above epigraph.

95. 535 of 1911.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the same prākāra. An incomplete record of the Pāṇḍya king Jaṭavarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Kulaśēkharadēva (I, ? 1190—1217), dated third year. Records gift of money for a lamp by Vaṅgi-purattu Mādhavabhaṭṭa of Jananātha-chaturvēdimāṅgalam.

96. 536 of 1911.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A damaged record of the Pāṇḍya king Śrīvallabhadēva, dated sixth year. Records gift of money for a lamp by a resident(?) of Tirunelvēli in Kīl-Vēmba-nāḍu. See No. 93 above.

97. 537 of 1911.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. An incomplete record of the Pāṇḍya king Māravarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Śrīvallabhadēva, dated fourteenth year. Records gift of oil for maintaining twenty lamps. See note to 93 above.

98. 538 of 1911.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. An incomplete and damaged record of the Pāṇḍya king Māravarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Śrīvallabhadēva, dated fourteenth year. Refers to the gift of the image of a goddess to the temple and mentions Ānaimēltuñjinār. See No. 93 above.

99. 539 of 1911.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in the second year of the Pāṇḍya king Śrīvallabha gift of twenty-five sheep for a lamp.

100. 540 of 1911.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the second prākāra of the same temple. A damaged record, dated fifteenth year. Registers that a piece of land granted for a garden was made tax-free at the request of Kāḷiṅgarāyan. Mentions Arichchandiran *alias* Pallavarāyan of Śēḷuvattūr in Tirukkānappērkūṛam. See No. 101. [This and the next two inscriptions are examples of "double transactions," i.e., the king grants certain lands tax-free and then the temple authorities have the charter engraved by the villagers and the remitted tax deducted from the village accounts (புரவு-வரி).]

101. 541 of 1911.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in the fourteenth year of the Pāṇḍya king Vīra-Pāṇḍyadēva the gift registered in No. 100 and mentions Arichchandiran *alias* Pallavarāyan of Śēḷuvattūr. [The king was evidently Jaṭavarman

Vīra-Pāṇḍya, the conqueror of Īlam, Koṅgu and Śōḷamaṇḍalam, who came to the throne in 1253.]

102. 542 of 1911.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Tribhuvana-chakravartin Kōṇērinmaikoṇḍān records in his eighth year that the land granted by a certain Sundara-Pāṇḍya-Brahmādhirāyan for lamps was made tax-free.

103. 543 of 1911.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Registers the gift of land mentioned in the above epigraph and the order of the assembly of Śēravanmahādēvi-chaturvēdimaṅgalam, to utilize the income from the land for lamps.

104. 544 of 1911.—(Tamil.) On the east wall of the same prākāra. A damaged record of the Pāṇḍya king Jaṭavarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Vīra-Pāṇḍyadēva, "who having taken Īlam (Ceylon), Koṅgu and Śōḷa-maṇḍalam, conquered the powerful chiefs and was pleased to perform the anointment of heroes and victors at Perumbarrappuliyūr," dated sixteenth year. Registers the gift mentioned in No. 100 and perhaps also another gift of land to supplement it under the orders of the assembly of Śēravanmahādēvi-chaturvēdimaṅgalam. The taxes on this land are stated to have been deducted in the account (*puravu-vari*) registers. The Government Epigraphist believes that this king might be the Jaṭavarman Vīra-Pāṇḍya who, according to professor Kielhorn, came to the throne in 1253. Among the taxes are enumerated the கடமை, அந்தராயம், வினியோகம், அச்சவரி, காரியவாராச்சி, வெட்டிப் பாட்டம், பஞ்சலீலி, சந்திவிக்கிரகப்பேறு, வாசல்பேறு, இலாஞ்சினைப்பேறு, உழுதாங்குடி, பாடிக்காவல், பொன்வரி, etc.

105. 545 of 1911.—(Tamil verse.) On the same wall. Ravi *alias* Kulaśekhara. Registers a eulogistic poem in praise of the king.

106. 546 of 1911.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the same prākāra. Dated in the twenty-sixth year of the Pāṇḍya king Jaṭavarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Vīra-Pāṇḍyadēva. Records that a native of Iraivanaṅaiyūr was required to provide for the *vasanta* festival in the temple on receiving from the assembly of Śrīvaishṇavas a specific piece of land. See note to 104.

107. 547 of 1911.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Refers in the twenty-sixth year of the Pāṇḍya king Vīra-Pāṇḍyadēva to the same gift and to the permission supposed to have been granted by the God. See note to 104.

108. 548 of 1911.—(Tamil.) On a lion pillar in the gōpura of the same temple. Registers that the lion face was the gift of Kīlakkira Padmanābha-Bhaṭṭasōmayājin.

109. 179 of 1895.—On the north wall of the shrine in the Rāmasvāmi temple. A Vaṭṭeḷuttu record of the third year of Parakēsarivarman Rajēndrachōḷadēva (1011—43) regarding the

gift of ghee for a daily lamp by certain Vaikhānasas in the Nigariliśōḷa Viṇṇagar temple. *Nigariliśōḷa* was apparently a surname of Rājendra Chōḷa I. See *Ep. Ind.*, Vol. V, pp. 47-8.

110. 180 of 1895.—(Vaṭṭeḷuttu.) On the same wall. An incomplete record of Kō-Rājarājakēsarivarman (I, 985—103). Date lost.

111. 181 of 1895.—(Vaṭṭeḷuttu.) In the same place. Records gift of a lamp in the third year of Parakēsarivarman Rājendra-chōḷadēva (I, 1011—43).

112. 182 of 1895.—(Vaṭṭeḷuttu.) On the same wall. An incomplete record of the fifteenth year of Rājarājakēsarivarman. See *Ibid.*, p. 46.

113. 183 of 1895.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the same temple. Records gift of lamp in the eighth year of Parakēsarivarman Rājendrachōḷadēva (I, 1011—43).

114. 184 of 1895.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the maṇṭapa in front of the same shrine. Records gift of lamp in K.A. 476.

115. 185 of 1895.—(Tamil.) On the east wall of the second prākāra in the Appar temple, right of entrance. An incomplete record of the fourteenth year of Kō-Jaṭavarman *alias* Vīra-Pāṇḍya. See No. 104 above.

116. 186 of 1895.—(Grantha and Tamil.) On the same wall, left of entrance. A record of Ś. 1463 (expired) and K.A. 717, making provision for feeding twenty-four Brāhmaṇas.

117. 187 of 1895.—(Grantha and Tamil.) On the inner side of the north wall of the second prākāra in the same temple. A Vijayanagar record of Śrīraṅgadēva Mahārāya (1578—86), dated in K.A. 769. Mentions Viśvanātha-Kṛishṇappa-Vīrappa Nāik as feudatory. See No. 64 above.

118. 188 of 1895.—(Tamil.) On a stone standing in front of the Baktavatsala temple. Records gift of paddy in the ninth year of Jaṭavarman Kulaśēkhara (unidentified).

119. 189 of 1895.—(Tamil.) On another stone in the same place. A record of the twenty-sixth year of Kulōttuṅgachōḷadēva.

120. 190 of 1895.—(Tamil.) On the right of the entrance into the same temple. A record, dated K.A. 679, mentioning a certain Janārdana Sarasvati.

121. 191 of 1895.—(Nāgari and Tamil.) In the same place. A record of Vikrama Samvat 1483 and K.A. 601. Mentions Nara-simha Sarasvati.

122. 192 of 1895.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the shrine in the Ambalanāthēśvara temple. A record of the twenty-seventh year of Rājarājakēsarivarman (I, 985—1013), recording gift of a lamp to the temple of Chōḷēndrasimhēśvara.

123. 193 of 1895.—(Tamil.) On the west wall of the same place. Gift of lamp in the twelfth year of Kō-Jaṭavarman Sundarachōla Pāṇḍyadēva (1021—43).

124. 194 of 1895.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the same shrine. Gift of land in the twenty-first year of Kō-Māravarma *alias* Vikrama Chōla-Pāṇḍyadēva. See No. 142.

124-A. One of the inner walls of the temple. A record, dated K.A. 614 (A.D. 1438—9), recording a grant by Śēra Udaya Mārttāṇḍavarma. See *Antiquities*, Vol. I, p. 310, based on Shungoony Menon's *History of Travancore*.

Tentribhuvanam.

124-B. In the local Śiva temple. A record of K.A. 661 (A.D. 1485).

Tiruppuḍaimarudūr.

125. 121 of 1905.—(Grantha.) On the east wall of the Chaṇḍēśvara shrine in the Pūtārjunēśvara temple. A partly damaged record. Mentions Vīra-Pāṇḍya (unidentified).

126. 122 of 1905.—(Vaṭṭeḷuttu.) On the same wall. A record in the twentieth year of the Pāṇḍya king Śaḍaiyamāran. The village is called Tiruppuḍaimarudil and the inscription refers also to Pāṇḍimāttāṇḍa-valānāḍu and to a servant of Vīra-Pāṇḍya (unidentified).

127. 123 of 1905.—(Tamil.) On the east and north walls of the same shrine. A partly damaged record in the tenth year of the Chōla king Rājarājakēsarivarman (I, 985—1013), "who destroyed the ships at Kāndaḷūr-Śālai." Records gift of land. Some of the signatures are in Grantha, while the rest are in Vaṭṭeḷuttu.

128. 124 of 1905.—(Tamil.) On the west wall of the same shrine. A damaged and incomplete record in the tenth year of the Chōla king Rājarājakēsarivarman (I, 985—1013), "who destroyed the ships at Kāndaḷūr-Śālai."

129. *C.P. No. 202 of Mr. Sewell's List.*—Records grant to Tiruppuḍaimarudūr temple in Ś. 1617 (A.D. 1695) by the agents of Vijayaraṅga Chokkanātha Nāik of Madura (1689—1731). [Maṅgammāl was then regent.]

[The following inscriptions are from Mr. Sewell's *Antiquities*.]

129-A. To the east of the south gate of the temple. A record, dated in K.A. 662.

129-B. In the same place. A record, dated in K.A. 871 (A.D. 1695).

129-C. In the temple kitchen. A record, dated in K.A. 701 (A.D. 1525).

129-D. In the field of a resident. A record, dated in K.A. 844 (A.D. 1668).

Tiruvāliśvaram.

This place was in Muḷḷināḍu, in Rājarājavāḷanāḍu.

130. 115 of 1905.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the central shrine in the Vāliśvara temple. An incomplete record in the thirteenth year of the Chōḷa-Pāṇḍya king Jaṭavarman *alias* Sundara Chōḷa-Pāṇḍyadēva. Records gift of lamps. The temple here called Tiruvāliścharamuḍaiyār was in Rājarāja-chaturvēdimaṅgalam, a *brahmadēya* in Muḷḷi-nāḍu. [The king referred to was evidently the contemporary and feudatory of Rājēndrachōḷa I (1011—43).]

131. 116 of 1905.—(Vaṭṭeḷuttu.) On the same wall. A record in the eleventh year of the Chōḷa king Rājarājakēsarivarman (I, 985—1013). Records gift of land.

132. 117 of 1905.—(Vaṭṭeḷuttu.) On the north and west walls of the same shrine. Records in the eighteenth year an agreement among the villages of Rājarāja-chaturvēdimaṅgalam.

133. 118 of 1905.—(Vaṭṭeḷuttu.) On the same walls. Records in the eighteenth year gift of land.

134. 119 of 1905.—(Vaṭṭeḷuttu.) On the south wall of the same shrine. A record in the eleventh year of the Chōḷa king Rājarājakēsarivarman (I, 985—1013), “who destroyed the ships at Kāndaḷūr-Śālai.” Records gift of land. The village is called Rājarāja-chaturvēdimaṅgalam, a *brahmadēya* in Muḷḷi-nāḍu, a subdivision of Rājarāja-Vāḷanāḍu.

135. 120 of 1905.—(Tamil.) On a pillar set up near the *balipitha* of the same temple. Registers the various victories gained by the Chōḷa army called *Mūṇṇukai-Mahāsēnai* and records that the temple at Tiruvāliśvaram, its treasury and the temple servants were placed under the protection of this army.

Ūrkād.

136. 519 of 1911.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the central shrine in the Gōshṭhiyappar temple. Records in the eleventh year of the Pāṇḍya king Jaṭavarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Kulaśēkharadēva I (1190—1217) gift of land to the shrine of Kshētrapāla in the temple of Tirukkōṭṭiśavīchcharam-Uḍaiyār. Built in in the middle and in the right end. Begins with the introduction *pūvin kiḷatti*, etc.

137. 520 of 1911.—(Tamil.) On the west wall of the same shrine. Records in the twentieth year of the Pāṇḍya king Māravarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Sundara-Pāṇḍyadēva (I, 1216—1235), “who took the Chōḷa country and was pleased to perform the anointment of heroes at Śōḷavandān hall at Āirattali in Muḍigonḍaśōḷapuram,” gift of land for maintaining a flower garden called Sundarapāṇḍyan-tirunandavanam after the name of the

king, to the temple at Rājarāja-chaturvēdi-maṅgalam in Muḷli-nāḍu, at the instance of a minister of Maḷavarāyan. On this occasion some other lands owned by the temple were also made tax-free (*iṟaiyili*).

138. 521 of 1911.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the same shrine. A record of the Pāṇḍya king Māravarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Sundara-Pāṇḍyadēva (I, 1216—35), “who took the Chōḷa country and was pleased to perform the anointment of heroes and victors at Muḍigoṇḍa-śōḷapuram.” Refers to the gifts mentioned in Nos. 136 and 137 and to the temple of Tirukkōṭīśvaram-Uḍaiyār. Built in in the middle and damaged.

139. 522 of 1911.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in the twenty-first year (i.e., 1237) of the Pāṇḍya king Māravarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Sundara-Pāṇḍyadēva (I, 1216—35), “who was pleased to take the Chōḷa country and was pleased to perform the anointment of heroes and victors at Muḍigoṇḍaśōḷapuram,” that a certain Paḷlichchai Vikkiranman Ādichchadēvar *alias* Aghōradēvan of Malai maṇḍalam completed the building of the temple of Tirukkōṭi Īsvaramuḍaiya Nāyanār, which had been left unfinished. Built in at the right end.

Vairāvikuḷam.

139-A. On a stone near the channel. An epigraph, dated Ś. 1570, K.A. 824 (A.D. 1648), recording a gift of lands to the Śūdra priest by Tirumal Nāik of Madura (1623—59). [*Antiquities*, Vol. I, p. 310.]

139-B. On a slab lying in a field. Undated. Gift of lands to the local Gaṇēśa temple. *Ibid.*

Valudūr.

139-C. On a stone north of the Tiruvignēśvara Uḍaiyār temple. Records grant of the village of Śaṅkaranēri, 2½ *mās* and 14 *kāṇi* of land to the god and worshippers in the reign of Tribhuvanachakravartin. *Ins., S. Dts.*, p. 284, No. 80.

139-D. In the western wall of the same temple. Grant of lamp to the deity by Sundara Pāṇḍya in his eleventh year. *Ibid.*, No. 81.

139-E. On a stone in the south side of the temple. A Telugu record, granting land to the deity in the seventh year of Vikrama Pāṇḍyadēva by the local inhabitants. *Ibid.*, No. 82.

KŌVILPATTI TALUK.

Ādanūr.

140. 432 of 1909.—(Vatteḷuttu.) On the south wall of the Ādilingēśvara temple. A damaged record of the Chōḷa king

Rājarājadēva (I), dated twenty-fourth year. Gift of twenty-five sheep for two lamps to the temple of Śūraṅguḍināṭṭichchivarattu-Ālvār at Ādanūr in Śūraṅguḍi-nāḍu. [The existence of the Vaṭṭeḷuttu in Rājarāja's shrine shows that it was not replaced in his age by Tamil.]

141. 433 of 1909.--(Vaṭṭeḷuttu.) On the same wall. Records in the twenty-ninth year of the Chōla king Rājarājadēva gift of twenty-five sheep for a lamp to the temple of Nāṭṭiśvarattālvār at Ādanūr in Śūraṅguḍi-nāḍu.

142. 434 of 1909.--(Vaṭṭeḷuttu.) On the same wall. A damaged record of the Chōla-Pāṇḍya king Māravarman *alias* Uḍaiyār-Śrī-Vikrama-Chōla-Pāṇḍyadēva, dated twentieth year. Mentions Ādanūr in Śūraṅguḍi-nāḍu, which was a subdivision of Muḍigoṇḍa-Chōlavaḷanāḍu in Rājarāja-Pāṇḍināḍu and seems to record a gift of lamps. At the top of this inscription is an incomplete line in Vaṭṭeḷuttu characters which refers to the third year of Jaṭavarman *alias* Sundara-Chōla-Pāṇḍyadēva. [The political divisions were evidently named after Rājendra Chōla I (Muḍigoṇḍa) and Rājarāja I. The Government Epigraphist surmises that Vikrama was the successor of the Viceroy Sundara Chōla-Pāṇḍya, their mutual relationship being unknown.]

143. 435 of 1909.--(Vaṭṭeḷuttu.) On the same wall. A damaged record, the date of which is lost. Mentions Rājarāja-maṇḍalam, Śūraṅguḍi-nāḍu and Ādanūr.

144. 436 of 1909.--(Tamil.) On the same wall. A fragmentary record of the Pāṇḍya king Māravarman Tribhuvanachakravartin, dated twenty-seventh year. Mentions Śūraṅguḍi-nāḍu and records the gift of a lamp.

145. 437 of 1909.--(Vaṭṭeḷuttu.) On the west wall of the same temple. A fragmentary record; seems to register the gift of a lamp and mentions Ādanūr.

146. 438 of 1909.--(Vaṭṭeḷuttu.) On the north and west walls of the same temple. A damaged record of the Chōla-Pāṇḍya king Jaṭavarman *alias* Uḍaiyār Sundara-Chōla-Pāṇḍyadēva (1021--43), dated twenty-third year. Mentions Ādanūr in Śūraṅguḍi-nāḍu, a subdivision of Muḍigoṇḍa-Chōla-vaḷanāḍu, in Rājarāja-Pāṇḍi-nāḍu.

147. 439 of 1909.--(Vaṭṭeḷuttu.) On the north wall of the same temple. A damaged record of the Chōla-Pāṇḍya king Jaṭavarman *alias* Sundara-Chōla-Pāṇḍyadēva (1021--43), dated eleventh year. Records gift of sheep for a lamp to the temple of Nāṭṭiśvarattālvār at Ādanūr *alias* Udayamārttāṇḍanallūr in Śūraṅguḍi-nāḍu.

148. 440 of 1909.--(Vaṭṭeḷuttu.) On a pillar lying in front of the same temple. Records gift of two pillars and mentions Śoṇāḍu.

149. 441 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On a pillar of a maṅṭapa in front of the same temple. Records gift of the pillar by a certain Iṅṅiyan Kūttan *alias* Ōvādakūttan.

Eṭṭaiyāpuram.

149-A. On a copper-plate attached to the wall of the Śiva temple. Contains the proclamation issued to the people on October 20, A.D. 1799, at the time of the Pāñjālaṅkuruchchi war, to submit to British authority and deliver up their arms to Major Bannerman. [*Antiquities*, Vol. I, p. 306.]

Kalugumalai.

See *Antiquities*, Vol. I, p. 307, for the enumeration of the antiquities of this place and the excellent bibliographical references given therein. [Notice the comparison of the rock-cut temple with that of the seven pagodas and Kailāsa.] It is attributed to the eleventh century.

150. 18 of 1894.—(Tamil.) On a stone lying in the compound of the Sub-Registrar's office. A record in the twenty-third year of the Pāṇḍya king Kō-Jaṭāvarman *alias* Sundara-Chōḷa-Pāṇḍya-dēva (1021--43). Records gift of land.

151. 19 of 1894.—(Vaṭṭeḷuttu.) On a stone lying near the Aiyanār temple in the same place. [Caldwell notes that the Vaṭṭeḷuttu in each is in a different form and this was probably due to "the sculptors having apparently amused themselves" by varying the shape of the letters.]

152—210. 20 to 78 of 1894.—(Vaṭṭeḷuttu.) On the rock at Kalugumalai, first section (except Nos. 68 and 72, which are in Tamil characters). No details given.

211—216. 79 to 84 of 1894.—(Vaṭṭeḷuttu.) On the same rock, second section. No details given.

217—236. 85 to 104 of 1894.—(Vaṭṭeḷuttu.) On the same rock, third section. No details given.

237—247. 105 to 115 of 1894.—(Vaṭṭeḷuttu.) On the same rock, fourth section. No details given.

248. 116 of 1894.—(Vaṭṭeḷuttu.) On the same rock, between the second and third sections. A record of the Pāṇḍya king Kō-Māran Śaḍaiyan, the date of which is indistinct. [Was this king the same as Māran-Śaḍayān of the Ānaimalai record who lived about A.D. 770? It is very probable, as he was the conqueror of the Chēras at Viḷinam.]

249. 117 of 1894.—(Vaṭṭeḷuttu.) In the same place. A record of the Pāṇḍya king Kō-Māran Śaḍaiyan, the date of which is indistinct. See note to the above epigraph.

250. 43 of 1908.—(Vaṭṭeḷuttu.) On a slab set up in the Kośakkūḍi street. A record of the twenty-third year of the Pāṇḍyan king Mārañjaḍaiyan. Refers to an expedition against Arividurkōṭṭai and mentions Pūndanmali in Toṇḍaināḍu. [It is not improbable that the king referred to is the king of the Ānaimalai record, A.D. 770. He fought with the Pallavas under Nandivarman Pallavamalla and the present epigraph apparently refers to his campaign in the north.]

Kayattār.

This place is called Kaśattalāru in inscriptions and is said to have belonged to Āśūr-nāḍu.

251. 18 of 1912.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the central shrine in the Kōdaṇḍarāmēśvara temple. A damaged record of the Pāṇḍya king Māravarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Kōnērmaikoṇḍān Sundara-Pāṇḍyadēva, in his eighth year and Ś. 1461, Vikārin. Registers a gift to the temple of Kōdaṇḍarāmīśuramuḍaiya-Nāyanār at Kaśattalāru *alias* Sundara-Pāṇḍyanallūr in Āśūr-nāḍu. [Was this king the same as that Māravarman Sundara Pāṇḍya who came to the throne between June 2, A.D. 1531 and June 1, 1532?]

252. 19 of 1912.—(Tamil.) On the east wall of the same shrine. A much damaged record of the Pāṇḍya king Māravarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Kōnērmaikoṇḍān Sundara-Pāṇḍyadēva, in his sixth year and Ś. 1459. Mentions the same temple and refers to the service called Sundara-Pāṇḍyan-śandi therein established in the name of the king. See note to the above epigraph.

253. C.P. No. 57 of Mr. Sewell's List.—Registers in Ś. 1549 (A.D. 1627), K.A. 803, grant of some lands in the "Kaittār" province to Iruṅkōḷ Pillai, the chief of Korkai, on account of his having settled a boundary dispute by Vijaya Raṅga Chokkanātha Nāyaka. [Vijaya Raṅga could not of course be the king of that name who ruled from 1689 to 1731.]

Paśuvantanai.

253-A. (Telugu.) On a wall of the local Subrahmaṇya temple. "The Ettiyaḍapuram Zamindar possesses an inscription on a copperplate recording a gift to the temple here by the Pānjālaṅkurichi Polegar in ŚŚ. 1695 (A.D. 1773)". [Antiquities, Vol. I, p. 308.]

Śōlapuram.

254. 482 of 1909.—(Grantha and Tamil.) On the north wall of the central shrine in the Vikramapāṇḍyēśvara temple. A record of the Pāṇḍya king Kulaśekhara-Perumāḷ *alias* Parākrama Māran

Aḷagiya-Śokkanār in Ś. 1495 (A.D. 1573) and second year, Śrī-mukha. Records gift of land. Also records that one of the Kaikkōḷars of the temple of Chintāmaṇinātha at Vāsudēvanallūr in Ariya-nāḍu was appointed the manager of this temple. [The king should have been a coregent of Ativīrarāman Srīvallabha.]

255. 483 of 1909.—(Grantha and Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in Ś. 1483 and thirteenth year, Durmati, of the Pāṇḍya king Dharmapperumāḷ Kulaśēkharadēva gift of land to a Mudaliyār who was originally manager in the temple of Tiruvālaivāy-Uḍaiyār at Māḍakkuḷattin-kīḷ-Madura, in the Madhurōdaya-vaḷanāḍu and was now appointed as the temple accountant under orders from prince Aḷagan-Perumāḷ Ativīrarāman (1562—1610).

256. 484 of 1909.—(Grantha and Tamil.) On the same wall. An unfinished record of the Pāṇḍya king Perumāḷ Ativīrarāman *alias* Śīvaladēva, dated Ś. 1509 (A.D. 1587) and twenty-fourth year, Sarvajit. [The king therefore came to the throne in 1562.]

257. 485 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the verandah round the same shrine. A much damaged record of Tribhuvana-chakravartin Kōnērinmaikoṇḍān, dated Ś. 1444 and fifth year. Seems to record a gift of land for a festival called Avanivēndarāman-śandi, after the name of the king, to the temple of Vikrama-pāṇḍīśvaramudaiya-Nāyanār of Śōḷapuram in Ānmānāḍu.

258. 486 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A much damaged record of Tribhuvanachakravartin Kōnērinmēlkoṇḍān, dated fifth year. Records gift of land for a festival established in the same temple, in the name of the king.

259. 487 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the west wall of the same verandah. A record of the Pāṇḍya king Jaṭāvarman Tribhuvana-chakravartin Parākrama-Pāṇḍyadēva in Ś. 1244 and in his eighth year, gift of land. As Kielhorn gives a Māravarman Kulaśēkhara II from 1315 onward it is plain that the Jaṭāvarman of this inscription was a joint ruler with him. There was a Jaṭāvarman Parākrama who ruled from 1357 onward. See *Ep. Ind.*, Vol. IX, 226 ff. and *Ep. Rep.*, 1910, p. 97.

260. 488 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the same verandah. A damaged record of Tribhuvanachakravartin, dated seventh year. Records gift of land.

261. 489 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On a pillar in the maṇṭapa at the entrance into the same temple. Records gift of the pillar by an individual who prayed for a son.

262. 490 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the inner gōpura of the same temple, left of entrance. Records in the thirty-sixth year of the Pāṇḍya king Māravarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Kulaśēkharadēva (I, 1268—1308) "who was pleased to take every country," gift of subscriptions to the temple by the merchants

of certain specified villages, at the rate of 1/80th *panam* on each cloth which they sold.

263. 491 of 1909.—(Tamil.) In the same place. An incomplete record of the Pāṇḍya king Māravarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Kulaśēkharadēva (1268—1308), “who was pleased to take every country,” dated thirty-seventh year. Records that the Mahēśvaras of the temple agreed to conduct a festival from the rent realized on a house presented to it, by a private individual. Refers to a certain Umayōrupāgar *alias* Śorṛagaṅgaḍindān who was evidently different from the saint of that name referred to in No. 414 below.

264. 492 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the outer main gōpura of the same temple. Records that this gōpura was built by Sundara Pāṇḍya.

265. 493 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the east wall of the maṅṭapa in front of the central shrine in the Veṅkaṭāchalapati-Perumāḷ temple in the same village. An incomplete record of the Pāṇḍya king Jaṭāvarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Śrīvallabhadēva, dated fourth year (contemporary of Jaṭāvarman Sundara Pāṇḍya I). Fixes the boundaries of Sundarapāṇḍya-chaturvēdimaṅgalam which was the *dēvadāna* village of the temple of Sundarapāṇḍya-Viṅṅagar-Āḷvār under orders from prince (*pillaiyār*) Sundarapāṇḍyadēva, while he was staying at Arugaikunṛattūr in Ānmā-nāḍu. [The change in the name of the village was evidently after the prince.]

266. 494 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Dated in the sixth year of the Pāṇḍya king Jaṭāvarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Vīra-Pāṇḍyadēva. Refers to a maṅṭapa, a portion of which was built by Uḍaiyār Kaḷappāḷar in the temple of Uttamaśōḷa-Viṅṅagar-Emberumān in Ānmā-nāḍu and to Uttamaśōḷa-Chaturvēdimaṅgalam. [This king, points out the Government Epigraphist, cannot be identified with any in Kielhorn's list. Was he the king who ascended the throne in A.D. 1253?]

267. 495 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A damaged record of the Pāṇḍya king Māravaram *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Vikrama-Pāṇḍyadēva, dated sixth year. Records gift of money for lamps. [Mr. Krishna Sastri believes that the same king is referred to in S.A. 813.]

268. 496 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Kōnērimaikōṇḍān records in his sixteenth year gift of taxes to the temple of Uttamaśōḷa-Viṅṅagar-Āḷvār in Ānmā-nāḍu.

269. 497 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Dated in the thirteenth year of Tribhuvanachakravartin Kōnērimēlkoṇḍān and 1119th day. Records that a few specified villages clubbed together as Sundarapāṇḍya-chaturvēdimaṅgalam received the new name

Uttamaśōḷa-chaturvēdimāṅgalam after that of the grandson (*pēra-nār*) Uttamaśōḷan-pēraraiyar and was granted to the temple of Uttamaśōḷa-ṽiṅṅagar-Āḷvār. [Mr. Krishna Sastri surmises that Kōnērinmaikoṅḍān might be the son of Uttamaśōḷa who was the son of Prince Sundarā Pāṅḍya referred to in 265. The inscription says that the villages suffered from famine and heavy taxation, that people deserted, lands remained uncultivated and temple worship ceased; that the king was then petitioned to and he reclaimed them once again, changing the name of the villages and deity to that of his father(?) Uttamaśōḷa.]

270. 498 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the lintel of the main entrance into the same temple. Dated in the thirty-eighth year of the Pāṅḍya king Kulaśēkharadēva. Records that a certain Vīran Kōlaṅgariyān *alias* Vēṅavudaiyān of Kaḷattāvūr *alias* Onnālakīrtinallūr in Śevvirukkai-nāḍu, built in the temple of Uttamaśōḷa-ṽiṅṅagar-Āḷvār, the following maṅṭapas:—(1) antarāḷa-maṅṭapa to the east of the ardha-maṅṭapa in which the Perumāl and Mannār were seated and (2) mahā-maṅṭapa in front of it with the *sōpāna*, (i.e., steps) (on either side of it?).

271. 499 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the east wall of the same temple, right of entrance. A damaged record of the Pāṅḍya king Jaṭāvarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Śivalladēva, dated ninth year. Mentions Uttamaśōḷa-ṽiṅṅagar.

272. 500 of 1909.—(Tamil.) In the same place. A record of Kōnērimēlkoṅḍān, dated in his tenth year. Records gift of land to the shrine of Sundarapāṅḍyadēva-ṽiṅṅagar-Āḷvār, built by Nāchiyār Nambiyāṅḍār in the temple of Uttamaśōḷa-ṽiṅṅagar-Āḷvār. Built in at the end.

273. 501 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the same wall, left of entrance. A record of the Pāṅḍya king Kulaśēkharadēva, dated in his thirty-eighth year. (A duplicate copy of No. 270.)

274. 502 of 1909.—(Tamil.) In the same place. Dated in the twenty-fifth year of the Pāṅḍya king Māravarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Kulaśēkharadēva I (1268—1308) who was pleased to take every country. Records in his twenty-fifth year gift of land for offerings.

NĀNGUNĒRI TALUK.

Eruvādi.

274-A. An inscription, dated in K.A. 876 (1700), in the local temple.

274-B. A C.P. grant dated in K.A. 476 (A.D. 1300) in the hands of a local man Tirukkuruṅvai Perumāl Piḷḷai.

Kalakkādu.

275. 129 of 1905.—(Tamil.) On the east wall of the central shrine in the Perumāḷ temple. A record of the Vijayanagara king Sadāśivadēva-Mahārāja in Ś. 1457, expired, Parābhava (wrong). Mentions Rāmappa-Nāyaka, agent of the Mahāmaṇḍalēśvara Rāmarāja-Timmarāja-Viṭṭhaladēva-Mahārāja and Kalakkāḍu *alias* Śōḷakulavallipuram. For Viṭṭhala's invasion of Travancore see my *Hist., Nāik Kingdom, Madura, in Ind. Antq., 1914.*

276. 130 of 1905.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the Satyavāgīśvara temple in the same village. A record in K.Ā. 676. The temple is called Puravērīchchuvaramuḍaiya-Nāyinār at Pachchāruppōkku-Kalakkāḍu *alias* Śōḷakulavallipuram in Vānavannāḍu.

277. 131 of 1905.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record in K.A. 688. The inscription is signed by Māttāṇḍan Māttāṇḍan.

278. 132 of 1905.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the central shrine in the Gōmati-Amman temple in the same village. A record in K.A. 708. The inscription is signed by Rāman Rāman and reference is made to Ilaiyān Māttāṇḍakkuṭṭi Vēṇavuḍaiyān in the beginning.

278-A—L. In his *Antiquities* Mr. Sewell gives twelve inscriptions in the place, the dates of some of which are probably inaccurate. Four of these are dated in K.A. 689, K.A. 552 (?), K.A. 552? and K.A. 685 and record grants by Mārttāṇḍavarman while residing in the "Vīra Pāṇḍyan palace" at this place. One inscription, dated K.A. 575 (A.D. 1399), records grant of lands to temple by Karamani Appan. The next three records, dated in K.A. 680, K.A. 697, and K.A. 697, are also grants by Mārttāṇḍavarman. Three records of the same sovereign are in Gōmati Amman temple and dated in K.A. 707, K.A. 721 and K.A. 721. The last of the series is an inscription of K.A. 721 in Chaṇḍīśvar Amman temple. [See *Antiquities*, p. 314.].

278-M. On the north wall of the Jamadagnīśvara temple. A record of Parākrama Pāṇḍyadēva, son of Abhirāma Parākrama, in his sixth year, in Ś. 1470, Kīlaka, Māśi 21, Friday (Śukla II, Uttarāshāḍha). Records gift of six *mās* and one *kāni* of land for various offerings. See *Trav. Arch. Ser.*, p. 268.

278-N. In front of the Jamadagnīśvara temple. A record of the seventh year of Jaṭilavarman Tribhuvanachakravartin Kulāśekhara *alias* Parākrama Pāṇḍya, son of Abhirāma Parākrama, in Ś. 1472, Sādhāraṇa, Tulā 25, Śu. 15, Uttarāshāḍha, recording the appointment of a hereditary accountant of the temple of Śrī Vakkīśvara at Kīḷāṅgāṭṭūr. *Ibid.*, pp. 270-1.

278-O. On the east wall of the Mahāmaṇṭapa of the same temple. A record of Ativīrarāma Pāṇḍya in his fifth year, in

Ś. 1489, Arpaśi 24, Śu. 7, Friday, Pushya, relating to the appointment of an accountant. *Trav. Arch. Ser.*, pp. 275-6.

278-P. On the base of the central shrine of the Venkaṭachalapati temple. A record of Ativīrarāma Pāṇḍya in Ś. 1493, Prajōtpatti, Vaikāśi 15, Śu. 10, Friday, Uttara, relating gift of land to the deity. The king is said to have been born in the Punarvasunakshattra. *Ibid.*, pp. 277-8.

278-Q. In the same place. A record of the same king in the same year, but dated in Kanni 16, Śu. 3, Thursday, Aśvati, relating a gift of land. *Ibid.*, pp. 278-9.

278-R. On a stone under a banyan tree east of the village of Kalaṅgāḍu. A record of Alagan Perumāḷ Ativīrarāma Śrīvallabha in his thirty-eighth year, in Ś. 1522, Plava, Tai 12, relating to the establishment of the village of Śivalanallūr and remittance of the taxes on house-sites for six months. *Ibid.*, p. 280-1.

278-S. A C.P. in the temple of Tiruvēṅkaṭanāthapperumāḷ, in the village. Records that Vallabhadēva granted the land of "Natittu Vendrum cadama colum" belonging to Pampuli as free gift to the God Tiruvēṅkaṭanātha, in Ś. 1493, Prajōtpatti. *Ins.*, S. Dts., p. 298, No. 4.

278-T. On the southern wall of the *vimānam* in the temple. A record of the same grant by the same king in the same year. *Ibid.*, No. 5.

278-U. On a stone in the east of the temple of Jamadagnīśvara in the village. Records that Bālamārttāṇḍakula Rāja Śinnaṇaṅjadēva and another granted $5\frac{1}{2}$ *kōttas* of productive land and groves of different trees in the village for the worship and offering food to the God Jamadagnīśvara, in Ś. 1665. *Ibid.*, No. 6.

278-V. On a stone situated on the north of the temple of Jamadagnīśvarasvāmi. Records that Periyamudaliār and Tilarappamudaliār granted some lands for the worship of the God Jamadagnīśvara, in Ś. 961, Viśvāvasu. *Ibid.*, p. 300, No. 7.

278-W. On the southern wall of the *vimānam* in the temple. Records that Kulaśēkharadēva granted $1\frac{1}{2}$ *mā* of land and 2 *kōttas* of grain per month, eight measures of food, two measures of grain and one measure of rice per day in the village to the Brahman Pandataṇḍasvāmi(?) Bhaṭṭar for worship in two temples, during the fifteenth year of his reign in Ś. 1416. *Ibid.*, No. 8.

278-X. On the north wall of the *vimānam* in the temple. Records that Kulaśēkharavarma granted eight *mā* and one *kāni* of land in the village to the God Tiruvighnēśvara Uḍaiyār Nāyanar for the first prayer worship, in Ś. 1470, Kīlaka, in the reign of Raghuvīra Pāṇḍyadēva. *Ibid.*, p. 301, No. 9.

278-Y. On a stone in the maṅṭapam on the south of the temple of Jamadagnīśvarasvāmi. Records that Āttūr Uḍaiyān

granted one *mā* of land in a village for two lamps to the God Tiruvighnēśvara Uḍaiyār Nāyanār, in the twentieth year of the reign of Sada (?) Pāṇḍya Dēva. *Ins., S. Dts.*, p. 301, No. 10.

278-Z-1. On a stone in the east of the temple of Jamadagnīśvarasvāmi. A damaged record of a grant by Sundara Pāṇḍyadēva to the Gods Tiruvighnēśvara Uḍaiyār Nāyanār and Hanūmān, during the twentieth year of his reign. *Ibid.*, p. 302, No. 11.

278-Z-2. On the west of the above. Records that Śrīvaliputtūr Dēva nominated an accountant to the pagoda of Tiruvighnēśvara in the village, in Ś. 689, Vibhava. *Ibid.*, No. 12.

Koḍasēri.

279. 133 of 1905.—On a stone set up near the village. A record in Ś. 1620, K. 4799, Bahudhānya. Records gift of land.

Padmanēri.

280. *C.P. No. III of Mr. Sewell's List.*—This is the same as C.P. No. 14 of 1905-6. Records grant of the village of Padmanēri, in the Nāngunēri taluk of the Tinnevely district which was given away by the Madura Nāyakka, Kumāra Kṛishṇappa in Ś. 1520, Viḷambi (A.D. 1598). See No. 64 above.

Pattai.

280-A. In the local temple. A record of Ś. 1457 (A.D. 1535) in the time of Achyutarāya (1530—42).

280-B. A gift of lands to the temple in Ś. 1469 (A.D. 1547).

280-C. An “undated and unimportant” inscription.

Tirukkuṅguḍi.

This important centre of Vaishṇavism is referred to in the *Prabandhas* of Nammālvār, Periyālvār and Tirumaṅgai Ālvār.

Mr. Sewell mentions three inscriptions here of which one is identical with No. 282. The other two are given here as 284-A and 284-B. He notes the three copper plates also, but his reading of them is not accurate.

281. 125 of 1905.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the central shrine in the Nambi temple. A record in the thirteenth year of the Pāṇḍya king Māravarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Sundara-Pāṇḍyadēva (I, 1216—35), “who presented the Chōḷa country”. Records an order of the *sabhā* of Rājarāja-chaturvēdimāṅgalam.

282. 126 of 1905.—(Grantha.) On the bell hanging in front of the same shrine. A record in K.A. 644 of the Travancore king Ādityavarman (1471—8). Published in *Ind. Antq.*, Vol. II, p. 360; also referred to in *Ep. Ind.*, Vol. IV, p. 146, note 2. See also *Trav. Manual*, Vol. I, pp. 277—8, where Mr. Nagamayya attributes the king to 1472—84.

283. 127 of 1905.—(Tamil verse.) On the same bell. A record in K.A. 644 of the Travancore king Ādityavarman. Tamil version of No. 282.

284. 128 of 1905.—(Vatṭeluttu.) On a stone set up in the northern side of the inner circuit of the same temple. A record in the fourth year of the Pāṇḍya king Mārañjadaiyan. Records gift of land. Mentions Nāṭṭāruppōkku-Brahmadēyam and Vaikuṇḍa-Vaḷanāḍu.

284-A. On the south wall of a maṅṭapam in the temple. Records the excavation of a channel with dams in K.A. 235 (A.D. 1059).

284-B. On the north wall of the same. Records repairs to the same channel in K.A. 848 (A.D. 1672).

285. No. 4 of Appendix A, *Mad. Ep. Rep.*, 1906.—This is a copper-plate grant (Tamil), dated in Ś. 1376, expired, K.A. 630, which mentions the temple of Aḷagia-Nambi at Tirukkuṅguḍi in Nāṭṭāruppōkku-Vaikuṇḍavaḷanāḍu. The God is said to be seated on the Bhujabala Vīra Saundara Rāmavarman's *piṭha* under the canopy called after Udayamārttāṇḍa. [For Vīra Rāmavarman's records and gifts see *Trav. Manual*, Vol. I, p. 276. His dates range from 1439 to 1468.]

286. No. 5 of *ibid.*—A C.P. grant (in Tamil), dated Ś. 1514, expired, K.A. 768, which refers to the God seated on the Bhujabala Vīravasanta Vēṅkaṭadēva Mahārāja's *piṭha* under the same canopy. This shows that Vīravasanta was a *biruda* of Vēṅkaṭa I of Vijayanagara.

287. No. 6 of *ibid.*—A C.P. grant (in Tamil) of the time Vīrapratāpa Sadāśiva Mahārāja, dated Ś. 1459, expired, K.A. 713, *Hēmalamba*, recording the gift of the village of Puliyūrkkuruchchi in Nāṭṭāruppōkku, a district of Tiruvaḍi dēśam, by the son of Aṅṅan Basavaṅṅa Nāyakkar who was an officer of Mahāmaṇḍalēśvara Rājādhirāja Viṭṭhalarāja (the viceroy of the south under Sadāśiva Rāja).

Vijayāpati,

287-A. On a stone in the deserted Aiyanār shrine east of the village. Records a grant of lamps by Kṛishṇappa Nāik in K.A. 745 (A.D. 1569). [Kṛishṇappa was the ruler of Madura from 1562 to 1572.]

SANKARANĀYINĀRKŌYIL TALUK.

*Karivalamvandanallūr.**

Mr. Sewell gives nine inscriptions in this place, of which six have been identified. The remaining three, dated in Ś. 1500, Ś. 1458 and Ś. 1449, are perhaps misreadings of three other epigraphs included here.

288. 268 of 1908.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the central shrine in the Pālvaṇṇanāthasvāmin temple. A record of the Pāṇḍya king Tribhuvanachakravartin Kōṇērmaikoṇḍān Perumāḷ-Śivala-Māravara Guṇarāman *alias* Pāṇḍya-Kulaśekhara-Diṭshakar in Ś. 1574, Nandana, and in his thirty-seventh year. Registers a gift of land to a servant in the temple of Tirukkaḷāvudaiya Tambirānār. [The liṅgam of the local temple is said to be made of crystal. Hence the name Pālvaṇṇanātha or milk-coloured lord.]

289. 269 of 1908.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the same shrine. Registers in Ś. 1572, Vikriti, a gift of land to a servant in the temple of Tirukkaḷāvudaiya Tambirānār. [This inscription is given in *Ins., S. Dts.*, p. 280, No. 61, but contains no details except the date. See also Mr. Sewell's *Antiquities*, No. 5 of his local list, where it is misread.]

290. 270 of 1908.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record of the Pāṇḍya king Jaṭilavarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Kulaśekhara-dēva in Ś. 1324 and in his seventh year. Records gift of land for offerings to the temple of Tirukkaḷāntachchuramudaiya-Nāyanār at Karivaranallūr in Ārināḍu. See Nos. 331 and 333. [This inscription is in *Ins., S. Dts.*, p. 278, No. 53 and Mr. Sewell's Local list, No. 1.]

291. 271 of 1908.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record of the Pāṇḍya king Perumāḷ Śrīvallabhadēva in Ś. 1466, Krōdhi, and in his tenth year. Records gift of gold to the temple of Uḍaiyār-Tirukkaḷāvūr-Nāyanār by the king who calls himself Abhirāma-Parākrama-Pāṇḍyadēvanār *alias* Tirunelvēlipperumāḷ Jaṭilavarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Kōṇērmaikoṇḍān. [This inscription is given in *Ins., S. Dts.*, p. 278, No. 54.]

292. 272 of 1908 (*No. 6 of Mr. Sewell's Local List*).—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the first prakāra of the same temple. A

* The list of Mackenzie's inscriptions given in *Ins., S. Dts.* (pp. 279—82) gives fifteen inscriptions in this place. Of these six have been identified above. The remaining belong to Parākrama Pāṇḍya in his twentieth year; a Tribhuvanachakravartin in Ś. 1300; a Vallabha dēva in Ś. 1490 said to be in his sixty-seventh year (apparently wrong), in Ś. 1470 and his second year; a Parākrama Pāṇḍya in his fifth year (in Plavaṅga), eighth and second years. Almost all these are damaged or record grant of land to the temple. One inscription (*Ins., S. Dts.*, p. 282, No. 69) records that the inhabitants of Śankaranāyanārkōyil settled a dispute between the Sāṇārs and Pariahs in favour of the former.

damaged record of the Pāṇḍya king Jaṭilavarman *alias* Tribhuvana-chakravartin Kōṇērmaikoṇḍān Abhirāma-Varatuṅgarāma *alias* Pāṇḍyadēva, in Ś. 1511, Sarvadhāri, and in his second year. Records gift of land for the celebration of the king's birthday. Mr. Sewell says it was the gift of a tank called Vāhaikkulam.

293. 273 of 1908.—(Grantha and Tamil.) On the same wall. A record of the Pāṇḍya king Jaṭilavarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Kōṇērmaikoṇḍān Abhirāma . . . *alias* Perumāḷ Kulaśēkharadēva, in Ś. 1480, Kālayukta. Mentions Viśvanāthan and Ativīrarāman.

294. 274 of 1908.—(Grantha and Tamil.) On the north wall of the first prakāra of the Pālvaṇṇanāthasvāmin temple. An unfinished record of the Pāṇḍya king Perumāḷ Parākrama-Pāṇḍyadēva in Ś. 1469, Plavaṅga, and in his fourth year.

295. 275 of 1908.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A much damaged record of the Pāṇḍya king Jaṭavarman *alias* Tribhuvana-chakravartin Kōṇērmaikoṇḍān Perumāḷ Abhirāma-Varatuṅgarāman *alias* Vīra-Pāṇḍyadēva in Ś. 1517, Manmatha, and in his tenth year. [See *Ins., S. Dts.*, p. 281, No. 63, and *Antiquities*, Local list, No. 4.]

296. 276 of 1908.—(Grantha and Tamil.) On the same wall. A record of the Pāṇḍya king Jaṭilavarman Tribhuvanachakravartin Kōṇērmaikoṇḍān Perumāḷ Kulaśēkharadēva, in Ś. 1472, Piṅgaḷa (wrong). Seems to record a gift of land and mentions Ativīrarāma and Karivaranallūr in Āri-nāḍu. [According to Mr. Sewell it records gift of land for a *nattuva* of the temple. The *Mack. MSS.* apparently refer to this inscription in *Ins., S. Dts.*, p. 280, No. 60, under date Ś. 1473. See also *Antiquities*, Local list, No. 7.]

297. 277 of 1908.—(Grantha and Tamil.) On the same wall. A damaged record of the Pāṇḍya king Aḷagan Perumāḷ Parākrama-Pāṇḍyadēva in Ś. 1469, Plavaṅga, and in his fifth year. Mentions the king's son Jaṭilavarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Kōṇērmaikoṇḍān Tirunelvēli-perumāḷ, who was born in the nakshatra Aśvati (Aśvini). See No. 274 above.

298. 278 of 1908 (*No. 2 of Mr. Sewell's Local list*).—(Grantha and Tamil.) On the north wall of the kitchen in the same temple. A record of the Pāṇḍya king Aḷagan-Perumāḷ Śrīvallabhadēva (1430—74) in Ś. 1393. Records gift of land for six house-sites in Śrīvallabha-chaturvēdimāṅgalam. Mentions Karivaranallūr in Ārināḍu. [This inscription has been noted in *Mack. MSS., Ins., S. Dts.*, p. 280, No. 577, but no details except the date are given.]

299. 279 of 1908.—(Tamil.) On the inner gōpura of the same temple, left of entrance. A damaged record in Vikrita. Provides for the worship of Nandīśvaramuḍaiya-Nāyinār in the temple of Tirukkiḷāvudaiya-Nāyanār.

300. 280 of 1908.—(Tamil verse.) On the same gōpura right of entrance. Records in Vyaya the construction of the gōpura of the temple of Pālvaṅṅa-nātha.

301. C.P. No. 201 of Mr. Sewell's List.—Records grant of lands to the Śiva temple by "Rāmaliṅga Nāyakka" of Madura, acting under orders of Navāb Asād Sīyal, who has royal titles, in Ś. 1693 (A.D. 1771).

*Śaṅkaranāyinārkōyil.**

302. 281 of 1908.—(Grantha and Tamil.) On the north wall of the Gōmati-amman shrine in the Śaṅkaraliṅgasvāmin temple. A record of the Pāṇḍya king Jaṭilavarman *alias* Tribhuvana-chakravartin Kōnērinmaikoṇḍān Kulaśēkharadēva, in Ś. 1475, Pramādin, and in his third year. Mentions Āri-nāḍu.

303. 282 of 1908.—(Tamil.) On a slab lying in front of the same temple. Records in Kaliyuga 4962, Ś. 1783, and K.Ā. 1036, Durmati, gift by a Tahsildar.

304. 432 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the main gōpura, right of entrance. Registers in Viśvāvasu, Vaikāśi 24, Monday, Uttarāshāḍha, the special privileges to be enjoyed by four low caste people on festive and funeral occasions.

304-A. On a stone in the south side of the Śaṅkaranāyinār temple. Records a grant of land in Ś. 1428 by Parākrama Pāṇḍya. *Ins., S. Dts., p. 280, No. 64.*

304-B. The south side of the ardhamanṭapam. Records grant of 2 *mās* of land, house, daily allowance of food, etc., by Parākrama Pāṇḍya in his second year, to one Kailāsanātha Bhaṭṭa. *Ibid., No. 70.*

304-C. On a stone in the surrounding wall. A grant of land by Parākrama Pāṇḍya in Plavaṅga. *Ibid., No. 71.*

304-D. On a stone in the north wall. Gift of land to the Brahman Sadāśiva Bhaṭṭa by Parākrama Pāṇḍya in Ś. 1413, his second year. *Ibid., No. 72.*

304-E. On the south wall of the tower. An effaced grant of Vallabhadēva in Ś. 1510, Sarvajit, in his twenty-sixth year. *Ins., S. Dts., p. 280, No. 73.* [The king was Ativīra Rāma Pāṇḍya, 1562—1605.]

304-F. On a stone in the north side of the Āvaḍai-amman temple. Grant of the village of Kōṭṭūr to the Goddess by Kulaśēkhara in his third year in Ś. 1475. *Ibid., No. 74.*

304-G. In the same place. An effaced grant of the same king in his thirteenth year, in Ś. 1484. *Ibid., No. 75.*

* The List of Mackenzie Inscriptions given in *Ins., S. Dts.* (p. 281, Nos. 64 and 70—79) gives ten epigraphs in this place. I have included them under Nos. 304-A—K.

304-H. On a stone north of the Amman temple. A damaged record of the sixth year of a Vikramadēva. *Ibid.*, No. 76.

304-I. In the same place. A grant of a village by Parākrama Paṇḍya in Ś. 1479, his sixteenth year. *Ibid.*, No. 77.

304-J. In the south gate of the temple. Gift of land to the *sthānikas* by Vikramadēva Paṇḍya in his sixth year. *Ibid.*, No. 78.

304-K. On a stone in the north side of the same. Grant of land by Tribhuvanachakravartin to the God and Goddess. *Ibid.*, p. 284, No. 79.

Tirumalasangamam and Pudukkūlam.

[Is it the same as Tirumalanāyakkan Pudukkūdi in Śaṅkaranāyinārkōyil taluk?]

304-L. *C.P. No. 52 of Mr. Sewell's List.*—(Telugu.) Records grant of land in the villages of Tirumalasangamam and Pudukkūlam to a Brāhman, in Ś. 1579 (A.D. 1657), Hēviḷambi, by Śrī Raṅga Kṛishṇa Muttu Vīrappa Nāyakka (1682—89), son of Chokkanātha Nāyakka (1659—82), and grandson of Tirumala Nāyakka, (1623—59).

Vannikūdam.

[Is it the same as Vannikkōnēndal in Śaṅkaranāyinārkōyil taluk?]

304-M. *C.P. No. 167 of Mr. Sewell's List.*—Records a sale date by the chief of Vannikūdam in the Tinnevelly district of certain lands to the Tinnevelly temple. The name of the chief is not mentioned. But it is stated that the sale was undertaken in order to increase the merit (*puṇṇiyattukkāha*) of Raṅga Kṛishṇa Muttu Vīrappa Nāyakka (1682—9) and Tiruveṅginātha Ayyar. The Kollam Āṇḍu 858 is given, and the year Durmukhi. [Tiruveṅginātha was the celebrated Mādai Tiruveṅgaḍanāthaiyar of Tamil literary tradition, the translator of the *Prabōdhachandrōdayam* into Tamil.]

Viraśikhāmani.

304-N. 42 of 1908.—In the caves of the rock forming part of the tank-bund of the village. The inscription is said to be in characters of the fourteenth century and to record that a certain Avaiyampukkān got the footprints of Sahajānanda engraved. See Md. 173 for details about Sahajānanda.

SRIVAİKUNTAM TALUK.

Akkāśālai. •

This place was so called because it was the site of the "Mint" of ancient Korkai, on the site of which it stands. See also Māramaṅgalam. For an excellent bibliographical note see *Antiquities*, Vol. I, p. 312. See also *Ind. Antq.*, Vol. VI, p. 80.

305. 165 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the Gaṇeśa temple. A fragmentary record in the thirtieth year of the Chōḷa king Chakravartin Kulōttuṅga-Chōḷadēva (I, 1070—1118). Mentions the temple of Akkaiśālai-Īśvaramuḍaiyār. The present inscription shows that Kulōttuṅga's boast of a Pāṇḍya conquest is a fact.

Koṅgarāyankuruchchi.

305-A. A C.P. grant in the Śiva temple, dated K.Ā. 872 (A.D. 1696).

Māramaṅgalam (ancient Korkai).

306. 157 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the west wall of the Chandraśekhara temple. A damaged record in the twenty-eighth year of the Chōḷa king Rājakēsarivarman *alias* Kulōttuṅga-Chōḷadēva (I). Mentions Chandraśekhara-Īśvaramuḍaiyār.

307. 158 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the Viṅṅirunda-Perumāl temple in the same village. A fragmentary record in the eleventh year of the Pāṇḍya king Tribhuvanachakravartin Kōnērinmaikoṇḍa Vīra-Pāṇḍyadēva. Mentions Māramaṅgalam.

308. 159 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A damaged and incomplete record in the eleventh year of the Pāṇḍya king Vīra-Pāṇḍyadēva.

309. 160 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A fragmentary record.

310. 161 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the same temple. A fragmentary record in the forty-seventh year of the Chōḷa king Kulōttuṅga-Chōḷadēva (I, 1070—1118). Mentions Chōḷēndra-simha-chaturvēdimāṅgalam in Parāntaka-vaḷanāḍu, a subdivision of Rājarāja-Pāṇḍināḍu.

311. 162 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A much damaged record of the Chōḷa king Chakravartin Kulōttuṅga-Chōḷadēva (I, 1070—1118), the date of which is lost.

312. 163 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record in the twenty-sixth year of the Chōḷa king Rājakēsarivarman *alias* Chakravartin Kulōttuṅga-Chōḷadēva (I, 1070—1118). Records the establishment of a water-shed.

313. 164 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the west wall of the same temple. A record in the forty-fourth year of the Chōḷa king Rājakēsarivarman *alias* Chakravartin Kulōttuṅga-Chōḷadēva (I, 1070—1118). Mentions Śrīpuṇḍravardhanam at Chōḷēndrasimha-chaturvēdimāṅgalam in Parāntakavaḷanāḍu (a subdivision) of Muḍikoṇḍa-Chōḷa-vaḷanāḍu (which formed part) of Rājarāja-Pāṇḍināḍu.

Murappunādu.

314. 431 of 1906.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the central shrine in the Vēdanārāyaṇa-Perumāḷ temple. An incomplete record of Tribhuvanachakravartin Kōnērinmaikoṇḍān, dated twelfth year. Records gift of land to the temple of Sōmidēva-Viṇṇagar-Āḷvār at Sōmidēva-chaturvēdimaṅgalam, a *brahmadēya* in Murappunādu.

315. 432 of 1906.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record of Tribhuvanachakravartin Kōnērimēlkoṇḍān. Mentions Murappunādu *alias* Sōmidēva-chaturvēdimaṅgalam and Yādavasimhabhaṭṭa.

316. 433 of 1906.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the same shrine. A mutilated record of Tribhuvanachakravartin Kōnērinmaikoṇḍān. Records that the temple is called Vēdanāyaka-Viṇṇagar-Āḷvār at Murappunādu *alias* Sōmidēva-chaturvēdimaṅgalam.

317. 434 of 1906.—(Tamil.) On the north, west and south walls of the same shrine. A record of Tribhuvanachakravartin Kōnērinmaikoṇḍān in his eleventh year. Records gift of land to the shrine of Sōmidēva-Viṇṇagar-Āḷvār built on the bank of the river Taṇporundavāru at Sōmidēva-chaturvēdimaṅgalam in Murappunādu.

318. 435 of 1906.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record of the Pāṇḍya king Jaṭāvarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Vīra-Pāṇḍyadēva, “who took Īlam (Ceylon), Koṅgu and Śōṇādu and was pleased to perform the anointment of heroes at Perumbarrappuliyūr,” dated in his fourteenth year. Mentions Śrī-Posala-Vīra-Sōmidēva-chaturvēdimaṅgalam, a *brahmadēya* in Murappunādu and a *matha* in it. Refers to a sale made in the eleventh year (of the king’s reign). [Mr. T. A. Gopinatha Rao identifies this king with the Vīra Pāṇḍya of the rock inscription of the Sthānunātha temple at Śuchīndram, “who conquered the Malainādu.” He argues, on the basis of a similar institution at Tirukkaḍavūr (Tanjore district) that this king was the contemporary of Rājādhirāja (II) and Kulōttuṅga (III), and that he was closely related by marriage with the Kēraḷa or Kūpaka king at Kollam. See *Trav. Arch. Ser.* (II, 15—21) for details. Mr. Krishna Sastri, however, points out that as the Hoysala Vīra Sōmēśvara, the uncle of Sundara Pāṇḍya (II, 1239—51) is referred to, king Vīra Pāṇḍya should have been later and was probably identical with the king who, according to Kielhorn, had the initial date 1253. See Shermādēvi inscriptions.]

Śrivaikuṇṭham.

319. 172 of 1895.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the shrine in the Kailāsapati temple. A record of the Pāṇḍya king Vīra-Pāṇḍyadēva in his twentieth year and Ś. 1363, expired.

320. 173 of 1895.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the maṅṭapa in front of the same shrine. A record in the fifteenth year of the Pāṇḍya king Vīra-Pāṇḍyadēva. Records gift of land.

321. 174 of 1895.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record in the fifteenth year of the Pāṇḍya king Vīra-Pāṇḍyadēva. Records gift of land.

322. 175 of 1895.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record in the fifteenth year of the Pāṇḍya king whose name is lost. Records gift of land.

323. 176 of 1895.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record in the fifteenth year of the Pāṇḍya king Vīra-Pāṇḍyadēva.

324. 177 of 1895.—(Tamil.) On the east wall of the maṅṭapa in front of the shrine in the Vaikuṅṭhanātha temple, right of entrance. A record in the thirty-sixth year of Tribhuvanachakravartin Kōnērimēlkoṇḍān. Records gift of land.

325. 178 of 1895.—(Tamil.) On the same wall, left of entrance. A record of the Pāṇḍya king Kō-Māravarman *alias* Vīra-Pāṇḍyadēva in his nineteenth year and Ś. 1361, expired. Records gift of land. [The king was co-regent with Arīkēsari Parākrama (1422—1464), the builder of the Tenkāsi temple.]

Tirukālūr.

325-A. In the Śēra-Śōḷa-Pāṇḍyēśvara temple. A record, dated in K.Ā. 707 (A.D. 1531-2), recording a grant by king Mārttāṇḍavarman of Travancore. [*Antiquities*, Vol. I, p. 314 and Shungoony Menon's *Hist. of Trav.*, pp. 34 and 35.]

Terkukārasēri.

This place was included in the Amudaguṇa vaḷanāḍu and known by the name of Ulaguyyavanda-Pāṇḍyanallūr.

326. 20 of 1912.—(Tamil.) On the west wall of the central shrine in the Kulaśēkharanātha temple. A record in the fourth year of the Pāṇḍya king Māravarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Kulaśēkharadēva (I, ? 1268—1308). Records gift of land and certain specified tolls for offerings, etc., to the temple of Kulaśēkharīśvaram-uḍaiya-Nāyinār at Kāraisēri in Amudaguṇa-vaḷanāḍu. Mentions Kannāṭṭaraśar.

327. 21 of 1912.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record in the twenty-second year of the Pāṇḍya king Māravarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Kulaśēkharadēva (I, 1268—1308), "who was pleased to take every country." Records gift of a lamp to the temple at Kāraiyeṛi *alias* Ulaguyyavandapāṇḍyanallūr in Amudaguṇavaḷanāḍu.

328. 22 of 1912.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the same shrine. A record in the thirteenth year of the Pāṇḍya king

Kulaśēkharadēva (1268—1308), “who was pleased to take every country.” Built in in the middle. A deed of contract (*pidipādu*) granted to Āṇḍār-Sundara-Perumāḷ who was doing the *māthāpatya* in the temple of Kulaśēkhara-Īchcharamuḍaiya-Nāyanār, by the residents of the village. Mentions *santānachchūpam* which literally means “curse on children.”

329. 23 of 1912.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the maṅṭapa in front of the same shrine. A damaged record in Ś. 1553 and K.Ā. 805, Pramōda. Mentions Kāriśēri in Amudaguṇa-vaḷanāḍu and seems to record a gift for the merit of Periyānāyakkar-ayyan.

330. 24 of 1912.—(Tamil.) On a slab set up near the tank in a field of the same village. A damaged record in Ś. 1711 and K.Ā. 964, Kīlaka. Seems to record repairs to the shrine of the goddess Aramvaḷarttanman in the temple of Kulaśēkharanātha at Kāriśēri, by a native of Āḷvār Tirunagari.

TENKĀSI TALUK.

Ilaiñji.

331. 528 of 1911.—(Tamil.) On the west wall of the Iruvālīśvara shrine in the Kumārasvāmin temple. Records in Ś. 1331 (A.D. 1409) and fourteenth year of the Pāṇḍya king Māravarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Kulaśēkharadēva that the temple was restored “from the foundation to the pinnacle” by king Aḷagan Kulaśēkharadēva. [So the king came to the throne in A.D. 1395. See Nos. 290 and 333 for the same king.]

332. 529 of 1911.—(Tamil.) On the west and south walls of the same shrine. A record in the thirty-third year of the Pāṇḍya king Māravarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Srīvallabhadēva regarding the claim of a certain priest in the temple of Iruvarku-Īśvaramuḍaiya-Nāyanār at Ilaiñji *alias* Sundara-Pāṇḍyanallūr in Tenvāri-nāḍu which had been overlooked by the king’s elder brother on account of the priest’s absence from the place and distributed among three others. The king while staying in the temple of Tirukkurrālamuḍaiya-Nāyanār, decided, on the representation made by the priest’s sons, that a fourth share must be restored to the original claimants. [Was the king the same as he who came to the throne in 1258?]

333. 530 of 1911.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the maṅṭapa in front of the Subrahmaṇya shrine, in the same temple. Records in the tenth year of the Pāṇḍya king Jaṭāvarman *alias* Tribhuvana-chakravartin Kōnērinmaikoṇḍān Kulaśēkharadēva that the king, while encamped at Vāsudēvanallūr in Tenvāri-nāḍu, appointed three priests to perform worship in the temple of Tiruppāgīśuramuḍaiya-Nāyinār at Sundarapāṇḍyanallūr, there being none of the Śivadya (*sivadviya*) community at that place to undertake the

work. [Mr. Krishna Sastri identifies this king with him who figures in Nos. 290 and 331, though the title is inconsistent.]

Kuttālam.

334-335. *C.P. Nos. 182 and 183 of Mr. Sewell's List.*—(Tamil.) Records of a document whereby the Piḷḷai caste people of the Tinnevely district bind themselves in Ś. 1676 (A.D. 1754), K.A. 930, Bhava, to pay a regular tax for the support of the evening worship at that temple. Each grant is roughly executed, and bears a number of Śaiva figures. On the back of No. 182, and copied into No. 183, is an agreement by the authorities of the Tiruvāḍuturai *matham* to collect this tax.

336. *C.P. No. 184 of Mr. Sewell's List.*—Records an agreement by certain villagers in Ś. 1710 (A.D. 1788), K. A. 964, Kīlaka, to pay tax to the temple.

336-A. On a stone in the eastern gate of the temple. Records that “Sri Vellee Devur” granted a village to the temple in his fourteenth year, Ś. 1498, Dhātu. *Ins., S. Dts., p. 291, No. 113.*

337. 203 of 1895.—(Grantha and Tamil.) On the south wall of the second prakāra of the Kuttālanātha temple. A record of the Pāṇḍya king Parākrama-Pāṇḍyadēva in his thirty-first year and Ś. 1337, expired. Records gift of land. [So this king came to the throne in 1384 and ruled till at least 1415.]

338. 204 of 1895.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record in the thirty-fifth year of the Pāṇḍya king Kō-Jaṭilavarman *alias* Parākrama-Pāṇḍyadēva. Records gift of land. [Was he the king who came to the throne in 1334 or one of the later ones of Tenkāsi?]

339. 25 of 1912.—On the rock in the cavern called Paradēsi-poḍai. The characters and symbols of the record are quite unintelligible as “they bear no resemblance except by accident to any of the known vernacular alphabets of Southern India.” [No information is available about the origin of this name. For a description of the cavern and the curious figures in it see *Ep. Rep.*, 1912, p. 57.]

340-341. Two *C.P.* grants of the Pāṇḍya king Śivala Varagunarāma Kulaśēkharadēva Dīkshita. Record in Ś. 1675 (A.D. 1753), K.A. 930, Bhava, Kārttikai 26 (Sunday, Navami, Uttira nakshattra), that two armies (Karnāṭaka and others) established an evening offering to the God Kuttālanātha by offering the annual payment of ten *paṇams* for palanquin owners, three for horsemen, one for footmen and one for others. [This king is one hundred and fifty years later than his namesake of the Śambūr Vaḍagarai inscription. See *Trav. Arch. Ser.*, Vol. I, pp. 149—152.]

Śivalarkuḷam.

341-A. A stone inscription in the Śiva temple, dated K.A. 847 (A.D. 1671).

Śuraṇḍai.

341-B & C. Two inscriptions in the local Śiva temple, dated K.A. 910 (A.D. 1735) and K.A. 921 (A.D. 1746).

Teṅkāsi.

342. 506 of 1909.—(Tamil verse.) On the main gōpura of the Viśvanātha temple, left of entrance. Records in Ś. 1385 that Perumāḷ Māran Parākrama *alias* Parākrama Pāṇḍya (1422—64), died in this year. See No. 355 below and *Trav. Arch. Ser.*, Vol. I, pp. 95--8.

343. 507 of 1909.—(Tamil verse.) In the same place. Records in Ś. 1368, that king Arikēsari Parākrama repaired the central shrine in this year and reconsecrated it in Ś. 1369. [Mr. Gopinatha Rao points out that it is not a question of repair but original construction. See No. 367 below.]

344. 508 of 1909.—(Tamil verse.) In the same place. Records in Ś. 1474, Pāridhāvi, that Nelvēli Māran Vīravēḷ Kulaśekhara-Śeliyan also called Ponnān Pāṇḍiyan was crowned in this year and that a Vīra-venbāmālai was composed in honour of the occasion. *Ibid.*, Vol. I, pp. 104-5.

345. 509 of 1909.—(Tamil verse.) In the same place. Records in Ś. 1486, Raktākshi, that Aḷagan Śivalavēḷ (i.e., Ativīra Rāma Pāṇḍya) was crowned in this year. *Ibid.*, pp. 105-6.

346. 510 of 1909.—(Tamil verse.) In the same place. A record in praise of the nine storeyed gōpura which was built by Perumāḷ-Vaḷudi.

347. 511 of 1909.—(Tamil verse.) In the same place. Records in Kaliyuga 4558, and Ś. 1379, that the foundation (*upāna*) for the tower was laid in this year under the direction of Vaḷudi-Parākrama. See No. 366.

348. 512 of 1909.—(Tamil verse.) On the same gōpura, right of entrance. Records in Kali. 4689, that Vēlvīramāran *alias* Abhirāman crowned himself under the name of Vīra Pāṇḍya. [The terms *Aṅmaṅgalam*, *Kuḍaimaṅgalam* and *Vāṅmaṅgalam* are, as Mr. Gopinatha Rao points out, not villages but verses of praise on the coronation, the umbrella and the sword of the king. *Ibid.*, Vol. I, pp. 115-6.

349. 513 of 1909.—(Tamil verse.) In the same place. Records the praise of Parākrama-Pāṇḍya.

350. 514 of 1909.—(Tamil verse.) In the same place. Records that Aḷagan Kulaśekhara (1430—74) completed the gōpura which had been left unfinished by his brother (*aṅṅāḷvi*). [*Ibid.*, Vol. I, p. 103.]

351. 515 of 1909.—(Tamil verse.) In the same place. Records in Ś. 1518, *Durmukhi*, the thirty-ninth year of the Pāṇḍya king Perumāḷ Aḷaganperumāḷ Ativīrarāman *alias* Śivaladēva,

that the taxes collected, by mistake, at Viśvanāthanallūr were returned to the temple and that the village was confirmed as a *sarvamānya* to the same temple. [This is the last date of Ativīra Rāma at Tenkāśi.]

352. 516 of 1909.—(Tamil verse.) In the same place. Records three verses in praise of Vīra-Pāṇḍya Abhirāman, “who conquered Viḷḷavan and captured Vallam.” The king also seems to have borne the surname Vīramāran Śeḷiyan. [The Government Epigraphist identifies him with Māravarman Vīra Pāṇḍya, the co-regent of Arikēsari Parākrama, the owner of the surnames of Kaliyugarāman and Tirunelvēlipperumāḷ.]

353. 517 of 1909.—(Tamil verse.) In the same place. Refers to the charities of Korkai Parākrama Māran also called Parākrama-Pāṇḍya and Arikēsari, to the temple of Viśvanātha.

354. 518 of 1909.—(Tamil verse.) In the same place. Records the gift mentioned in No. 351.

355. 519 of 1909.—(Tamil verse.) In the same place. Records that Parākrama-Pāṇḍya, also called Parākramakkaitavan Mānakavachan Korkkaivēndan Arikēsari and Ponnin-Perumāḷ, finished the work of the gōpura in six years and died. For his actual date of death see 342 above.

356. 520 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the west wall of the maṇṭapa in front of the central shrine in the same temple. Records in Ś. 1381 and thirty-ninth year of the Pāṇḍya king Arikēsaridēva *alias* Parākrama-Pāṇḍyadēva gift of land in Nallūrpaṇṇu, a subdivision of Tennāri-nāḍu, to Tattvaparakāśa, one of the religious teachers living in the street called Vitaraṇavinōdan-perunderuvu, west of the temple. [Tamil literature is aware of two Tattvaparakāśas, the authors of the commentary on *Śivagñānasiddhiyār* and *Tattvaparakāśam*.]

357. 521 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the same maṇṭapa. Records in the thirty-second year of the Pāṇḍya king Jaṭilavarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Parākrama-Pāṇḍyadēva gift of land in the same division, to the shrine of the goddess Ulagamūḷuḍumuḍaiya-Nāchchiyār. [Was the king the founder of the Tenkāśi temple, 1422--64?]

358. 522 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in the thirteenth year of the Pāṇḍya king Māravarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Vīra-Pāṇḍyadēva gift of land for offerings. [Was he the co-regent of the king referred to in the above epigraph?]

359. 523 of 1909.—(Grantha and Tamil.) On the same wall. A record of the Pāṇḍya king Aḷagan-Perumāḷ *alias* Kulaśēkhara-dēva (1430--74), dated in Ś. 1395 and forty-third year, to the works done in connexion with the temple (from *upāna* up to the

stūpi) and the gōpura, by Arikēsaridēva *alias* Parākrama-Pāṇḍyadēva and states that the king built the Ōlakkamaṇṭapa (i.e., the hall of audience) for the God.

360. 524 of 1909.—(Grantha and Tamil.) On the same wall. A record of the Pāṇḍya king Aḷagan-Perumāḷ Kulaśēkharadēva (1430—74) providing in Ś. 1395, his forty-third year, for offerings in a shrine of Vishṇu built by Tiruvāli Śrīraṅgarāja-Brahmādhirāyan within the prakāra of the temple at Tenkāsi, which was situated on the northern bank of the river Chitranadi in Tennārināḍu.

361. 525 of 1909.—(Grantha and Tamil.) On the same wall. A damaged record of the Pāṇḍya king Jaṭilavarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Kōnērimaikōṇḍān Perumāḷ Kulaśēkharadēva, "who revived the old time," dated Ś. 1457, Manmatha. Records that the king received the usual *birudas* of the later Pāṇḍyas. Seems to record a gift of land. [It is difficult to identify this king and show his exact relation to *Iranda-kālamedutta* Śrīvallabha, A.D. 1533.]

362. 526 of 1909.—(Grantha and Tamil.) On the east wall of the same maṇṭapa, right of entrance. A record of the Pāṇḍya king Arikēsaridēva *alias* Parākrama-Pāṇḍyadēva (1422—64) in Ś. 1384 and in his forty-first year. Records gift of land to a servant of the temple. Refers to a gift of offerings made to the shrine of the goddess by prince (?) Venṅumālaiyiṭṭa-Perumāḷ Vīra-Pāṇḍyadēva.

363. 527 of 1909.—(Grantha and Tamil.) On the north wall of the verandah round the same shrine. A record of the Pāṇḍya king Perumāḷ Tirunelvēlipperumāḷ Dharmaperumāḷ Kulaśēkharadēva, son of Jaṭilavarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Kōnērimaikōṇḍān Abhirāman-Parākrama-Pāṇḍyadēva, dated in Ś. 1485 and twelfth year, Rudhirōdgārin. The king referred to is the same as in No. 344 above.

364. 528 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record of the Pāṇḍya king Jaṭilavarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Kōnērimaikōṇḍān Perumāḷ Aḷagan-Perumāḷ, Ativīrarāman *alias* Śrīvallabhadēva (1562—1610), dated in Ś. 1505 and twenty-first year, Subhānu. Refers to the order of prince Abhirāmadēvan Śrī-Varatuṅgarāman, and records a gift of land, a house, and a garden to Viśvanātha-Maḷavarāya-Uḍaiyār.

365. 529 of 1909.—(Grantha and Tamil.) On the same wall. An incomplete record, dated in Ś. 1408. Records gift of a house to *matha* at Tenkāsi. Refers to the repairs executed to the temple by king Parākrama-Pāṇḍyadēva.

366. 530 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the slab set up in front of the gōpura in the same temple. An unfinished record of the Pāṇḍya king Perumāḷ Kulaśēkharadēva (1430—74), dated Ś. 1387 and in his thirty-sixth year. Refers to the works in the temple executed by Ponninperumāḷ Parākrama-Pāṇḍyadēva (1422—64).

367. 531 of 1909.—(Grantha and Tamil.) On a quadrangular pillar set up in the same place. A record of the Pāṇḍya king Jaṭilavarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Perumāḷ Arikēsaridēva *alias* Ponninperumāḷ Parākrama-Pāṇḍyadēva (1422—64), dated in Ś. 1384 and in his fortieth year. States that in Ś. 1368 the *ākarshaṇa* ceremony was performed, and in the twenty-fourth year the work of construction was commenced and was continued till the fortieth, i.e., for seventeen years. All the grants made to the temple are also registered. See also *Trav. Arch. Ser.*, Vol. I, pp. 99—102.

368. 532 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the central shrine in the Porundiniṅṅa-Perumāḷ temple in the same village. Dated in the reign of the Pāṇḍya king Perumāḷ Kulaśēkharadēva-Parākrama Pāṇḍyadēva, son of Jaṭilavarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Kōṇērmaikoṇḍān Perumāḷ Abhirāma-Parākrama-Pāṇḍyadēva (i.e., Śrīvallabha). Refers in Ś. 1473 and in his eighth year, *Virōdhikrit*, to a gift made by Vīraveṅbāmālai Tirunelvēli-Perumāḷ to a servant of the temple. [So this Kulaśēkhara began to reign in A.D. 1543. For Tirunelvēli Perumāḷ see Nos. 344 and 363 above.]

369. 533 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the maṅṭapa in front of the central shrine in the Kulaśēkharamuḍaiyān temple in the same village. Records in Ś. 1490, *Vibhava*, sixth year of the Pāṇḍya king Jaṭilavarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Kōṇērmaikoṇḍān Perumāḷ Aḷaganperumāḷ Ativīrarāman *alias* Śrīvallabhadēva (1562—1610), sale of land by the Bhaṭṭas of Puliyūr Parākrama-Pāṇḍya-chaturvēdimāṅgalam in Tennāri-nāḍu, to the temple of Kulaśēkharamuḍaiya-Nāyinār at Kulaśēkharanallūr in the same district. [Reference is made to *Nelvēli Kaliyugarāman paṇam*, named evidently after Vīra Pāṇḍya Tirunelvēli-perumāḷ (1443—?).]

370. 534 of 1909.—(Grantha and Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in Ś. 1499 (mistake for 1490) and fifth year, *Prabhava*, of the Pāṇḍya king Jaṭilavarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Kōṇērmaikoṇḍān Perumāḷ Aḷaganperumāḷ Ativīrarāman (1562—1610) *alias* Śrīvallabhadēva, the building of the temple and the consecration of the God Kulaśēkharanātha and the Goddess Kuḷalvāymoḷimaṅgai-Nāchchiyār, and registers a gift of land for repairs and offerings.

371. 535 of 1909.—(Grantha and Tamil.) On the west wall of the central shrine in the same temple. Refers in Ś. 1489 and fifth year, *Prabhava*, of the Pāṇḍya king Jaṭilavarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Kōṇērmaikoṇḍān Perumāḷ Aḷaganperumāḷ Ativīrarāman *alias* Śrīvallabhadēva (1562—1610) to the building of the temple and the consecration of the God Kulaśēkharanātha and the Goddess Kuḷalvāymoḷimaṅgai-Nāchchiyār, and registers a gift of land for repairs and offerings.

372. 1 of 1912.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the central shrine in the Viśvanāthasvāmin temple. A record in the thirty-ninth year of the Pāṇḍya king Jaṭilavarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Parākrama-Pāṇḍyadēva (A.D. 1422—65). Refers to the building of the Viśvanātha temple and its maṇṭapa “from the foundation to the pinnacle,” and to the gift to it of the tank called Viśvanāthappērēri in Vitarāṇavinōda-vaḷanāḍu, in the thirty-second year of the king.

373. 2 of 1912.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record in the thirty-eighth year of the Pāṇḍya king Jaṭilavarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Parākrama-Pāṇḍyadēva (1422—65). Records gift of the village of Ilañji in Tenvāri-nāḍu, with its connected hamlets to the same temple. The order is signed by Kaḍārattūr-udaiyān.

374. 3 of 1912.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record in the fortieth year of the Pāṇḍya king Jaṭilavarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Parākrama-Pāṇḍyadēva (1422—65). Refers to the gift of the village of Kāśikkuvāykkānallūr founded by the king in Kurumaṇai-nāḍu, as a *dēvadāna* to the temple, in his thirty-third year.

375. 4 of 1912.—(Tamil in poetical prose of early introductions.) On the west and south walls of the same shrine. A record in the twenty-fifth year of the Pāṇḍya king Arikēsari. Built in at the right end; gives a eulogistic account of the king and of his building the Viśvanātha temple and refers also to his gift of the *dēvadāna* villages Tenkāśi, Parākramapāṇḍyanallūr, Vīrapāṇḍyanallūr and others. [The inscription has been edited by Mr. Gopinatha Rao in *Trav. Arch. Ser.*, Vol. I, pp. 89—95.]

376. 5 of 1912.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record in the twenty-eighth year of the Pāṇḍya king Jaṭilavarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Parākrama-Pāṇḍyadēva. Built in at the right end. Registers that the king on his birthday (Mrigaśīrsha) established a special service in the temple to be called Parākramapāṇḍyan-śandi and made a gift of the villages Tenkarai-Kārikurichchi and Piḷḷaiyārkuḷam, for its maintenance.

377. 6 of 1912.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record in the thirty-second year of the Pāṇḍya king Jaṭilavarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Parākrama-Pāṇḍyadēva (1422—65). Built in at the right end. Records gift of lands in the villages Paimpolirpaṅḡu and others in Vaḍavāri-nāḍu. In continuation of this record was perhaps engraved another (now built in), which registered the cows granted to the temple.

378. 7 of 1912.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record in the thirty-third year of the Pāṇḍya king Jaṭilavarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Parākrama-Pāṇḍyadēva (1422—65). Built in at the right end. Records gift of cows.

379. 8 of 1912.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record of the Pāṇḍya king Jaṭilavarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Parākrama-Pāṇḍyadēva *alias* Kulaśēkharadēva “born on the asterism Kārttigai,” in Ś. 1416 and in his fifteenth year. Built in at the right end. Records gift of land in the village of Kunṛakkuḍi in Tennāri-nāḍu, to the same temple.

380. 9 of 1912.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the same shrine. A record of the Pāṇḍya king Jaṭilavarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Parākrama-Pāṇḍyadēva *alias* Kulaśēkharadēva “born on the asterism Kārttigai,” in Ś. 1419. Records gift of a house and a garden at Tenkāśi and land in Ilañjipaṛṇu to a certain priest of the temple. Quotes the fifteenth year of the king.

381. 10 of 1912.—(Tamil.) On the west and south walls of the maṅṭapa in front of the same shrine. A record of the Pāṇḍya king Śeṅbaka-Sundara-Pāṇḍyadēva *alias* Vīra-Pāṇḍyadēva in Ś. 1384 (A.D. 1462). Registers the gift of houses and shares in the village of Vīra-Pāṇḍya-chaturvēdimāṅgalam to twenty-four Brāhmaṇas for reciting the Vēdās, reading the Pañchāṅga (the Indian Calendar) and Purāṇas as already made but on a smaller scale, in the Śaka years 1369, 1382, 1378 and 1384. [Tenkāśi got evidently its new name from this king. It is not improbable that he was, like Jaṭilavarman Aḷagan Perumāḷ Kulaśēkhara (1430—74), the brother and joint ruler with Arikēsari Parākrama.]

382. 11 of 1912.—(Tamil.) On the same walls. An incomplete record of the Pāṇḍya king Aḷaganperumāḷ *alias* Kulaśēkharadēva in Ś. 1395 and in his forty-fourth year (1430—74). Refers to lands granted to Brāhmaṇas, who had to recite the Vēdās in the temple of Viśvanātha at Tenkāśi *alias* Vīra-Pāṇḍya-chaturvēdimāṅgalam in Tennārināḍu.

383. 12 of 1912.—(Tamil.) On the same walls. A record in the thirtieth year of the Pāṇḍya king Jaṭilavarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Parākrama-Pāṇḍyadēva. Records grant by common consent to the temple of Viśvanāthan, of a certain quantity of paddy from lands harvested for *kār* and *puśānam*, by the agriculturists of Kurumaṛai-nāḍu, Tenvāri-nāḍu, Vaḍavāri-nāḍu and Kurumalai-nāḍu on the Śiṛṛāṅgarai.

384. 13 of 1912.—(Tamil.) On the same walls. A record in the thirty-ninth year of the Pāṇḍya king Jaṭilavarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Parākrama-Pāṇḍyadēva. Fixes certain rates of collection in grain and coin in the hamlets lying between Kunnūr and Pāgūr, for the benefit of the temple. See No. 379.

385. 14 of 1912.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the same maṅṭapa. An incomplete record in the thirty-second year of the Pāṇḍya king Jaṭilavarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Parākrama-Pāṇḍyadēva. Registers gifts of house-sites and garden lands to six persons who worshipped in the temple, five who did

the *dēvakarma* and to other servants. Each of these had also a share in the sacred food offered to the God.

386. 195 of 1895.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the shrine of the Viśvanātha temple. A record in the thirty-first year of the Pāṇḍya king Kō-Jaṭilavarman *alias* Parākrama-Pāṇḍyadēva. Records gift of land.

387. 196 of 1895.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record in the thirteenth-year of the Pāṇḍya king Kō-Māravarman *alias* Vīra-Pāṇḍyadēva, corresponding to Monday, 28th July 1455. Records gift of land. See *Ep. Ind.*, Vol. VIII, pp. 282-83. The king was apparently the same as Kaliyugarāman Tirunelvēlpperumāl who was joint ruler with Arikēsari Parākrama (1422—64).

388. 197 of 1895.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record of the Pāṇḍya king Kō-Jaṭilavarman *alias* Parākrama-Pāṇḍyadēva *alias* Kulaśēkharadēva (1479—?) in his twentieth year and Ś. 1421, expired. Records gift of land. See Nos. 379 and 380 above.

389. 198 of 1895.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the maṅṭapa in front of the same shrine. A record in the forty-fourth year of the Pāṇḍya king Kō-Jaṭilavarman *alias* Kulaśēkharadēva. Records that the Viśvanātha temple was built by Parākrama-Pāṇḍya. [This Kulaśēkhara was the younger brother of Arikēsari Parākrama (1422—64) and was joint ruler with him from 1430 onward. He finished the gōpura which was left incomplete by his brother.]

390. 199 of 1895.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the same maṅṭapa. A record of the Pāṇḍya king Arikēsariidēva *alias* Parākrama-Pāṇḍyadēva (1422—65) in his thirty-ninth year and Ś. 1381, expired. Records gift of land.

391. 200 of 1895.—(Grantha and Tamil.) On the south wall of the Subrahmaṇya shrine in the same temple. A record of the Pāṇḍya king Kō-Jaṭilavarman *alias* Śrīvallabhadēva in his third year and Ś. 1459 expired, Hēviḷambin. [The king was evidently *Iṛandakālamedutta* Śrī Vallabha who came to the throne in 1533.]

392. 201 of 1895.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the shrine in the Kulaśēkharam-Uḍaiyār temple. A record of the Pāṇḍya king Kō-Jaṭilavarman *alias* Ativīrarāma *alias* Śrīvallabhadēva (1562—1610) in Ś. 1489, expired. Records gift of land.

393. 202 of 1895.—(Grantha and Tamil.) On the south wall of the same shrine. An incomplete record of the Pāṇḍya king Kō-Jaṭilavarman *alias* Ativīrarāma *alias* Śrīvallabhadēva (1562—1610) in his fifth year and Ś. 1489, expired, Prabhava.

393-A. On the north wall of the Mahāmaṅṭapa of the Viśvanātha temple. (Sanskrit.) Records that a Pāṇḍya king Varaguṇa Śrī Vallabha Kulaśēkhara performed a *yāga* and consecrated on the occasion, an image of Vighnēśvara named Yagnēśa after the

performer of the *yāga*. The king came to style himself a Dīkshita in consequence. The date is Ś. 1537. See *Trav., Arch. Ser., Vol. I*, p. 147.

TINNEVELLY TALUK.

Gaṅgaikondān.

394. 160 of 1895.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the shrine in the Kailāsapati temple. A record in the twenty-sixth year of the Chōla king Kō-Rājarāja-Rājakēsarivarman *alias* Rājadēva (I). Records gift of land.

395. 161 of 1895.—(Vaṭṭeḷuttu.) On the same wall. The king's name is lost. Records gift of a lamp.

396. 162 of 1895.—(Vaṭṭeḷuttu.) On the south wall of the same shrine. A record in the twenty-first year of the Pāṇḍya king Kō-Jaṭavarman *alias* Sundarachōlapāṇḍyadēva (1021—43). Records gift of land.

397. 163 of 1895.—(Tamil.) On the west wall of the same shrine. A record in the twenty-eighth year of the Chōla king Kō-Rājakēsarivarman *alias* Kulōttuṅga Chōladēva (I, ? 1070—1118). Records gift of a lamp.

398. 164 of 1895.—(Vaṭṭeḷuttu.) On the same wall. A record in the seventh year of the Pāṇḍya king Kō-Māraṅjadaiyan. Records gift of a lamp. [It is difficult to identify the king. But he might be the king who, according to the Ānaimalai inscriptions, ruled about A.D. 770.]

399. 165 of 1895.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record in the seventh year of the Chōla king Kō-Parakēsarivarman *alias* Rājendra-Chōladēva (I, 1011—43). Records gift of a lamp.

400. 166 of 1895.—(Tamil.) On the east wall of the maṅṭapa in front of the same shrine. A record in the twelfth year of the Pāṇḍya king Kō-Māravarman *alias* Śrīvallabhadēva. Records gift of a lamp by an inhabitant of Kōṭṭāru.

401. 167 of 1895.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record in the fourteenth year of the Pāṇḍya king Śrīvallabhadēva. Records gift of a lamp.

402. 168 of 1895.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. An incomplete record in the eighteenth year of Kō-Jaṭavarman *alias* Śrīvallabhadēva (contemporary of Māravarman Sundara Pāṇḍya I?).

403. 169 of 1895.—(Tamil.) On the west wall of the maṅṭapa surrounding the shrine of the goddess in the same temple. A damaged record of the Pāṇḍya king Kō-Māravarman *alias* Sundara-Pāṇḍyadēva, the date of which is doubtful. See No. 405.

404. 170 of 1895.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the same maṅṭapa. A record in the fourth year of the Pāṇḍya king Kō-Māravarman *alias* Sundara-Pāṇḍyadēva. Records gift of land. See No. 405.

405. 171 of 1895.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A damaged record of the Pāṇḍya king Kō-Māravarman *alias* Sundara-Pāṇḍya-dēva in his twenty-fourth year and Ś. 1477, expired, Rākshasa. [He began to rule between June 2, A.D. 1531 and June 1, A.D. 1532.]

Kṛishṇāpuram.

406. 16 of 1912.—(Tamil.) On the wall, right of entrance into the central shrine of the Vēṅkaṭāchalapati temple. A much damaged record of the Vijayanagara king Śrīraṅgadēva-Mahārāya (1578—86) in Ś. 1499, Īśvara. Records gift of Vīrappa-Nāyaka (1573—95) for the merit of his father Kṛishṇappa-Nāyaka (1563—73) of the Kāśyapa-gōtra to the temple of Tiruvēṅgaḍa-nāthadēva at Kṛishṇāpuram on the bank of the Tāmraparṇi (river). Mentions the Tiruvaḍi country (*dēsam*). Mr. Sewell refers to this inscription as dated in Ś. 1500. For Vīrappa's rule see *Ind. Antq.*, 1916, p. 90 ff.

407. 17 of 1912.—(Tamil.) On the same wall, left of entrance. A record of the Vijayanagara king Vīraśrī-Sadāśivadēva-Mahārāya in Ś. 1485, Krōdhana (wrong). Records gift of the villages Ariyakūlam, Puttanēri *alias* Tiruvēṅgaḍanallūr, Pottaikūlam, Kōḍikkūlam, Kuttukkal, Śīrāmankūlam and some land in Āḷikuḍi to the temple of Tiruvēṅgaḍanāthadēva by Kṛishṇappa Nāyaka of the Kāśyapa-gōtra. It is stated that the latter had acquired the Tiruvaḍidēśa in which these villages were situated, as *amaranāyakam* from Rāmarājar-Ayyan. [Kṛishṇappa was the son and successor of Viśvanātha I, the founder of the Nāik dynasty of Madura. For a detailed account of his reign see *Ind. Antq.*, 1916, p. 82 ff.]

407-A. The Kṛishṇāpuram plates of Sadāśiva Rāya in Sanskrit language and Nandināgari character. Records that at the request of Kṛishṇappa Nāik of Madura Sadāśiva Rāya granted a number of villages to the Tiruvēṅkaṭanātha temple at Kṛishṇāpuram, set up by the same Nāik. It is dated Ś. 1489, Prabhāva, on a Monday, new-moon day in the month of Pushya. See *Ep. Ind.*, Vol. IX, pp. 328—42.

Maṇappadaividu.

408. 442 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the maṇṭapa in front of the central shrine in the Muṇḍīśvaramuḍaiyār temple. Records in K.A. 616 gift of money for a lamp by Mārtāṇḍan Perumān *alias* Villavarāyar to the temple of Mūṅṛīśuramuḍaiya-Nāyanār at Ambalattāḍinallūr *alias* Maṇappadaividu, the northeast hamlet of Śrīvallavanmaṅgalam, a *bruhmadēya* in Kīlkaḷakūṛam.

409. 443 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in K.A. 616 gift of certain privileges in the same temple to a disciple of Āgamaśīladēvar *alias* Umaiyoṛupāgar of the lineage of

the *Bhikshā-maṭha* which had rendered some service to the temple. See *Ep. Rep.*, 1910, p. 99. See No. 414 below.

410. 444 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. . An incomplete record, dated K.A. 719 (A.D. 1544-5). Records gift of paddy to the temple of Mūnṛichchuramuḍaiya-Nāyanār, at Maṇappaḍaiviḍu by the chief of Jayatuṅganāḍu, who was called Venṛumaṅkoṇḍa Bhūtalavi . . . varman and had the title Śaṅkaranārāyaṇa-mūttavēḷaikkāran. Mentions also the temples of Kanaviniya-Perumān, Emmaṇḍalamkoṇḍa-Pāṇḍichchuramuḍaiya-Nāyanār and Śēraṇanuganda-Pāṇḍichchuramuḍaiya-Nāyanār.

411. 445 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Dated in the forty-third year of the Chōḷa king Rājakēsarivarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Śrī-Kulōttuṅga-Chōḷadēva (I, 1070—1118). Records gift of land to the temple of Mūnṛukai-Īśvaramuḍaiya-Nāyanār by the assembly of Uttamaśōlachaturvēdimāṅgalam in Kīlkaḷa-kūṛram, a subdivision of Rājarāja-Pāṇḍināḍu. See Nagerkōil and C. Comerin inscriptions.

412. 446 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the same maṇṭapa. Dated in the reign of the Pāṇḍya king Māravarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Sundara-Pāṇḍyadēva (II?), “ who was pleased to take every country.” Records in his tenth year gift of money for offerings to the shrines of the God, Goddess and ḷaiya-Nāyanār, built in the name of Sundara-Pāṇḍya Kaṇḍiyadēvar by a private individual, in the temple of Mūnṛukaiśvaramuḍaiya-Nāyanār. See *Ep. Ind.*, Vol. XI, p. 254, where Mr. Sewell considers the date to be unsatisfactory.

413. 447 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in K.A. 617, gift of 100 *paṇam* called *Neumēni-Kaliyugarāman*, by the individual mentioned in No. 408 above. The coin was evidently named after Vīra Pāṇḍya Tirunelvēlipperumāl. See Nos. 352 and 369.

414. 448 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the east wall of the same maṇṭapa. A record of the twenty-third year of the Pāṇḍya king Māravarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Vīra-Pāṇḍyadēva. Records gift of land for offerings to the same temple and to the *maṭha* presided over by Āgamaśīladēva *alias* Umaiyōrupāga-Mudaliyār of the lineage of *Bhikshā-maṭha*. See No. 409 above.

415. 449 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in the sixteenth year (of whom?) gift of land for offerings in the village of Śrīvallavanmaṅgalam.

416. 450 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in K.A. 642, provision for the *śribali* in the temple, twice every day, and for other festivals.

417. 451 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the shrine of the Goddess in the same temple. An incomplete record of the

Pāṇḍya king Jaṭavarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Kulaśekhara-dēva (I, ? 1190—1217), dated thirteenth year. Mentions the temple of Mūṅṅukai-Īśvaramuḍaiya-Nāyanār at Maṅarpaḍaivīḍu, a hamlet of Śrīvallavanmaṅgalam.

418. 452 of 1900.--(Tamil.) On the same wall. An incomplete record of the Pāṇḍya king Māra-varman *alias* Tribhuvana-chakravartin Kulaśekhara-dēva (I?), dated fifth year. Mentions Pāttivaśēkaranallūr and seems to record a gift of lamp.

419. 453 of 1909.--(Tamil.) On the south wall of the maṅṭapa in front of the central shrine in the Āṇaikāṭṭa-Perumāl temple in the same village. Records in the reign of Tribhuvanachakravartin Kōnērinmaikoṇḍān gift of land to the temple of Kanaviniya-Viṅṅagar-Ālvār built by Śeyāndūmāmaṇi *alias* Kulaśekhara-varman at Maṅappaḍaivīḍu.

420. 454 of 1909.--(Tamil.) On the east wall of the same maṅṭapa. A damaged record of Tribhuvanachakravartin Kōnērinmaikoṇḍān. Registers gift of land.

421. 455 of 1909.--(Tamil.) On the north wall of the same maṅṭapa. A much damaged and incomplete record of the Pāṇḍya king Vikrama-Pāṇḍyadēva, the date of which is lost. It begins with a historical introduction and mentions that Śeyyāndūmāmaṇi, the founder of the temple, was one of the servants (of the king?).

Māṅūr.

422. 423 of 1906.--(Vaṭṭeḷuttu.) On one of the pillars in the Ambalavāṇasvāmin temple. Dated in the reign of the Pāṇḍya king Māraṅjaḍaiyan (whom the Government Epigraphist attributes to the ninth century). Registers in his thirty-fifth year and four hundred and sixty-ninth day an agreement of the Mahāsabha of Mananilainallūr, a *brāhmadēya* in Kaḷakkuḍi-nāḍu. [The inscription is of invaluable interest and describes the rules of membership in the *sabhā*. See *Ep. Rep.*, 1913, p. 98, where a full summary is given. It is too long to be quoted here.]

423. 424 of 1906.--(Tamil.) On another pillar in the same place. Dated in the third year of the Pāṇḍya king Tribhuvana-chakravartin Kōnērinmaikoṇḍān. Records gift of land in Maṅanilainallūr. Mentions the temple of Kulaśekhara-Viṅṅagar-Ālvār at Karuvanallūr *alias* Vikrama-Pāṇḍiyanallūr in Kaḷakkuḍināḍu.

424. 425 of 1906.--(Veṭṭeḷuttu.) At the top of an image set up in front of the same temple. Below the inscription is the figure of a man with outstretched arms, of which the left arm holds a sword.

425. 426 of 1906.--(Tamil.) At the top of another image in the same place. Below the inscription is the figure of a man holding a club in each of his hands. The inscription refers to the

threatened destruction of a village and its rescue by one who fell in the attempt.

426. 427 of 1906.--(Tamil.) On a pillar set up in the same place. Records that the stone is set up on a platform which covers the lower portion of the inscription. It mentions the *trading communities of a number of towns*.

427. 428, of 1906.--(Tamil.) On another face of the same pillar. An unfinished and damaged record. Seems to be similar in contents to the above epigraph.

428. 429 of 1906.--(Tamil.) On a stone lying in front of the Maḍaināchchiyār shrine near the tank in the same village. A damaged record of the Pāṇḍya king Māravarman *alias* Tribhuvana-chakravartin Sundara-Pāṇḍyadēva, dated ninth year. Records gift of land. [It is uncertain which king of the above name is referred to.]

429. 430 of 1906.--(Tamil.) On a *viragal* set up near the bund of the same tank. A damaged record dated forty-first year (of unknown king). Appears to be a gift of land for some service in connexion with the tank.

Marugāltalai.

430. 407 of 1906.--(Pāli in the Brāhmi character.) On a boulder of the hill called Pūviluḍaiyārmalai, ten miles from Palamcottah. The Government Epigraphist notes the similarity of the characters to those of the Aśōka edicts.

Pālayamkōttai.

430-A. Palm leaf grant in the Rāmasvāmi temple. Records that Tirumalanāyaka and Viśvanātha Nāyaka gave four *mās* of land in Rājavallipuram to Teppakuḷam Rāmabhadrasvāmi in Ś. 1532, Ísvara, in the reign of Sadāśivarāya. The record is in Grantha. *Ins., S. Dts., p. 190, No. 2.* [The date is inconsistent.]

430-B. Another palm leaf grant in the same temple. Same as the above, but Sadāśiva is not mentioned. *Ibid., No. 3.*

Śevilipēri.

431. 408 of 1906.--(Tamil.) On the north wall of the central shrine in the Aḷagar temple. Dated in the third year of the Chōḷa-Pāṇḍya king Jaṭavarman *alias* Uḍaiyār Śrī-Chōḷa-Pāṇḍyadēva (1021—43). Records gift of twenty-five sheep for a lamp to the temple of Ten-Tirumāliṟuñjōlai by a native of Dēvar-Veṭṭikuḍi near Tirunelvēli in Kīḷvēmbanāḍu, a subdivision of Muḍigoṇḍa Chōḷa-vaḷanāḍu, a district of Rājarāja-Pāṇḍi-nāḍu.

432. 409 of 1906.--(Vaṭṭeḷuttu.) On the same wall. Records in the twenty-first year of the Pāṇḍya king Śaḍaiyamāran gift of fifty sheep for a lamp.

433. 410 of 1906.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Dated in the reign of the Chōla-Pāṇḍya king Jaṭavarman *alias* Uḍaiyār Śrī-Sundara-Chōla-Pāṇḍya (1021—43). Records gift of fifty sheep for a lamp. The date of the record is lost. [The king was the viceroy of Rājendra-Chōla I. See Ambāsamudram and Kaḷugumalai lists.]

434. 411 of 1906.—(Vaṭṭeḷuttu.) On the same wall. A mutilated record of the Chōla king Rājarājakēsarivarman *alias* Śrī-Rājarājadēva (I), dated twenty-eighth year. The village Ten-Tirumāliruñjōlai was situated on the northern bank of the river *Tanporundanādu*.

435. 412 of 1906.—(Vaṭṭeḷuttu.) On the same wall. A mutilated record of the Chōla king Rājarāja-Rājakēsarivarman *alias* Śrī-Rājarājadēva I, dated twenty-eighth year. Records gift of land.

436. 413 of 1916.—(Vaṭṭeḷuttu.) On the same wall. Records in the twenty-eighth year of the Chōla king Rājarāja-Rājakēsarivarman *alias* Śrī-Rājarājadēva (I) gift of land for offering of 1,000 *nālis* of rice in Āḍi Uttirāḍa.

437. 414 of 1906.—(Vaṭṭeḷuttu.) On the west wall of the same shrine. A mutilated record of the Chōla king Rājarāja I, dated twenty-third year. A portion of the historical introduction of the king is preserved.

438. 415 of 1906.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A mutilated record of the Chōla king Rājakēsarivarman Vīrarājēndradēva (I, 1063—70), the date of which is lost. A portion of the historical introduction of the king is preserved.

439. 416 of 1906.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. The Chōla king Chakravartin Śrī-Kulōttuṅga-Chōladēva (I?) records in his thirty-fifth year gift of a lamp. The temple is called Niṅṅaruḷina Karumāṇikka-Āḷvār at Ten-Tirumāliruñjōlai in Kīḷkaḷa-kūṅṅam, a subdivision of Muḍigoṇḍa-Chōla-vaḷanāḍu, a district of Rājarāja-Pāṇḍi-nādu.

440. 417 of 1906.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A mutilated record of the Chōla king Rājarājakēsarivarman *alias* Rājarājadēva I, the date of which is lost. A portion of the historical introduction of the king is preserved.

441. 418 of 1906.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the same shrine. Dated in the twenty-ninth year of the Chōla king Rājarājakēsarivarman *alias* Śrī-Rājarājadēva (I, 985—1013). Records gift of a lamp by a merchant of Karavandapuram in Kaḷakkuḍināḍu to the temple of Niṅṅaruḷina Karumāṇikkadēvar at Ten-Tirumāliruñjōlai in Kīḷkaḷakūṅṅam.

442. 419 of 1906.—(Vaṭṭeḷuttu.) On the same wall. A record of the Chōla king Rājarāja-Rājakēsarivarman *alias* Śrī-Rājarājadēva in his twenty-fourth year. The stones do not appear to be in

the original order. Registers gift of a lamp by a native of the Chōla country.

443. 420 of 1906.—(Vaṭṭeḷuttu.) On the same wall. A mutilated and incomplete record of the Chōla king Rājarājakēsari-varman *alias* Śrī-Rājarājadēva (I), dated ,twenty-third year. Records gift of lamp.

444. 421 of 1906.—(Vaṭṭeḷuttu.) On the same wall. A record of the Pāṇḍya king Śaḍaiyamāran in his twenty-first year. Records gift of sheep for a lamp to the temple of Niṅṅaruḷina Karumāṅikkadēvar at Ten-Tirumāliruṅjōlai, a *dēvadāna* in Kīlkaḷa-kūṅṅam by the queen of a certain Śatrubhayanikara-Muttaraiyan.

445. 422 of 1906.—(Tamil.) On the south and west walls of the same shrine. A record of the twenty-sixth year of the Chōla king Rājarāja-Rājakēsari-varman *alias* Śrī-Rājarājadēva (I). Records gift of land by the *mahāsabha* of Śrīvallabhamaṅgalam, a *brahmadēya* in Kīlkaḷa-kūṅṅam, a subdivision of Rājarāja-maṅḍalam.

Śuttamalli.

446. 456 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the maṅṅapa in front of the central shrine in the Bhagavatīśvara temple. Records in the tenth year of Tribhuvanachakravartin Kōṅṅerimēl-koṅḍān gift of land in the village of Kuḍaikkūḷam, the western hamlet of Śēravanmādēvi-chaturvēdimāṅgalam in Muḷḷināḍu, to the temple of Bhagavati-Īśvaram-uḍaiyār at Śuttamalli *alias* Vīravinōda-chaturvēdimāṅgalam in Mēl-Vēmbanāḍu. Mentions Mānābharaṅamaṅgalam.

447. 457 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the west wall of the central shrine in the same temple. A record of the second year of the Pāṇḍya king Jaṭāvarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Kulaśēkharadēva (I, ? 1190—1217). Records gift of land in the same village, under orders from Kōṅṅerinmaikoṅḍān.

448. 458 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Dated in the reign of the Pāṇḍya king Māra-varman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Kulaśēkharadēva (I, 1268—1308), “who was pleased to take every country.” Records gift of money for a lamp.

449. 459 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the same shrine. A record of the fourteenth year of the Pāṇḍya king Jaṭā-varman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Kulaśēkharadēva (I, 1190—1217). Records gift of 100 *drammas* by the king for deepening the tank Kulaśēkharappēreri at Śuttamalli *alias* Vīravinōda-chaturvēdi-māṅgalam, on representations made by a Brāhmaṅa of Karambichchēḍu. Refers to the maṅṅapa called *Pugaḷābharāṅan* in the palace at Māḍakkūḷakkīḷ-Madurai.

450. 460 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record of Tribhuvanachakravartin Kōṅṅerimēnkoṅḍān in his seventh year.

Records gift of land for offerings in the village of Rājarāja-chaturvēdimaṅgalam in Muḷli-nādu. One of the signatories was a native of Koḷuvaṅṅūr in Kīlkūṅṅu, a subdivision of Miḷalai-kūṅṅam.

451. 461 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record of the seventh year of Tribhuvanachakravartin Kōṅṅerimēnkoṅṅān. Records the same gift and adds that the order was issued by the king while he was seated on *Munaiya-daraiyan* in his palace at Māḍakkulakkīl-Madurai. The signatories were a native of Kaṅkurichchil in Tiruvaḷudi-vaḷanādu, one of Viḷattūr *alias* Jayaṅgoṅṅaśōḷanallūr in Kaḷa-kūṅṅu, a subdivision of Miḷalai-kūṅṅam, and others.

452. 462 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the south and west walls of the Saundararāja-Perumāṅ temple in the same village. A much damaged and fragmentary record of the Pāṅṅṅya king Māravarman. Contains portions of the historical introduction commencing with *pū-maruviya* of Māravarman Sundara-Pāṅṅṅyadēva (I, 1216--35). Seems to record a gift of money for a lamp.

453. 463 of 1909.—(Grantha and Tamil.) On the south wall of the Śiva temple on the bank of the Tāmraparṅi river in the same village. Records that king Vīra-Kēraḷa Kulaśēkharadēva made, for the merit of his son, a gift of land to the Bhaṅṅṅas of Udayamāttāṅṅa-chaturvēdimaṅgalam. The land was situated in Kōḷaṅṅūr *alias* Kulaśēkhara-chaturvēdimaṅgalam of Mēl-Vēmbanādu, on the southern side of the temple of Aṅṅṅuḍiśvaram-Uḍaiyār, which is stated to be an *āśrayaliṅga*, subordinate to the temple at Vrīhivṅṅṅi (Tinnevelly).

454. 464 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the same temple. An incomplete record of Tribhuvanachakravartin Kōṅṅerimēnkoṅṅān. Seems to register a gift of land to the shrine of the goddess, built in the temple of Aṅṅṅuḍiśvaramuḍaiya Nāyanār, by Śivanīndakālan *alias* Śembiyadaraiyan.

Tinnevelly (General).

455. *C.P. No. 10 of Mr. Sewell's List.*—Records grant of twelve villages in the Tinnevelly district by Viśvanātha Nāyakka (1559--1563), the first of the great Nāyakka dynasty of Madura, and his celebrated minister and general Aryanātha, who built the thousand-pillared maṅṅṅapam at Madura. The former is styled "the pious son of Koṅṅṅyam Nāgama Nāyudu;" the latter "Mandaraputtanēri Arya Nāyaka Mudaliyār." The grant is in Ś. 1482 (A.D. 1560), Raudri. For a full account of Viśvanāṅṅṅa and Aryanātha, see *Ind. Antq.*, 1914-5.

456. *C.P. No. 11 of Mr. Sewell's List.*—Records a private grant of land in a village of the Tinnevelly district for the support of a temple of the village god and goddess, during the reign of Vijaya

Chokkanātha of Madura, dated Ś. 1637 (A.D. 1715), K.Ā. 887. [The king was Vijaya Raṅgachokkanātha who ruled from 1705 to 1731.] See *Ind. Antq.*, 1917, p. 186 ff.

457. *C.P. No. 12 of Mr. Sewell's List.*—Records a grant by the Vijayanagar sovereign Veṅkaṭapati (I, 1586--1614) in Ś. 1512, Vikriti (A.D. 1590), of villages in the Tinnevelly district, to a Vaishṇava shrine under the management of one Kṛishṇa Dās. See *Ind. Antq.*, 1916, p. 133.

458. *C.P. No. 54 of Mr. Sewell's List.*—(Tamil and Hindustāni.) Records the grant of certain lands by a Tēvar named Chinna Nainsa to a Muhammadan for the maintenance of a Paḷlivāśal in A.D. 1777, Ś. 1699, K.Ā. 953, Hēviḷambi.

459. *C.P. No. 55 of Mr. Sewell's List.*—(Tamil and Hindustāni.) Records grant of lands by another Tēvar named Ūttumalai Marudappa to the same Muhammadan, for the same purpose, in the same year.

460. *C.P. No. 200 of Mr. Sewell's List.*—Records a grant made by one of the Pāṇḍiyan kings in the year 475. The name of the Pāṇḍya given is Vañji Śērakula Rāma-Pāṇḍya. No Pāṇḍya of that name appears in any of the lists yet published. A forgery.

461. *C.P. No. 109 of Mr. Sewell's List.*—(Telugu.) Records grant of a village in charity by Vijaya Raṅga Chokkanātha of Madura (1705--1731), in Ś. 1646, Krōdhi (A.D. 1724), during the reign of Mahādēva Rāya of Vijayanagar at Ghānagiri. [The inscription affords an instance of the existence of the old formula of subordination to Vijayanagar long after its destruction.]

462. *C.P. No. 110 of Mr. Sewell's List.*—(Telugu.) Records a grant by Maṅgammāl of Madura (1689--1705), widow of Chokkanātha Nāyakka of Madura, in Ś. 1628, Vyaya (A.D. 1706), during the reign of Veṅkaṭadēva Rāya at Ghānagiri. Regarding Veṅkaṭadēva see note to the above. For a detailed account of Maṅgammāl's administration see *Ind. Antq.*, 1917 (July and August).

463. *C.P. No. 53 of Mr. Sewell's List.*—(Telugu.) Records grant to a Mussalman for maintenance of a mosque at Kanakagiri in Ś. 1614 (A. D. 1692), during the reign of Śrī Raṅga Rāya by "Vijaya Raṅga Chokkanātha (1705--31), son of Raṅga Kṛishṇa Muttu Vīrappa (1682--89), who was son of Chokkanātha (1560--82) and grandson of Muttu Vīrappa of the family of Viśvanātha Nāyakka." See No. 456 above.

464. *C.P. No. 56 of Mr. Sewell's List.*—Records grant of a house by certain persons to a female belonging to the Śiva temple in Tinnevelly for the maintenance of worship, in Ś. 1653 (A.D. 1731), K.Ā. 907, Virōdhikrit, in the reign of Vijaya Raṅga Chokkanātha (1705--31), of the Nāyakka dynasty of Madura. It is noticeable that, though the grant is for a Śiva temple, the deed is ornamented with

Vaishṇava figures, the engraver being a worshipper of Viṣṇu, as appears from his name Ānavattān Perumā].

465. *C.P. No. 168 of Mr. Sewell's List.*—(Telugu.) Records a grant in Ś. 1622, Vikrama (A.D. 1700), to the Śiva temple at Tinnevelly by Raṅga Kṛiṣṇa Muttu Vīrappa Nāyaka of Madura (1682—1689), in the reign of Rājādhirāja-Narasimhadēva at Ghānagiri. [Raṅga Kṛiṣṇa ruled in reality from 1682 to 1689 and so the chronology of the inscription is questionable. No information is available about Narasimhadēva. For a detailed account of Raṅga Kṛiṣṇa's reign see *Ind. Antq.*, 1917 (August-September).

Tinnevelly.

466. 15 of 1912.—(Kanarese.) On the west wall of the third prākāra in the Nellyappar temple. Records gift of money for two lamps to the temple of Tirunelvēliyodayadēva, by Vāmaṇṇa, the brother-in-law of Varadaṇa-Daṇṇāyaka, the śrī-karaṇa of the Hoysala king Vīra-Sōmēśvaradēvarasa (1234—62), the contemporary of Jaṭāvarmaṇ Sundara Pāṇḍya I (1251—64). See Nos. 487 and 505 below.

467. 118 of 1894.—(Sanskrit.) On the outside of the east wall of the third prākāra of the Nellyappar temple. A record of the Pāṇḍya king Sundara-Pāṇḍyadēva. Records gifts of ornaments and the erection of buildings at the Vēṇuvanēśvara or Vṛihivritīśvara temple, and refers to the king's victories over the Karnāṭa, Kāṭhaka and Kākati kings. [The Pāṇḍya king referred to is Jaṭāvarmaṇ Sundara Pāṇḍya I, 1251—64.]

468. 119 of 1894.—(Tamil.) On the outside of the south wall of the same prākāra. A record in the thirteenth year of the Pāṇḍya king Kō-Māravarma *alias* Sundara-Pāṇḍyadēva (II, ? 1239—51). Records gift of land.

469. 120 of 1894.—(Tamil.) On the same side of the same wall. A record of Rāmavarma in Ś. 1468 (1546), expired, and K.Ā. 722. Records gift of land. [The king was evidently identical with Śrī Vīra Rāma Mārttaṇḍavarma whose name occurs in the Trivandrum temple records from 1538—48. See *Trav. Manual*, Vol. I, pp. 296—7.]

470. 121 of 1894.—(Tamil.) On the same side of the same wall. A record of the Vijayanagara prince (?) Rāmappadēva-Mahārāja in Ś. 1483, expired, and K.Ā. 737, Durmati. Records gift of land by Kṛiṣṇappa-Nāyaka (1562—73), son of Viśvanātha-Nāyaka (1559—1563). See *Ind. Antq.*, 1916, p. 82 ff.

471. 122 of 1894.—(Tamil.) On the outside of the north wall of the same prākāra. A record in the eighth year of the Pāṇḍya king Kō-Māravarma *alias* Kulaśēkharadēva II (1314—21?). Records gift of land. Dr. Kielhorn discusses the date and points out that

the most probable is Saturday, 14th November 1321. See *Ep. Ind.*, Vol. VI, pp. 312-3.

472. 123 of 1894.—(Tamil.) On the outside of the east wall of the second *prākāra* of the same temple, right of entrance. A record in the thirteenth year of the Pāṇḍya king Kō-Jaṭavarman *alias* Kulaśēkharadēva (I, 1190—1217). Records gift of land. See *Ep. Ind.*, Vol. VI, p. 302, where Dr. Kielhorn points out that the date of this inscription (Thursday, Pūrvāshāḍha, Aparapak. 4, Mīna 4th) corresponds to 26th February 1204. [This is in agreement with the date of the larger Tiruppūvaṇam grant of the same king and establishes the fact that the king came to the throne in the period between 27th February and 29th November 1190.]

473. 124 of 1894.—(Tamil.) On the same side of the same wall, left of entrance. A record in the eleventh year of the Pāṇḍya king Kō-Māravarman *alias* Sundara-Pāṇḍyadēva (I, 1216—1235), “who distributed the Chōḷa country.” Contains an order of the king to the *sabhā* of Tinnevelly regarding taxes.

474. 125 of 1894.—(Tamil.) On the same side of the same wall, left of entrance. A record in the thirteenth year of the Pāṇḍya king Kō-Māravarman *alias* Sundara-Pāṇḍyadēva (I, 1216—1235), “who distributed the Chōḷa country.” Contains a similar royal order.

475. 126 of 1894.—(Tamil.) On the outside of the south wall of the same *Prākāra*. A record in the twenty-sixth year of the Pāṇḍya king Kō-Jaṭavarman *alias* Kulaśēkharadēva (I, ? 1190—1217). Records gift of land.

476. 127 of 1894.—(Sanskrit and Tamil.) On the same side of the same wall. A record in the eighth year of the Pāṇḍya king Vīra-Pāṇḍyadēva (unidentified). See No. 478.

477. 128 of 1894.—(Tamil.) On the same side of the same wall. A record in the third year of the Pāṇḍya king Kō-Jaṭavarman *alias* Kulaśēkharadēva (I, ? 1190—1217). Records gift of a lamp.

478. 129 of 1894.—(Tamil.) On the same side of the same wall. A record in the fourth year of the Pāṇḍya king Kō-Jaṭavarman *alias* Vīra-Pāṇḍyadēva. Records gift of land. [The king referred to might be identical with him who came to the throne in A.D. 1253.]

479. 130 of 1894.—(Tamil.) On the same side of the same wall. A record in the fifteenth year of Kōnērinmaikoṇḍān. Records gift of land.

480. 131 of 1894.—(Tamil.) On the same side of the same wall. A record in the fifteenth year of Kōnērinmaikoṇḍān. Records gift of eleven houses in Tinnevelly.

481. 132 of 1894.—(Tamil.) On the same side of the same wall. A record in the fifteenth year of the Pāṇḍya king Kō-Māra-varman *alias* Sundara-Pāṇḍyadēva (I?). Records gift of land.

482. 133 of 1894.—(Tamil.) On the same side of the same wall. A record in the seventeenth year of the Pāṇḍya king Kō-Māra-varman *alias* Sundara-Pāṇḍyadēva (I, 1216—35), “who, having taken the Chōḷa country, was crowned at Muḍikoṇḍa-Chōḷapuram.” Records gift of gold and paddy. Compare No. 504. The date, according to Dr. Kielhorn, is Monday, 19th February 1235. See *Ep. Ind.*, Vol. VI, p. 303.

483. 134 of 1894.—(Tamil.) On the front wall of the Vighnēśvara shrine on the southern side of the same prākāra. A record in the twenty-sixth year of the Pāṇḍya king Kō-Māra-varman *alias* Kulaśēkharadēva (I, 1268—1308). Records gift of a lamp. Dr. Kielhorn fixes the date on Wednesday, 18th November 1293. See *Ep. Ind.*, Vol. VI, p. 309.

484. 135 of 1894.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in Ś. 1476, expired, and K.Ā. 730, private gift of land.

485. 136 of 1894.—(Tamil.) On the outside of the west wall of the same prākāra. A record in the fifth year of the Pāṇḍya king Kō-Jaṭā-varman *alias* Vīra-Pāṇḍyadēva. Records gift of a lamp. (See No. 478.)

486. 137 of 1894.—(Tamil.) On the same side of the same wall. A record in the twenty-seventh year of the Pāṇḍya king Kō-Māra-varman *alias* Kulaśēkharadēva I (1268—1308) who was pleased to take every country. Records gift of cows. See *Ep. Ind.*, Vol. VI, pp. 308-9, where Dr. Kielhorn points out the exact date to be Friday, 10th December 1294.

487. 138 of 1894.—(Tamil.) On the same side of the same wall. A record in the eleventh year of the Pāṇḍya king Kō-Māra-varman *alias* Sundara-Pāṇḍyadēva. Records gift of a lamp. Mentions an officer of the Hoysaḷa king Vīra-Sōmēśvaradēva. The Pāṇḍya king therefore was Māra-varman Sundara-Pāṇḍya II who ruled from 1239 to 1251. See No. 505 below.

488. 139 of 1894.—(Tamil.) On the same side of the same wall. A record in the third year of the Pāṇḍya king Kō-Jaṭā-varman *alias* Kulaśēkharadēva (I or II?). Records gift of land for worship on the king's birthday.

489. 140 of 1894.—(Tamil.) On the same side of the same wall. A record in the twentieth year of the Pāṇḍya king Kō-Māra-varman *alias* Sundara-Pāṇḍyadēva (I or II?). Records gift of land.

490. 141 of 1894.—(Tamil.) On the same side of the same wall. A record of Kōnērinmaikoṇḍān. Records gift of land.

491. 142 of 1894.—(Tamil.) On the outside of the north wall of the same prakāra. A record in the fourth year of the Pāṇḍya king Kō-Jaṭāvarman *alias* Vīra-Pāṇḍyadēva. Records gift of a lamp. [Was he the king who came to the throne in 1253?]

492. 143 of 1894.—(Tamil.) On the same side of the same wall. A record in the eleventh year of the Pāṇḍya king Kō-Māravarman *alias* Sundara-Pāṇḍyadēva II (1239—51). Records gift of a lamp. See *Ep. Ind.*, Vol. VI, p. 305, where it is pointed out that the date corresponded to Sunday, the 25th April, A.D. 1249.

493. 144 of 1894.—(Sanskrit and Tamil.) On the same side of the same wall. A record in the fifth year of the Pāṇḍya king Vikrama-Pāṇḍyadēva (not identified). Records gift of land for a flower garden.

494. 145 of 1894.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the Śastralinga shrine on the northern side of the same prakāra. A record of the Chōḷa king Kō-Rājakēsarivarman *alias* Kulōttuṅga-Chōḷadēva, the date of which is lost. Records gift of land.

495. 146 of 1894.—(Tamil.) On the east wall of the Naṭeśa shrine in the north-eastern corner of the same prakāra. A record in the eleventh year of the Pāṇḍya king Kō-Māravarman *alias* Sundara-Pāṇḍyadēva (II, 1239—51). Records gift of paddy. See *Ibid.*, Vol. VI, pp. 304-5. The date is the same as in No. 497.

496. 147 of 1894.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record in the eleventh year of the Pāṇḍya king Kō-Māravarman *alias* Sundara-Pāṇḍyadēva II (1239—51). Records gift of paddy. The exact date was Wednesday, 14th June A.D. 1251. See *Ibid.*, p. 305.

497. 148 of 1894.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record in the eleventh year of the Pāṇḍya king Kō-Māravarman *alias* Sundara-Pāṇḍyadēva II (1239—51) "who took every country." Records gift of gold. See *Ibid.*, p. 304, where Dr. Kielhorn points out that the date (Wednesday, Anurādhā, Aparapaksha, Daśami, Makara 24) was Wednesday, 18th January 1251.

498. 149 of 1894.—(Tamil.) On the inside of the west wall of the third prakāra of the same temple. A record in the eighth year of the Pāṇḍya king Kō-Māravarman *alias* Sundara-Pāṇḍyadēva (II?). Records gift of land.

499. 150 of 1894.—(Tamil.) On the same side of the same wall. A record in the twenty-sixth year of the Pāṇḍya king Kō-Jaṭāvarman *alias* Kulaśekhāradēva (I, ? 1190—1217). Records gift of rice.

500. 151 of 1894.—(Tamil.) On the same side of the same wall. An incomplete record in the seventh year of the Pāṇḍya king Kō-Jaṭāvarman *alias* Vīra-Pāṇḍyadēva. See No. 478.

501. 152 of 1894.—(Vaṭṭeḷuttu.) On a pillar near the above epigraph. Records the setting up of the pillar.

502. 153 of 1894.—(Tamil.) On the inside of the north wall of the same prākāra. A record in the thirty-fourth year of the Pāṇḍya king Kō-Māravarman *alias* Kulaśēkharadēva (I?). Records gift of rice.

503. 154 of 1894.—(Tamil.) On the inside of the south wall of the second prākāra of the same temple. A record in the eighth year of the Pāṇḍya king Kō-Māravarman *alias* Sundara-Pāṇḍyadēva (I or II?). Records gift of land.

504. 155 of 1894.—(Tamil.) On the inside of the west wall of the same prākāra. A record in the seventeenth year of the Pāṇḍya king Kō-Māravarman *alias* Sundara-Pāṇḍyadēva (I, 1216—35) who was pleased to take the Chōḷa country and perform the anointment of heroes at Muḍikoṇḍaśōḷapuram. Dr. Kielhorn points out that between 1200 and 1300 the only possible English date for this (Monday, Uttarāshāḍha, 10th *tithi*, 7th of Pūraṭṭādi) is Monday, 4th December 1234. *Ep. Ind.*, Vol. VI, p. 303.

505. 156 of 1894.—(Tamil.) On the inside of the north wall of the same prākāra. A record in the eighth year of the Pāṇḍya king Kō-Māravarman *alias* Sundara-Pāṇḍyadēva (II, 1239—51). Records gift of a village to certain Brahmans and the naming of it after Vīra-Sōmēśvara, the Hoysaḷa king, whose supremacy was apparently recognized by the Pāṇḍya. See No. 487 above.

506. 157 of 1894.—(Tamil.) On two pillars in the maṅṭapa on the southern side of the large shrine in the same temple. A record in the eighth year of the Chōḷa king Kō-Parakēsarivarman *alias* Rājendra-Chōḷadēva (I, 1011—43). Records gift of money.

507. 158 of 1894.—(Sanskrit and Tamil.) On another pillar in the same maṅṭapa. A record in the twenty-second year of the Kēraḷa king Kulaśēkharadēva. [Was he Ravivarman Kulaśēkhara, the conqueror of South India, about 1316 ?] Records gift of land.

508. 159 of 1894.—(Vaṭṭeḷuttu.) On the north wall of the same shrine in the same temple. A record in the fifteenth year of the Pāṇḍya king Kō-Vīra-Pāṇḍya, “who took the head of the Chōḷa.” Records gift of a lamp. See No. 478 above.

509. 160 of 1894.—(Vaṭṭeḷuttu.) On the same wall. A record in the eleventh year of the Pāṇḍya king Kō-Vīra-Pāṇḍya, “who took the head of the Chōḷa.” Records gift of a lamp. See No. 478 above.

510. 161 of 1894.—(Vaṭṭeḷuttu.) On the same wall. An incomplete record in the eighteenth year of the Pāṇḍya king Kō-Vīra-Pāṇḍya, “who took the head of the Chōḷa.” See No. 478 above.

511. 162 of 1894.—(Vaṭṭeḷuttu.) On the west wall of the same shrine. A record in the fifteenth year of the Pāṇḍya king Kō-Vīra-Pāṇḍya, “who took the head of the Chōḷa.” Records gift of a lamp. See No. 478 above.

512. 163 of 1894.—(Vaṭṭeḷuttu.) On the same wall. An incomplete record in the sixth year of the Pāṇḍya king Kō-Vīra-Pāṇḍya, “who took the head of the Chōḷa.” See No. 478 above.

Ukkirankōṭṭai.

512-A. On a rock near the town. (“Old Tamil.”) Records grant of land to a Śiva temple in the eleventh year of the reign of Sundara Pāṇḍyan.

TIRUCHENDŪR TALUK.

Āḷvār Tirunagari.

This place is the well-known Tirukkurugūr of Śrī Vaishṇava traditions, the birth-place of Nammāḷvār and later on the centre of the Prabandhic movement. It has been sung by that saint. It is also the native place of Subrahmaṇya Dikshita, the author of the *Prayōgavivēka*, a comparative grammar of Sanskrit and Tamil.

513. 465 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the east wall of the shrine of Jñānapirān in the temple of Ādinātha. Dated in the fourth year of the Pāṇḍya king Māravarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Kulaśēkharadēva. Records gift of the two villages of Śeṅgāṅkuḷam and Neduṅguḷam, hamlets of Tirukkurugūr in Tiruvaḷudi-vaḷanāḍu, by a certain Ōḍanāṭṭadigaḷ for feeding the learned men of the “eighteen (Vaishṇava) countries” who met in the Aruḷāḷadāsī-maṭha founded by himself in the temple of Poliṅjiniṅṅaruḷiya Paramasvāmi at Tirukkurugūr. Mentions Śrī-vaikuṇḍam *alias* Rājendra-chaturvēdimāṅgalam, Tiruvāymoḷimāmuni, a disciple of Tirukkurugūrnāmuni, and the palace of the king situated in a grove south of Jayaṅḡḍaśōḷapuram. [Mr. Krishna Sastri points out that the unusual nature of the king’s introduction prevents his being identified with Māravarman Kulaśēkhara I and thinks that he was perhaps the contemporary and successor of Jaṭavarman Śrīvallabha.] See *Ep. Rep.*, 1910, p. 99.

514. 466 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Tribhuvana-chakravartin Kōnērinmaikoṇḍān records in his fourth year the sanction of the above gift by Kāḷingarāyan.

515. 467 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the same shrine. Dated in the seventeenth year of the Pāṇḍya king Kulaśēkharadēva “who was pleased to take every country.” Records gift of special privileges by Tribhuvanachakravartin Kōnērinmaikoṇḍān, in the distribution of the sacred *prasāda*, to a Brāhmaṇa of Maṅalūr who recited the *purāṇas* and *itihāsas* in the

temples of Poliñjiniṅṅararuḷiya-Paramasvāmi and Tirunāḍudaiya-pirān at Tirunagari in Tiruvaḷudi-vaḷanāḍu.

516. 468 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record of the fifteenth year of the Pāṇḍya king Māravarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Śundara-Pāṇḍyadēva (II?, 1239—51). Records that Araiyan Viradamuḍichchān *alias* Pallavarāyar of Chakra-pāṇinallūr in Śevvirukkaināḍu built the maṅṭapa and set up the image of Varāha-Nāyanār.

517. 469 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Dated in the twelfth year of the Pāṇḍya king Māravarman *alias* Tribhuvana-chakravartin Sundara-Pāṇḍyadēva (I, 1216—35). Records gift of land at Peruṅguḷam *alias* Uttama-Pāṇḍyanallūr, with the sanction of Maḷavarāyan, for a festival founded in the temple at Tirukkurugūr by Araiyan Pūvan *alias* Vēnavuḍaiyān, in the name of Araiyan Tirunāḍudaiyān *alias* Nīlaganṅaraiyan of Kīḷai-Koḍumalūr in Vaḍatalai Śembi-nāḍu. Mentions the palace at Māḍakkuḷakkī-Madurai and the seat, Maḷavarāyan.

518. 470 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Dated in the eleventh year of Māravarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Sundara-Pāṇḍyadēva (I?). Records gift of land at Śrīvaikuṇḍam *alias* Rājēndra-chaturvēdimanṅaḷam for the upkeep of the same festival.

519. 471 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. An incomplete record of Tribhuvanachakravartin Kōnērinmaikoṇḍān, dated twelfth year. Records gift of land at Peruṅguḷam *alias* Uttama-Pāṇḍyanallūr for the same purpose.

520. 472 of 1909.—(Grantha.) On the north wall of the *yāgaśāla* in the same temple. Records two verses written by Kavipitāmaha saying that Maḷavanripati built an artistic maṅṭapa for the God Sthitādh-ipati-(Ninra Ādinātha in Tamil), also called Tāta, at Tātaśrīnagari (i.e., Āḷvār-Tirunagari).

521. 473 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the main gōpura of the same temple. A damaged record mentioning Venṅrumaṅkoṇḍa Bhūtala-vīra Śrī-Udayamāttāṅḍapanmar.

*Tiruchchendūr.**

This is the well-known Tiruchchendil, one of the six *Paḍai-vidus* of God Subrahmaṅya. It is also known as Tiruchchīralaivāy.

522. 26 of 1912.—(Vaṭṭeḷuttu.) On two slabs set up in the Subrahmaṅya temple. A record in the thirteenth year of the Pāṇḍya king Varaguṅa-Mārāya. The inscription was partially copied in 1903. Registers that the king who was a devotee of

* An extensive Tamil poem purporting to be the translation of a Sanskrit *Purāṇa* on this place, consisting of ten *adhyāyas* and 898 *viruttas*, exists. Its author is Venrimālai Kavirāya, a servant of the shrine. He lived perhaps in the eighteenth century.

Subrahmaṇya Bhaṭāra provided 1,400 gold coins (*kāśus*) for the requirements of the temple throughout the twelve months of the year. The money was distributed among sixteen villages which were required only to pay interest at two *kalams* of paddy per year on each *kāśu* borrowed, without disturbing principal. (Note the rate of interest.)

523. 27 of 1912.—(Tamil.) On a pillar set up in the same place. A record in the thirteenth year of the Pāṇḍya king Māra-varman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Kōṇērmaikoṇḍān Vikrama-Pāṇḍyadēva. Records gift of two *mās* of land at Maṅgalakkurichchi in Tiruvaḷudivaḷaṇāḍu to a Brāhmaṇa of Parākrama-Pāṇḍya-chaturvēdimāṅalam in Karuṅguḍi-nāḍu. [The king may be identical with him who came to the throne in A.D. 1282 and was the conqueror of Vīragaṇḍa Gōpāla and Gaṇapati. Mr. Krishna Sastri, however, believes that he was perhaps a contemporary of Arikēsari Parākrama, founder of the Tenkāśi temple, as *Kaliyugarāman* was.]

524. 28 of 1912.—(Tamil.) On the same pillar. Records in K.A. 621, sale of land mentioned in No. 27, to Narkīradēva Nāyanār in the temple of Subrahmaṇya-Piḷḷaiyār at Tiruchchendil, for 630 *Kaliyugarāman-panam* (named after Vīra Pāṇḍya, the contemporary of Arikēsari Parākrama). It is stated that this land which was at Maṅgalakkurichchi *alias* Peruṅkaruṇai-chaturvēdimāṅalam was originally granted to the Brāhmaṇa Attigirinātha-Bhaṭṭar and two others of Parākramapāṇḍya-chaturvēdimāṅalam by Raṇaraṅgarāma-Perumāḷ *alias* Vikrama-Pāṇḍyadēva. [The dedication of a shrine to Nakkīra shows the importance attached in the age to literary greatness. Nakkīrar was one of the last Śaṅgam poets and was the author of the *Tirumurugārṟuppaḍai* and *Irayanār-agapporul*. For an account of his life see *Abhidhāna-chintāmaṇi*, p. 572.]

525. 155 of 1903.—(Vaṭṭeḷuttu.) On a slab set up in the second prakāra of the Subrahmaṇya temple. A record in the thirteenth year of Varaguṇa-Mārāya. Records gift of money.

526. 156 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the west and south walls of the Śivakoḷundiśvara temple in the same village. An incomplete record in K.A. 650. Tiruchchendilūr was also called Tribhuvana-mādēvi-chaturvēdimāṅalam.

TRICHINOPOLY DISTRICT.

KARŪR TALUK.

Aravakkurichi.

1. On a stone in the local temple. (Tamil.) Records gift of land in the village of Muḍikonḍachōlapuram by Kōnērinmaikōṇḍān in his thirteenth year. *Ins., S. Dts., p. 19, No. 1.*

1-A. On a stone in the same. Records that in the twenty-eighth year of the reign of Vīra-Pāṇḍyadēva the people of "Parumbalundore" settled the farmers of that village to cultivate the barren land given to two Brahmans. *Ibid., No. 2.*

Karūr.

This place, the Paśupatīśvara temple of which is known in inscriptions as Tiruvānilai or holy cow stable, has got inscriptions of Vīra Rājendra, Rājendra, Kulōttuṅga III and Vīrachōḷa. But it is a very ancient city and was evidently the celebrated Vañji of Tamil Literature. It is referred to by Ptolemy. Of late a controversy has been raging as to whether Vañji should be identified with Karūr or Cranganore, but the question in favour of Karūr has been unanswerably settled by the able and erudite Pandit Raghavaiyangar in his *Vañjimānagar* published a few months back. According to some inscriptions it was later on included in Adhirājarājamaṇḍalam (i.e., Koṅgu), and according to the others in Śōḷa-Kēraḷamaṇḍalam. In the time of Rājendra I and Rājarāja it was in Kēraḷāntaka vaḷanāḍu. The local epigraphs mention the two subdivisions of Koṅgu, Veṅgala Nāḍu and Taṭṭaiyūr nāḍu.

2. 58 of 1890.--(Tamil.) On the south wall of the *garbhagriha* in the Paśupatīśvara temple. A record in the fourth year of the Chōḷa king Kō-Rājakēsarivarman *alias* Uḍaiyār Śrī-Vīra-Rājendradēva (I, 1064--70) granting the village of Pākkūr in Veṅgala nāḍu in Adhirājarāja maṇḍalam to the shrine. It gives a graphic account of Vīra Rājendra's three wars with the Western Chāḷukyan Āhavamalla Sōmēśvara I and his two sons Vikramāditya VI and Jayasimha III and their Sāmantas Chāvunḍarāya, Kēśavāditya and Nārasimha. The battle of Kūḍal-Śaṅgam is said to have given the Chōḷa decisive victory. See *Ibid., p. 50.* Also *S.I.I., Vol. III, pp. 31--9,* where Dr. Hultzsch edits the inscription.

2-A. 59 of 1890.--(Tamil.) On the south wall of the *garbhagriha* of the Paśupatīśvara temple. A record in the ninth year of the Chōḷa king Kō-Parakēsarivarman *alias* Uḍaiyār Śrī-Rājendradēva (1050--62), the brother and successor of Rājādhirāja who fell in the battle of Koppam, making the grant of Kaṇavadinallūr in Veṅgalanāḍu to the shrine. Dr. Hultzsch points out that one of his

officers was a commander in Ceylon. See *S.I.I.*, Vol. III, No. 21, pp. 39—41.

3. 60 of 1890.—(Tamil.) On the outer wall of the second *prākāra* of the same temple, left of entrance. A record in the twenty-fifth year of the Chōla king Tribhuvanachakravartin Śrī-Kulōttuṅga-Chōladēva (III), saying that the villagers of Tēvanapalli (Śōmūr) sold some land to the temple for three *kalañju* which a hunter had paid into the temple treasury. *Ibid.*, No. 24, pp. 45—6, and *Ins.*, *S. Dts.*, p. 59, No. 26.

4. 61 of 1890.—(Tamil.) On the outer wall of the second *prākāra* of the same temple, right of entrance. A record in the twenty-third year of the Chōla king Tribhuvanachakravartin Śrī-Kulōttuṅga-Chōladēva (III) *alias* Kōnērinmaikoṇḍān, who took Īlam, Madura and Karuvūr and cut off the head of the Pāṇḍya king. Records the grant of two villages in Taṭṭaiyūr nāḍu. *Ibid.*, No. 23, pp. 43—5.

5. 62 of 1890.—(Tamil.) On the outer wall of the second *prākāra* of the same temple, left of entrance. A record of the Chōla king Kōnērinmēlkoṇḍān *alias* Vīra-Chōla, making the gift of the village of Aṇḍanūr or Vīraśōlanallūr for the maintenance of temple servants, on the 23rd year and 438th day of his reign. *Ibid.*, No. 26, pp. 47—8. Also *Ins.*, *S. Dts.*, *Mack. MSS.*, p. 50, No. 3.

6. 63 of 1890.—(Tamil.) On the outer wall of the second *prākāra* of the same temple, right of entrance. A record in the third year of the Chōla king Kō-Parakēsarivarman *alias* Tribhuvana-chakravartin Śrī-Vikrama-Chōladēva (III 18—35).

7. 64 of 1890.—(Vaṭṭeluttu.) On a stone on the roadside, three miles east of Karuvūr. No details given.

8. 65 of 1890.—(Tamil.) South wall of the Amman temple within the Paśupatīsvara temple. A record in the ninth year of the Chōla king Kō-Parakēsarivarman *alias* Uḍaiyār Śrī-Rājēndra-Chōladēva making the gift of the village of Nelvāyppalli in Veṅgalanāḍu in Adhirājarāja maṇḍalam, for the temple expenses. The taxes, tolls, *ēlavai*, *ugavai*, *manrupādu*, *daṇḍakurram* were to be paid to temple. [*Ibid.*, No. 22, pp. 40—3. See also *Ins.*, *S. Dts.*, p. 50, No. 2.]

9. 66 of 1890.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the *garbhagriha* of the same temple. A record in the fifteenth year of Tribhuvana-chakravartin Śrī-Kōnērinmaikoṇḍān, granting some privileges to the Kanmālar of Veṅgalanāḍu. In their marriages and funerals these could in future blow double conches and drums. They could again wear sandals and have their houses covered with plaster. [For a similar order to those of South Koṅgu see 562 of 1893 at

Pērūr and 151 of 1905 at Moḍakkūr. [See *S.I.I.*, Vol. III, No. 25, pp. 46-7.]

10. 135 of 1905.—(Tamil.) On the Moṭṭai-gōpuram of the Paśupatiśvara temple, right of entrance. A record in the twenty-fifth year of the Chōḷa, king Tribhuvanachakravartin Kulōttuṅga-Chōḷadēva (III), “who took Īlam (Ceylon), Madurai, the crowned head of the Pāṇḍya and Karuvūr.” Stones out of order. [See *Ins.*, *S. Dts.*, p. 58, No. 23. It says that the king granted the village of Vīrachōlanallūr to God Tiruvaṅṅāmalai Mahādēva.]

11. 136 of 1905.—(Tamil.) In the same place. A record in the third year of Tribhuvanachakravartin Kōnērimēlkoṇḍān. Records the grant of certain privileges to temple servants. At their marriages and funerals double conches might be blown and drums beaten. They could build two storeys for their houses, could cover them with plaster, could have double doors therein, and decorate their outside with garlands of water-lilies. [The inscription is very interesting for the mention of restrictions even in regard to house buildings.]

12. 137 of 1905.—(Tamil.) In the same place. In modern characters. Mentions in Pārthiva a certain Mīnākshi-Nāyaka.

13. 138 of 1905.—(Tamil.) In the same place. • An incomplete record in the twenty-fourth year of the Chōḷa king Tribhuvanachakravartin Rājarājadēva. Records a gift by three persons, of whom Daṇḍinagōpa Śōmaiya-Daṇḍanāyaka who is mentioned with a string of *birudas* was one.

14. 139 of 1905.—(Tamil.) In the Moṭṭai-gōpuram of the same temple, left of entrance. A mutilated record in the third year of the Chōḷa king Parakēsarivarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Vikrama-Chōḷadēva. Karuvūr was situated in Veṅgala-nāḍu, a subdivision of Vīra-śōḷamaṇḍalam.

15. 140 of 1905.—(Tamil.) In the same place. In modern characters. Records in Pārthiva a gift while Ērāreḍḍi of Patti-pūṇḍi was the moṇigar.

16. 141 of 1905.—(Tamil.) In the same place. A record in the thirty-sixth year of the Chōḷa king Tribhuvanachakravartin Tribhuvanavīradēva (Kulōttuṅga III), “who took Īlam (Ceylon), Madura, and the crowned head of the Pāṇḍya and performed the anointment of heroes and the anointment of victors.” Records gift of land. [See *Ins.*, *S. Dts.* (*Mack. MSS.*), p. 51, No. 4. It gives the date as thirty-seventh year, and says that it “regulated the measurement of the land at 12 feet of colī (*kulī*). Five hundred (*kulis*) are said to have made a *mā* in the village of Puliyūr. See also No. 214L below.]

17. 142 of 1905.—(Tamil.) On a pillar to the right of entrance into the front gōpura of the same temple. In modern characters.

Records in Paridhāvin that some Nāyakas founded a *sattra* at Karuvūr for feeding Brāhmaṇas. [See *Ins., S. Dts.*, p. 55, No. 15. It says that it was the grant of two villages in the time of Chokkaliṅga Nāyakar.]

17-A. On a stone south of the Amman temple. Records that Vikrama Chōḷa (1118—35) granted in his twelfth year a village to God Tiruvanēśvara Uḍaiyār. *Ibid.*, p. 50, No. 3.

17-B. On a stone south of the Mahāmaṅṭapam in the Paśupatiśvara temple. Records that Rājēndradēva granted in his ninth year some land east of "Rājanundrumvādi" and Coolattoo (Kulattūr?). *Ibid.*, p. 54, No. 13.

17-C. On a stone south of the *katta-gōpuram*. The grant of the village of "Poonapulli munnora" to the *sthānattār* of the temple by Kulōttuṅga Chōḷadēva in his twenty-third year. *Ibid.*, No. 14.

17-D. On a stone west of the Amman temple. Records grant of the village of Aḷagia Sokkakkūttanallūr to God Tiruvaṅṅāmalai Mahādēva by one "Pettoovunji Nāyakan." *Ibid.*, No. 16.

17-E. On a stone in the back side of the inner temple of Amman. Records the grant of the village of Ādichchamaṅgalam to the God by Kulōttuṅga Chōḷa in his twenty-first year. *Ibid.*, p. 56, No. 17.

17-F. On a stone in the south side of *katta-gōpuram* in the temple of Paśupatiśvara Svāmi. Records that Rāmāyākavunḍa Nāyakan and Kuppānkavunḍa Nāyakan purchased some *dēvastānam* land for sixty *paṇams* and granted it to the God in the twenty-fourth year of the reign of Rājā Rāja Dēva. *Ibid.*, p. 59, No. 25.

Modakkūr.

In *Mack. MSS. (Ins., S. Dts.*, p. 20) three inscriptions are given in this place, of which one is assigned to Vīra Rājēndra and the other two to Kōnērinmaikoṇḍān. They seem to be the same as the first three in the following list :—

18. 151 of 1905.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the central shrine in the Meypporuḷnāthasvāmin temple. A record in the fifteenth year of Tribhuvanachakravartin Kōnērinmaikoṇḍān. Records the grant of certain privileges to the Kammāḷars of certain specified districts (Talayūrṇāḍu, Veṅgalanāḍu, Araiyanāḍu, Iḍaippuḷuḍināḍu, Vaḍagaraimaṅaturnāḍu, Taṭṭaiyūr-nāḍu and Kīḷaṅganāḍu. See No. 9 above.

19. 152 of 1905.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the same shrine. A record in the thirteenth year of Vīrarājēndradēva. Built in the beginning. Records gift of a lamp.

20. 153 of 1905.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record in the third year of Tribhuvanachakravartin Kōnērinmaikoṇḍān. “Śrī Parakēsari” is engraved to the left of the inscription. A mutilated record.

21. 154 of 1905.—(Tamil.) On a stone set up in front of the Vighnēśvara temple in the same village. A damaged record. Mentions the God Meypporuḷīśvaramuḍaiyār.

Mukkaṇāṅkurichchi.

21-A. On a stone in the temple of Vīrapāṇḍya Īśvara Svām in the village. Records that Karemakavuṇḍān and others fixed an allowance of one *patāka* of grain and two *paṇams* for each marriage to the God in the reign of Viśvanātha Nāyakar. *Ins., S Dts., p. 51, No. 6.* [Viśvanātha might be the founder of the Nāik dynasty of Madura, 1559—63.]

Nanniyūr.

21-B. On a stone in the Subrahmaṇya temple. Records grant of land by one Chokkaliṅga Mudaliār in the reign of Chokkaliṅga Nāyakar Raṅgappa Nāyakar. *Ibid., p. 52, No. 7.* [The king was evidently Chokkanātha Nāik of Madura who ruled from 1660 to 1682. Raṅgappa was probably his son Raṅga Kṛishṇa who ruled from 1682 to 1689. See my *Hist., Nāik King, Madu., in Ind. Antq. 1916-17.*]

Nattamaṅgalam.

21-C. On a stone in the temple of Pushpanāthasvāmin. Records gift of land to the God by the inhabitants of the village in the reign of Vīrapāṇḍya. *Ibid.*

Nērūr.

21-D. On a stone on the back the Dakṣiṇāmūrti shrine, in the Agnēśvara temple. Records gift of the village of “Nallipokka Nattum” to the God by Kōnērinmaikoṇḍān in his seventy-second year. *Ibid., p. 53, No. 9.*

21-E. On a stone in the same. Records that the people of the village established the festival of Chitrai to the God in the seventeenth year of Vīrapāṇḍya. Mentions Kuñjaramalla. *Ibid., No. 10.*

21-F. On a stone in a local temple of Varadarāja. Records grant of the village of “Mauniecaull” to a Brahman by Kulōttuṅga-chōḷa in the seventeenth year of his reign. *Ibid., No. 11.*

21-G. On a stone in the inner temple of the Amman, in Agnēśvara shrine. Records gift of the village of “Channappa Reddi” for the God in the reign of Rājēndradēva. *Ibid., No. 18.*

21-H. On a stone on the south side of the *katta-gōpuram*. Records the deposit of 173 *paṇams* with the priests by one Āḷavanḍān in the third reign of the Vikramachōḷadēva. *Ibid., No. 19.*

21-I. On a stone on the north side of the same. Records that Mīnākshi-Nāyaka granted 200 *kulis* of paddy field to God Pushpanathēśvara for the supply of 1,000 Bilva leaves in Pārthiva in the reign of Tribhuvanachakravarti. *Ins., S. Dts., p. 58, No. 20.*

21-J. On the south of the cook room gate. Records that the people of Raṅgasamudram gave some land to God Tiruvanala Mahādēva in the fifteenth year of the reign of Vīrapāṇḍya. *Ibid., No. 21.*

21-K. On the south side of a maṅṭapam in the same temple. Records that "Parum Padeyar" fixed the payment of one *paṇam* per year for the repair of the temple in the sixth year of the reign of Sundarapāṇḍyadēva. *Ibid., No. 22.*

Puliyūr.

21-L. On a stone south of the ardha-maṅṭapam in the Vajragirīśvara temple. Records that Tribhuvanachakravīra Dēva's feudatory Chēdirāya "regulated measurement of land at twelve feet of *kuli*, 500 *kulis* being made a *mā*", in the thirty-seventh year of the king. *Ibid., p. 51, No. 4.*

21-M. On the north side of the same. Records grant of land east of the village to the God. *Ibid., No. 5.*

Śōmūr.

The ancient name of this place was evidently Tēvanappaḷi.

22. 67 of 1890.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the deserted Sōmēśvara temple. A record in the twentieth year of the Chōḷa king Kō-Rājarājakēsarivarman *alias* Śrī-Rājarājadēva (I).

23. 68 of 1890.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the same temple. A record in the twenty-fourth year of the Chōḷa king Madirai-koṇḍa Kō-Parakēsarivarman (i.e., Parāntaka I).

24. 69 of 1890.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the same temple. A record in the ninth year of the Chōḷa king Kō-Parakēsarivarman *alias* Śrī-Rājēndra-Chōḷadēva (1012--43).

*Veñjāmāngūdalūr.**

25. 143 of 1905.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the central shrine in the Vikritīśvara temple. A record of Kōnērinmaikoṇḍān. On the top of the inscription is engraved "Jayakēsari." Records the gift of the village of Tiruveñjamākkūdal to the temple. See *Ibid., p. 23, No. 9.*

* The *Mack. MSS. (Ins., S. Dts., pp. 21--4, Nos. 6--14)* give nine inscriptions under this place, of which eight are the same as given in the list, though, owing to want of details, it is difficult to point out the exact identity of every two of them. For the same reason it is impossible to pick out the ninth inscription in the MSS.

26. 144 of 1905.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record in the thirteenth year of Tribhuvanachakravartin Kōnērinmaikoṇḍān. On the top of the inscription is engraved “Śrī-Rājakēsari”. Records gift of land.

27. 145 of 1905.—(Tamil.) On the north and west walls of the same shrine. A record in the tenth year of Tribhuvanachakravartin Kōnērinmaikoṇḍān. Veñjamākkūḍal was in Veṅgala-nāḍu. Records gift of land.

28. 146 of 1905.—(Tamil.) On the west wall of the same shrine. A record of Kōnērinmaikoṇḍān. “Jayakēsari” is engraved at the top of the inscription. Records gift of land.

29. 147 of 1905.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the same shrine. A record in the forty-first year of Rājakēsarivarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Vīrarājēndradēva (I? 1063—70). Records gift of gold for a lamp to the God Vikṛita of Veñjamākkūḍal.

30. 148 of 1905.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record in the sixth year of the Pāṇḍya king Jaṭāvarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Sundara-Pāṇḍyadēva. Records gift of land. See *Ins., S. Dts.* (in *Mack. MSS.*), p. 22, No. 7. The latter says that the village of “Parapoottoraya” was given to God Ādichandrēśvara by two villagers. [It is difficult to say whether the king is the one who came to the throne in 1251 or his namesakes whose years of accession were 1270 and 1276.]

31. 149 of 1905.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record of Kōnērimaikoṇḍān. “Jayakēsari” is engraved at the top of the inscription. Records gift of land. [See *Ibid.*, p. 21, No. 6, which says that it is the gift of the village of Nandanore to Āḷudaiya Dēvar.]

32. 150 of 1905.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the Panniru-muḷi Amman shrine in the same temple. A record in the third year of Parakēsarivarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Vīra-Pāṇḍyadēva. Records that a certain Sundara-Pāṇḍyadēvan *alias* Kaṇḍiyadēvar made some additions and improvements to the shrine of the goddess Paṇṇemoḷiyār. [The Chōla title is in this epigraph applied to a Pāṇḍya king. A similar example is seen in the Koṅgu-Pāṇḍya king Rājakēsarivarman Vīra-Pāṇḍya (1265—81). Was the present king also a Koṅgu-Pāṇḍya ruler of the same age?]

KULITTALAI TALUK.

Dēvarmalai.

33. In the Vishṇu temple. A record of Muttaya Naik of Gooty, the alleged founder of the Kaḍavūrpālayam. *Trichinopoly Gazr.*, Vol. I, p. 279.

Mahādānapuram.

The *Trichinopoly Gazr.* points out that, according to tradition, this place was so called because it was a great gift by Kṛishṇa Uḍaiyār of Mysore to some Brahmans. See Paḷaiyaśaṅgaḍam.

34. 386 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the central shrine in the Chōḷēśvara temple. Records in the fourth year of the Chōḷa king Rājākēsarivarman *alias* Uḍaiyār Rājēndra-Chōḷadēva (i.e., Rājēndra Chōḷa II, later on Kulōttuṅga I) gift of land to the temple of Madhurāntaka-Īśvaramuḍaiyār also called Śrī-Kailāsa. The land was purchased from the *sabhā* of Śōḷakulamāṅikka-chaturvēdimaṅgalam, a *brahmadēya* in Ādanūr-nāḍu (a subdivision) of Abhimānajīva-vaḷanāḍu. [Contains also an incomplete inscription of the fifth year of Parakēsarivarman *alias* Uḍaiyār Rājēndra-Chōḷadēva.] Mr. Venkayya points out that the usurper's power extended into the Chōḷa country by this year, that his war with Adhi Rājēndra must have taken place subsequent to this and been followed by the Western Chālukyan invasion of the Chōḷa country. *Ep. Rep.*, 1904, p. 12.

35. 387 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the west wall of the central shrine in the Chōḷēśvara temple. Records in the fifth year of the Chōḷa king Rājēndra-Chōḷadēva (i.e., Rājēndra Chōḷa II or Kulōttuṅga I) gift of land to the temple of Madhurāntaka-Chōḷīśvara in Śōḷakulamāṅikka-chaturvēdimaṅgalam by Sōmaya-Daṇḍanāyaka, an officer of Vīra-Sōmēśvaradēva.

Maṅgavaram.

The place contains a large number of Chōḷa inscriptions and the story is current that the local god saved the daughter of a Chōḷa king who was born with a jackal's face.

36. 328 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the central shrine in the Sundarēśvara temple. Dated in the reign of the Chōḷa king Parakēsarivarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Vikrama-Chōḷadēva (1118—35). Records gift of money for a lamp by Piṅgaḷandai Tillaiviḍaṅgan Śagaragaṅāyagan. The date of the record is lost. The *Piṅgaḷandai* is the famous Tamil dictionary of Piṅgaḷar, the son of Divākara, attributed by Prof. Seshagiri Sastri to the eighth century. See his *Rep.*, *Suns. Tam. MSS.*, 1894, pp. 118-9.

37. 329 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the north and south bases of the same temple. A damaged record. The king's name is lost.

38. 330 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the maṅṭapa in front of the same shrine. Records in the fourth year of the Chōḷa king Parakēsarivarman gift of land to two trumpet blowers of the temple. The village was called Ariṅjigaichcharuppēdimaṅgalam [evidently named after Ariṅjigai, son of Parāntaka I].

39. 331 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in the fourth year of the Chōḷa king Parakēsarivarman gift of a flower garden.

40. 332 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records that in the twelfth year of the Chōla king Parakēsarivarman a certain Lōkavidyādhaṛa Brahmādhirājan reclaimed some land and presented it to the Goddess Umā-Bhaṭṭāraki.

41. 333 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in the seventh year of the Chōla king Rājādhirājadēva (I?) gift of money for a lamp.

42. 334 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the maṇṭapa in front of the central shrine in the Sundarēśvara temple. Records in the thirty-fourth year of Tribhuvanachakravartin Kōnērinmaikonḍān a gift of land. Mentions Naṅgai Brahmādēyam *alias* Ariñchiyacharuppēdimāṅalam in Rājagambhīravaḷanāḍu.

43. 335 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the same maṇṭapa. Records in the twentieth year of the Chōla king Parakēsarivarman *alias* Rājēndra-Chōladēva (I, 1012—43) that the king dismissed two of the temple drummers and appointed another man instead.

44. 336 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the south base of the same maṇṭapa. An incomplete record of the Chōla king Parakēsarivarman, the date of which is lost. Records gift of land.

45. 337 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the same base. Dated in the reign of a Chōla king Parakēsarivarman. Records in his twelfth year sale of land.

46. 338 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the same base. An incomplete and damaged record.

47. 339 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the north side of the entrance into the same maṇṭapa. Records that a chief named Akalaṅkan built the maṇṭapa.

48. 340 of 1903.—(Tamil.) At the entrance into the kitchen in the same temple. Records in the thirteenth year of the Pāṇḍya king Sundara Pāṇḍyadēva (unidentified) gift of door-posts.

49. 341 of 1903.—(Grantha.) On the south base of the central shrine in the Sundararāja Permāl temple in the same village. A much damaged record in Sanskrit verse. Refers to the tank and the donor mentioned in the next inscription.

50. 342 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the same base. Records in the fourth year of the Chōla king Rājakēsarivarman a gift of land for maintaining the boat plying in the tank at Ariñjigai-chaturvēdimāṅalam. The purchaser was Trailōkkiyan *alias* Kōdaṇḍarāma-Mārāyan of Kaṛkaḍai near Kodumbālūr.

51. 343 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the west base of the same shrine. A damaged record. Connected with the above inscription. Records detailed arrangements for the daily removal of silt in the tank and for repairing the boat.

52. 344 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the south base of the maṇṭapa in front of the same shrine. An incomplete and damaged record.

53. 345 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the east base of the central shrine in the Piḍāri temple in the same village. An incomplete record of the Chōla king Madirai-koṇḍa Parakēsarivarman (Parāntaka ?), the date of which is omitted. Mentions the village of Arañjigai-chaturvēdimāṅgalam and a Piḍāri temple called Kālabhaṭāri *alias* Śāttanūrnaṅgai.

54. 346 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the west base of the same shrine. Records in the fourth year of the Chōla king Rājakēsarivarman gift of rice for offerings.

55. 347 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the same base. An incomplete record of the Chōla king Rājakēsarivarman, dated in his twelfth year.

Maruṅgāpuri.

56—61. [For the history of this Pālayam see *Trichinopoly Gazr.*, p. 283.] Epigraphically the place has been noticed for five old copper-plate grants in the possession of the Zemindar; ' but the first three of these are absolutely valueless, as two of them are dated in 912 and the third in 1195 A.D., while it is obvious that the estate cannot be as ancient as this. They mix up Chōlas, Pāṇdyas, Nāyakkans and poligars in inextricable confusion. The other two grants are dated in 1747 and 1783 and apparently record gifts of lands to certain temples. The latter contains a long list of the poligars, but gives no dates for them." (*Trichinopoly Gazr.*, p. 283.)

Palaiyaśaṅgam.

✓ A hamlet of Mahādānapuram, it is supposed to be a contraction of Palaiya Jāyaṅkoṇḍachōlapuram (as opposed to the new town of that name in the Uḍaiyārpālaiyam taluk, once a Chōla capital. "It contains some Jain remains, the ruins of an extensive camp and a beautifully constructed stone tank, which lend some support to this theory of departed greatness." *Trichinopoly Gazr.*, Vol. I, p. 282.

62. 388 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the south base of the central shrine of the Ālavandīśvara temple. A fragmentary record dated in Parthiva. Mentions Ālavandīśura. Contains also a more ancient fragment.

63. 389 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On a stone oil mill lying in a field in the same village. Records the transfer of the mill from the ownership of Vaḍugambhaṭṭan to that of Viśambhaṭṭan.

Pūrattukōyil.

64. 734 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the maṅṭapa in front of the central shrine in the Muktiśvara temple. Records

in the twenty-eighth year of the Pāṇḍya king Māravarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Kulaśēkharadēva (I or II?), gift of a village to the temple of Tirumuttīśvara-muḍaiyanāyanār at Kaḍuvaṅkuḍi by the inhabitants of Mudiyaḅkuḍi-nāḍu and Vaḍa-Kōnāḍu, which were subdivisions of Urattūr-kūrṅam in Kōnāḍu *alias* Kaḍaladayād-Ilaṅgaikoṇḍa-Chōḷa-vaḷanāḍu.

65. 735 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Mentions in Paridhāvi that the residents of Kaḍuvaṅkuḍi made an endowment of a dancing girl to the temple of Muttīśvaramuḍaiya Nāyanār.

66. 736 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. An incomplete record of Bhujabalarāya (i.e., Immuḍi Naraśiṅga, son of Sāḷuva Naraśiṅga), dated Ś. 1414, Paridhāvi. Mentions Kaḍuvaṅkuḍi and Koḍumbaināyaka Vēḷār of Koḍumbāḷur. See No. 73 below and *Ep. Ind.*, 1910, p. 114.

67. 737 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in the fourth year of the Pāṇḍya king Māravarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Kulaśēkharadēva (I or II?) gift of the village of Aḷagiya-Śēmanallūr to the temple of Tirumuttīchchuramuḍaiya-Nāyanār at Kaḍuvaṅkuḍi, a village in Mudiyaḅkuḍi-nāḍu in Vaḍa-Kōnāḍu, a subdivision of Urattūr-kūrṅam, which was a district of Kaḍaladayād-Ilaṅgaikoṇḍa-Chōḷa-Vaḷanāḍu. See No. 64 above.

68. 738 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in Paridhāvi, endowment of a dancing girl to the temple of Muttīchchuramuḍaiya-Nāyanār of Muduśorkuḍi-nāḍu.

69. 739 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A damaged record. Mentions Kōḍāḷakkuḍi and seems to record a gift of land to the same temple.

70. 740 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the west wall of the same maṅṭapa. Dated in the reign of the Vijayanagara king Vīrapratāpa Dēvarāya-Mahārāya (II), "who was pleased to witness the elephant hunt." Records in Ś. 1367, Raktākshi, gift of land by the residents of Kaḍuvaṅkuḍi to the temple of Muttīśvaramuḍaiya Nāyanār at Pūlattūr in Kaḍuvaṅkuḍi-paṅṅu, in Muduśorkuḍināḍu in Urattūr-kūrṅam, in Kōnāḍu *alias* Kaḍaladayād-Ilaṅgaikoṇḍa-Chōḷavaḷanāḍu.

71. 741 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the same maṅṭapa. Records in the eleventh year of the Pāṇḍya king Jaṭavarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Sundara-Pāṇḍyadēva (I) gift of land to the same temple. See *Ep. Ind.*, Vol. XI, p. 257, where Mr. Sewell calculates from the details of the date (Wednesday, Svāti, second fortnight, Kanyā) that August 31, A.D. 1261, is intended, but the fortnight is wrongly stated.

72. 742 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in the sixth year of the Pāṇḍya king Māravarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Kulaśēkharadēva (II) gift of land by the residents of

Mēlai-Kaḍuvaṅkuḍi, Kīlai-Kaḍuvaṅkuḍi and Poygai. See *Ep. Ind.*, Vol. XI, pp. 264-5. The details of the date are Saturday, Dhanishṭa, Pūrvapaksha, Prathamai in Makara, corresponding, according to Mr. Sewell, to Saturday, January 12, A.D. 1320. So the king referred to is Māravarman Kulaśēkhara II.

73. 743 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A much damaged record of the Śāluva king Immaḍi Naraśiṅgarāya, dated Piṅḡala. Mentions Kaḍuvankuḍi-Paṅṅu *alias* Purattūr. See No. 66 above.

74. 744 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the east wall of the same maṅṭapa. Seems to record in the eighth year of the Pāṇḍya king Jaṭāvarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Sundara-Pāṇḍyadēva an agreement among the temple servants. [It is not known which of the Sundara Pāṇḍyas is referred to.]

75. 745 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the east wall of the same maṅṭapa. A damaged record of the Pāṇḍya king Māravarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin "who was pleased to take every country," dated in his thirty-ninth year. Records gift of money for offerings and festivals.

Ratnagiri.

So called from the curious bare conical rock (the ruby hill) which rises from the surrounding plain and which is ascended by a flight of 952 steps built in 1783.

76. 144 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the central shrine in the Ratnāchalēśvara temple. Rāśiṅgadēva *alias* Śōlakōn built three rows of stone steps to the east of the hall called maṅṭapa.

77. 145 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Dated in the reign of the Pāṇḍya king Jaṭāvarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Sundara-Pāṇḍyadēva, "who was pleased to take every country." Provides in his twelfth year, Kārttigai 8, for offerings to the God Tirumāṅikkamalai uḍaiya Nāyanār, while installed at the maṅṭapa on festival days. The donor was Nāvalūruḍaiyān, a native of Sivapādaśēkharapuram. [The Government Epigraphist believes that the king referred to was Jaṭāvarman Sundara Pāṇḍya I.]

78. 146 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the south and east walls of the same shrine. Dated in the reign of the Vijayanagara king Sadāśivadēva Mahārāya, son of Achyutarāya. Records in Ś. 1466, expired, Krōdhin, Mithuma, ba. di. 10, Rēvati, Friday (details not enough for calculation), a gift of land in Kuḷittaṅḍalai-śīrmai *alias* Karuṅgilappalli in Mikōḍu-nāḍu, a subdivision of Tenkarai- Rājagambhīra-vaḷanāḍu, by Timmappa Nāyaka (son of Śiṅgama Nāik and grandson of Koṇḍama Nāik), an agent of Rāmarāja-Chinna-Tammayadēva-Mahārāja, for the morning offerings in the temple

of Tirumāṅikka-malai-uḍaiya-Tambirānār. Rāmarāja Chinnā Tammayadēva was a member of the Āravīti family and like his brother Viṭṭhala was the cousin-brother of the great minister Rāma Rāya. Timma accompanied his brother Viṭṭhala in his southern campaign of 1545.

79. 147 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the east wall of the same shrine. Dated in the reign of the Vijayanagara king Vīra-Narasiimha-Bhujabalarāya-Mahārāya. Records in Ś. 1428, expired, Kshaya, Karkataka, ba. di. 12, Friday, gift of gold for a lamp, for bringing a pot of water from the Kāvēri for the sacred bath of the God and for offerings in the mornings. Diwan Bahadur Swamikannu Pillai calculates the date to be Friday, July 17, A.D. 1506.

80. 148 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the same shrine. Records in Ś. 1362, expired, Plavaṅga (wrong), Tai, thirteenth solar day, Rēvati, gift of land in Karuṅgilāpalli by Timmarāja, the younger brother of Viṭṭhalarāja, to the God at Ratnagiri. The date is irregular and a number of possible dates are given in *Ep. Rep.*, 1915, p. 84, but none is satisfactory. For Timmarāja see No. 78 above.

81. 149 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Tribhuvana-chakravartin Kōnērinmaikoṇḍān (Kulōttuṅga III), records in his third year, gift of land in Ediriliśōlanallūr for making provisions for those who bring water from the Kāvēri to the temple of Tirumāṅikkamalai-Mādēva in Kurunagar-nāḍu, a subdivision of Rājagambhīra-vaḷanāḍu. Mentions the royal secretary Mīnavan Mūvēndavēḷān. The grant was made at the instance of Toṇḍaimān. Both these were well known officers of Kulōttuṅga (III).

82. 150 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Dated in the reign of the Chōḷa king Tribhuvanachakravartin Kulōttuṅga-Chōḷadēva (III), "who having been pleased to take Madurai (Madura), Iḷam (Ceylon), the crowned head of the Pāṇḍya and Karuvūr, was pleased to perform the anointment of heroes and the anointment of victors." Seems to register a gift of land. Partly built in.

83. 151 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record of the Chōḷa king Tribhuvanachakravartin Rājarājadēva, in his second year. Mentions Poṅgalūkkā-nāḍu in Koṅgu-maṇḍalam. Partly built in.

84. 152 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Seems to register in the thirty-fourth year, Makara, ba. di. Monday, Uttara-Phalguna, of the Chōḷa king Tribhuvanachakravartin Tribhuvanavīradēva (Kulōttuṅga III), "who having been pleased to take Madurai (Madura) . . . Karuvūr and the crowned head of the Pāṇḍya, was pleased to perform the anointment of heroes and the anointment of victors (i.e., Kulōttuṅga-Chōḷa III), a gift of land by a native of Poṅgalūkkā-nāḍu in Vaḍa Koṅgu. Built in

at the beginning. The date corresponds to Monday, December 26, A.D. 1211.

85. 153 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Portions lost and partly built in. Seems to prescribe punishments for illegal collection of taxes.

86. 154 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the west wall of the same shrine. Records in the twelfth year of Tribhuvanachakravartin Viraśōladēva gift of land. Beginning lost. The village is called Viraśōla-chaturvēdimāṅgalam, a *brahmadēya* in . . . taiyūr nāḍu, a subdivision of Viraśōla-vaḷanāḍu.

87. 155 of 1914.—(Tamil.) In the same wall. Records in the tenth year of the Chōla king Rājarāja (III), gift of 1,000 *kāsus* for the expenses of the Śivarātri day, by a merchant of Śivapādaśēkharapuram.

88. 156 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A damaged record of the Chōla king Tribhuvanachakravartin Kulōttuṅga-Chōladēva (III), "who took Madurai (Madura), Īlam (Ceylon) and the crowned head of the Pāṇḍya," dated in his twenty-third year.

89. 157 of 1914.—(Tamil.) At the entrance into the maṅṭapa in front of the same shrine, left side. States that a certain Maṅṭragalaṇḍān Koṅgaraikoṇḍa-Pallavaraiyan, one of the Agambaḍi-Mudalis of Śāttan Śēdirāyan, built the entrance steps and supplied the door to this maṅṭapa and built the Tirumaḍaivilāgam at the foot of the hill.

90. 158 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the same maṅṭapa. A record of the Pāṇḍya king Sundara-Pāṇḍya, dated in his fifteenth year. The terrace roof of this maṅṭapa was the charity of the merchants* (*nagarattōm*) of Śivapādaśēkharapuram and the cartmen of Pēṭṭai.

91. 159 of 1914.—(Tamil verse.) On the same wall. Records the construction of the temple with stone by a certain Āḍavidāṅga Pichchan.

92. 160 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the east wall of the Dakshiṇāmūrti shrine in the same temple. Records in the twenty-second year of the Chōla king Tribhuvanachakravartin Rājarājadēva (III ?), gift of two *mās* of land for offerings to the image of Dakshiṇāmūrti-dēvālaya, merchant of Śivapādaśēkharapuram in Kuru-nagar-nāḍu, a subdivision of Rājagambhīra vaḷanāḍu.

93. 161 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the west wall of the same shrine. Records that Śirraṅambaruḍaiyān Vikkavināyakan Kāli Nalliśaiyāḷan, a merchant* of Śivapādaśēkharapuram, set up the image of Dakshiṇāmūrtidēva and built the steps (*sōpāna*).

94. 162 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records gift of money by the person mentioned in the above epigraph for a lamp to be burnt in the shrine of Dakshiṇāmūrtidēva.

95. 163 of 1914.—(Tamil.) At the entrance into the kitchen in the same temple, right side. A damaged record of the Hoysala king Sārvabhaṃmachakravartin Vīra-Rāmanāthadēva, dated in his thirteenth year.

96. 164 of 1914.—(Tamil.) At the same entrance, left side. Records the building of the kitchen east of the maṇimaṇṭapa.

97. 165 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the rock outside the south prākāra wall of the same temple. Records in the forty-eighth year of the Chōla king Kulōttuṅga Chōladēva gift of land for offerings. Built in at the beginning.

98. 166 of 1914.—(Tamil.) In the same place. Seems to register a gift of land in the reign of the Chōla king Chakravartin Kulōttuṅga-Chōladēva (I). Built in and damaged.

99. 167 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the rock, outside the west prākāra of the same temple. A record of the Chōla king Parakēsari-varman *alias* Uḍaiyār Rājēndradēva (1050--63), dated in his seventh year. Grant portion is built in at the bottom.

100. 168 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same rock. A record of the time of the Chōla king Parakēsari-varman *alias* Uḍaiyār Rājēndra-Chōladēva I (1012--43) recording sale of land for offerings to the temple of Kuṅṅam Uḍaiyār, by the assembly of Valladamaṅgalam, a *brahmadēya* in Mīkōṭṭu-nāḍu, a subdivision of Kēraḷāntakā vaḷanāḍu. The price of the land was 45 *kāśus* which included the capitalised value of the taxes to be paid.

101. 169 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same rock. Records in the fourth year, Mithuna, Monday, Pūrvāshāḍa, the Chōla king Tribhuvanachakravartin Kulōttuṅga-Chōladēva, a sale of land by a native of Kuḷittaṇḍalai (Kuḷittalai).

102. 170 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same rock. Dated in the reign of the Vijayanagara king Viruppaṅṅa-Uḍaiyār (II), son of Ariyaṅa-Uḍaiyār. Registers in Śukla, Mīna, śu. di. 8, Thursday, Punarvasu (corresponding to March 24, A.D. 1390), a sale of land by Tiruvādavūr-Ponmēynda-Śōḷappiramārāyar, a native of Śōḷakula-Uttama-chaturvēdimaṅgalam in Śūraḷūr-kūṅṅam, which was a subdivision of Rājagambhīra-vaḷanāḍu. The king referred to is Virūpāksha I (1379—1410).

103. 171 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the rock outside the north prākāra of the same temple. Records in the sixteenth year, and three hundred and fortieth day of Tribhuvanachakravartin Kōnērin-mēlkoṇḍān gift of land for the festival called Vaigāśi-tirunāl and for the supply of water for the sacred bath, etc., to the God Tirumāṅikkamalai-uḍaiya-Nāyanār. Ādanperuvali, Rājagambhīra-vaḷanāḍu and Vaḍa-Kōnāḍu are mentioned among the boundaries.

104. 172 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same rock. Dated in the reign of the Pāṇḍya king Jaṭavarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin

Sundara-Pāṇḍyadēva (I, 1251—64). Records in his thirteenth year, Tulā, ba. di. 13th, Monday, Śravaṇa, gift of certain taxes to the temple of Tirumāṇikkamalai-uḍaiya-Nāyanār in Kurunagar-nāḍu, a subdivision of Rājagambhīra-vaḷanāḍu. The king settled the dispute between the trustees of this temple and the *nagarattār* of Śivapādaśekharpuram as regards the payment of taxes (*kaḍamai*) by the people residing in the vicinity of the temples of Iḷaṅgōyil, Tiruvāliśvaram-uḍaiya-Nāyanār and Śrīkayilāsam-uḍaiya-Nāyanār. [The date is irregular. Mr. Swamikannu Pillai would place it on Monday, January 28, A.D. 1264, but change the month to *Kumbha*.]

105. 173 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same rock. Dated in the reign of the Pāṇḍya king Jaṭavarman Tribhuvanachakravartin Sundara-Pāṇḍyadēva (I, 1251—64). Records in his sixth year, Mīna, śu. di. 13, Magha, Sunday, gift of 350 *paṇams* for meeting the expenses of the festival called Māśi-tirunāl in the temple of Tirumāṇikkamalai-uḍaiya-Nāyanār in Kurunagai nāḍu, a subdivision of Rājagambhīra-vaḷanāḍu, by the residents of Koḍukkayam, Kumattēri, Śatta-maṅgalam and Varagūr in the same nāḍu. The details of the date point to March 5, A.D. 1262, but this, points out Mr. Swamikannu Pillai, would correspond to the eleventh year of the king and not the sixth.

106. 174 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same rock. Records in the twenty-fourth year of the Chōla king Parakēsarivarman *alias* Rājēndra-Chōladēva (I) sale of land to the temple of Tiruvātpōkki-Mahādēva. Mentions Kēraḷāntaka-vaḷanāḍu and *Rājarājan-palaṅkāśu*. Thirty of the latter were received as *irai-kāval*.

107. 175 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the central shrine in the Harālakēśvari temple on the same hill. Dated in the reign of the Pāṇḍya king Jaṭavarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Sundara-Pāṇḍyadēva (I, 1251—68). Records in his tenth year, Makara, śu. di. 6, Friday, Uttara-Bhādrapada, gift of land for the sacred bath and offerings on the day of Tiruvādirai in the month of Mārgaḷi. [Mr. Swamikannu Pillai says that the only date which is suitable is December 23, A.D. 1267, in the seventeenth year of the king and not the tenth.

108. 176 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Dated in the reign of the Hoysala king Sārvabhaumachakravartin Vīra-Sōmēśvara. Records in his twenty-first year, Mēsha, śu. di. 13, Sunday, Hasta, gift of 20,000 *kaśus* for offerings to the image of Tirukkāmakkōṭṭam-uḍaiya-Periya-Nāḅhchiyār set up in this temple by Tirujñānasambandanambi, a merchant of Śivapādaśekharpuram. [Mr. Swamikannu Pillai says that the date corresponded to Sunday, 13th April 1253, but it was on the twentieth year of the reign and 20th Mēsha.]

109. 177 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the east wall of the first *prākāra* of the same temple. Dated in the reign of the Chōla king Rājakēsarivarman *alias* Chakravartin Kulōttuṅga-Chōladēva I. Records in his thirty-sixth year, Rishabha, śu. di. 3, Saturday, Rōhiṇi (corresponding most probably to Saturday, May 5, A.D. 1106), gift of land to the temple of Tiruvālpōkkimalai-Mahādēva in Kurunāgannādu, a subdivision of Rājamahēndra-vaḷanādu. The assembly of Kulittaṇḍalai, a *brahmadēya* in Mīkōḍū-nādu, having met in the hall called Rājēndraśōḷan tirumaṇṭapam, made a sale of land to a merchant of Śivapādaśēkharapuram who assigned it for the sacred bath of the God in that temple. [The price of the land was 12 *kaḷaṅjus* and 1 *kunri*, of which 5 *kaḷaṅjus* and 1 *kunri* formed the capital for the tax to be paid to Government.]

110. 178 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the east wall of the first *prākāra* of the same temple. A damaged and incomplete record of the Chōla king Rājakēsarivarman *alias* Chakravartin Kulōttuṅga-Chōladēva, dated in his forty-seventh year, Makara, śu. di. Thursday, 13, *Hasta* (an irregular date). Seems to record a gift of land for feeding strangers (*apūrvin*).

111. 179 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the same *prākāra*. Dated in the reign of the Chōla king Rājakēsarivarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Kulōttuṅga-Chōladēva I. Records in his fortieth year, Dhanus, ba. di. 11, Punarvasu, Friday (corresponding to Friday, December 10, A.D. 1109), gift of land for feeding *dēvaradiyār*, *sivayōgins* and *tapasvins* in the *matha* called *Elunūrrucan-tirumadam*, to the south of the western gate of Śivapādaśēkharapuram in Kurunāgai-nādu, by Pugaḷan Dāmōdaran *alias* Pillaikkadiyār, a merchant of Rājarājapuram in Vaḍakoṅgu, who had set up the image of Tiruppaḷḷiyaṟai Nambirāṭṭiyār. Kulittaṇḍalai is mentioned as a *brahmadēya* in Mīkōṭṭu-nādu, a subdivision of Rājamahēndra-vaḷanādu. Refers to a revenue survey.

112. 180 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Dated in the reign of the Chōla king Rājakēsarivarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Kulōttuṅga-Chōladēva (I). Records in his thirty-ninth year, Kumbha, ba. di. Sunday 14, Śravaṇa (corresponding to January 31, A.D. 1109), a similar gift of land. The individual who is said to have set up the image of Tiruppaḷḷiyaṟai-Nambirāṭṭiyār in the above inscription also figures here.

113. 181 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Dated in the reign of the Chōla king Rājakēsarivarman *alias* Kulōttuṅga-Chōladēva I. Records in his thirty-eighth year, Karkaṭaka, śu. di. . . . Pūrva-Phalguni, Monday (corresponding to Monday, July 13, A.D. 1108) gift of land for providing two potfuls of water for sacred bath, to the temple of Tiruvālpōkki-malai-Mahādēva.

114. 182 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record of the Chōḷa king Rājakēsarivarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Kulōttuṅga-Chōḷadēva I in his forty-third year. Records gift of money for lamps by a merchant of Śivapādaśēkharapuram.

115. 183 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. An incomplete record of the Chōḷa king Parakēsarivarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Vikrama-Chōḷadēva, dated in his sixth year. Records a supplementary gift of gold for the same lamps.

116. 184 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A damaged record of the Chōḷa king Tribhuvanachakravartin Rājādhirājadēva (I or II?), dated in his third year. Seems to record a gift of money for lamps.

117. 185 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the Chōḷēśvara shrine in front of the same temple. Dated in the reign of the Chōḷa king Tribhuvanachakravartin Kulōttuṅga-Chōḷadēva (III), "who was pleased to conquer Īlam (Ceylon), Madurai (Madura), the crowned head of the Pāṇḍya and Karuvūr." Records in his twentieth year, Vrischika, ba. di. 8, Monday, Pūrva-Phalguni, gift of 8 *ānai-achchu* for offerings to the image of Ariya Nāyanār. The date corresponded to Monday, November 23, A.D. 1198.

118. 186 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the rock below the same shrine. A damaged record of the Chōḷa king Rājakēsarivarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Kulōttuṅga-Chōḷadēva I, dated in his eleventh year, Vrischika, . . . di., Monday. Records sale of land by the assembly to the temple on the hill Tiruvātpōkkimalai. Refers to a revenue survey. Mīkōṭṭu-nāḍu is here stated to be in Sarvalōkāśraya-vaḷanāḍu.

119. 187 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same rock. A much damaged record of the Chōḷa king Rājakēsarivarman *alias* Chakravartin Kulōttuṅga-Chōḷadēva I, in . . . ba. di. 6, Thursday. Records gift of land. Above this is an unfinished inscription of Rājēndra-Chōḷa I.

120. 188 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same rock. Registers in the twenty-second year of the Chōḷa king Parakēsarivarman *alias* Uḍaiyār Śrī-Rājēndra Chōḷadēva I, a sale of land to the temple on the Tiruvātpōkkimalai hill.

121. 189 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the rock near a spring behind the Harālakēśvari temple on the same hill. A record of the Chōḷa king Parakēsarivarman *alias* Uḍaiyār Śrī-Rājēndra-Chōḷadēva (I) in his twenty-first year. Records a sale of land by the assembly of Ariñjigai-chaturvēdimaṅgalam, a *brahmadēya* in Uraiyūr-kūṛram, a subdivision of Kēraḷāntaka-vaḷanāḍu. It was probably made in favour of the temple of Śrīkayilāsam *alias* Madhurāntaka-Īśvaram at Rājēndraśōḷappēṭṭai in Mīkōṭṭu-nāḍu. [The cost of $1\frac{1}{2}$ *nilam* is given as 380 *kāśus* which included the *iraikāval*. The

dues enumerated are : பேர்வரி, சில்வரி, யெச்சோறு, வெட்டிலேதினை, குலைதாம்பு, மெசய்நீர்வெட்டி உள்ளிட்டு திருவாசலில் போந்த குடிமை.]

122. 190 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same rock. A damaged record of the Chōla king Rājendra-Chōladēva I, dated in his twenty-first year. Registers a sale of land by the same assembly to the Vishṇu temple of Janānanātha-Viṇṇagar-Ālvār in Mikōṭṭu-nāḍu. [The price of land was 120 *kāśus* and this included the *iraikāval* which the *sabhā* undertook to pay.]

123. 191 of 1914.—(Grantha.) On the rock near the Ponnaḍi-pārai, on the same hill. A much damaged record of the Vijayanagara king Sadāśiva, dated in Ś. 1467, Krōdhin, Śravaṇa, ba. di., Kṛishṇashashṭhi. Under the orders of Rāmarāja Viṭṭhalarāja, Timma (his younger brother) made a grant to the God on the hill called Ratnagiri. The composer of this inscription was a certain Dharmarāja of Kākkalūr. The date "can be calculated but cannot be verified."

124. 102 of 1892.—(Tamil.) Close to the Dakshināmūrti shrine on the south wall of the first prakāra of the Ratnāchalēśvara temple. A record of the twenty-third year of Vīra Sōmēśvara-dēva. See Nos. 131, 134 and 135 below.

125. 103 of 1892.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the first prakāra of the same temple. A record of the twenty-first year of Vīra Sōmēśvaradēva. See Nos. 131, 134 and 135 below.

Śivāyam.

See Mr. Sewell's *Antiquities*, Vol. I, p. 269, *Ind. Antq.*, Vol. IV, p. 272 and Moore's *Trichinopoly Manual*.

126. 44 of 1913.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the maṅṭapa in front of the central shrine in the Śivapurīśvara temple. A fragmentary record of the Hoysala king Sārvabhaumachakravartin Vīra-Rāmanāthadēva, dated in his fifteenth year. Records gift of land to the priests of the temple of Tirumāṅikkamalai-Uḍaiya-Nāyanār at Śivapāda-śēkharapuram in Kurunāgai-nāḍu by the trustees and the merchants (*nagarattār*) of that village.

127. 45 of 1913.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A damaged record of the Chōla king Tribhuvanachakravartin Rājendra-Chōladēva III (1246—69), dated in his seventh year, Kanni, śu. di. 10, Punarpūsam. Records gift of land to a *maṭha* within the premises of the temple, by the merchant Nāvalūruḍaiyān Tiruch-chirrambalamuḍaiyān Gaṅgaikoṇḍa-Piḷḷai. The inscription says incidentally that Rājendrachōla humbled so thoroughly his uncle Sōmēśvara, the Karnāṭa king, that he put on the Chōla's leg an anklet of heroes with his own hand.

128. 46 of 1913.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. The beginning is missing. Seems to record the lease of land to a merchant by the priests of the temple of Tirumāṅikkamalai-Uḍaiya-Nāyanār.

129. 47 of 1913.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the kitchen in the same temple. Dated in the reign of the Chōla king Tribhuvanachakravartin Kulōttuṅga-Chōladēva III (1246—69). Records in his nineteenth year, Tulā, ba. di. 7, Tuesday, Punarpūṣam (corresponding to 15th October 1196), gift of two *kaḷañjus* of gold (*tulai-urai-ṣembon*) for providing betel-leaf and nuts, to the temple of Tiruvāliśvaramuḍaiya-Nāyanār at Śivapādaśekhara-puram in Kurunāgai-nāḍu, a subdivision of Rājagambhīra-vaḷanāḍu, by the merchant Nāvalūruḍaiyān Kālitādan Tiruchchir-rambalamuḍaiyān Kulōttuṅgaśōla Uṇandaiyarāyar.

130. 48 of 1913.—(Tamil.) On three pillars of the maṅṭapa in front of the same shrine. Registers that the pillars were the gift of Muppēr-uḍaiyān Irunedikubērachchamaiyachakravarti, a merchant of Śōlapāṇḍyapuram.

131. 49 of 1913.—(Tamil.) On the second gōpura of the same temple, left and right of entrance. A damaged record of the Chōla king Tribhuvanachakravartin Rājendra-Chōladēva III, dated in his fourth year, Dhanus, su. di. 3, Thursday, Tiruvōṇam. Seems to record an enquiry into the affairs of the temple of Tirumāṅkka-malai-Uḍaiya-Nāyanār in Kurukkaināḍu, a subdivision of Rājagambhīra-vaḷanāḍu. The committee of enquiry included the great minister Maṅḍalika Murāri Aliya-Sōmaya-Daṇḍanāyaka, Śēvaya-Daṇḍanāyaka and Sōmanātha Viṭṭaya who was a servant in the place of Sōmiśvaradēva. The *mahēśvaras*, *sthānikas* and merchants were also included. Virasōmēśvara's appointment of his own men shows that the Chōla recognized his suzerainty.]

132. 50 of 1913.—(Tamil.) On the Śuṇḍakkāppārai rock in the same village. Registers the names Vīramallan and Śiyamittiran in archaic characters. In another place is engraved *yā-karaḍu* also in ancient alphabet. The rock has a row of five beds cut into it.

MUSIRI TALUK.

Kāmākshipuram.

133. "In a field belonging to one Vīran Pillai is a stone with an inscription, dated Ś. 1653 (A.D. 1731), recording a private grant of lands to the village temple." [*Antiquities*, Vol. I, p. 266.]

Kaṅṅanūr.

For an excellent historical account of the place see *Trichinopoly Gazr.*, Vol. I, pp. 315-16. Its ancient name was Vikramapura.

134. 509 of 1905.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the central shrine in the Bhōjēśvara temple. Records in Ānanda gift of money by certain merchants of Conjeeveram. [Bhōjēśvara is evidently a corruption of Poysalēśvara, i.e., the Hoysala king who founded the temple of this place (as he made it his capital). See inscription

(189 of 1891) at Jambukēśvaram and Bangalore C.P. quoted in *Trichinopoly Gazr.*, p. 316, *Ep. Rep.*, 1892, p. 7.]

135. 510 of 1905.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A mutilated record in the third year of Tribhuvanachakravartin Kōnērinmaikōṇḍān. Records gift of land to the temple of Pōśaḷīśuramuḍaiya Nāyanār at Kaṇṇanūr for celebrating a festival called Raṇamukharāman śandi after the king. [Vīra Rāmanātha, the son of Sōmēśvara, is evidently the king referred to.]

136. 511 of 1905.—(Tamil.) On the gōpura of the same temple, right of entrance. A record in Ś. 1439, Īśvara, of the Vijayanagara king Vīrapratāpa Kṛishṇadēva-Mahārāya. Records remission of certain taxes in favour of a number of temples. The Sanskrit verse *namastuṅga*, etc., is written mostly in Tamil. The taxes amounted to 10,000 gold pieces and consisted of four items, viz., “*jōḍi, śūlavari, piṛavari* and *araśupēru*.” See also S.A. 435, 233 and Tp. 608 below.

Muśiri.

137. 70 of 1890.—(Tamil.) At the head-sluice of the Periyavāykkāl. A record of Tribhuvanachakravartin Śrī-Rājarājadēva, in his fourth year. Mr. Walhouse gives a description of this in *Ind. Antq.*, Vol. IV, p. 273. His statement that “king Lorakkōnan” cut the channel is of course, as he himself thought, inaccurate. As a matter of fact it is an inscription of Rājarāja III, dated A.D. 1219. The inscription refers to Muśiri as Mummudi-Chōḷapēṭṭai. See *Trichinopoly Gazr.*, Vol. I, p. 288. Also *Antiquities*, Vol. I, p. 266.

Nāgaiyanallūr.

138. In his *Antiquities* (Vol. I, p. 266) Mr. Sewell says that one Sundara Rāmayya of this place had a copper-plate grant in Nāgari characters, dated Ś. 1572 (A.D. 1650).

Pālaiyūr.

139. “In the field bearing Survey No. 105, is a stone with an inscription, dated Ś. 1546 (A.D. 1624), recording a private grant of lands to the temple.” [*Antiquities*, Vol. I, p. 266.]

Śrinivāsanallūr.

See *Trichinopoly Gazr.*, Vol. I, p. 289, for the sculptural and architectural features of the place and stories in explanation of the deserted condition of the temple.

140. 586 of 1904.—(Tamil.) On the east wall of the Korāṅgunāthan temple. A record in the second year of the Chōḷa king Rājakēsarivarman. Records gift of thirty sheep and thirty goats (sixty in all) for a lamp to burn at the temple of Tirukurakkuturai-Perumānaḍigaḷ at Mahēndramaṅgalam. [Was the place named after the Pallava sovereign Mahēndravarman?]

141. 587 of 1904.—(Tamil.) On the south and east walls of the same temple. A record in the twenty-ninth year of the Chōla king Madiraikoṇḍa Parakēsarivarman (Parāntaka I). Records sale of land to the temple of Tirukkurukkutturai-Perumānadiḡaḡ.

142. 588 of 1904.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the same temple. An incomplete and damaged record of the Chōla king Rājakēsarivarman in his seventh year. Records sale of land to the temple.

143. 589 of 1904.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the same temple. A record in the thirty-seventh year of the Chōla king Madiraikoṇḍa Parakēsarivarman (Parāntaka I). Records gift of gold for a lamp and of a water-pot of copper, a lamp-stand and a silver tray by a native of Kiḡinallūr in Kiḡarkūḡḡam.

144. 590 of 1904.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record in the thirtieth year of the Chōla king Madiraikoṇḍa Parakēsarivarman (Parāntaka I). Records gift of a garden by a Brāhmaṇa woman.

145. 591 of 1904.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A much damaged record of the Chōla king Madiraikoṇḍa Parakēsarivarman (Parāntaka I). Records gift of gold for lamp. (The date of the record is damaged.)

146. 592 of 1904.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record in the twenty-fourth year of the Chōla king Rājakēsarivarman. Records gift for a lamp.

147. 593 of 1904.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record in the twentieth year of the Chōla king Madiraikoṇḍa Parakēsarivarman. Records sale of land. Quotes the nineteenth year of the king's reign. Nos. 145—7 are engraved on the same stone.

148. 594 of 1904.—(Tamil.) On the west wall of the same temple. A record in the fourteenth year of the Chōla king Parakēsarivarman. Records gift of gold for a lamp to the temple of Tirukkurakkutturai at Mahēndramaṅgalam, a *brahmadēya* in Vadakarai-Maḡanāḡu.

149. 595 of 1904.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A mutilated record in the twenty-first year of the Chōla king Rājakēsarivarman *alias* Chakravartin Kulōttuṅga Chōladēva (I).

150. 596 of 1904.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the same temple. An incomplete record in the second year of the Chōla king Rājakēsarivarman. Registers the tax-free lands belonging to the temple and allots their revenues for the various requirements of the temple.

151. 597 of 1904.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A damaged record in the third year of the Chōla king Rājakēsarivarman.

152. 598 of 1904.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. An incomplete record. Contains a portion of the introduction of Rājēndra-Chōla I.

153. 599 of 1904.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the Paṭṭābhirāmasvāmin shrine in the Viśvanāthasvāmin temple in the same village. A much damaged record in the seventh year of the Chōḷa king Rājakēsarivarman.

154. 600 of 1904.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A damaged record of the Chōḷa king Rājakēsarivarman, the date of which is lost. Mentions Tottiyam, a *dēvadāna* and *brahmadēya* on the hill, in Maḷanāḍu.

155. 601 of 1904.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record in the twenty-second year of the Chōḷa king Kulōttuṅga-Chōḷadēva. Records gift of money for a lamp.

156. 602 of 1904.—(Tamil.) On the west wall of the same shrine. An incomplete and much damaged record of the Chōḷa king Rājakēsarivarman *alias* Rājarājadēva, the date of which is lost.

157. 603 of 1904.—(Tamil.) On a stone built into the wall of the kitchen in the same temple. A fragmentary record in the third year (of a certain king).

158. 604 of 1904.—(Tamil.) On a detached stone built into the floor of the same temple. A fragmentary record of the Chōḷa king Rājakēsarivarman, the date of which is lost.

159. 605 of 1904.—(Tamil.) On the east base of the Lakshmi-nārāyaṇa Permāl temple in the same village. A record in the thirty-eighth year of the Chōḷa king Parakēsarivarman "who took Madurai and conquered Īlam (Ceylon)", i.e. (Parāntaka I). Records gift of land for a lamp.

160. 606 of 1904.—(Tamil.) At the entrance into the central shrine in the Rāmanāthasvāmin temple in the same village, right side. A record in the eighth year of the Chōḷa king Rājarājadēva. Records the gift of a door-post.

161. 607 of 1904.—(Tamil.) At the same place, left side. A record in the eighth year of the Chōḷa king Rājarājadēva. Records the gift of a *gōmukha*.

162. 608 of 1904.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the maṅṭapa in front of the same shrine. A mutilated record in the forty-second year of the Chōḷa king Rājakēsarivarman *alias* Tribhuvana-chakravartin Kulōttuṅga-Chōḷadēva (1070—1118). Mentions the conquest of Kalinga. This is evidently the second Kalinga invasion of the reign which took place about A.D. 1111—2 and which is apparently described in the *Kalingattupparani*. The first invasion took place about 1095-6, an evidence of which we have in the king's inscription at Simhāchalam in A.D. 1098-9. Venkayya's theory is that the earlier invasion was in S. Kalinga (i.e., Vizagapatam and portion of Ganjām) while the second was against

N. Kaliṅga. Both took place when Anantavarman Chōḍagaṅga, Kulōttuṅga's grandson by his daughter Rājasundari, was the ruler (1078—1146). See *Ep. Rep.*, 1905, pp. 52-3. See also, 44 of 1891 at Ālaṅguḍi in the Tanjore district.

163. 609 of 1904.—(Tamil.) On the east wall of the Gaṇeśa shrine in the Rāmanāthasvāmin temple in the same village. A fragmentary record of the Chōḷa king Madiraikoṇḍa Parakēsarivarman (Parāntaka I) the date of which is lost.

164. 610 of 1904.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the Māriyamman temple in the same village. A fragmentary record in the sixth year of the Chōḷa king Parakēsarivarman. Seems to record a gift of gold.

Tēnūru.

165. C.P. No. 46 of Mr. Sewell's List.—(Telugu.) Records grant of land for the Śiva temple by Vijaya Venkaṭāchala Redḍi, in Ś. 1715 (A.D. 1793), Kaliyuga 4894, Pramādīcha, during the reign of Venkaṭapatidēva Mahārāya of Vijayanagar at Ghānagiri.

Tiruppaṅgili (Tiruppaiṅṅili).

This place which figures in the old Tamil poems and which was visited by Appar (to whom the God is said to have given food) is now noted for some curious legends and for a temple dedicated to the God of Death.

166. 90 of 1892.—(Tamil.) On three niches of the south wall of the first prakāra of the Nīlivanēśvara temple. A record of the Chōḷa king Kō-Rājakēsarivarman *alias* Rājādhirājadēva (I) in his twenty-seventh year, Kumbha, Aparā, Navami, Mūla, Wednesday.

167. 91 of 1892.—(Tamil.) On the base of the south wall of the first prakāra of the Nīlivanēśvara temple. A record of the Chōḷa king Kō-Parakēsarivarman *alias* Rājendra-Chōḷadēva (I) in his 6th year, 185th day. Records gift of 150 *kāśus* to assembly to pay 64 *kalams* every year for offerings.

168. 92 of 1892.—(Tamil.) On three niches of the north wall of the first prakāra of the Nīlivanēśvara temple. A record of the Chōḷa king Kō-Rājakēsarivarman *alias* Rājādhirājadēva (I?), the date of which is lost. Records sale of land (extent damaged) to temple for 160 *kāśus*. *Kāraṇattār* and *Madhyasthan* mentioned.

169. 93 of 1892.—(Tamil.) North wall of the Viśālākshiamman shrine in the second prakāra of the Nīlivanēśvara temple. A record in the twenty-fifth year of the Chōḷa king Kō-Parakēsarivarman *alias* Rājarājadēva (II, 1146—78).

170. 94 of 1892.—(Tamil.) In the unfinished gōpura in front of the same temple. A record in the thirty-first year of Kōnērinmēlkoṇḍān.

171. *C.P. No. 45 of Mr. Sewell's List.*—Records grant in Ś. 1714 (A.D. 1792), K. 4839, Paritāpi, by Vijaya Venkaṭāchala Redḍi, of the village of Tiruppanjēri (Tiruppaṅgili) for a Śiva temple in Tuṟaiyūr.

•
Tiruppattūr.

See *Trichinopoly Gazr.*, p. 290. The local legend is that Subrahmaṇya obtained here the spear with which he killed Śūra. Till the time of the Vijayanagar king Vira Vijaya this place was known, as epigraphy shows, as Mādhava Chaturvēdimāṅalam, named evidently after Mādhava Daṇḍanāyaka of Daṇāiken-kōṭṭai.

171-A. 48 of 1908.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the maṅṭapa in front of the central shrine in the Aiyānār temple. A record of the Chōḷa king Rājakēsarivarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Śrī-Kulōttuṅga-Chōḷadēva, the date of which is doubtful. Records gift of cows for a lamp by a goldsmith of Gaṅgaikoṇḍa-Chōḷapuram to the temple of Piḷḷaiyār at Tiruppiḍavūr, a *dēvadāna* and a *brahmadēya* in Tiruppiḍavūr-nāḍu, a district of Tribhuvanamuḷuduḍaivaḷanāḍu.

171-B. 49 of 1908.—(Tamil.) On the gōpura of the same temple, right of entrance. A record contains the name Araiyan Rājarājan *alias* Madhurāntakan Iḷāṅōvēlān.

171-C. 50 of 1908.—(Tamil.) On the same gōpura, left of entrance. Records the construction of the gōpura by Terri Ādittan *alias* Oṭtagaleritta (?) Pichchan.

172. 587 of 1908.—(Tamil.) On the pedestal of the image of Ayyānār in the central shrine of the Ayyānār temple. A fragmentary record of the Chōḷa king Parakēsarivarman *alias* Rājendra-Chōḷadēva (I), dated in his sixth year. Contains portions of the historical introduction and mentions a gift by Uttamaśōḷa Milāḍuḍaiyār. ["The first part of the name, Uttamaśōḷa, was evidently borrowed from a surname of Rājendra Chōḷa I."]

173. 588 of 1908.—(Tamil.) On the east wall of the maṅṭapa in front of the same shrine. A record of the thirty-eighth year of the Chōḷa king Tribhuvanachakravartin Tribhuvanavīradēva. Gift of a gold ornament by Kaṟkaṭarāya, a subordinate of lord (*dēvar*) Kulōttuṅga Vāṇakōvaraiyar.

174. 589 of 1908.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record of the Chōḷa king Rājarājadēva in his twenty-fourth year. Says that certain lands at Tiruppiḍavūr were lying fallow until the twenty-fourth year of the king.

175. 590 of 1908.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Dated in the reign of the Hoysāḷa king Chakravartin Vīra-Rāmanāthadēva. Provides, in his eighth year, for a festival in the temple of Tiruveppantēṟri-Uḍaiya-Nāyanār.

176. 591 of 1908.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in the second year of the Chōla king Rājendra-Chōla that the inhabitants of Tiruppiḍavūr-nāḍu and of two other districts granted a lease of land, hitherto lying fallow, to a servant of the temple of Anbarīchchuramuḍaiyā-Nāyanār at Tiruppiḍavūr. The land was lying fallow for a long time until the second year of the king.

177. 592 of 1908.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the same maṅṭapa. A record of the thirty-second year of the Chōla king Rājarāja. Gift of the village of Vaḷugūr Tēṟṟikurichchi for offerings and repairs by Māyidēvarasa, son of the Mahāmaṅḍalēśvara Kulōttuṅga-chōla Sōmaṅḍadēva.

178. 593 of 1908.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records the building of the Nīrāli-maṅṭapa by a native of Tiruppiḍavūr, in the temple of Piḷḷaiyār Tiruveppantēṟṟi-Uḍaiyār.

179. 594 of 1908.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the maṅṭapa in front of the central shrine of the Ayyanār temple. Records in the sixth year of the Pāṇḍya king Jaṭāvarman *alias* Tribhuvana-chakravartin Sundara-Pāṇḍyadēva (I?) the gift of the income from Kumārakkuḍi Tēṟṟakurichchi and Mūvāyiranallūr, the *dēvadāna* villages, respectively, of the temples Tirumaṅṭavamuḍaiyā Nāyanār and Piḷḷaiyār Tiruveppantēṟṟi Uḍaiya-Nāyinār at Tiruppiḍavūr, by the inhabitants of Ūṟṟattūrmēlvaḷi-nāḍu for offerings and repairs to the temple of Subrahmaṇya-Piḷḷaiyār in the same village. The villages granted were lying fallow up to the fifth year of the king.

180. 595 of 1908.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the first prākāra in the same temple. A record of the fourth year of the Chōla king Tribhuvanachakravartin Rājarājadēva III, on Tuesday, Rēvati, Pūrvapaksha, Daśamī, in Dhanus. Records gift of land to the temple of Kuṅṅameṟinda Perumāḷ (i.e., Subrahmaṇya). Mentions Tiruppiḍavūr, a *brahmadēya* and *dēvadāna* in Tiruppiḍavūr-nāḍu, a subdivision of Vaḍagarai Rājarāja-valanāḍu. [The date is doubtful and discussed by Professor Jacobi in *Ep. Ind.*, Vol. XI, p. 126.]

181. 596 of 1908.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in the seventh year of the Chōla king Tribhuvanachakravartin Rājarājadēva III gift of land to a *maṭha* by Aḷagiyamaṅḍavālan Ādit-tadēvan *alias* Kulōttuṅgaśōḷa-Mūvēndavēḷān, a native of Peruṅgōnūr, which was a hamlet of Tiruppiḍavūr in Tiruppiḍavūr-nāḍu, a subdivision of Bhuvanamuḷududai-valanāḍu. Professor Jacobi fixes from the details of the date (Monday, day of *Mūla*, the *Aparapaksha Tṛitiya* of the month *Rishabha*), Monday, 30th March, A.D. 1222. For details see *Ep. Ind.*, Vol. IX, p. 127.

182. 597 of 1908.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Dated in the seventh year Parakēsarivarman Tribhuvanachakravartin Rājarājadēva II (Thursday, day of *Aśvini*, *Aparapaksha dōḷasi*, in month

Rishabha). Records sale of land for a gold garment to the image of Kūttādumdēvar (Natarāja) in the temple of Tirumaṅṅapam-Uḍaiyār at Tiruppiḍavūr. The purchaser of the land was the donor in the above inscription. Professor Jacobi would fix the corresponding English date on Thursday, 21st May, A.D. 1153. See *Ep. Ind.*, Vol. XI, p. 123.

183. 598 of 1908.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Dated in the twenty-fourth year of the Pāṇḍya king Jaṭavarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Vīra-Pāṇḍyadēva. Records the terms on which the inhabitants of Ūṛṛattūr-nāḍu agreed to cultivate the temple lands. Mentions the temple of Purushōttamatt-Emberumān at Tiruppiḍavūr. [This king may be either the Vīra Pāṇḍya who, according to Mr. Krishna Sastri, ruled from 1310 to later than 1356, or he who came to the throne in 1253.]

184. 599 of 1908.—(Tamil.) On the west wall of the same *prākāra*. Records in Plavaṅga, gift of land to the *mahājanas* of Tiruppiḍavūr by Kempamāyaṅa-Nāyaka, son of Śittaṅa-Nāyaka of the Kōṭṭa family.

185. 600 of 1908.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the same *prākāra*. Records in the eighteenth year of the Chōḷa king Tribhuvanachakravartin Rājarājadēva (III?) a sale of land to a certain Laṅkēśvaradēva, through the mediation of the great assembly of "twelve nāḍus" at Tiruppiḍavūr, by a native of Nambikurichchi *alias* Śrikanṭha-chaturvēdimāṅgalam, a *brahmadēya* in Ūṛṛattūr-nāḍu, a subdivision of Vaḍagarai Rājarāja-vaḷanāḍu. The inscription is interesting for the fact that it mentions an assembly of a number of nāḍus put together under one political unit.

186. 601 of 1908.—(Tamil.) On a slab supporting the stone elephant in the same temple. A record of the Chōḷa king Tribhuvanachakravartin Rājarājadēva (III?). Mentions in his third year, Kūttan Vayiramunḍan, who was one of the *sāmantas* of the king.

187. 602 of 1908.—(Tamil.) On a stone beam in the kitchen of the same temple. Records that the kitchen (*madappalli*) was built by Kūttādumdēvan *alias* Śiruppuliyūr-Vēḷān.

188. 603 of 1908.—(Tamil.) On two pillars of a maṅṅapa in the north-east corner of the same temple. A mutilated record of the Chōḷa king Rājakēsarivarman *alias* Uḍaiyār Śrī-Rājādhirājadēva (I), dated in his thirty-first year. Contains the historical introduction of the king and records a gift of cows for a lamp to the temple of Piḷḷaiyār Veppandēṛri-Uḍaiyār at Tiruppiḍavūr, a *dēvadāna* and a *brahmadēya* in Tiruppiḍavūr-nāḍu, a district of Vaḍagarai Rājāśraya-vaḷanāḍu, by a native of Mēchchaṅkuḷam, a hamlet of Perumaḷuvūr in Kuṅṅakūṅṅam, a subdivision of Uttuṅga-tuṅgavaḷanāḍu.

189. 604 of 1908.—(Tamil.) On another set of two pillars in the same maṅṭapa. A much damaged and mutilated record. Begins with the introduction of Rājādhirāja I.

190. 605 of 1908.—(Tamil.) On a shrine near the tank in the Brahmapurīśvara temple in the same village. A mutilated and incomplete record of the Chōḷa king Tribhuvanachakravartin Vikrama-Chōḷadēva (1118--35), dated in his twelfth year. Records gift of land. Mentions Tribhuvanamuḷududaiya-vaḷanāḍu.

191. 606 of 1908.—(Tamil.) On a slab set up in a field at Āvāravalli, a hamlet of the same village. Records in Ś. 1550, *Vibhava*, gift of the field which was situated in Ākāravilli in Tiruppidāvur-nāḍu by a Redḍi.

Tuṟaiyūr.

An excellent historical account of this place based on the *Mack. MSS.* and Orme is given in *Trichinopoly Gazr.*, pp. 291—5.

192. 698 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the central shrine in the Vālīśvara temple. Refers in his twenty-second year, to an order of Akalānkanādālvān and records a grant of land to the temple of Ulaguyyavanda-Chōḷīśvaramuḍaiya Nāyanār built by Śembiyan Virāṭarāyar at Tuṟaiyūr.

193. 699 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in the twenty-second year of Tribhuvanachakravartin Kōnērinmaikonḍān gift of land to the same temple built by Śembiyan Virāṭarāyan of Veḷḷūr at Tuṟaiyūr in Rājarāja-vaḷanāḍu.

194. 700 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the central shrine in the Chōḷīśvara temple in the same village. A damaged record of Tribhuvanachakravartin Kōnērinmaikonḍān, dated in his twenty-second year. Records gift of land to the temple of Tiruchiṟṟambalamuḍaiyār built at Tuṟaiyūr by Gurukularāya of that village.

195. 701 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the same shrine. Records in the third year of the Chōḷa king Tribhuvana-chakravartin Rājarājadēva (II?) gift of land to the shrines of Nallanāyaki and Subrahmaṇya-Piḷḷaiyār in the temple of Vālīśuramuḍaiya-Nāyanār at Tuṟaiyūr on the bank of the river Kīḷ-Palāru, in Pāchchil-kūrṟam, a subdivision of Rājarāja-vaḷanāḍu.

196. 702 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the gōpura of the same temple, right of entrance. A damaged record of the Chōḷa king Parakēsarivarman, dated in his sixteenth year. Records gift of land to the same temple. Tuṟaiyūr was (situated on the bank) of Kīḷ-Palāru, in Pāchchil-kūrṟam, a subdivision of Vaḍagarai-Vaḷanāḍu.

197. 703 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On a slab set up in the Varadarāja Perumāḷ temple in the same village. Records gifts of land to the temple of Kōḍaṅḍarāma-Perumāḷ.

198. *C.P. No. 48 of Mr. Sewell's List.*—(Telugu.) Records grant of the village of Vokkera for a Śiva temple at Tuṛaiyūr by a Redḍi during the reign of Venkaṭapatidēva Mahārāya of Ghānagiri, dated Ś. 1713 (A.D. 1791), K. 4182, *Virōdhikrit*.

NĀMAKKAL TALUK.

Kapilamalai.

The well-sculptured Śiva temple of this place is “surrounded by several fine maṇḍapams erected by the Nāyakka kings of Madura” (*Antiquities*, Vol. I, p. 203). Mr. Sewell mentions two copper-plate grants in the temple, viz.—

199. A private grant, dated in K. 4675 (A.D. 1574), *Bhava*, recording the building of a maṇḍapam by the villagers of Kapilamalai.

200. A grant recording the gift of certain lands to the temple in K. 4738 (A.D. 1637) by Tirumal Nāik of Madura (1623—59).

Kārguḍi.

201. 37 of 1913.—(Tamil.) On the east wall of the maṇḍapa in front of the central shrine in the Kailāsanāthasvāmi-temple. Records in *Virōdhi* that Kāśi-Bōdināyaka set up the image of Bhairava and provided for its worship.

202. 38 of 1913.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the same maṇḍapa. A record of the Pāṇḍya king Jaṭavarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Vīra-Pāṇḍyadēva in his twenty-second year, Vriśchika, śu. di. 5, Monday, Uttirāḍam. Refers to Perumāḷ Kulaśēkharadēva and to Vijayālayadēva. Records gift of the village of Ūṛrakkarai *alias* Aḷagiyakūttanallūr in Vaḍagarai Kari-kālaśōḷavaḷanāḍu, to the temple of Kaiyilāsamuḍaiya-Nāyanār at Tirukkārikūḍi *alias* Vikramaśōḷapuram, by the residents of that district for the purpose of providing offerings during the festival called Śittirai-tirunāḷ. [Diwan Bahadur Swamikannu Pillai says that either Monday, 5th November 1274, or Monday, 30th October 1318, will suit. In the former case the king was Jaṭavarman Vīra-Pāṇḍya, the conqueror of Īlam, Koṅgu and Śōḷamaṇḍalam and anointer of kings at Perumbarrapuliyūr who ascended the throne in 1253; and in the latter the Vīra Pāṇḍya of the Mussalman times who acceded to the throne A.D. in 1295. Mr. Krishna Sastri identifies him with the latter on the ground that the Visālayadēva of this epigraph was the same as his namesake who reconsecrated the Tiruppattūr temple after the Mussalman invasions.]

203. 39 of 1913.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. The record states that the temple at Tirukkārkūḍi came into existence on the day of the asterism Rēvati.

204. 40 of 1913.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record of the Hoysala king Sārvabhaumachakravartin Vīra-Rāmanāthadēva in his eleventh year, Mīna, śu. di. 3, Wednesday, Aśvati (corresponding to Wednesday, 10th March, A.D. 1266). Registers the sale of the village Uṇḍai *alias* Vīra-Sundara-nallūr in Vaḍagarai Karikālakaṇṇavaḷanāḍu, to the priests of the temple of Kailāsamūḍalaiya-Nāyanār at Tirukkārikūḍi *alias* Vikramaśōḷapuram, by Śīrāmān Chakravarti, an agent of the chief minister *Pakkadikkāra* Sōmayya-Deṇṇāyakkar.

205. 41 of 1913.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in Ś. 1541, Siddhārthin, gift of land by a certain Immaḍi Rāmachandra-nāyaka to the priests of the same temple.

Kuṇṇamalai.

206. 43 of 1913.—(Tamil.) On a stone lying to the south of the Kuṇṇīśvara temple. A record of the Chōḷa king Virarājēndradēva (*i.e.*, Kulōttuṅga-Chōḷa III), in his twenty-fourth year, mentions the name of a *gāmiṇḍa* (*i.e.*, gaṇḍan), who was one of the Veḷḷāḷas of Valipuram in Maḷai-nāḍu. Perhaps the stone was presented by him.

Nāmakkal.

An excellent description of the two caves of this place and the shrines therein is given in *Ep. Rep.*, 1906, pp. 76-7. Neither of the two Vaishṇava shrines is mentioned in the *Prabandhas*. Nāmakkal was situated in Ēḷūr-nāḍu in North Koṅgu. See No. 215 below.

207. 5 of 1906.—(Tamil.) On the north, west and south walls of the deserted temple on the hill. A record in the second year of the Pāṇḍya king Jaṭavarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Sundara-Pāṇḍyadēva. The hill is called Tiruvāraikkal and the inscription records a grant of land by the residents of Ēḷūr-nāḍu to the temple here called Arulānviṇṇagar *alias* Edirilippurumāl.

208. 6 of 1906.—(Kanarese.) On the east wall of the same temple. Mentions in Śrīmukha, Lakshmīkānta-arasa, son of the *Gajapativibhāḷa* Tipparasa-Oḍeya. A Tamil copy is found on the same wall.

209. 7 of 1906.—(Pallava-Grantha.) In the monolithic cave forming the central shrine of the Raṅganātha temple on the same hill. Mentions the following *birudas*: Nayapara, Prakritipriya, Naravāhana, Utpalakarnika, Udārachitta, and refers to the Atiyēndra-Vishṇugriha and the Atiyānvavāya. The inscription is of great importance in regard to the history of the Adigaimāns (Adiyamāns, Adiyamās, etc.) who had their capital at Tagaḍūr (Dharmapuri). It shows that their territory extended as far as Nāmakkal. See the inscriptions of Oḍḍappaṭṭi, Dharmapuri, etc., in Salem.

210. 8 of 1906.—(Tamil.) At the entrance into the same temple. A fragmentary record. Mentions Rājanārāyaṇa-tādar and Tiruvaḷinambi.

211. 9 of 1906.—(Tamil.) In the same temple. An incomplete record in the thirtieth year of the Chōla king Tribhuvanachakravartin Rājarājadēva. Refers to the setting up of the image of Vēdanāyaka-Perumāḷ. Another fragment mentions Tiruvāraikkal.

212. 10 of 1906.—(Tamil.) On the monolithic cave in the Narasiṃha-Perumāḷ temple in the same village. Records an agreement among the artisans of Koṅgu. The temples of Śiṅga-perumāḷ and Paḷlikoṇḍa-Perumāḷ on the hill are mentioned.

213. 11 of 1906.—In the underground cellar near the entrance into the central shrine of the same temple. The inscriptions are built over to a considerable extent and could not be copied in full. They belong to the thirteenth century and mention Viḍukādan *alias* Vattarāyan of Nāmōḷi-nāḍu and Tiruvāraikkal.

214. 12 of 1906.—(Tamil.) At the entrance into the same temple, left side. Registers in Sādhāraṇa an order of a Nāyaka. Mentions Tirunāmakkal.

215. 13 of 1906.—(Tamil.) On the rock at Nāmakkal close to the temple of Muniyappan. A record in the eighth year of the Pāṇḍya king Tribhuvanachakravartin Kōnērinmaikoṇḍān Sundara-Pāṇḍyadēva. Records gift of the village of Vānavanmādēvi in Ēḷūr-nāḍu, a district of Vaḍakoṅgu, to a physician named Āditta-dēvan Tiruvambalapperumāḷ *alias* Vaidyapurandaran.

216. 14 of 1906.—(Tamil.) On the same rock. A record in the fifth year of Tribhuvanachakravartin Kōnērinmaikoṇḍān. Registers an order addressed to the assemblies (*sabhās*), residents of the district (*nāṭṭar*) and residents of cities (*nagarattār*) in Ēḷūr-nāḍu.

217. A C.P. grant (No. 29 of 1906) of Vīra-Chōla. (See *Ind. Antq.*, Vol. IX, pp. 47—50; *Salem Manual*, Vol. II, pp. 365—8 and *Ep. Ind.*, Vol. III, pp. 78—82, where it is called Udayēndiram plates of Vīra-Chōla. These contained only two plates. A third was obtained by Venkayya in 1905 and summarized in *Ep. Rep.*, 1906, pp. 74—5. It is in Sanskrit-Grantha and records a grant of Vīra-Chōla, a Kēraḷa prince but feudatory of a Parakēsarivarma-Chōla. The inscription shows that the Kēraḷas were in possession of Koṅgu at this time. Amidst the ancestors of Vīra-Kēraḷa we meet with Maṇikuṭṭuva (who reminds us of Śeṅguttuva of early Tamil literature) and Kōdai Ravi (who reminds us of his namesake in Malabar and Kochin epigraphs).

Nañjai Eḍaiyār.

218. 42 of 1913.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the central shrine in the Tiruvēliśvara temple. A damaged and fragmentary

record of the Chōḷa king Parakēsarivarman *alias* Rājēndra-Chōḷa-dēva I, dated in his seventh year. Seems to record a grant of land to the temple of Śrī-Kailāsam *alias* Tiruveylvāyiluḍaiya-Paramēśvara by the assembly of Rājēndra-siṃha-chaturvēdimāṅalam. Mentions Idaiyāru in Rājāśraya-vaḷanāḍu.

PERAMBALŪR TALUK.

Ādutuṟai.

219. 15 of 1913.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the central shrine in the Aparādhakshamēśvara temple. Seems to record in the thirty-fifth year of the Chōḷa king Kūḷottuṅga-Chōḷadēva (I) gift of land to the temple of Tirukkuraṅgāḍutuṟai-uḍaiya-Mahādēva. Built in in the middle.

220. 16 of 1913.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the same shrine. Records in the twelfth year of the Chōḷa king Vikrama-Chōḷadēva gift of paddy for offerings and for oil to anoint the images every Saturday in the temple of Tirukkuraṅgāḍutuṟai Mahādēva Irayānpuñjai, a *brahmadēya* in Tēnūrvāṭkai-Ugaḷūr-kūṟṟam, a subdivision of Vaḍagarai Muḍiśōḷa-vaḷanāḍu, by a native of Ambar in Ambar-nāḍu.

221. 17 of 1913.—(Tamil.) On the west wall of the same shrine. A damaged record of the Chōḷa king Vikrama-Chōḷadēva, the date of which is doubtful. Records gift of paddy for offerings to the temple of Tirukkuraṅgāḍutuṟai-Nāyanār at Iraiyanpuñjai.

222. 18 of 1913.—(Tamil verse.) On the north wall of the same shrine. Records gift of land by a certain Ayyāran of Kuḷumūr to the God at Tirukkuraṅgāḍutuṟai.

223. 19 of 1913.—(Tamil.) On the north base of the same shrine. Dated in the reign of the Chōḷa king Tribhuvanachakravartin Rājādhirājadēva (II). Records in his fifth year, Tulā 15, Viśākha, Monday, gift of cows for a lamp to the temple of Mahādēva at Iraiyanpuñjai Tirukkuraṅgāḍutuṟai, a *brahmadēya* in Ugaḷūr-kūṟṟam, which was a subdivision of Muḍigoṇḍasōḷa-vaḷanāḍu. [The date corresponds to 12th October A.D. 1170, but the fifth year seems to be a misreading for eighth year.]

224. 20 of 1913.—(Tamil.) On the same base. A record of the time of the Chōḷa king Tribhuvanachakravartin Rājādhirājadēva (II) in his sixth year. Gift of money for providing betel-leaves and nuts (during paḷḷiyarai-śandi) in the shrine of the Goddess, by a certain Kāmadēvavēḷan of Āṟkaḷūr in Āṟṟūr-kūṟṟam which was a subdivision of Malāḍu *alias* Jananātha-vaḷanāḍu.

225. 21 of 1913.—(Tamil.) On the same base. Records in the fourth year of Tribhuvanachakravartin Kōnērinmaikoṇḍān gift of land for offerings. The document is signed by Vallavaṟājan.

226. 22 of 1913.—(Tamil.) On the north and west walls of the same shrine. Records in the eighth year of the Chōla king Parakēsarivarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Rājarājadēva (II) gift of money on which interest was paid in paddy and provision was made for offerings.

227. 23 of 1913.—(Tamil.) On the north and west bases of the same shrine. A damaged record of the Chōla king Rājakēsarivarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Kulōttuṅga-Chōladēva (II), dated in his fourth year. Begins with the introduction *pūmēvu vaḷar*, etc. Records gift of land. [Perhaps this is the second inscription which Mr. Sewell notes in his *Antiquities*, Vol. I, p. 263. In this case he gives the wrong date of K. 4000, A.D. 899.]

228. 24 of 1913.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the maṅṭapa in front of the same shrine. A record of the Pāṇḍya king Kōnērimēlkoṇḍān Tribhuvanachakravartin Parākramapāṇḍyadēva, dated in his second year, Vriśchika, ba. di. 3, Friday, Punarpūśam, gift of the village Parākramapāṇḍyanallūr in Kīlkūrṅu, a subdivision of Vēmbār-nāḍu, to the temple of Kuṅṅamporuttaruḷiya-Nāyanār at Iraiyaṅpūnjai Tirukkuraṅgāḍutuṅṅai, a *brahmadēya* in Ugaḷūr-kūrṅam, which was a subdivision of Vaḍagarai-Rājasimha vaḷanāḍu, for celebrating a festival on the asterism Pūrāḍam (i.e., which coincided with the birthday of the king).

229. 25 of 1913.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Dated in the reign of the Vijayanagara king Vīra-Bukkarāya (II), son of Vīra-Harihara II. Records in Ś. 1327, Pārthiva, Kanni, ba. di., Wednesday, Uttirattādi, assignment of certain taxes in some specified districts of Rājasimha-vaḷanāḍu to the same temple for offerings and worship.

230. 26 of 1913.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A damaged record of the Vijayanagara king Vīrapratāparāya Dēvarāya-Mahārāya (II) "the king (who instituted) the elephant hunt," dated Ś. 1361, Siddhārthin, Makara, ba. di., Monday Śōdi (should be Śravaṇa), Śivarātri, corresponding to 1st February 1440. Records gift of a village in Uttuṅgatūṅgavaḷanāḍu to the temple of Kuṅṅamporuttaruḷiya-Nāyanār at Tirukkuraṅgāḍutuṅṅai, a village in Ugaḷūr-kūrṅam of Viṭṭapaṅṅu in Vaḍagarai Rājasimha-vaḷanāḍu, by a certain Dēvaṇa Nāyaka, for the merit of Lakkaṅṅa-Daṅṅayakka-Uḍaiyār "Lord of the Southern Ocean."

231. 27 of 1913.—(Tamil.) On the south base of the same maṅṭapa. Dated in the reign of the Vijayanagara king Mallikārjunarāya, son of Vīrapratāpa Dēvarāya-Mahārāya (II). Registers in Ś. 1381, Vikrama, Karkaṭaka, śu. di. 9, Monday, Pūśam, that the residents of Venbānāḍu remitted certain taxes in favour of the temple, in the village of Kalanivāśal of Kīl-kūrṅu (in Venbā-nāḍu) for maintaining worship and constructing a gōpura. [This is

evidently the inscription referred to by Mr. Sewell in his *Antiquities*, Vol. I, p. 263.

232. 28 of 1913.—(Tamil.) On the same base. Seems to record in Śōbhakrit that *the residents of the eighteen divisions (parṛu)* met together under the presidency of Ēkāmbaranāthar, son of Nāyinār, and seeing that there was a deficiency in the total area of Ugaḷūrpaṛṛu in Viṭṭappaṛṛu-śīrmai, they rectified it and had the alteration engraved on the temple of Kuraṅgāḍuturai.

233. 29 of 1913.—(Tamil.) On the same base. Dated in the reign of the Pāṇḍya king Māravarman Tribhuvanachakravartin Kulaśēkharadēva (II). Seems to record in his nineteenth year, Tulā, śu. di. 13, Friday, corresponding to the 22nd October 1332, the gift of the village Abhaṅgarāhuttarāyanallūr for maintaining a special worship in the temple, called Abhaṅgarāhuttarāyan-śandi, in the name of the king and also for celebrating a festival on his birthday. Stones missing (at the end).

234. 30 of 1913.—(Tamil.) On the same base. Dated in the reign of the Vijayanagara king Vīrapratāpa Dēvarāya-Mahārāya (II), son of Vīra-Vijayarāya. Records in Ś. 1351, Saumya, Makara, śu. di., Friday, Pūraṭṭādi, gift of the village of Adišūdamaṅgalam with all its income for worship and repairs in the same temple by the residents of Viṭṭappaṛṛu and the community of *tandirimār*. The income from the village included assessment on wet and dry lands, houses and house-sites, *pēṛkaḍamai*, *tarikkaḍamai*, *āṭṭaikkāṇikkāi*, *nāṭṭuviniyōgam*, *pattirai*, *pāḍavari*, *āḷamaṅḡi*, *arisikāṇam*, *kōṇigai*, *virimuttu* and *vanniyavari*.

235. 31 of 1913.—(Tamil.) On the west wall of the same maṅṭapa. Records in the fourth year of the Pāṇḍya king Perumāḷ Śrīvaladēva gift of the village of Talaiyāmaṅgalam *alias* Āṭkondaṅallūr in Teṅkarai-nāḍu which was a subdivision of Magadai-maṅḍalam, for providing offerings in the shrine of the Goddess called Eḷilvārkuḷaliyār in the temple of Kurramporuttaruḷiya-Nāyanār at Iraivānpuṅjai Tirukkuraṅgāḍuturai under orders of the king and Nāyanār Ulagaṅgāṭṭa Vāṇakōvaraiyar.

236. 32 of 1913.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the same maṅṭapa. Dated in the thirty-third year of the Chōḷa king Tribhuvanachakravartin Rājarājadēva (III). Refers in his thirty-third year to the sale of the village Adišūdamaṅgalam *alias* Śembiyaṅkaḷattūr by several parties to the temple of Kurramporutta-Nāyanār at Tirukkuraṅgāḍuturai. The twenty-seventh and twenty-eighth years of the king are also quoted.

237. 33 of 1913.—(Tamil.) On the east wall of the same maṅṭapa. A record of the Pāṇḍya king Perumāḷ Parākrama-Pāṇḍyadēva. Registers in his second year that the *dēvadāna* village Kalanivāy (or Kalanivāśal) in Kīḷ-kūrṛu of Vēmbar-nāḍu

was granted tax-free in obedience to the orders of the king by the residents of that nāḍu.

238. 34 of 1913.—(Tamil.) On the east base of the same maṅṭapa. Seems to record in Saumya an agreement among themselves by the Valaṅgai 98 classes and the Iḍaṅgai 98 classes of Vaḷudalambattuśāvaḍi as against the Brāhmaṇas and the Vellāḷans, who held proprietary rights (*kāni*) over the lands of that district. Built in at the bottom.

239. 35 of 1913.—(Tamil.) On the same base. A record of the Pāṇḍya king Tribhuvanachakravartin Parākrama-Pāṇḍyadēva. Refers in his fourth year to some events connected with the temple which happened in the fourth year of Vikrama-Chōḷa and in the reign of Kulōttuṅga-Chōḷa (II) and states that the residents of various divisions met together at Ugaḷūr and agreed to conduct the worship in the temple as had been done before by their ancestors.

240. 36 of 1913.—(Tamil.) On the second gōpura of the same temple, right of entrance. Registers in Durmukhi, that the tenants (*kudi*) in twelve villages of Ugaḷūr-Kurumbarvāy-śīrmai had abandoned them owing perhaps to heavy taxation and consequently an agent of Vīramarasar, regulated the taxes at five *paṇams* for the first year and ten from the following year on each plough of dry land and at eight *paṇams* on every 100 *kulis* of wet land.

241. C.P. No. 137 of Mr. Sewell's List.—(Tamil.) Records a private grant, no ruler's name being mentioned, by which the inhabitants of seventeen villages agreed to pay every year a tax for the maintenance of the service in the Śiva temple at Āḍuturai, in Ś. 1720 (A.D. 1798), *Kāḷayukti*. [This inscription is in the *Mack. MSS.* See *Ins., S. Dts.*, p. 214, No. 37. It gives the additional information that the grant consisted of one *paṇam* for every *kāni* of land and ten *paṇams* for each weaver loom.]

Arumbāvūr.

242. 3 of 1913.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the central shrine in the Kailāsanāthasvāmin temple. Records in the sixteenth year of the Chōḷa king Tribhuvanachakravartin Rājarājadēva (III) gift of land to the temple of Vaḍakayilāyamuḍaiya Nāyanār at Arumbār, by a certain Malaiyan Vāṇarāyan.

243. 4 of 1913.—(Tamil.) On the south base of the same shrine. A damaged record of the Chōḷa king Tribhuvanachakravartin Rājarājadēva (III), dated in his sixteenth year. Seems to record a grant of land to a private individual by a certain Vāṇakōvaraiyan.

244. 5 of 1913.—(Tamil.) On the west wall of the same shrine. Dated in the reign of the Chōḷa king Tribhuvanachakravartin Rājarājadēva (III) in his fourteenth year. Registers that all the

dēvadāna lands of the temple and those of Tirukkālatti-uḍaiya-Nāyanār, Durgā, Piḍāri and Ayyan situated in this village and at Rājarājanallūr and Kīraippāḍi, were made tax-free by the chief Vānakōvaraiyan.

245. 6 of 1913.—(Tamil.) On the north. base of the same shrine. Records in the twenty-eighth year of the Chōla king Tribhuvanachakravartin Rājarājadēva (III) that the community of priests living in the districts of Vēmbār-nāḍu, Perambalūr-nāḍu and Mūlai-nāḍu granted the taxes due to them from the *dēvadāna* villages for repairs in the temples of Vaḍakayilāyamūḍaiya-Nāyanār and Kulōttuṅga-Viṅṅagar-Emberumān at Arumbār.

246. 7 of 1913.—(Tamil.) On the same base. A record of the Chōla king Tribhuvanachakravartin Rājarājadēva (III). Specifies in his twenty-third year the extent of the *dēvadāna* lands below the tanks Śīrṛēri and Periyēri at Arumbār, as fixed by Toṇḍaimān Perumālpillai *alias* Śēdirāyadēvan. Mentions the measuring rod *magadēśan*. [Was Śēdirāva the contemporary of Poet Kamba ?]

247. Mr. Sewell mentions an inscription, dated Ś. 1591, recording a grant by some ryots to the Śrīraṅgam temple, when Śrīraṅga Rāya was ruling. See *Antiquities*, Vol. I, p. 263.

248. *Ibid.*—A record of the time of “Venkaṭappa dēva,” dated Ś. 1545.

249. *Ibid.*—A record, dated Ś. 1608 (A.D. 1686), recording the repair of a sluice by (Raṅga Kṛishṇa) Muttu Vīrappa Nāik of Madura.

Kottavāśal.

249-A. On a stone south of the local Vaidyanāthasvāmi temple. Records that Raṅgappa Maḷavarāya granted 270 *kulis* of land, etc., to the God in Sādhāraṇa, Ś. 1530. *Ins.*, S. *Dts.*, p. 204, No. 8.

Perambalūr.

250. 8 of 1913.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the central shrine in the Madanagōpālasvāmin temple. States in the ninth year of Tribhuvanachakravartin Kōnērinmaikoṇḍān that the residents of Vēmbār-nāḍu were ordered to collect *vāram* from the *vāraparṛu* villages and *kaḍamai* from *kaḍamaiparṛu* ones. The amount realized by this arrangement was to be spent in making friendly terms with and meeting the expenses of the followers of Sundara-Pāṇḍyadēva.

251. 9 of 1913.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Registers in his tenth year, an order to the inhabitants of Mēlkūrṛu-nāḍu in Vēmbār-nāḍu stating that the village Nochchiyam which was once a tax-free village of the temple of Gōpālakūttar Viṅṅagar-Emberumān

at Perumbalūr was assessed at some later period but was again made tax-free by Kaḍalaḍaitta-Perumāḷ *alias* Sundara-Pāṇḍya Viḷupparaiyar, a native of Ilāṅkuḍi in Pāṇḍi-maṇḍalam.

252. 10 of 1913.—(Tamil.) On the south base of the same shrine. Remission of *jōḍi* in Vyaya, on the village of Nochchiyam by an agent of Kṛishṇappa Nāyaka and the residents of Vēṅbār-śīrmai. The village is stated to have been owned by the temple of Perumāḷ Gōpālakūttar at Perumbalūr since the time of Dharmaputra. Mentions Śūrappa-Nāyaka in whose time a small amount of *jōḍi* used to be collected from that village.

253. 11 of 1913.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the same shrine. A damaged record of the Pāṇḍya king Perumāḷ Sundara-Pāṇḍya-dēva, dated in his eighteenth year. Registers that the residents of Perumbalūr made a gift of land for celebrating a special festival in the temple on the day of Bharāṇi (Pūrvāshāḍha), in the month of Purattāśi which was the asterism under which, evidently, the queen Tennavanaimuḷudumuḍaiyāḷ was born. See No. 255.

254. 12 of 1913.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in the eighteenth year (of ?) gift of land for maintaining the festival of Akkantirunāḷ which happened on Bharāṇi in the same temple. The document is signed by Sundara Pāṇḍya Viḷupparaiyan. Evidently this gift is connected with what has been recorded in the above inscription. See No. 255.

255. 13 of 1913.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record of the Pāṇḍya king Sundara Pāṇḍya, "who conquered all countries." Refers in his eighteenth year to the gift registered of twelve *vēlis* of land south of Perumbalūr, which had been lying waste for many years by the residents of that village for conducting the festival of Bharāṇi in honour of the birthday of the queen Tenna-vanaimuḷudumuḍaiyāḷ. [Was the king Jaṭāvarman Sundara-Pāṇḍya I, 1251--64 ?]

256. 14 of 1913.—(Tamil.) On the north and west bases of the same shrine. Records in Ś. 1432, Prabhava (wrong by two years), Makara, Amāvāsyā, Pūrāḍam, solar eclipse, gift of land for offerings to the *navagrahas* in the same temple by Timṁiyappa-Nāyakkar Nūkki-Raḍḍiyār, agent of Tulukkaṇa-Nāyakkar of Eramāñchi. The date should be Ś. 1430 and the *nakshatra* Pūrāḍam is wrong for Tiruvōṇam. Otherwise the date corresponded to Wednesday, 13th January 1508.

Turiñjippādi.

256-A. On a stone south of the Paḷayanattam. Records that in the seventeenth year of the reign of Śrīraṅgadēva Mahārāya, Vayyappa Kṛishṇappa Koṇḍappa Nāyakkar granted the village as free gift to Marudanta-Chōḷēśvara (Madhurāntaka-Chōḷēśvara ?) Svāmi at Venmaṇi. *Ins., S. Dts., p. 205, No. 10.*

Ūṭṭattūr.*

257. 489 of 1912.—(Tamil.) On the east wall of the maṅṭapa in front of the central shrine in the Siddharatnēśvara temple. Dated in the reign of the Chōḷa king Tribhuvanachakravartin Tribhuvanavīradēva (i.e., Kulōttuṅga III). Registers in his fortieth year a compact drawn up by the Śrutimāns of Ūṭṭattūr, assembled in the maṅṭapa of the temple called Uttamaśōḷan for the community of Iḍaṅgai classes who consisted of ninety-eight sub-sects. [The inscription is one of the valuable documents for the construction of the social history of the land. It gives an account of the origin of the Iḍaṅgais, their duties and privileges and their paraphernalia. See *Ep. Rep.*, 1913, p. 109, for a full summary, which is too large to be quoted here. The Śrutimāns were apparently a cultivating section of the Iḍaṅgais.]

258. 490 of 1912.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the same maṅṭapa. The Chōḷa king Tribhuvanachakravartin Kulōttuṅga-Chōḷadēva III, “who was pleased to take Madurai (Madura) and the crowned head of the Pāṇḍya,” records in his twenty-first year gift of land to the Śrīpādantāṅgi-servants of the temple. This land was originally the property of a Brāhmaṇa who had stolen the jewels of the Goddess and was compelled in consequence to give up the land as a *dēvadāna* to the temple. See No. 280 below.

259. 491 of 1912.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in the eleventh year of Tribhuvanachakravartin Vikrama-Chōḷadēva (III 8—35) gift of land to the temple of Tugumāmaṇiyāṇḍār of Ūṭṭattūr, a village in Vaḍagarai Tribhuvanamuḷuduḍaivaḷanāḍu, by three residents of Karuvidai-maṅḡalam, a *dēvadāna* village of Tiruvālandurāi-uḍaiya-Mahādēva at Śirupaḷuvūr.

260. 492 of 1912.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the first prākāra of the same temple. An unfinished record of the Chōḷa king Rājakēsarivarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Rājādhirājadēva (II), the date of which is lost. Records gift of land to the temple of Tugumāmaṇi-Nāyakar at Ūṭṭattūr in Ūṭṭattūr-nāḍu, a subdivision of Rājarāja-vaḷanāḍu.

261. 493 of 1912.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Dated in the reign of the Chōḷa king Tribhuvanachakravartin Rājarājadēva (III). Records in his seventeenth year, Kanni, śu. di. 5, sale of land by a certain Brahmādhirāya-Muttaraiyan to one of his dependants (*aḍiyār*) named Śrutimān Śōṅṅan Śōṅḍan *alias* Ilaṅkēśuradēvan.

262. 494 of 1912.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. An incomplete record of the Chōḷa king Tribhuvanachakravartin Rājādhirājadēva (II), dated in his fifth year, Mēsha, śu. di. 3, Monday, Tiruvōṅṅam (corresponding to 24th June, A.D. 1168). Records

* In the *Ins., S. Ets.*, p. 192, two inscriptions are given under this heading, one of Kulōttuṅga Chōḷa in his thirteenth year and one of Rājarājadēva in his fourth year.

gift of lands and houses by a Brāhmaṇa lady to the temple at Tiruttōrrattūr in Ūṛrattūr-nāḍu. [The Government Epigraphist remarks that the record shows that "a Brāhmaṇa widow held a proprietary right over the family (?) property after the death of her husband."

263. 495 of 1912.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record of the Chōḷa king Tribhuvanachakravartin Rājarājadēva (III), dated in his eighteenth year, Karkaṭaka, ba. di. I, Sunday, Avittam. Records sale of land by Mallan Śīyan *alias* Brahmādhirāya Muttaraiyan to one of the *Agambadiyār* of Nerkuḷam in Ūṛrattūr-nāḍu, a subdivision of Vaḍagarai-Rājarāja-vaḷanāḍu. Mr. Swamikannu Pillai says that the corresponding date is 23rd July 1233, but the week day is Saturday and not Sunday.

264. 496 of 1912.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record of the Chōḷa king Tribhuvanachakravartin Rājarājadēva (III). Records in his eighteenth year, Simha, su. di. 3, Wednesday, Attam (= Wednesday, 10th August 1233) sale of land in Nerkuḷam by Śrutimān Irāman Śōḷan to Śrutimān Śōṛan Śōṇḍan *alias* Ilaṅkēśura-dēvan. See Nos. 261 and 257 above.

265. 497 of 1912.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. An incomplete record of the Chōḷa king Tribhuvanachakravartin Rājarājadēva (III), dated in his seventeenth year, Mēsha, ba. di. II, Wednesday, Śadayam (= Wednesday, 6th April 1233). Records sale of land by four residents of Ten-Paḍavūr to Śrutimān Nāyan Śōṛan *alias* Iruṅḍōḷan of Nerkuḷam. See No. 257 above.

266. 498 of 1912.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record of the Pāṇḍya king Jaṭāvarmaṇ *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Sundara-Pāṇḍyadēva (III), dated in his fifth year, Mīna, śu. di. 13, Monday, Uttirāḍam. Records sale of land by Śrutimān Madiyāṇḍān *alias* Śōṛan Iruṅḍōḷan of Nerkuḷam to Śrutimān dēvan Poḷilmīgaman *alias* Iruṅḍōḷan of Muṭṭam *alias* Nāḍari-Pugaḷnallūr, the western hamlet of Tiruveḷḷarai. Mr. Swamikannu Pillai calculates the corresponding English equivalent to be Monday, 20th January 1281, but the month, he says, should be *Makara* and not *Mina*.

267. 499 of 1912.—(Tamil.) On the west wall of the same prākāra. A record of the Chōḷa king Tribhuvanachakravartin Rājarājadēva (III), dated in his seventeenth year, Karkaṭaka, śu. di. 3, Wednesday, Pūram (corresponding to Wednesday, 21st July A.D. 1232). Records sale of land by Mallan Śīyan *alias* Brahmādhirāya Muttaraiyan, chief of Ūṛrattūr-nāḍu, to one of his *Agambadiyār*, viz., Śrutimān Nāyan Śōṛan *alias* Iruṅḍōḷan who was a resident of Nerkuḷam. See No. 265 above.

268. 500 of 1912.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record of the Chōḷa king Tribhuvanachakravartin Rājarājadēva (III), dated in his sixteenth year, Mithuna, śu. di. II, Monday, Śōdi (corresponding to Monday, 31st May, A.D. 1232). Registers a sale of land

at Vaḍa-Paḍavūr by Śrutimān Ūran Nambi *alias* Vīramēdāvi Pēraiyān and Mallan Maṇavālan *alias* Koṅgadaraiyan, to the same individual.

269. 501 of 1912.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record of the Chōḷa king Tribhuvanachakravartin Rājarājadēva (III), dated in his seventeenth year, Karkaṭaka, śu. di. 3, Wednesday, Pūśam (=Wednesday, 21st July 1232). Records sale of land at Vaḍa-Paḍavūr by Mallan Śīyan *alias* Brahmādhirāya Muttaraiyan to the same individual.

270. 502 of 1912.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the same prakāra. A much damaged and incomplete record of the Chōḷa king Rājakēsarivarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Rājarājadēva (II), dated in his fourth year. Seems to record a gift of land by purchase, for maintaining the festival called *Urōśaṇittirunāḷ* in the temple, conducted by Śrutimān Mūvāyirattoruvan Jananāthan *alias* Ediriliśōḷanādālvān.

271. 503 of 1912.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. An incomplete record of the Chōḷa king Tribhuvanachakravartin Kulōttuṅga Chōḷadēva (III), who was pleased to take Madurai (Madura) and the crowned head of the Pāṇḍya, dated in his sixteenth year, Makara, śu. di. 7, Friday, Rēvati (=1st January 1194). Records an exchange of land given to a dancing girl of the temple of Togumāmaṇi-Nāyanār at Ūṟṟattūr, for the maintenance of a shrine for Umai-Īsvaramuḍaiya-Nāyanār which she had constructed in one of the *dēvadāna* villages.

272. 504 of 1912.—(Tamil.) On the south base of the Akhilāṇḍēśvari shrine in the same temple. Records the consecration of the image of the Goddess, the construction of the shrine and prakāra wall by Umaiyaḷvi *alias* Śivakāmasundari-Māṇikkam, one of the dancing girls of the temple of Togumāmaṇi-Nāyanār.

273. 505 of 1912.—(Tamil.) On the same base. An incomplete record of the Chōḷa king Tribhuvanachakravartin Vīrārājēndra-Chōḷadēva, "who was pleased to take Madurai (Madura)" (i.e., Kulōttuṅga Chōḷa III), the date of which is lost. Seems to record a gift to a Śiva-Brahmaṇa attached to the goddess' shrine.

274. 506 of 1912.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the Āṇḍavar shrine in the same temple. Dated in the reign of the Chōḷa king Tribhuvanachakravartin Kulōttuṅga-Chōḷadēva, "who was pleased to take Madurai (Madura), Īlam (Ceylon), Karuvūr and the crowned head of the Pāṇḍya." Records in his twenty-fourth year, Mēsha, śu. di. 4, Rōhaṇi (=Friday, 29th March) a gift of land for maintaining worship of the images of Śaiva saints (Nāyanmār) in the temple of Togumāmaṇi-Nāyanār at Ūṟṟattūr by a maid-servant (*agambadi-ppeṇḍugaḷ*) of the temple at Ārgalūr, a village in Āṟṟūr-kūṟṟam in Vaḍagarai-Rājarāja-vaḷanāḍu.

275. 507 of 1912.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Dated in the reign of Chōla king Tribhuvanachakravartin Tribhuvanavīradēva (i.e., Kulōttuṅga III). Seems to register in his thirty-sixth year Dhanus, śu. di. 3, Monday, Tiruvōṇam, corresponding to 16th December 1213, a sale of land.

276. 508 of 1912.—(Grantha and Tamil.) On the base of the same shrine. A record of the Pāṇḍya king Jaṭavarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Sundara-Pāṇḍyadēva (I), dated in his eighteenth year, Tulā, śu. di. 10, Monday, Śadaiyam, corresponding to 23rd October 1262. Records that residents of Kuṇṇakkūrānāḍu, a subdivision of Uttuṅgatuṅga vaḷanāḍu, assembled in the maṇṭapa called Uttamaśōlan within the temple of Togumāmaṇi-nāyanār at Ūṛṛattūr and granted the two villages of Idaimalai and Vettuṇi to a certain Āyan Kavikumāran of Ūṛṛattūr. Begins *Samastajagad*, etc.

277. 509 of 1912.—(Tamil.) On the west wall of the yāga-maṇṭapa in the same temple. Records in the fifteenth year of the Chōla king Parakēsarivarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Vikrama-Chōladēva (1118—35) sale of a temple land for the benefit of a *maṭha* called *Kēraḷāntaka-madam*. The money realized from the sale was utilized for a plate called *Kēraḷāntakapaṭṭam*. [The inscription says that one *kāśu* weighed $\frac{3}{4}$ *kaḷāñju* of gold and that four *vēlis* of land were sold for ninety such *kāśus*.]

278. 510 of 1912.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in the fourteenth year of Parakēsarivarman Vikrama-Chōladēva (1118—1135) gift of land by a resident of Ādamaṅgalam named Uttamaśōlan *alias* Virāṭarāyan, for expenses of a festival held in the month of Śittirai.

279. 511 of 1912.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in the thirteenth year of the Chōla king Parakēsarivarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Vikrama-Chōladēva (1118—35) sale of land to the temple by a Brāhmaṇa of the *brahmadēya* village Nambikurichchi *alias* Śrīkaṇṭhachaturvēdimāṅgalam in Ūṛṛattūr-nāḍu which was a subdivision of Tribhuvanamuḷuduḍai-vaḷanāḍu.

280. 512 of 1912.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record of the Chōla king Parakēsarivarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Vikrama-Chōladēva (1118—35). Registers that a Brāhmaṇa committed some offence against the temple of Togumāmaṇi-Āṇḍār at Ūṛṛattūr and was fined twenty *kāśus*. His land at Śrīkaṇṭhachaturvēdimāṅgalam was sold by the assembly of that village for arrears of tax due on the land. See No. 258 above.

281. 513 of 1912.—(Tamil.) On the west base of the same maṇṭapa. An incomplete record of Chōla king Parakēsarivarman *alias* Rajādhirājadēva (I), “who destroyed the ships at śālai and took the crowned head of the Pāṇḍya,” dated in his twenty-eighth year. The title Parakēsarivarman is apparently a mistake for

Rājakēsarivarman. Records sale of land to the temple of Ūṛṛattūr-Perumānāḍigaḷ.

282. 514 of 1912.—(Tamil.) On the same base. An incomplete record of the Chōḷa king Rājarājadēva (I), dated in his twenty-fourth year. Muttaraiyan mentioned.

283. 515 of 1912.—(Tamil.) On the same base. An incomplete and damaged record of the Chōḷa king Parakēsarivarman Rājēndra-Chōḷa (I, 1012—53), dated in his third year. Seems to refer to the death of a certain Śrutimān Nakkan Chandiran *alias* Rājamala Muttaraiyan of the elephant corps on the occasion when, in a fight with the Western Chāḷukyan Iṛivabeḍaṅga Satyāśraya, he was ordered by the king to pierce the enemy's elephant. A gift was made on his behalf to the temple of Mahādēva at Ūṛṛattūr. See Hoṭṭūr record, dated A.D. 1007, in Fleet's *Dynas., Kanar. Dts.*, p. 433.

284. 516 of 1912.—(Tamil.) On the same base. A record of the Chōḷa king Rājakēsarivarman *alias* Uḍaiyār Śrī-Rājādhirājadēva I "who took the head of Vīra-Pāṇḍya and destroyed the ships at Kāndaḷūr-śālai." Records the gift of a lamp to the temple of Mahādēva at Ūṛṛattūr, for the merit of a lady residing at Tiraṇi. Stones missing at the end. The date of the record is lost.

285. 517 of 1912.—(Tamil.) On the second gōpura of the same temple, right of entrance. Records in the eighteenth year of the Chōḷa king Parakēsarivarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Rājarājadēva (II). Records in his eighteenth year gift of four cows for a lamp to the temple by Tiruveṅkāḍuḍaiyān *alias* Abhimānamēru Koṛṛakkudaikōn, a resident of Viśalūr.

286. 518 of 1912.—(Tamil.) On the same gōpura. Records in the seventh year of king Kulōttuṅga-Chōḷadēva (III), gift of cows for a lamp.

287. 519 of 1912.—(Grantha and Tamil.) On the same gōpura. Records in the twenty-seventh year of the Hoysala king Niśśaṅka Pratāpachakravartin Vīra-Sōmēśvaradēva, gift of paddy by the king to the temple of Togumāmaṇi-Nāyanār at Ūṛṛattūr, a village in Ūṛṛattūr-nāḍu which was a subdivision of Rājarāja-vaḷanāḍu for the merit of his grandson Viśvanāthadēva. See Nos. 134 and 135.

288. 520 of 1912.—(Tamil.) On the same gōpura. An unfinished record of the Vijayanagara king Vīra-Dēvarāya-Mahārāya (II), dated in Ś. 1343, Śārvarin. Mentions Anṇāmalaināthar, son of the mahāpradhāni Śilupayaraśar.

289. 521 of 1912.—(Tamil.) On the same gōpura. A record of the Chōḷa king Tribhuvanachakravartin Kulōttuṅga-Chōḷadēva III "who was pleased to take Madurai (Madura) and the crowned head of the Pāṇḍya," dated in his twenty-first year, Kumbha (wrong for *Makara*), ba. di. 10, Thursday, Viśākha (= 24th December

1198). Records that the *nāḍu* and *nagara* of Ūṛṛattūr-nāḍu assembled in the Uttamaśōḷa maṅṭapa within the temple of Togumāmaṇi-Nāyanār and granted the village of Venṇaṇippāḍi in Kīḷvaḷḷuvāp-pāḍi-nāḍu converting it into the mercantile town called Tāyilunallapuram, for the merit of Kulōttuṅga-śōḷa-Vāṇakōvaraiyar.

290. 522 of 1912.—(Tamil.) On the same gōpura, left of entrance. Records in the fifth year of the Chōḷa king Tribhuvana-chakravartin Vīrarājēndra-Chōḷadēva (i.e., Kulōttuṅga-Chōḷa III), gift of gold jewels by a dancing girl of the temple.

291. 523 of 1912.—(Tamil.) In the same place. Records in the eighth year of king Rājakēsarivarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Kulōttuṅga-Chōḷadēva (II) gift of land to the image of Kshētrapāla-Piḷḷaiyār at Vaḍaśērinattam by a certain Aṇukkānambi. Begins with the introduction *pūmannu padumam*, etc.

292. 524 of 1912.—(Tamil.) In the same place. A record of the Vijayanagara king Vīrapratāpa Achyutayyadēva-Mahārāya, dated in Ś. 1463, Śārvarin, Kanni, śu. di. 10, Friday, Pūśam (an error in week day). Records gift of money by a feudatory of the king for maintaining the car festival in the temple of Tuyyamāmaṇi-Nāyinār at Ūṛṛattūr. The king has Śāḷuva *birudas*.

293. 525 of 1912.—(Tamil.) On the same gōpura, right of entrance. Registers in the thirty-third year and three hundred and fifteenth day of Tribhuvanachakravartin Kōnērinmaikoṇḍān an order to collect *vāram* and *variśai* from the residents of Ūṛṛattūr-nāḍu.

294. 526 of 1912.—(Tamil.) In the same place. Records in his twenty-seventh year an order of the king Vatsarāya stating that the village Tiraṇi was given as a *kāni* to the Āriyas (i.e., Brāhmins?) of that village.

295. 527 of 1912.—(Tamil.) On the same gōpura, left of entrance. Records that the Hoysaḷa king Sārvabhaumachakravartin Vira-Rāmanāthadēva fixed in his seventeenth year the rate of tax on cattle (*āḍiraippāttām*) levied in all the eight subdivisions which formed the district of Ūṛṛattūr-nāḍu; but remitted the same on the cattle belonging to the temple of Togumāmaṇi-Nāyanār. The taxes consisted of ten *kāśus* per year on each sheep, thirty *kāśus* on each cow and 100 *kāśus* on each buffalo. The temple tenants were exempted from these.

296. 528 of 1912.—(Tamil.) In the same place. In modern characters. Seems to record in Saumya the settlement of a dispute, which arose on the death of the temple accountant, by paying some money to the man who set up his claim for that place.

297. 529 of 1912.—(Tamil.) In the same place. In modern characters. Registers in Ānanda the gift of the door and of the paved floor by Eṛama-Peddi-Nāyaka, son of Nāraṇappa-Nāyaka.

298. 530 of 1912.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the Chōḷēśvara temple in the same village, right of entrance. A record of the Chōḷa king Parakēsarivarman *alias* Tribhuvana-chakravartin Rājarājadēva (II) Kōnērinmaikoṇḍān. Records in his fourth year and two hundred and twenty-sixth day gift of the village Uḷuttambāḍi in Kānakkīḷiyūr-nāḍu as a *dēvadāna* to the temple of Kulōttuṅgaśōḷa Īśvaramuḍaiyār of Ūṟṟattūr. The secretary (*tirumandiraōlai*) who wrote the grant was Rājāśraya-Pallavarāyan.

299. 531 of 1912.—(Tamil.) On the same wall, left of entrance. A record of the Chōḷa king Rājakēsarivarman *alias* Tribhuvana-chakravartin Kulōttuṅga-Chōḷadēva (II). Records in his thirteenth year and one hundred and twenty-fourth day that the temple was constructed by a certain Vāṇavichchādira-nāḍāḷvān, the younger brother of Brahmādarāya Muttaraiyar, and that the income from the village Śiruvaḷaippūr in Kānakkīḷiyūr-nāḍu was assigned to it. Begins with the introduction *pūmannu-padumam*, etc.

Vālikaṇḍapuram.

299-A. On a stone in the Īśvara temple. Records grant of a measure of milk daily to God Tiruvāliśvara Uḷaiyār in the eleventh year of the reign of Rājarājadēva. See *Ins., S. Dts.*, p. 192, No. 3.

299-B. On a stone in the same temple. Records that one Yuddhamalla of Chōḷamāḷanāḍu gave to the God twenty *vēḷis* of land in twenty villages in the twentieth year of Kulōttuṅgachōḷadēva. *Ibid.*, No. 4.

299-C. In the same. Records grant of land to the deity in the twenty-seventh year of Rājarājadēva. *Ibid.*, p. 193, No. 5.

Veṅganūr.

The following epigraphs show that the local temple was built by a Redḍi in the seventeenth century.

300. 1 of 1913.—(Tamil.) On the gōpura of the Vriddhāchalēśvara temple, right of entrance. A record of the Vijayanagara king Veṅkaṭapatidēva-Mahārāya (II), dated in Ś. 1545, Rudhirōdgārin, Vaiyāśi 3, Rishabha, śu. di. 12, Attam, Thursday (= Thursday, 1st May 1623 A.D.). Records that one Liṅga Redḍi of the Paṇṭakula race consecrated the shrines of Paḷamalaināthasvāmin and Periyammai-Nāchchi at Vriddhāchalam *alias* Veṅganūr, presented images, constructed maṇṭāpas and gōpuras and also made provision for worship and oblations. Mentions Śēñji in Vēṅbār-nāḍu which was a subdivision of Karikālakanna valanāḍu in Magadamāṇḍalam. [The inscription seems to show that Veṅkaṭa II was ruling part of the Empire in the time of Rāma IV.]

301. 2 of 1913.—(Tamil.) On the same gōpura. A record of the Vijayanagara king Śrīraṅgadēva-Mahārāya (VI?) in Ś. 1591 Saumya, Śittirai 18, Daśami, Śadayam, Thursday (= Thursday 16th April A.D. 1669), registering gift of land and certain specified fees to the same temple by the different communities living at Veṅganūr, for the merit of one of the Reddis of the same family. [The communities mentioned are the *Vellālas*; the *Kāśāvargattār* including the *Kōmuttis*, *Kaikkōlars*, *Śēnias*, *śekkārs*, *Eruttuk-kāras*, etc.; the *Brāhmaṇas*; and the *Perumakkaḷ* of various castes. All these undertook to pay to the temple a fixed rate of grain as soon as they raised crops, besides one *paṇam* on every loom and one *paṇam* per head to be paid by the *Kāśāvargattār* each year.]

Veṅmaṇi.

301-A. On the southern wall of the mahāmaṅṭapam in the Marudanta (?) Chōlēsvara Uḍaiyār temple. Records that Malaya-kula Rāya gave to God Marutanda (?) Chōlēsvara two *vēlis* of land in the Kuḷappāḍi village. *Ins., S. Dts., p. 205, No. 9.*

TRICHINOPOLY TALUK.

Ālambākkam.

This is an ancient and important place the history of which is easily deduced from its ancient inscriptions. It evidently came into existence in the time of Dantivarman of the Pallava dynasty as it has been called Dantivarma-maṅgalam and as the local deity was known after the same king. Later on it was named Madhurāntakachaturvēdimāṅgalam by the Chōla king Madhurāntaka, while its suburb came to be called Gaṇḍarādityachaturvēdimāṅgalam after Gaṇḍarāditya. The local tanks and temples go back to times anterior to Rājarāja I.

302. 704 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the central shrine in the Śelliyamman temple. Built in at the beginning. Records that the temple of Piḍāri was built by a certain Irāyar Alaṅkārapriyan *alias* Tiru-Oṟriyūrān and seems to register a gift of land for offerings.

303. 705 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A damaged record of the Chōla king Rājakēsarivarman, dated in his twenty-fifth year. Seems to record a gift of land to the temple of Saptamātrikas by the assembly of Dantivarmamaṅgalam. [The Government Epigraphist notes that this is the earliest epigraphical record which mentions a temple dedicated to the seven mothers.]

304. 706 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the west and south walls of the same shrine. A damaged record of the Chōla king Rājakēsarivarman *alias* Uḍaiyār Śrī-Rājādhirājadēva (I?), dated in his thirty-first year. Refers to the assembly of Madhurāntakachaturvēdimāṅgalam, a *brahmadēya* in Poygaināḍu, a subdivision of Rājēndraśiṅga-vaḷanāḍu and records a gift of land by it to the temple of

Saptamātrikas. [See Nos. 323 and 324 below for the changes in the names of the political divisions in the time of Vikrama Chōla.]

305. 707 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the Ayyanār temple in the same village. A fragmentary record of the Chōla king Rājarājakēsarivarman (985—1013), dated in his ninth year. Mentions Gaṇḍarāditya-chaturvēdimāṅgalam, a *brahmadēya* on the northern bank of the Kāvēri, and its hamlet Śirumaruvūr.

306. 708 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A fragmentary record of the Chōla king Rājarājakēsarivarman (985—1013), dated in his eighth year. Records gift of lamp to a temple of Śrī-Kṛishṇa Perumāḷ at Tiruvāypāḍi, by a resident of Dantivarmamaṅgalam which was a *brahmadēya* on the northern bank of the Kāvēri. No traces of the Kṛishṇa temple exist now.

307. 709 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the same temple. A fragmentary record. Mentions the image of Śrī-Vāsu-dēva and provides for offerings and lamps.

308. 710 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the central shrine in the Varadarājaperumāḷ temple in the same village. A fragmentary record. Registers a gift of sheep for a lamp for the merit of an individual who died of an accident. Mentions Śittirakūṭa and Tiruvāypāḍi.

309. 711 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Registers in the eleventh year of the Chōla king Parakēsarivarman, gift of land for a lamp below the tank called *Mārpīḍugēri* at Dantivarma-maṅgalam, to the temple of Tirumēṙṙaḷi-Perumāḷ by a member of the *gana* who managed the affairs of the village. See No. 687 below.

310. 712 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in the first year of the Chōla king Rājakēsarivarman gift of land below the tank of Mārpīḍugēri, for offerings and of a lamp to the temple of Tiruvīśalūr-Perumāṇaḍigal of Dantivarmamaṅgalam, by a private individual who purchased it from the assembly (*sabhā*) of the village. See No. 687 below.

311. 713 of 1909.—(Tamil verse and prose.) On the same wall. Mentions Madhurāntakappēreri and records that a certain Viṭṭappa-Daṇḍanāyaka, son of a general of Narasiṁhadēva and a native of a village near Madhurāntakam in Toṇḍaimaṇḍalam, renewed the Tirumērkōyil (the present temple of Varadarāja) which had “a long time back” been founded to the west of the Kayilāyamudaiyār temple and had since become dilapidated. Dantivarman was the founder of the temple of Kailāsanātha.

312. 714 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the same shrine. A damaged and incomplete record of the Chōla king Madiraikoṇḍa Parakēsarivarman (A.D. 905—47), dated in his thirty-eighth year. Records gift of land below the tank of

Mārpīḍugēri, to the temple of Tirumēṅṅali-Perumāḷ at Dantivarmamaṅgalam, a *brahmadēya* on the northern bank of the Kāvēri.

313. 715 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the central shrine in the Kailāsanātha temple in the same village. Records in the fifth year of the Chōḷa king Parakēsarivarman gift of land for a lamp to the temple of Amarēśvara-Perumāḷ. Mentions Dantivarmamaṅgalam and Mārpīḍugēri. [The Government Epigraphist surmises that Amarēśvara should have been the earlier name of Kailāsanātha. See No. 318 below. The Parakēsari referred to might be either Parāntaka I or Sundara Chōḷa Parāntaka II.]

314. 716 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A damaged record of the Chōḷa king Rājakēsarivarman *alias* Uḍaiyār Śrī-Vijaya-Rājēndradēva, dated in his thirty-fifth year. Built in at the end. Mentions the assembly of the village of Madhurāntaka chaturvēdimāṅgalam, a *brahmadēya* in Poygaināḍu, a subdivision of Rājēndraśiṅga-vaḷanāḍu. [The inscription begins with *tingalērtaru* and distinctly shows that the king was Rājādhirāja I (who had the title Vijayarājēndra).]

315. 717 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the same shrine. A damaged record of the Chōḷa king. Built in at the end. Contains an unfinished historical introduction of Rājādhirāja I which begins *tiṅgalērtaru*.

316. 718 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record of the Chōḷa king Rājakēsarivarman *alias* Uḍaiyār Śrī-Vīrarājēndra (1064—70). Records in his second year, that the assembly of Madhurāntakachaturvēdimāṅgalam met in the temple of Tiruviśalūr-Palligoṇḍālvār of this village and made a gift of land to the temple of Tiruvālīśvaramuḍaiya-Mahādēva.

317. 719 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in the twenty-third year of the Chōḷa king Parakēsarivarman *alias* Uḍaiyār Śrī-Rājēndra-Chōḷadēva I (1011—53) gift of land to the temple of Kailāsamuḍaiya-Mahādēva of Madhurāntaka-chaturvēdimāṅgalam, by the assembly of that village. Sēnāpati Rājēndra-Chōḷa Brahmanārāyar is mentioned.

318. 720 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in the third year of Parakēsarivarman gift of land to the temple of Amarēśvara Perumāḷ at Dantivarmamaṅgalam, by the assembly (*sabhā*) of that village. See No. 313 above.

319. 721 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in the thirty-first year of the Chōḷa king Rājakēsarivarman *alias* Uḍaiyār Śrī-Rājādhirājadēva (I) that some servants of the temple residing in Madhurāntaka-chaturvēdimāṅgalam received five *kāśus* from a merchant of that village and agreed to supply paddy towards interest in order to maintain a lamp in the temple of Kailāsamuḍaiya-Mahādēva. (Daily three *nālis* of paddy or its equivalent one *alāḅku* of ghee had to be supplied.)

320. 722 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Built in in the middle. Contains a portion of the historical introduction of Rājādhirāja I, which begins *tiṅgalēr taru*.

321. 723 of 1909.—(Grantha.) On the south wall of the maṅṭapa in front of the same shrine. Records that a lady built a maṅṭapa in Kailāsa (i.e., the temple of Kailāsanātha) which was founded by Danti.

322. 724 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the same maṅṭapa. Records in the ninth year of the Chōḷa king Tribhuvana-chakravartin Rājarājadēva (Rājarāja II, 1146—78) that a native of Alambākkam in Poygaināḍu, a subdivision of Uḷaguḍai-Mukkōkki-lānādi-vaḷanāḍu, agreed to give a specified quantity of paddy to the assembly of Madhurāntaka-chaturvēdimaṅgalam. Mentions Tribhuvanachakravartin Kōnērinmaikoṇḍān. [Notice the change in the name of the political division and compare with Nos. 323 and 324.]

323. 725 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the east wall of the same maṅṭapa. Records in the fifteenth year of the Chōḷa king Tribhuvana-chakravartin Vikrama-Chōḷadēva (1118—35) gift of land by the assembly of Madhurāntaka-chaturvēdimaṅgalam, a *brahmadēya* in Poygaināḍu, a subdivision of Tribhuvanamuḷuduḍaivaḷanāḍu, to the shrine of Aḷuḍaiya-piḷḷaiyār. The assembly met in Madhurāntakadēva-maṅṭapa of this village, at the time when the gift was made. The division was evidently renamed after Tyāgapatāka or Tribhuvanamuḷuduḍaiyāl, the second queen of Vikramachōḷa (1118—35). [Aḷuḍaiya Piḷḷaiyār was Gñānasambanda.]

324. 726 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in the fifth year of the Chōḷa king Vikrama-Chōḷadēva (1118—35) gift of land for offerings and for the sacred bath of image in the temple of Kailāsamuḍaiya-Mahādēva at Madhurāntaka-chaturvēdimaṅgalam, a *brahmadēya* in Poygaināḍu, a subdivision of Vaḍagarai-Tyāgavalli-vaḷanāḍu, named evidently after the third queen of Kulōttuṅga Chōḷa I. Several *chēris* of the village are mentioned in the inscription.]

325. 727 of 1909.—(Tamil verse.) On a pillar of the same maṅṭapa. Records gift of the maṅṭapa by a certain Uyyavandāl of Kōdaikuḍi “by the grace of Danti” (Dantivarman?).

326. 728 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the gōpura of the same temple, right of entrance. Records in the twelfth year of the Chōḷa king Tribhuvanachakravartin Rājādhirājadēva (II?) gift of a house. See *Ep. Ind.*, Vol. XI, p. 247, where the details of the irregular date are discussed.

327. 729 of 1909.—(Tamil verse and prose.) In the same place. Records in the seventh year of the Chōḷa king Tribhuvana-chakravartin Rājādhirājadēva gift of paddy to the temple of

Kailāsamudaiya-Mahādēva, by the *Vellālas* of Madhurāntaka-chaturvēdi-maṅgalaṁ and its hamlets.

328. 730 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the same gōpura, left of entrance. Records in the twelfth year of the Chōḷa king Tribhuvanachakravartin Rājādhirājadēva (I or II?), gift of land to the same temple by a native of Vaṅgipuram.

329. 731 of 1909.—(Tamil.) In the same place. A damaged record of the Chōḷa king Tribhuvanachakravartin Rājādhirājadēva II, "who was pleased to take Iḷam (Ceylon) and . . .", dated in his thirteenth year. Records that the Śiva Brāhmaṇas of Madhurāntaka-chaturvēdimāṅgala borrowed some money from the temple treasury, and agreed to burn a lamp in the temple of Kailāsamudaiyār, for the interest on the borrowed amount. [Some Śiva-Brāhmaṇa families deserted their homes and lands this year and ran away. The lands were neglected and the rents unpaid in consequence. Other Śiva-Brāhmaṇas of the village met and settled that the lands should be sold to the temple. The Epigraphist ascribes the inscription to Rājādhirāja II and suggests that the trouble at Ālambākkam should have been an incident in the course of the war of the Pāṇḍyan succession which was fought in his times.]

330. 732 of 1909.—(Tamil.) In the same place. An incomplete record of the Chōḷa king Parakēsarivarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Kulōttuṅga-Chōḷadēva III, "who was pleased to take Madurai (Madura), Iḷam (Ceylon), Karuvūr and the crowned head of the Pāṇḍya (i.e., Kulōttuṅga III, 1186—1216), dated in his twenty-sixth year (Kumbha, Pūrva, Monday, Krittika). [Seems to record a gift of land and mentions Madhurāntakappērēri. See *Ep. Ind.*, Vol. XI, p. 245, where Mr. R. Sewell points out that the date corresponded to Monday, February 9th, A.D. 1204.]

331. 733 of 1909.—(Tamil.) In the same place. Records in the fifth year (Mēsha, Pūrva, Saturday, Aśvini) of the Chōḷa king Parakēsarivarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Virarājēndradēva sale of land and a house to the temple. [See *Ep. Ind.*, Vol. XI, p. 244, where it is shown that the date corresponded to Saturday, March 26th, A.D. 1183.]

Allūr.

332. 365 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the west base of the central shrine in the Pañchanādēśvara temple. Dated in the reign of the Chōḷa king Parakēsarivarman *alias* Rājēndra-Chōḷadēva (I, 1011—53). Makes provision in his fourth year for feeding five Brāhmaṇas on new-moon days.

333. 366 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the west and south bases of the same shrine. An incomplete record of the Chōḷa king Rājākēsarivarman, dated in his fifth year. Records gift of gold for a lamp.

334. 367 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the same bases. An incomplete record of the Chōla king Parakēsarivarman *alias* Rājēndra-Chōladēva (I, 1011—53), dated in his fourth year. Records gift of land.

335. 368 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the south base of the maṅṭapa in front of the same shrine. A damaged record of the Chōla king Rājarājakēsarivarman *alias* Rājarājadēva I, dated in his twenty-second year. Records gift of gold for feeding Brāhmaṇas.

336. 369 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the same base. A fragmentary record of the Chōla king Rājakēsarivarman *alias* Rājādhirājadēva (I, 985—1013). Contains a portion of the historical introduction of the king.

337. 370 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the north base of the maṅṭapa in front of the Pañchanadēśvara temple. A fragmentary record of the Chōla king Rājakēsarivarman *alias* Rājarājadēva I, dated in his twenty-seventh year. Records gift of land for daily requirements.

338. 371 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the same base. A record of the Chōla king Parakēsarivarman *alias* Uḍaiyār Rājēndra-Chōladēva (I, 1011—53), dated in his thirteenth year. Built in at the beginning.

339. 372 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the west base of the Dharmasamvardhani shrine in the same temple. A fragmentary record of the Chōla king Kulōttuṅga III, dated in his thirty-seventh year.

340. 373 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the central shrine in the Paśupatiśvara temple in the same village. A damaged record of the Chōla king Parakēsarivarman (905—47), "who took Madirai and Ḹam," dated in his forty-first year. Records gift of land.

341. 374 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in the twelfth year of the Chōla king Rājakēsarivarman sale of land.

342. 375 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in the thirty-seventh year of Parakēsarivarman (905—47) "who took Madirai and Ḹam," gift of land by a private individual who purchased it from the villagers. This land was silted up and had lain fallow for six or seven years owing to a heavy flood in the Kāvēri.

343. 376 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in the third year of the Chōla king Parakēsarivarman gift of land for a lamp by Gaṅgamādēviyār Tippāyginṅār, wife of Viraśoḷa-Ḹaṅgōveḷār. See N.A. 107 and 633.

344. 377 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the west wall of the same shrine. A damaged and incomplete record of the Chōla king Madiraikoṇḍa Rājakēsarivarman, dated in his seventeenth year. Records gift of gold. [The king might be Āditya II, Karikāla.]

345. 378 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record of the Chōḷa king Parakēsarivarman in his fourth year. Gift of land.

346. 379 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the same shrine. Gift of land in the twenty-ninth year of the Pāṇḍya king Māravarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Kulaśēkharadēva (I, ? 1268—1308).

347. 380 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the maṅṭapa in front of the same shrine. Records in the third year of the Chōḷa king Rājakēsarivarman gift of waste land with the permission of Viraśōḷa-Īlaṅgōvēḷ *alias* Parāntakan Kuñjaramallar. See No. 343.

348. 381 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in the seventeenth year of the Chōḷa king Madiraikoṇḍa Parakēsarivarman (905—47) gift of waste land to the temple of Allūr-Nakkar.

349. 382 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in the eighteenth year of the Chōḷa king Maduraikoṇḍa Parakēsarivarman (905—47) gift of land.

350. 383 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the same maṅṭapa. Records in the sixth year of the Chōḷa king Rājakēsarivarman gift of gold for the supply of bathing water to the temple.

351. 384 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in fortieth year of the Chōḷa king Parakēsarivarman (905—47), “who took Madirai and Īlam,” gift of land.

352. 385 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records gift of waste land in the reign of the Chōḷa king Parakēsarivarman (905—47), “who took Madirai and Īlam.” The date of the record is doubtful.

Anbil.

353. 588 of 1902.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the Vishvaksēna shrine in the Sundararāja-Perumāḷ temple. A record in the fifth year of the Chōḷa king Parakēsarivarman. Records gift of land.

354. 589 of 1902.—(Tamil.) On the west wall of the central shrine in the same temple. A record of the Chōḷa king Rājakēsarivarman *alias* Chakravartin Kulōttuṅga-Chōḷadēva (I?), the date of which is doubtful. Records gift of land.

355. 590 of 1902.—(Tamil verse.) On the same wall. Records gift of land.

356. 591 of 1902.—(Tamil verse.) On the north wall of the same shrine. Records the setting up of the images of Lakshmaṇa, Lakshmi and Hanūmat by a Brāhmaṇa.

357. 592 of 1902.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the same shrine. An incomplete record in the forty-fourth year of the Chōḷa king Tribhuvanachakravartin Kulōttuṅga-Chōḷadēva (I) who abolished tolls.

358. 593 of 1902.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the maṅṭapa in front of the same shrine. A record of the Vijayanagara king Dēvarāyamahārāya-Virūpāksharāya-Praudhadēvamahārāya (i.e., son of Virūpāksha and grandson of Dēvarāya II), in Ś. 1408, Parābhava. Records gift of land by Śāḷuva-Saṅgamadēva-Mahārāja.

359. 594 of 1902.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record of the Śāḷuva king Saṅgamadēva-Mahārāja in Ś. 1403, Plava. Records gift of land.

360. 595 of 1902.—(Tamil.) On the inner gōpura of the Prēmāpurīśvara temple in the same village, right of entrance. An incomplete record of the Pāṇḍya king Māravarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Kulaśēkharadēva (I?), the date of which is doubtful.

361. 596 of 1902.—(Tamil.) In the same place. A record in the fourth year of the Chōḷa king Tribhuvanachakravartin Rājēndra-Chōḷadēva (III). Records gift of land. The date corresponded to Sunday, the 12th September 1249. See *Ep. Ind.*, Vol. VII, pp. 6-7.

362. 597 of 1902.—(Tamil.) In the same place. A record in the eighth year of the Hoysala king Vīra-Rāmanāthadēva. Records gift of land. See Tp. 135 above.

363. 598 of 1902.—(Tamil.) On the inner gōpura of the Prēmāpurīśvara temple, left of entrance. A record in the eleventh year of the Pāṇḍya king Māravarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Kulaśēkharadēva. Records gift of land.

364. 599 of 1902.—(Tamil.) On a pillar lying in front of the Vighnēśvara temple in the same village. A record in the thirty-fourth year of the Chōḷa king Madiraikoṇḍa-Parakēsarivarman. Records gift of gold for lamps.

365. 600 of 1902.—(Tamil.) On a second pillar in the same place. A record in the sixth year of the Chōḷa king Rājarājākēsarivarman (I, 985—1013). Records gift of gold for one lamp.

366. 601 of 1902.—(Tamil.) On a slab built into the floor at the entrance into the same temple. An incomplete record in the nineteenth year of the Chōḷa king Tribhuvanachakravartin Rājarājadēva.

Andanallūr.

367. 348 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the central shrine in the Vaṭatīrthaṅṭha temple. Records in the tenth year of the Chōḷa king Parakēsarivarman gift of gold for a lamp by Puliyūrṇāṭṭu-Aḍigal, queen of Śembiyan Irukkuvēḷ *alias* Pūdi Parāntakan. See No. 378 below.

368. 349 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in the fourteenth year of king Parakēsarivarman gift of a garden.

369. 350 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Seems to record in the thirteenth year of the Chōla king Parakēsarivarman the gift of a lamp. Built in.

370. 351 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A damaged record of Rājarājakēsarivarman (Rājarāja I, 985—1013), dated in his seventh year. Records gift of land.

371. 352 of 1903.—(Tamil verse.) On the south base of the central shrine in the Vaṭatīrthanātha temple. Records that a private individual established a festival and granted some land.

372. 353 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the same base. An incomplete record of the Chōla king Rājarāja I. Contains a portion of the historical introduction of the king.

373. 354 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the west base of the same shrine. An incomplete and damaged record of the Chōla king Rājarāja I. Contains the usual historical introduction, but the king's name and date are either obliterated or lost.

374. 355 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the maṅṭapa in front of the same shrine. A record of the Chōla king Parakēsarivarman; records in his thirteenth year gift of gold for a lamp. Andavanallūr was in Kiḷiyūr-nāḍu and Tiruvālanduṛai was the name of the temple.

375. 356 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record of the Chōla king Parakēsarivarman in his fifteenth year. Registers gift of land for a lamp by Pūdi Mādēvaḍigaḷ, queen of Kaṇṇaradēva. [Was the latter the Rāshtrakūta king Kṛishṇa III?]

376. 357 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in the thirteenth year of the Chōla king Parakēsarivarman gift of gold for a lamp by Śingannimaḍigaḷ, queen of Śembiyan Irukkuvēḷār. See No. 367 above.

377. 358 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. An incomplete record of the Chōla king Parakēsarivarman, dated in his fourteenth year. Records gift of land by Śembiyan Irukkuvēḷ *alias* Pūdi-Parāntakan who built the stone temple. See No. 367.

378. 359 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record of the Chōla king Parakēsarivarman in his eleventh year, that Śembiyan Irukkuvēḷ *alias* Pūdi-Parāntakan built the stone temple and granted land to it with the permission of Parakēsarivarman.

379. 360 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record of the Chōla king Parakēsarivarman in his twenty-fifth year. Gift of land by a certain Araiyan Vīraśōḷan.

380. 361 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the same maṅṭapa. An incomplete record of the Pāṇḍya king Jaṭavarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Sundara-Pāṇḍyadēva (I?), dated in his eighth year.

381. 362 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the south base of the same maṅṭapa. A damaged record of the Chōḷa king Rājendra-Chōḷa I. Records gift of ninety sheep for a lamp.

382. 363 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the same base. A damaged record of the Chōḷa king Parakēsarivarman, dated in his twelfth year. Records gift of land.

383. 364 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the north base of the same maṅṭapa. An incomplete record of the Pāṇḍya king Parākrama-Pāṇḍyadēva, dated in his eighth year.

Iluppūr.

For the history of this place which was one of the Pāḷayams under the Nāik kings of Madura, see *Trichinopoly Gazr.*, Vol. I, p. 310. The Śiva temple of the place contains numerous inscriptions, but these are yet to be examined. Two inscriptions, however, have been noted. These are :—

384. A grant by Vallavāṭi Kāmākshi Nāik in 1669. See *Virappaṭṭi*.

385. In the monolithic pillar in front of the Vishṇu temple. Records that it was erected by a Saiyed Ali of the Carnatic family in gratitude for relief from a disease.

Jambukēśvaram.

See Mr. Sewell's *Antiquities*, Vol. I, p. 267, Fergusson's *Ind. and East Arch.*, p. 365; Moore's *Trichinopoly Manual*, pp. 341-2 and *Trichinopoly Gazr.*, pp. 321-3, for the religious and architectural importance of the place.

386. 61 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the east wall of the third prākāra of the Jambukēśvara temple. A record in the twentieth year of the Chōḷa king Tribhuvanachakravartin-Rājarājadēva (III?). Records sale of land.

387. 62 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record in the twenty-ninth year of the Chōḷa king Tribhuvanachakravartin Rājarājadēva (III). Records gift of land. The date corresponded to Monday, 6th February, A.D. 1245. See *Ep. Ind.*, Vol. IX, p. 216.

388. 63 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record in the twenty-sixth year of the Chōḷa king Tribhuvanachakravartin Rājarājadēva (III?). Records sale of land.

389. 64 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the same prākāra. A record in the twenty-sixth year of the Chōḷa king Tribhuvanachakravartin Rājarājadēva (III?). Records sale of land.

390. 65 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record in the twenty-second year of the Chōḷa king Tribhuvanachakravartin Rājarājadēva. Records sale of land.

391. 66 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the Akhilāṇḍanāyaki shrine in the same temple. Records in Ś. 1500, Bahudhanya, gift of land.

392. 67 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the same shrine. A record of the Śāḷuva king Tirumalairāja, son of Gopparāja in Ś. 137 . . . Śrīmukha. Records gift of an ornament. [Poet Kāḷamēgha visited the court of this king and had his famous controversy with Atimadhura and others. Kāḷamēgha's date is thus determined.]

393. 499 of 1905.—(Tamil.) On the east wall of the third prākāra in the Jambukēśvara temple. Records in the twentieth year of the Chōḷa king Tribhuvanachakravartin Rājarājadēva, sale of land.

394. 500 of 1905.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in the twenty-ninth year of the Chōḷa king Tribhuvanachakravartin Rājarājadēva III, gift of land. See *Ep. Ind.*, Vol. IX, p. 216, where it is shown that the date corresponded to Monday, 6th February, A.D. 1245.

395. 501 of 1905.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in the twenty-sixth year of the Chōḷa king Tribhuvanachakravartin Rājarājadēva III, sale of dry land. *Ibid.*, Vol. IX, p. 215, where it is shown that the date corresponded to Tuesday, 4th October, A.D. 1244.

396. 502 of 1905.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record of the Chōḷa king Tribhuvanachakravartin Rājarājadēva. Records in his twenty-sixth year, sale of dry land. See *Ibid.*, where it is shown from the details of the date that it is the same as that of the previous epigraph.

397. 503 of 1905.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A damaged record of the Chōḷa king Tribhuvanachakravartin Rājarājadēva, the date of which is lost. Appears to record a sale of land.

398. 504 of 1905.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A damaged record of the Chōḷa king Tribhuvanachakravartin Rājarājadēva, the date of which is lost. Appears to record a sale of land.

399. 505 of 1905.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record of the Chōḷa king Tribhuvanachakravartin Rājarājadēva. Sale of land. The date of the record is lost.

400. 506 of 1905.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in the twenty-ninth year of the Chōḷa king Tribhuvanachakravartin Rājarājadēva, sale of dry land.

401. 507 of 1905.—(Tamil.) On the west wall of the kitchen in the same temple. A record of the Chōḷa king Tribhuvanachakravartin Rājarājadēva in his twentieth year, sale of land.

402. 508 of 1905.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record of the Chōḷa king Tribhuvanachakravartin Rājarājadēva in his twenty-fourth year, sale of land. See *Ep. Ind.*, Vol. IX, p. 215.

403. 18 of 1891.—(Tamil.) North wall of the third prakāra of the Jambukēśvara temple. Record of the Hoysala king Vīra-Sōmēśvaradēva, dated in his second year. Mentions the image of Poysaḷēśvara set up by him at Kaṇṇanūr or Vikramapura, and four images named after his grandfather (Ballāla II), grandmother (Padmalā), father (Narasimha II) and his queen (Sōmala) at Jambukēśvaram.

404. 19 of 1891.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the third prakāra of the same temple. A record of the Hoysala king Vīra-Sōmēśvaradēva.

405. 20 of 1891.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the third prakāra of the same temple. A record of the Hoysala king Vīra-Sōmēśvaradēva, dated in his twenty-seventh year.

406. 21 of 1891.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the third prakāra of the same temple. A record of the Hoysala king Vīra-Rāmanāthadēva, dated in his fourth year.

407. 22 of 1891.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the third prakāra of the same temple. A record of the Hoysala queen Sōmalādēvi, dated in the twenty-fifth year of Vīra-Sōmēśvaradēva.

408. 23 of 1891.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the third prakāra of the same temple. A record of the Chōla king Kō-Rājakēsarivarman *alias* Rājarājadēva (III), dated in his sixteenth year. See *Ep. Ind.*, Vol. VI, pp. 281-2.

409. 24 of 1891.—(Sanskrit.) On the west wall of the third prakāra of the Jambukēśvara temple. A fragmentary record of the Pāṇḍya king Kō-Jaṭavarman *alias* Sundara-Pāṇḍyadēva; as far as the text goes, it agrees with No. 417.

410. 25 of 1891.—(Tamil.) On the west wall of the second prakāra of the Jambukēśvara temple. A record of the Pāṇḍya king Kō-Māravarman *alias* Kulaśēkharadēva, dated in his tenth year. See *Ep. Ind.*, Vol. VI, p. 309, where it is pointed out that the date is Wednesday, 5th January, A.D. 1278. The inscription refers to a street called after the God who transformed a spider into a Chōla king, a distinct allusion to the local story given in the *Periapurāṇa*.

411. 26 of 1891.—(Tamil.) On the west wall of the second prakāra of the same temple. A record of the Hoysala king Vīra-Rāmanāthadēva, dated in his seventh year. Mentions his queen Kamalādēvi, the daughter of a certain Ariya Piḷḷai.

412. 27 of 1891.—(Tamil.) On the west wall of the second prakāra of the same temple. A record of the Saubhāṇa queen Jākhadēvi, queen of Rāhutta-Jājaladēva, son of Bhīmadēva.

413. 28 of 1891.—(Tamil.) On the west wall of the second prakāra of the same temple. A record of the Hoysala king Vīra-Sōmēśvaradēva, dated in his twenty-first year. Mentions the same queen as in the above inscription.

414. 29 of 1891.—(Telugu.) On the west wall of the second prakāra of the same temple. A record of the Kākattya king Pratāpa Rudradēva. *Ind. Antq.*, Vol. XXI, p. 200.

415. 30 of 1891.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the second prakāra of the same temple. Records grant of one *vēli* by the Chōla king Vālakāmayar *alias* Akkalarājar, dated Ś. 1403 (expired), Plava, to the God of Tīruvānaikkā. See *Ep. Ind.*, Vol. III, pp. 72-3, where the inscription is edited. [The date, according to Dīkshit, corresponded to Sunday, 3rd February, 1482.]

416. 31 of 1891.—(Tamil.) On the east wall of the second prakāra. A record of the forty-seventh year of Rājakēsarivarman Kulōttuṅga-Chōla (I). A certain Villavarāyan makes a bull vehicle and endows lands purchased by him. See *S.I.I.*, Vol. III, No. 76, pp. 168-72.

417. 32 of 1891.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the second prakāra. A record of the tenth year of Jaṭavarman Sundara Pāṇḍya I (1251-64). See *Ind. Antq.*, Vol. XXI, p. 121; *Ibid.*, Vol. XXII, p. 221 and *Ep. Ind.*, Vol. VI, p. 307, where Dr. Kielhorn points out that the date corresponded to Wednesday, 28th April 1260. See also *Ep. Rcp.*, 1892, p. 8, paragraph 8.

418. 480 of 1908.—(Tamil.) On the west gōpura of the Jambukēśvara temple, right of entrance. A damaged record of the Chōla king Tribhuvanachakravartin Kulōttuṅga-Chōladēva (III), "who was pleased to take Madura and the crowned head of the Pāṇḍya, dated in his nineteenth year. Seems to register a political compact between Śīyan Uḍaiyaṭṭai *alias* Piṭṭai Akalaṅka-Nāḍālvān and Toṇḍan Sēman *alias* Rājarājamūvarāyan.

419. 481 of 1908.—(Tamil verse.) On the west gōpura of the same temple, right of entrance. Records the gift of the Chōla country by Sundara-Pāṇḍya to the Bāṇa king. See *Ind. Antq.*, Vol. XXI, p. 122.

420. 482 of 1908.—(Tamil and Grantha.) On the west gōpura of the same temple, right of entrance. A verse in the Vamśasthametre in praise of the Bāṇa king, evidently called Vīramāgadan as indicated by the single Tamil line at the top. Another damaged inscription of two verses refers to the same Bāṇa king.

421. 483 of 1908.—(Tamil.) In the same gōpura, left of entrance. A damaged record of the Chōla king Tribhuvanachakravartin Kulōttuṅga-Chōladēva, dated in his eighteenth year. Renewal of a political compact between Rājarājadēvan Ponparappinān Vāṇakōvaraiyan and Śīyan Uḍaiyaṭṭai *alias* Akalaṅka-Nāḍālvān.

422. 484 of 1908.—(Tamil.) In the same place. A damaged record of the Chōla king Tribhuvanachakravartin Rājēndrachōladēva, dated in his sixth year. Records gift of land for a flower garden.

423. 485 of 1908.—(Tamil.) On the walls of the Gaṇeśa shrine in the same temple. A fragmentary record of the Hoysala king Vīra-Rāmanāthadēva, dated in his fourteenth year. Refers to the temple at Tiruvānaikkāval in Teṅkarai Pāṇḍikulāśanivaḷanādu.

424. 486 of 1908.—(Tamil.) On the west wall of the Śaṁkārāchāryasvāmi *maṭha* in the same village. A record of Tribhuvanachakravartin Kōṇērinmaikoṇḍān. Refers to the building of the *maṭha* called *Nārpattēṇṇāyiravanmaḍam* by Āvūruḍaiyān Śōḷakōn, on the northern side of the temple at Tiruvānaikkāval and provides for the feeding of the ascetics.

425. 487 of 1908.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record of Tribhuvanachakravartin Kōṇērinmaikoṇḍān. Refers to the building of the same *maṭha*.

425-A. 92 of 1910.—(Tamil.) On the gōpura of the Rājarājēśvara temple. A damaged record of the Hoysala king Pratāpachakravartin Vīra-Rāmanātha, the date of which is doubtful. The signature of the king at the end, viz., Malaparoluḡaṇḍa is in Kanarese characters. Seems to record a gift of land by a servant of Nāgala-Mahādēvi to the shrine of Prasannīśvaram-Uḍaiyār *alias* Rājākkalṇāyanār situated on the western side of the temple of Tiruvānaikkāvūḍaiyār and mentions Kiḷiyūr-nāḍu in Pāṇḍyakulāśani-vaḷanādu.

Kaṇṇanūr.

See Nos. 134—136 above, which have been wrongly located there and which ought to be here.

426. 33 of 1891.—(Tamil.) In the Poysalēśvara temple at Kaṇṇanūr, five miles north of Śrīraṅgam. A record of the Hoysala king Vīra-Rāmanāthadēva, dated in his seventeenth year, Prajāpati (i.e., A.D. 1271).

Kumāravāyalūr.

426-A. On a stone in front of the Anganēśvaraśvāmi in the temple of Subrahmaṇya. Records in the second year of the reign of Rājēndra Chōḷadēva grant of one piece of land to the God for lamp. *Ins., S. Dts., p. 182, No. 1.*

426-B. Below the above inscription. Records that in the fifth year of the reign of Kēśava Pāṇḍya he granted 6½ *mās* of dry field in Vāyalūr to the God Uḍaiyār Nāganātha Ambalavāṇa. *Ibid., No. 2.*

426-C. On the south side of ardhamaṇṭapam in the temple. Records a gift in the fifty-eighth year of the reign of Kulōttuṅga-chōḷadēva to the God Vāyalūr Uḍaiyār. *Ibid., No. 3.*

426-D. On the east side of ardhamaṇṭapam in the temple of Subrahmaṇya. Records that in the reign of "Kobarayya Kēsari Pāṇḍyadēva" he granted some dry field to the God Vāyalūr Uḍaiyār. *Ibid., No. 4.*

426-E. On the northern wall of ardha maṅṭapam in the temple of Subrahmaṇya. Records that in the seventh year of the reign of "Kobarayya Kēsari-Pāṇḍyadēva" he granted 200 *sayes* of land in Vāyalūr to the Nāyanār *sthānattār*. *Ins., S. Dts.*, p. 182, No. 5.

Lālgudi:

Lālgudi, so called by the Muhammadans on account of its red gōpuram, is the well-known Maḷavanāḍu of the middle ages, the seat of the Smārtas of the Maḷavanāḍu Brihacharaṇam sect. For the description of its temples and festivals, its part in the Karnatic wars, etc., see *Trichinopoly Gazr.*, Vol. I, p. 312.

427. 84 of 1892.—(Tamil.) On a niche of the north wall of the first prākāra of the Saptarishīśvara temple. A record of Kō-Vijaya-Nṛipatuṅga-Vikramavarman in his twenty-second year.

428. 85 of 1892.—(Tamil.) On a niche of the north wall of the first prākāra of the same temple. A record of the Chōla king Kō-Parakēsarivarman in his sixth year.

429. 86 of 1892.—(Tamil.) On a niche of the north wall of the first prākāra of the same temple. A record of the Chōla king Madiraikoṇḍa Kō-Parakēsarivarman (905—47) in his twenty-second year.

430. 87 of 1892.—(Tamil.) On a niche of the north wall of the first prākāra of the same temple. A record of the Chōla king Kō-Rājakēsarivarman in his fifteenth year.

431. 88 of 1892.—(Tamil.) On the second niche of the east wall of the first prākāra of the same temple. A record of the Chōla king Kō-Parakēsarivarman (905—47), who took Madura and Ceylon, the date of which is doubtful.

432. 89 of 1892.—(Tamil.) On the second niche of the south wall of the first prākāra of the same temple. A record of the Chōla king Kō-Rājakēsarivarman in his second year.

Maṅachchanallūr.

433. 663 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On a slab set up in a grove of trees. Dated in the reign of the Vijayanagara king Kṛishṇadēva-Mahārāja in Ś. 1435, Śrīmukha. Records gift of the village of Uppūr to the temple of Śrīraṅganātha for conducting festivals and for planting a grove.

*Periyakaruppūr.**

433-A. On the western side of the Nāyaka maṅṭapam in the Tirunandēśvara temple. Records that Sundarapāṇḍyadēva gave to the deity in his eleventh year some land and a garden. *Ins., S. Dts.*, p. 208, No. 19.

* Spelt *Pareyamcoop* in *Mack. MSS.*

Pichchāṇḍārkōvil.

434. 602 of 1902.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the central shrine in the Uttamar temple. A record in the thirtieth year of the Chōla king Rājakēsarivarman *alias* Uḍaiyāṅ Rājādhirājadēva. Records gift of land. [Uttamar kōvil figures in the *Guruparampara* of the Teṅgalai Vaishṇavites as the scene of the early services of the teacher Nambiḷḷai (Varadarāja) or Lōkāchārya. For Nambiḷḷai's position in the history of Śrī Vaishṇavism in South India, his life, his services to the prabandhic party, his disciples, etc., see my article on the *History of Śrī Vaishṇavism from the death of Rāmānuja up to Vēdānta Dēśika* in J.Bo.R.A.S., 1914-5.]

Puttūr.

435. 143 of 1914.—(Mixed characters.) On the top of the Chōlampārai rock. No details given.

Śamayavaram.

436. 746 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the maṅṭapa in front of the central shrine in the Muktiśvara temple. Records in the sixth year of the Chōla king Tribhuvanachakravartin Rājārājadēva gift of land for offerings to the temple of Kaḷugirai-Nāyanār at Māgāṇikuḍi, a village on the bank of Kīlpālāru, in Pāchchil-kūrṅam, a subdivision of Vaḍagarai Rājarāja-vaḷanāḍu.

437. 747 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A much damaged record of a Hoysala king (the date and the name of the king lost). Stones missing.

438. 748 of 1909.—(Kanarese.) On the west wall of the kitchen in the same temple. A damaged record of the Hoysala king Vīra-Rāmanāthadēvarasa. Seems to record that a Nāyaka built one of the walls of the kitchen.

439. A C.P. grant in the possession of a Mussalman of the village. (Hindustani.) Dated H. 1173, A.D. 1759. (*Antiquities*, Vol. I, p. 267.)

440. A C.P. grant in the possession of the same. (Tamil.) A grant of Queen Mīnākshi of Madura, dated Ś. 1655 (A.D. 1733), "during the reign of Śrī Vīra Veṅkaṭadēva Mahārāya at Ghānagirinagara." [*Ibid.*, p. 267.]

Śriraṅgam.

See *Antiquities*, Vol. I, pp. 267-8, for a brief sketch of the place and bibliography.

441. C.P. No. 50 of Mr. Sewell's List.—(Telugu.) Records grant of land for a charity at the great temple of Śrīraṅgam by Vijaya Raṅga Chokkanātha of the Madura Nāyakkan dynasty in Ś. 1638 (A.D. 1716). The grant mentions his father Raṅga Kṛishṇa Muttu Virappa, and grandfather Chokkanātha, and states that the Vijayanagar sovereign Śrī Vīra Raṅga Rāya was then reigning at Ghānagiri. The recognition of a Vijayanagar ruler is, of course, a mere

formality. For a detailed account of the reign of Vijaya Raṅga Chokkanātha see *Ind. Antq.*, 1917, September-November.

442. 51 of Mr. Sewell's List.—(Telugu.) Records grant of land to the priest at the great temple of Śrīraṅgam in Ś. 1584 (A.D. 1662), Kaliyuga 4763, Śōbhakrit, by Chokkanātha (1560—80), son of Muddu Vīrappa and grandson of Tirumala of the Nāyakkan dynasty of Madura, noting that the Vijayanagar sovereign Śrī Raṅga was reigning at Ghānagiri.

443. C.P. No. 2 of 1888.—A grant in five plates with the ring but without seal. Said to belong to the reign of Vīradēva Rāya.

444. C.P. No. 4 of 1888.—Three plates. Seal with boar, sun and moon. A grant of Kṛishṇadēva Rāya in Ś. 1450 (?), Sarvajit.

445. C.P. Nos. 8 and 9 of 1888.—Said to contain Telugu songs.

446. C.P. No. 13.—Two plates in Nandināgari without ring and seal.

447. C.P. No. 14.—Five plates with ring but without seal. Dated in Ś. 1270.

448. C.P. Nos. 11 of 1888 and 18 of 1905-6.—(Telugu.) In the Raṅganātha temple. A record of Pūsapāṭi Vijayarāmarāju in Ś. 1710, Kīlaka. Records grant of the revenue of the village of Lakidāmu in the Poṭnūru-tāluka. See *Local Records*, Vol. IV, p. 179 and XLVII, p. 148, and *Vizagapatam Gazr.*, p. 339.

449. No. 3 of 1888 and C.P. No. 19 of 1905-6.—Sanskrit (in Nāgari.) A record of the Vijayanagara king Dēvarāya (II), in Ś. 1356, Ānanda. Records gift of three villages in Rājagambhīra-vaḷanāḍu on the southern bank of the Kāvēri river and of two in Maḷanāḍu on its northern bank.

450. No. 20 of 1905-6 and C.P. No. 5 of 1888.—(Sanskrit and Kanarese in Nāgari.) A record of the Vijayanagara king Dēvarāya (II), in Ś. 1349, Plavaṅga (in figures 1350). Records gift of two villages in the same districts by the king for the merit of his mother Nāraṇadēvi. An old plate at the end refers to two of the villages granted in the above record.

451. C.P. No. 21 of 1905-6.—(Sanskrit in Telugu.) Records in Ś. 1280, the gift of a village in the Telugu country by the mother of the seventh Parāśara-Bhaṭṭa. The village had been granted to him as *guru-dakshina* by a chief named Mummaḍi-Nāyaka (also called Raṅgavarḍhana) of the Mañchikoṇḍa-gōtra. See Gd. 70.

452. C.P. No. 22 of 1905-6.—(Nāgari.) A record of the Vijayanagara king Viruppaṇa.

453. C.P. No. 23 of 1905-6 and C.P. No. 1 of 1888.—(Sanskrit, Nāgari.) A record of the Vijayanagara king Kṛishṇarāya in Ś. 1436, Bhava. Records gift of the village of Eṇṇakūḍi *alias*

Kṛishṇarāyapura to a certain Allāḷa-Bhaṭṭa. The village was situated in Uyyakoṇḍa-Chōḷēndravaḷanaḍu.

454. *C.P. No. 24 of 1905-6 and C.P. No. 7 of 1888.*—(Sanskrit in Telugu.) A record of Rājarāja-Mādhava in Ś. 1343, Plava. The king was the son of Śingabhūpāla by his queen Annamāmba. Mentions Venkatachārya, son of Rāmānujārya of the Śrīśaila family, as the king's *guru*.

455. *C.P. No. 25 of 1905-6 and C.P. No. 12 of 1888.*—(Telugu.) A record of the Nāyaka queen Maṅgammā (1689--1705), queen of Viśvanātha-Nāyaka-Chokkanātha-Nāyaka, in Ś. 1614, Śrīmukha. Records gift of land.

456. *C.P. No. 26 of 1905-6 and C.P. No. 10 of 1888.*—(Telugu.) Records sale of land in Krōdhana by a certain Emberumānāru Jiyyaṅāru of Tirukkōvalūr (i.e., Tirukkōyilūr in the South Arcot district).

457. *C.P. No. 27 of 1905-6.*—(Telugu.) A record of the Vijayanagara king Vīrapratāpa Dēvarāya Mahārāya (I) in Ś. 1336, Jaya. Records gift of the village of Naṅuvūru (in Kiḷaṅgunāḍu) by the king's son Vīra-Harihararāya-Oḍeya II to a private individual who, in his turn, gave the village to the temple of Śrīraṅganātha. The prince seems to have been governing the country on the banks of the Bhavāni.

458. *C.P. No. 28 of 1905-6 and C.P. No. 6 of 1888.*—(Sanskrit, in Nāgari.) A record of the Vijayanagara king Mallikārjuna *alias* Immadi-Dēvarāya II in Ś. 1384, Chitrabhānu. Records gift of the village of Uttamachēri Kiliyūru by the king for the success of his own arms.

459. *34 of 1891.*—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the *garbhagriha* of the Śamivanēśvara temple at Tiruvāśi near the same place. A record of the Hoysaḷa king Vīra-Sōmēśvaradēva, dated in his twenty-ninth year.

460. *45 of 1891.*—(Sanskrit.) On the east wall of the second prakāra of the Raṅganātha temple. A record of the Pāṇḍya king Sundara Pāṇḍya who took Śrīraṅgam from the "moon of Karnāṭa and who plundered the capital of the Kāṭhaka king, i.e., Jaṭāvarman Sundara Pāṇḍya I (1251--64)." The moon of Karnāṭa was Vīra Sōmēśvara-dēva. See *Ep. Ind.*, Vol. III, pp. 1--17, where Dr. Hultsch edits the inscription.

461. *46 of 1891.*—(Sanskrit.) On the north wall of the second prakāra of the Raṅganātha temple. A record of the Kēraḷa king Ravivarman Kulaśēkhara Saṅgrāmadhīra, saying that the king, after his victorious campaign in the south, worshipped his tutelary deity, Raṅganātha, and founded an image and celebrated a festival of lights in his honour and provided for the payment on a fixed day of every year, of 100 *paṇas* each to fifty learned men. See *Ep. Ind.*, Vol. IV, pp. 148--52.

462. 51 of 1892.—(Sanskrit.) On the south wall of the second prakāra of the Raṅganātha temple. Refers to the gift recorded in the next epigraph.

463. 52 of 1892.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the second rākāra of the same temple. A record of the Hoysaḷa king Vira-Rāmanāthadēva, dated in his fifteenth year. Records gift to a private person to the temple of Raṅganātha of four ornaments which he had previously received as presents from Vira Paṇḍya.

464. 53 of 1892.—(Tamil.) East wall of the second prakāra of the same temple. A record of the Paṇḍya king Kō-Māravarman *alias* Sundara-Paṇḍyadēva I (1216—35), dated in his ninth year. He is said to have been “pleased to present the Chōḷa country.” The English date, according to Kielhorn, is Friday, 28th March A.D. 1225. See *Ep. Ind.*, Vol. VI, p. 303. Also *Ind. Antq.*, Vol. XXI, p. 344 and Rd. 171.

465. 54 of 1892.—(Tamil.) On the east wall of the second prakāra of the Raṅganātha temple. A record of the Hoysaḷa king Vira-Narasimhadēva (III), dated Vijaya (i.e., 1293 A.D.). Mentions Dēvala Dēvi, one of the queens of Vira Sōmēśvara, the father and predecessor of Narasimha III.

466. 55 of 1892.—(Sanskrit.) On the east wall of the second prakāra of the same temple. A record of Goppanārya or Gōpaṇa, dated Ś. 1293. The inscription records that Goppana recovered the images of Raṅganātha and consorts from Muhammadans, took them to Gingi and then restored them to Śrīraṅgam. See *Ep. Ind.*, Vol. VI, pp. 322—30. See also my article on Vēdānta Dēśika in J. Bo. R.A.S., 1916.

467. 56 of 1892.—(Tamil and Sanskrit.) On the east wall of the second prakāra of the same temple. A record of the Chōḷa king Chennaya Bālayadēva, dated in Ś. 1452, expired, Vikriti.

468. 57 of 1892.—(Sanskrit and Tamil.) On the north wall of the second prakāra of the same temple. A record of the Hoysaḷa king Vira-Rāmanāthadēva, dated in his twelfth year. Records that Ponnambala-mahādēvi, the uterine sister of Vira Rāmanātha and daughter of Vira Sōmēśvara by the Chāḷukya princess Dēvala-mahādēvi, gave a gift. See No. 465 above.

469. 58 of 1892.—(Sanskrit.) On the west wall of the second prakāra of the same temple. A record of the Vijayanagara king Harihara (II). Mentions his minister Muddaya Daṇḍanāyaka.

470. 59 of 1892.—(Tamil and Sanskrit.) On the west wall of the second prakāra of the same temple. A record of the Śāḷuva chief Tirumalaidēva or Gōpa-Timma, dated Ś. 1385, expired, Subhānu. See No. 392 above.

471. 60 of 1892.—(Sanskrit.) On the east faces of four pillars of the maṅṭapa in front of the central shrine of the same temple.

A record of the Pāṇḍya king Sundara-Pāṇḍya, referring to his conquests over the two kings Simhaṇa and Rāma. The latter was evidently Vīra Rāmanātha Dēva and the former Narasiṃha III. See No. 464 above.

472. 61 of 1892.—(Tamil.) On the east wall of the third prākāra of the Raṅganātha temple. A record of the Chōḷa king Kō-Rājakēsarivarman *alias* Kulōttuṅga Chōḷadēva (I?), dated in his fifteenth year.

473. 62 of 1892.—(Tamil.) On the east wall of the third prākāra of the same temple. In the eighteenth year of the Chōḷa king Kō-Rājakēsarivarman *alias* Kulōttuṅga-Chōḷadēva (I). Grant by a certain Kāḷiṅgarāyar of $6\frac{1}{4}$ *kāśus*, to meet the cost of offerings on two festival days out of the interest. The inscription shows clearly that the Āḷvārs had by this time become popular. *S.I.I.*, Vol. III, No. 70, pp. 148—52.

474. 63 of 1892.—(Tamil in two alphabets: Vaṭṭeḷuṭṭu and Tamil proper.) On the south wall of the fourth prākāra of the Raṅganātha temple. A record of the Chōḷa king Tribhuvana-chakravartin Kulōttuṅga-Chōḷadēva, dated in his thirteenth year.

475. 64 of 1892.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the fourth prākāra of the same temple. A record of the Chōḷa king Tribhuvanachakravartin Rājēndra-Chōḷadēva III, dated in his seventh year. See *Ep. Ind.*, Vol. VII, p. 176, where Kielhorn points out that the date corresponded to Wednesday, December 25, A.D. 1252. The king resided at Gaṅgaikoṇḍa Chōḷapuram, and claims to have defeated the Hoysala king Vīra Sōmēśvara, father of Vīra Rāmanātha, who had inscriptions as far south as Śendalai (57 of 1897) and Mannārgudi (85 and 97 of 1897).

476. 65 of 1892.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the fourth prākāra of the same temple. A record of the Chōḷa king Tribhuvanachakravartin Rājēndra Chōḷadēva, dated in his seventh year. The Government Epigraphist points out that as this king was the contemporary of Rājarāja III it has to be inferred that there were internal dissensions in the Chōḷa dominions in the time of Rājarāja and that this was the cause of the Chōḷa decline. *Ep. Rep.*, 1900, p. 30. See *Ep. Ind.*, Vol. VII, p. 177, where Kielhorn points out that the date of the inscription is irregular.

477. 66 of 1892.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the fourth prākāra of the Raṅganātha temple, left of entrance. A record of the Chōḷa king Kō-Parakēsarivarman *alias* Kulōttuṅga-Chōḷadēva (III), dated in his nineteenth year. See *Ep. Ind.*, Vol. IV, p. 219, where it is pointed out that the exact date was Tuesday, the 12th November 1196. See also *S.I.I.*, Vol. III, No. 88, pp. 217—9.

478. 67 of 1892.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the fourth prākāra of the same temple, right of entrance. A record of the Hoysala king Vīra-Rāmanāthadēva, dated in his second year,

Wednesday, Bharani, Pūr. 7, Kumbha, corresponding to 24th January A.D. 1257. See *Ep. Ind.*, Vol. III, p. 9, and Kielhorn's *Southern List*, No. 441.

479. 68 of 1892.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the fourth prakāra of the same temple, right of entrance. A record of the Hoysala king Vira Sōmēśvaradēva, dated in his sixth year.

480. 69 of 1892.—(Tamil.) Right of entrance into the thrashing-floor in the fourth prakāra. A record of the Chōla king Kō-Rājakēsarivarman, dated in his fourth year.

481. 70 of 1892.—(Tamil.) Right of entrance into the thrashing-floor in the fourth prakāra of the same temple. A record of the Chōla king Kō-Rājakēsarivarman, dated in his twenty-sixth year.

482. 71 of 1892.—(Tamil.) Left of entrance into the thrashing-floor in the fourth prakāra of the same temple. A record of the Chōla king Madiraikoṇḍa Kō-Parakēsarivarman (905--47), dated in his twenty-eighth year.

483. 72 of 1892.—(Tamil.) Left of entrance into the thrashing-floor in the fourth prakāra of the same temple. A record of the Chōla king Madiraikoṇḍa Kō-Parakēsarivarman (905--47), dated in his seventeenth year.

484. 73 of 1892.—(Tamil.) Left of entrance into the thrashing-floor in the fourth prakāra of the same temple. A record of the Chōla king Kō-Parakēsarivarman, dated in his second year.

485. 74 of 1892.—(Tamil.) In a room in the south-west corner of the third prakāra of the same temple. A record of the Hoysala king Vira-Rāmanāthadēva, dated in his fifteenth year.

486. On the west gate of the second prakāra wall.* Records that "Visa Bhārati," son of Dakshināmūrti, gave a village for the God in Ś. 1351, Saumya. *Ins., S. Dts.*, p. 126, No. 1. [In the place of Visa Bhārati *Vijayapar* is given in the *Rais. Catal.*, Vol. III, p. 310, No. 44.]

487. On the downstair of the above. Records gift of a village to Uttamanambhi in Śubhakrit, in the reign of Vijaya Bhūpatirāya. *Ibid.*, No. 2.

488. On the eastern wall of the *dvārapālaka* on the west gate of the second prakāra. Records that Karpūra Maṇavāla Rāya purchased 1,200 *kulis* of land for 48 *pons* and other land for 27 *pons* and presented it to God Raṅganātha for flowers and worship in Ś. 1393, Khara, in the time of "Rāja Vipada." *Ibid.*, p. 127, No. 3.

489. On the eastern wall on the west side of two prakārams in the same temple. Records that in Ś. 1343, Śārvari, in the reign

of Vīrapratāpa Dēvarāya, "Malananga" Dēva granted four *vēlis* of land and thirty cows to the God. *Ins., S. Dts., p. 126, No. 4.*

490. In the same place. Records that Madura Rāman gave half *vēli* of land to the God in Ś. 1580, Viśvāvasu, in the reign of Viśvanātha Nāyakar. *Ibid., No. 5.*

491. On the downstairs of the above. Records that in S. 1400, Manmatha, Bālayyadēva Mahārāja gave a village to the God for the celebration of Śrī-Rāmanavami in the reign of Vīrapratāpa Rāya. *Ibid., p. 128, No. 6.*

492. On the north-east of the "Sanadhipati" (Sēnādhipati?) shrine, in the second prakāra. Records that Liṅgayyan gave some land to the God for worship and food in Ś. 1433, Prajōtpatti, in the reign of Kṛishṇadēvarāya. *Ibid., No. 7.*

492-A. On the back wall of the Sēnamudaliār temple. Records grant of a village to the deity in Ś. 1446, Tāraṇa, by Timmarāya, the prime minister of Kṛishṇadēvarāya. *Ibid., No. 8.*

492-B. On the back wall of the Sēnamudaliār temple. Records grant of land to the God in Ś. 1590, Kīlaka, by Madura Rāman. *Ibid., p. 129, No. 9.*

492-C. In the same place. Records that Appayyan gave some land for the celebration of Śrī-Rāmanavami in Ś. 1445, in the reign of Kṛishṇadēvarāya. *Ibid., No. 10.*

492-D. On the east of the above. Records that Timmarāya Kṛishṇa Nāyakar gave a village to God Raṅganātha in Ś. 1542, Vikriti, in the reign of Achyutadēvarāya. *Ibid., No. 11.*

492-E. On the wall of the second prakāra of the Nāchchiyār temple. Records that Rāyasam Tirumalayya gave a village to God Raṅganātha in Ś. 1496, Āṅgīrasa, in the reign of Vīrapratāpa Dēvarāya. *Ibid., No. 12.*

492-F. On a stone in the Tiruvunnāligai. Records that Annamuttammāl, the mother of Śrī Raṅga Kṛishṇa Muttuvīrappa Nāyakar, gave two villages for God Raṅganātha in Prabhava. *Ibid., p. 130, No. 13.* For Raṅga Kṛishṇa's reign see *Ind. Antq., 1917, p. 104 ff.*

492-G. On the west wall of the gate of the cook-room of the temple. Records that in the reign of Achyutarāya Rāmabhaṭṭa of Uṛaiyūr made a gift to God Raṅganātha in Ś. 1459, Viḷambi. *Ibid., No. 14.*

492-H. On the western wall of the Tiruvunnāligai. Records gift of $\frac{1}{4}$ *vēli* of land in Ś. 1603. *Ibid., No. 15.*

492-I. On the eastern wall of the Aruvatuvaśal gate, in the fourth prakāram. Records that Nāgapparāja gave $\frac{3}{4}$ of a village to God Raṅganātha and one-fourth to Śrī Vaishṇavas in Ś. 1473, Virōdhikrit, in the reign of Sadāśivarāya. *Ibid., p. 131, No. 16.*

492-J. Above the same. Records that Naraśiṅganāyaka purchased some land and gave it to God Raṅganātha in the reign of Rājendra-chōladēva. *Ins., S. Dts., p. 131, No. 17.*

492-K. On the east wall of the Garuda shrine. Records that Chinna Bommaya Nāyaka granted a village for God Gōpālakṛishṇa and Raṅganātha in Ś. 1596, Ānanda, in the reign of Viśvanātha Nāyakan Chokkanātha Nāyakan (1660—82). *Ibid., No. 18. See Ind. Antq., 1917, p. 40 ff.*

492-L. West of the above. Records the grant of a village to God Raṅganātha and Tiruvēṅkaṭanātha by Viśvanātha Nāyakan Chokkanātha Nāyakan (1660—82) in Ś. 1586, Parābhava. *Ibid., No. 19. See Ind. Antq., 1917, p. 40 ff.*

492-M. In the same place. Records that Aḷagiri Nāyakan, son of Chinnama Nāyakan, gave two *vēlis* and four *mās* of land in Umayāpuram and elsewhere in Ś. 1591, Saumya, to God Raṅganātha. *Ibid., p. 132, No. 20.* [Aḷagiri was the foster-brother and general of Chokkanātha Nāyaka who, on the latter's conquest of Vijaya Rāghava of Tanjore, was appointed its viceroy and then rebelled. See *Ind. Antq., 1917, p. 63.*]

492-N. On the south-west wall of the Garuda temple. Records that Basavappa Nāyakan, son of Śaṅgama Nāyakan, gave thirteen *sayes* of land in Ś. 1593, Virōdhikrit. *Ibid., No. 21.*

492-O. On the back wall of the Garuda temple. Records that Viśvanātha Nāyakar granted the allowance of Tirumalayya Maṭha to the Brahman Veṅkaṭa Varadāchārya in Ś. 1613, Pramōdūta, in the reign of Vīrapratāpa Vīradēva Mahārāya. *Ibid., No. 22.* "Some regulations as to the order in which certain Brahmans were to put garlands on the idol during processions."

492-P. On a stone on the south gate to the west of the royal spire. Records that Viśvanātha Nāyakar Chokkanātha Nāyakar (1660—82) gave the village of "Veelevadungun" to Śrī Vaishṇava Brahmans of Ādivarāhapuram street at Śrīraṅgam in Ś. 1658, in the reign of Śrīraṅgadēva Mahārāya. *Ibid., p. 133, No. 23.*

492-Q. On the eastern wall of the fourth prākāra. Records that Chinna Bommanāyaka granted the village of "Vohacode" to God Gōpālakṛishṇa and Raṅganātha in Ś. 1596, Ānanda, in the reign of Viśvanātha Nāyakar Chokkanātha Nāyakar (1660—82). *Ibid., No. 24. See Ind. Antq., 1917, p. 40 ff.*

492-R. On the back of the Garuda temple. Records that Rāyasam Basava-Rāja gave the village of "Mungalooroo" to Gods Raṅganātha and Varadarāja and Rāmānuja *kūtam* in Ś. 1596, Ānanda, in the reign of Viśvanātha Nāyakar Chokkanātha Nāyakar (1660—82). *Ibid., No. 25.*

492-S. In the same temple. "An inscription commemorating the self-immolation of a manager of the fane at Śrīraṅgam whose name was Appana Ayengar. In consequence of all supplies to the

fane being withheld, in a bad time, he ascended the Rayer gōpura or lofty tower, and precipitated himself to the ground. The twenty-fourth of Tai of a cyclic year only is mentioned. The precise time of the occurrence cannot be, from the document, ascertained. But possibly it is the incident related by Mr. Orme, and by him ascribed to a somewhat different cause." *Rais. Catal.*, Vol. III, p. 311, No. 68.

Tiruchkendurai.

493. 291 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the central shrine in the Chandraśēkhara temple. Records in the twelfth year of the Chōla king Madiraikoṇḍa Parakēsarivarman (A.D. 905—47) gift of land for a lamp.

494. 292 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in the twentieth year of the Chōla king Parakēsarivarman a gift of land.

495. 293 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in the sixteenth year of the Chōla king Parakēsarivarman gift of land for a lamp.

496. 294 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A damaged record of the Chōla king Parakēsarivarman, dated in his twenty-eighth year.

497. 295 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in the fourteenth year of the Chōla king Parakēsarivarman a sale of land.

498. 296 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in the ninth year of the Chōla king Parakēsarivarman a sale of land.

499. 297 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the west wall of the same shrine. Records in the third year of the Chōla king Vikrama-Chōladēva (1118—35) a private agreement.

500. 298 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in the twentieth year of the Chōla king Madirāikoṇḍa Parakēsarivarman (905—47) gift of land.

501. 299 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in the eighth year of the Chōla king Parakēsarivarman a gift of land for a lamp.

502. 300 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in the sixteenth year of the Chōla king Madiraikoṇḍa Parakēsarivarman a gift of land for a lamp.

503. 301 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in the sixth year of the Chōla king Tribhuvanachakravartin Rājarājadēva a gift of cows for lamps.

504. 302 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the same shrine. Records in the second year of the Chōla king Rājakēsarivarman a gift of land.

505. 303 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in the sixth year of the Chōla king Rājakēsarivarman a sale of land.

506. 304 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Dated in the reign of the Chōla king Parakēsarivarman *alias* Uḍaiyār Rājendra-Chōladēva (I, 1011—53). Records a gift of land. The date of the record is doubtful.

507. 305 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the south base of the same shrine. A damaged record of the Chōla king Parakēsarivarman, dated in his third year.

508. 306 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the same base. A record of the Chōla king Parakēsarivarman in his second year; gift of gold for a lamp. The standard of weight is called *vidēlvidugu*. Mentions Kodumbālūr. See No. 702 below.

509. 307 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the west base of the same shrine. Records in the twenty-third year of the Chōla king Parakēsarivarman gift of a garden.

510. 308 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the north base of the same shrine. Records in the third year of the Chōla king Parakēsarivarman a gift of land for a lamp.

511. 309 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the maṅṭapa in front of the same shrine. Records in the tenth year of the Chōla king Parakēsarivarman a sale of land.

512. 310 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in the second year of the Chōla king Parakēsarivarman a gift of land by Pūdi-Āditta-Piḍāri on the day of a solar eclipse.

513. 311 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. An incomplete record of the Chōla king Parakēsarivarman, dated in his tenth year. Records gift of gold by the donor in the above inscription.

514. 312 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in the fourth year of the Chōla king Parakēsarivarman a gift of gold by the same donor.

515. 313 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in the forty-sixth year of the Chōla king Rājakēsarivarman Tribhuvana-chakravartin Kuloṭtuṅga-Chōladēva I (1070—1118) gift of gold for a lamp.

516. 314 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in the tenth year of the Chōla king Parakēsarivarman gift of gold by the donor in No. 512 above.

517. 315 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the same maṅṭapa. Records gift of lamps by Śembiyan Iṅgōvēḷ *alias* Pūdi-Āditta-Piḍāran.

518. 316 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in the third year of the Chōla king Parakēsarivarman gift of gold by Pūdi-Ādichcha-Piḍāriyār, daughter of Tennavan Iṅgōvēḷār and queen of Arikulakēsariyār, son of Śōḷa-Perumāṇaḍigaḷ (Parāntaka

l), to the God of the stone temple which she had built at Tiruchchendurai (near Īśānamaṅgalam).

519. 317 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records gift of two gardens by the same queen who refers to her having built the temple.

520. 318 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the maṅṭapa in front of the central shrine in the Chandraśekhara temple. Records in the twenty-second year of the Chōḷa king Parakēsari-varman a gift of land by Madirāntaka Irukkuvēḷ *alias* Ādittambūdi.

521. 319 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in the second year of the Chōḷa king Parakēsari-varman gift of two gardens by the donor in No. 518 who refers to her having built the temple.

522. 320 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record of the Chōḷa king Rājakēsari-varman in his twenty-third year. Sale of land to the same donor.

523. 321 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the south base of the same maṅṭapa. A mutilated record of the Chōḷa king Parakēsari-varman, dated in his third year. Records gift of land.

524. 322 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the same base. Mentions the donor of No. 518. Damaged and built in.

525. 323 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the same base. A record of the twenty-third year of the Chōḷa king Parakēsari-varman. Records gift of land by Vīraśōḷa-Iḷaṅgōvēḷ *alias* Ādittan Tiruvorriyūr Adigaḷ on the occasion of his marriage. [The king referred to is Parāntaka I, who had the title Vīraśōḷa.]

526. 324 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the south base of the Viśva-nātha shrine in the same temple. A damaged record of a Chōḷa king, whose name is doubtful. Seems to describe in his twelfth year, in detail, the circumstances that led to the building of a Viṣṇu temple called Puḷalaya Viṅṅagar to the west of Īśānamaṅgalam. Refers also to a Gaṅga king without mentioning his name.

527. 325 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the west base of the same shrine. A record of the Chōḷa king Rājakēsari-varman in his twentieth year, registering that a certain merchant of Tanjore named Karuṇāṭaka-Puḷalayaśeṭṭi built the temple called Puḷalaya-Viṅṅagar and set up the God; that he purchased the land adjoining the temple and presented it.

528. 326 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the north base of the same shrine. Records in the twelfth year of the Chōḷa king Rājadhiraḷadēva gift of money for a lamp.

529. 327 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the same base. A much damaged record of a Chōḷa king whose name is doubtful. Refers

to the donor in No. 527 and to his having built the temple called Puḷalaya-Viṅṅagar.

Tiruneduṅgaḷam

This place is a Śaivite centre of the South-Kavēri region where a certain Vaṅkyachōḷa had the sight of the Lord in His grèat beauty. It has been sung by Gñānasambanda and has been also celebrated by Aiyadigaḷ Kāḍavarkōn in his *kshētra-venbā*.

530. 664 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the north, west and south walls of the central shrine in the temple of Neduṅgaḷanāthasvāmin. A record of the Vijayanagara king Vīrapratāpa Bhujabalarāya Immaḍi-Tamayadēva-Mahārāya (whom Mr. Krishna Sastri identifies with Immaḍi Narasiṁha, the son of Śāḷuva Naraśiṅga). Refers in Ś. 1422, Durmati, to Narasa-Nāyakkār and to the founding of a village for the merit of Sōmaya-Vīramarasa, "lord of the southern ocean."

531. 665 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the same walls. A record of the Vijayanagara king Viruppaṇa-Uḍaiyār (II, i.e., Virūpāksha I), son of Ariyaṇa-Uḍaiyār (Harihara II). Records in Ś. 1306, Raktākshi, a gift of land.

532. 666 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the same shrine. An unfinished record of the Vijayanagara king Mallikārjunarāya, son of Dēvarāya-Mahārāya (II).

533. 667 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the maṅṭapa in front of the same shrine. Records in the eighth year of the Pāṇḍya king Jaṭāvarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Sundara-Pāṇḍyadēva (II) gift of land to the temple of Tiruneduṅgala-Uḍaiya Nāyanār in Vaḍagari-nāḍu by a native of Kiḷiyūr in Kiḷiyūr nāḍu, which was a subdivision of Pāṇḍyakulapati-vaḷanāḍu. See *Ep. Ind.*, Vol. XI, p. 257, where the date is discussed and decided in favour of Wednesday, January 17th, A.D. 1285. [Mr. Swamikannu Pillai, however, attributed the epigraph to Jaṭāvarman Sundara Pāṇḍya II and fixes the date on 5th January 1278. *Ind. Antq.*, 1913 p. 22.]

534. 668 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record of the Pāṇḍya king Jaṭāvarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Sundara-Pāṇḍyadēva; records gift of land for a lamp to the same temple. The date of the record is lost.

535. 669 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. The Hoysala king Vīra Rāmanāthadēva records in his thirteenth year gift of paddy to the temple of Tiruneduṅgaḷa-Uḍaiya-Nāyanār in Vaḍagavināḍu, a subdivision of Pāṇḍyakulāśani-vaḷanāḍu.

536. 670 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in the thirty-second year of the Chōḷa king Tribhuvanachakravartin Tribhuvanavīradēva (1178—1216), who was pleased to take Madurai (Madura), Īlam (Ceylon), Karuvūr and the crowned head of the

Pāṇḍya, gift of land to the same temple by Tillai Tirunaṭṭapperumāl *alias* Vijayālaya Muttarayan of Vaḷambakuḍi. See Nos. 544 and 545 below.

537. 671 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A damaged record of Tribhuvanachakravartin, dated in his tenth year. Records gift of land.

538. 672 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the same maṅṭapa. A damaged record of Karikāla-Chōḷadēva, dated in his sixth year. Records gift of land to the temple of Neḍungaḷattu-Mahādēva, by a native of Kaḷḷikuḍi in Eyi-nāḍu, a subdivision of Pāṇḍikulāśani-Vaḷanāḍu. [Was the king the same as Āditya II, Karikāla?]

539. 673 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in Naḷa gift of the village of Kaḍaiyakkūḍi (in Vaḍagaviarnāḍu) sur-named Kamparājanallūr, by Kampayadēva-Mahārāja, son of the Mahāmaṅḍalēśvara Antambarakaṇḍaṅ Vallamarāja.

540. 674 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record of the Chōḷa king Tribhuvanachakravartin Tribhuvanavīradēva (1178—1216), “who being pleased to take Madurai (Madura), Īlam (Ceylon), Karuvūr and the crowned head of the Pāṇḍya, was pleased to perform the anointment of heroes and victors.” Records in his thirty-second year a gift of land.

541. 675 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record of Tribhuvanachakravartin Kōnērimaikonḍān. Refers to a gift of land made in accordance with an earlier charter of Parakēsari-varman *alias* Śrī-Vijayālaya-Chōḷadēva (the first of the imperial line).

542. 676 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Dated in the reign of the Vijayanagara-king Vīranārāyaṇa-Uḍaiyār (hitherto unknown), son of Bhūpati-Uḍaiyār (son of Bukka II). Records in Ś. 1334, Nandana, gift of land and a house, and permanent right of repairing to a mason who repaired the temple at his own expense.

543. 677 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in the eleventh year (Makara, Pūrva. 6, Wednesday, Rōhiṇi) of the Pāṇḍya king Sundara Pāṇḍya gift of land by the people of Miśeṅḷi-nāḍu in Teṅkarai Jayaśiṅga-kulakāla-vaḷanāḍu. See *Ep. Ind.*, Vol. XI, p. 255, where Mr. R. Sewell points out that the date suits neither the king who ascended the throne in 1251 nor him who came in 1276. [Can it be he who ascended the throne in 1270? Mr. Swamikannu Pillai fixes it on March 5th, A.D. 1264, in the reign of the first of these.]

544. 678 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the east wall of the Chandī-kēśvara shrine in the same temple. A damaged record of the Chōḷa king Tribhuvanachakravartin Rājarājadēva (III), dated in his fourth year. Records sale of land by certain members of the

assembly of Tiruneduṅgaḷam *alias* Tyāgavalli-chaturvēdimaṅ-
gaḷam, a *brahmadēya* in Vaḍagaviranāḍu, a subdivision of Pāṇḍya-
kulāśani-vaḷanāḍu. [As this inscription also refers to Anapāya
Muttaraiyan, the donor of the next inscription, this is, like the
latter, attributed to Rājarāja III.]

545. 679 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the same
shrine. A record of Chōḷa king Tribhuvanachakravartin Rāja-
rājadēva (III). Records in his fourth year that a liṅga was set up
in the first prakāra of the temple of Neduṅgaḷam-Uḍaiyār under
the name Ulaganādīśvaram-Uḍaiyār, for the merit of Tillai
Tirunattapperumāl *alias* Vijayālaya Muttaraiyar of Vaḷambakuḍi,
by one of his sons Anapāya Muttaraiyan. Mentions Periyadēvar
Tribhuvanavīradēva (i.e., Kulōttuṅga III, 1186--1216) and a previous
grant by him. So the Rājarāja referred to in this inscription
should be Rājarāja III.

546. 680 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the west wall of the same
shrine. A record of the Pāṇḍya king Jaṭavarman *alias* Tribhuvana-
chakravartin Sundara-Pāṇḍyadēva (III?). Records in his third
year (Rishabha, Pūrva. II, Monday, Pushya) gift of land for a lamp
by Arayan Sivandakālaḷagiyan of Pudevūr in Arvala-kūrṅam, a
subdivision of Rājendra-Chōḷa-vaḷanāḍu. [It is not known which
of the three kings of this name is referred to. Mr. Sewell finds the
date irregular. See *Ep. Ind.*, Vol. XI, pp. 255-6. Mr. Swamikannu
Pillai would fix it on Monday, 4th April, A.D. 1278. See *Ind. Antq.*,
1913, pp. 221-2.

547. 681 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the east wall of the Gaṇēśa
shrine in the same temple. Records in the ninth year of the
Chōḷa king Rājakēsarivarman gift of sixty-one cows for *pañchagāvya*
to the temple of Mahādēva at Tiruneduṅgaḷam, a *dēvadāna* in
Kaviranāḍu. Provision was also made for lamps, for burning
incense, etc.

548. 682 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the same
shrine. A record of the Chōḷa king Rājakēsarivarman in his third
(in figures) and sixth (in words) years. An image called Lōka-
sundara was set up in the temple of Tiruneduṅgaḷattu Āḷvār in
Kavira-nāḍu, by a native of Orriyūr. Records also a gift of land
for offerings.

549. 683 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in
the eighth year of the Chōḷa king Rājakēsarivarman gift of land
to a native of Śūralūr by the Mahēśvaras, the temple servants and
the residents of the village of Neduṅgaḷam.

550. 684 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in
the fourteenth year of the Chōḷa king Parakēsarivarman gift of
ghee for the purificatory ceremony of *agnikāryā* in the same temple,
for the merit of Śembiyan Mūvēndavēḷān of Vada Puṇaiyūr-nāḍu
who appears to have had the title Uttamaśōḷa Brahmādhirājanmi-

[The Government Epigraphist suggests that the king referred to might be Madhurāntaka Uttama Chōla.]

551. 685 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Dated in the reign of the Chōla king Rājarājakēsarivarman (I, 985—1013) “who destroyed the ships at Kāndaḷūr Śālai.” Records in his tenth year gift of gold for a lamp to the shrine of Piḷḷaiyār-Gaṇapati, in the temple of Tiruneduṅgaḷam Uḍaiyār by a certain Kōḷambanāchchan of Iḍaikkudi.

552. 686 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in the tenth year of the Chōla king Rājarājakēsarivarman (985—1013) “who destroyed the ships at śālai,” gift of paddy for offerings (twenty *kalams*).

553. 687 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the west wall of the same shrine. Dated in the ninth year of the Chōla king Rājarājakēsarivarman (985—1013). Records gift of land for feeding 550 Śiva-yōgins, during seven days' Māśi festival and Chitrai by a native of Orriyūr which was a *dēvadāna* and *brahmadēya* in Viḷā-nāḍu (thirty *kalams* by *Koḍukulavan marakāl*).

554. 688 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Dated in the eighth year of the Chōla king Rājarājakēsarivarman. Records gift of land by the assembly of Tiruneduṅgaḷam to a private person who had to provide paddy (220 *kalams*) to the temple for offerings, commencing from “the year opposite to the year opposite to” the date of grant.

555. 689 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the same shrine. The Chōla king Parakēsarivarman records in his fifteenth year gift of sheep for a lamp.

556. 690 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A damaged record of the Chōla king Parakēsarivarman, dated in his thirteenth year. Records gift of land by a private individual for the supply of paddy for offerings in the temple Kayilāyattu-Mahādēva.

557. 691 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record of the Chōla king Rājarāja-Rājakēsarivarman, dated in his fourteenth year. Mentions the destruction of the ships at śālai and the king's conquest of Gaṅgapāḍi, Vēṅgai-nāḍu, Nuḷambapāḍi and Taḍigai-vaḷi. Records also that Kamban Maṇiyan *alias* Vikramaśiṅga-mūvēnda-vēḷān made a gift of gold ornament and a copper-tipped *mattali* for the *śribali* service in the temple.

558. 692 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the Sōma-skanda shrine in the same temple. Records in Ś. 1386, Subhānu, that Araśan *alias* Vallāḷadēva of Muḷukkudi built the Raṅga-maṅṭapa of the temple and made a gift of land and a house for offerings, to the shrine of Kaḷandai-Nāyakar.

559. 693 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the west wall of the same shrine. Records in Ś. 1425, Rudhirōdgarin, gift of land for repairs,

offerings and festivals, to the temple of Tiruneduṅgaḷamudaiyā Tambirānār also called Nīlālārśōlaivanamudaiya Nāyanār, by a *sāmanta*. Refers to an earlier grant by the *sāmanta* Tirumalai-rāja.

560. 694 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the gōpura of the same temple, right of entrance. An unfinished record of a Vijayanagara king who received tribute “from all countries and from Ceylon” and witnessed the elephant hunt.

561. 695 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the gōpura of the same temple in the same place. Records gift of money for offerings by Periya-Edirilāsāmantanār, son of Vīrappanāyaka Sāmantanār *alias* Aḷagappa Sāmantanār, for the merit of his mother.

562. 696 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On a fragment built into the wall of a maṅṭapa in the same temple. Dated in the reign of the Chōḷa king Rājakēsarivarman. Records a gift of money for a lamp to the temple of Mahādēva and refers to Mīśeṅgaḷi-nāḍu and the Pāṇḍya king Varaguṇa-Mahārāja (who ascended the throne in 862). Another fragment built into the same wall refers to the reign of Madiraikoṇḍa Parakēsarivarman (905—47). The date of the record is lost.

563. 697 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On a slab set up in a street of the same village. The Nāyaka king Vijayaraṅga-Chokkanātha-Nāyaka (1705—31) records in Ś. 1650, and Kali 4829, Kīlaka, a gift of land for worship in the temple of Tiruneduṅgaḷanāthasvāmi.

*Tiruppālattuṛai.**

The large number of Rājakēsarivarman and Parakēsarivarman of the local epigraphs are not identifiable; but the Government Epigraphist has suggested that some of them at least were kings who ruled between Parāntaka I and Rājarāja I. In those days Tiruppālattuṛai was evidently a hamlet of Uttamaśīlichaturvēdi-maṅḷam, modern Uttamaśīli, which must have been founded by Uttamaśīli, son of Parāntaka I and brother of Arikulakēsari who is also referred to in some of the local inscriptions. Arikulakēsari was a general of his father's troops and married Pūri Ādichcha Piḍāriār, the daughter of Tennavan Iḷaṅgōvēḷār, who afterwards constructed the temple of Chandraśēkhara at Tiruchchendurai. See *Ep. Ind.*, Vol. VII, p. 141 and *Ep. Rep.*, 1909, p. 89. The *Mack*.

* There are two places in the Trichinopoly taluk named Tiruppālattuṛai or Tirupparāttuṛai and Tiruppāṛṛuṛai. Of these the former is south of the Kāvēri and the latter north of it. The former has got Tirupparātturainātha as its deity and the latter Tirumūlanātha. The former again is referred to by Gñānasambanda, Appar and Māṅkka-vāsaga, and the latter by the first of these alone. In the list given above Nos. 546—610 refer to the former and 611—47 to the latter, though the epigraphical reports give them under the same.

MSS. (*Ins.*, S. Dts., pp. 60-1) give three inscriptions only in this place and they are included in the following list.

564. 244 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the central shrine in the Dārukāvanēśvara temple. Records in the seventeenth year of the Chōḷa king Parakēsarivarman gift of gold for two lamps.

565. 245 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in the thirtieth year of the Chōḷa king Madiraikoṇḍa Parakēsarivarman (A.D. 905—47) gift of cows and gold.

566. 246 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. The Chōḷa king Rājakēsarivarman makes in his fourteenth year allotments of paddy for the daily requirements of the temple.

567. 247 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A damaged record of the Chōḷa king Parakēsarivarman, dated in his third year.

568. 248 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the west wall of the same shrine. A damaged record of the Chōḷa king Parakēsarivarman, the date of which is lost. Records gift of land. Incomplete.

569. 249 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A damaged and incomplete record of the Chōḷa king Parakēsarivarman, the date of which is lost.

570. 250 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A damaged and incomplete record. No king is mentioned.

571. 251 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A damaged record of the Chōḷa king Parakēsarivarman, dated in his fourth year.

572. 252 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the same shrine. Records in the thirty-third year of the Chōḷa king Parakēsarivarman gift of ninety sheep for a lamp.

573. 253 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record of the Chōḷa king Parakēsarivarman; records in his eighth year gift of land for a lamp.

574. 254 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in the eighth year of the Chōḷa king Parakēsarivarman gift of land for a lamp.

575. 255 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in the twentieth year of the Chōḷa king Madiraikoṇḍa Parakēsarivarman (A.D. 905—47) gift of gold for a lamp. Incomplete.

576. 256 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. An incomplete record of the Chōḷa king Parakēsarivarman, dated in his twenty-second year. Records a sale of land.

577. 257 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record of the Chōḷa king Parakēsarivarman *alias* Rājendra-Chōḷadēva (I, 1011—53), dated in his fifth year. The last item of conquest that is mentioned is that of Īḷa-maṇḍalam.

578. 258 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A damaged record of the Chōla king Rājakēsarivarman, dated in his twenty-seventh year.

579. 259 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Belongs to the reign of the Chōla king Parakēsarivarman. Records gift of gold for a lamp. The date of the record is doubtful.

580. 260 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Belongs to the reign of the Chōla king Parakēsarivarman. Records gift of gold for a lamp. The date of the record is lost.

581. 261 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. An incomplete record of the Chōla king Rājarājakēsarivarman, “who destroyed the ships at Kāndaḷūr”, dated in his twelfth year.

582. 262 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On a pillar of the south wall of the same shrine. Records in the ninth year of the Chōla king Parakēsarivarman, a gift of land.

583. 263 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the south base of the same shrine. Records in the twenty-eighth year of the Chōla king Madiraikoṇḍa Parakēsarivarman (905—47) gift of land for two lamps.

584. 264 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the west base of the same shrine. A damaged record of the Chōla king Rājakēsarivarman, the date of which is lost.

585. 265 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the north base of the same shrine. Records in the twenty-second year of the Chōla king Parakēsarivarman a sale of land.

586. 266 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the same base. Records in the twenty-fourth year of the Chōla king Rājarājakēsarivarman *alias* Rājarājadēva I a sale of land.

587. 267 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the east wall of the maṅṭapa in front of the same shrine. A record of the Pāṇḍya king Māra-varman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Sundara-Pāṇḍyadēva (I? 1216—35). Records in his ninth year gift of a gold ornament.

588. 268 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record of the Chōla king Tribhuvanachakravartin Kulōttuṅga-Chōladēva, “who covered the big hall with gold.” Records in his twelfth year gift of money for a lamp.

589. 269 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the east wall of the maṅṭapa in front of the central shrine in the Dārukāvanēśvara temple Tribhuvanachakravartin Kōnērinmaikoṇḍān records in his twenty-fourth year a gift of land by him made at the instance of the Tondaimān.

590. 270 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the same maṅṭapa. An incomplete record of the Chōla king Virarājēndra-Chōladēva, dated in his sixth year. Records gift of money.

591. 271 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A damaged record.

592. 272 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the east base of the same maṅṭapa. A damaged record of the Chōḷa king Rājakēsari-varman, dated in his twenty-fourth year. Contains the beginning of an inscription of Parakēsari-varman.

593. 273 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the south base of the same maṅṭapa. A much damaged record of the Chōḷa king Rājakēsari-varman, the date of which is lost.

594. 274 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the north base of the same maṅṭapa. Records gift of a lamp in the reign of the Chōḷa king Rājarājakēsari-varman *alias* Rājarājadēva I. Built in at the beginning. The date of the record is lost.

595. 275 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the same base. An incomplete record of the Chōḷa king Parakēsari-varman *alias* Rājēndra-Chōḷadēva I, dated in his fifth year. The last item of conquest is that of Ceylon. The details of the date are Tuesday, the day of Śatabhishaj, in Mēsha, which, according to Kielhorn, corresponded to Tuesday, 26th March, A.D. 1017. He also infers from this that the reign of Rājēndrachōḷa I could not have begun before the 27th March, A.D. 1012. See *Ep. Ind.*, Vol. VIII, pp. 261-2.

596. 276 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the same base. A record of the Chōḷa king Rājarājakēsari-varman *alias* Rājarājadēva I. Records in his twenty-fourth year gift of land. Quotes the thirteenth year of Śrī-Uttama-Chōḷadēva.

597. 277 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the same base. A record of the Chōḷa king whose name is doubtful. Built in at the beginning.

598. 278 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the same base. A damaged record of the Chōḷa king Rājarājakēsari-varman (985—1013), dated in his fifteenth year.

599. 279 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the same base. Records in the fifth year of the Chōḷa king Rājakēsari-varman a gift of land.

600. 280 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the east wall of the Sōma-skanda shrine in the same temple. Records the building of the maṅṭapa by Śiraimiṭpān Tiruvēgambamuḍaiyān.

601. 281 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. There is a doubtful Śāka date. Mentions Ayyan Aḍapattu Mallappa-Nāyakar.

602. 282 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the north, west and south walls of the Gaṇēśa shrine in the same temple. Dated in the reign of the Vijayanagara king Vīra-Kampana-Uḍaiyār II, son of Vīra-Bukkaṇa-Uḍaiyār. Records in Ś. 1296, Ānanda, a gift of land. *Ins., S. Dts.*, p. 60, No. 1.

603. 283 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the Subrahmaṇya shrine in the same temple. Records a sale of land in the

ninth year of the Pāṇḍya king Jaṭavarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Sundara-Pāṇḍyadēva III (1276—90) or a date corresponding to either Friday, 28th March 1259 (the eighth year of Sundara Pāṇḍya I) or Friday, 29th March 1286 (the tenth or eleventh year of Sundara Pāṇḍya II. See *Ep. Ind.*, Vol. VIII, pp. 280-1.

604. 284 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the same shrine. Records in the thirty-fifth year of Tribhuvanachakravartin Kōnērinmaikoṇḍān a gift of land. Tirupparātturai belonged to Rājagambhīravaḷaṇāḍu. See *Ins.*, S. Dts., p. 61, No. 3.

605. 285 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the east gōpura of the first prakāra of the same temple, right of entrance. Records in the twenty-seventh year of the Pāṇḍya king Māravarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Kulaśēkharadēva (E?) a gift for the merit of Uḷaguḍaiya Perumāḷ.

606. 286 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the same gōpura, left of entrance. A damaged record of the Chōḷa king Jaṭavarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Perumāḷ Sundara-Pāṇḍya, dated in his sixth year. Appears to record the gift of a lamp. [Was the king the son of Kulaśēkhara I who afterwards proved a parricide?]

607. 287 of 1903.—(Tamil.) In the same place. Records the building of the gōpura by a private individual.

608. 288 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the east gōpura of the second prakāra of the same temple, right of entrance. Dated in the reign of the Vijayanagara king Vīrapratāpa-Kṛishṇadēva-Mahārāya. Refers in Ś. 1439, Īśvara, to the king's conquests and records the gift of 10,000 *varāhās* to the Śiva and Viṣṇu temples in the Chōḷa and other districts. See S.A. Nos. 233 and 435; also p. 136 above.

609. 289 of 1903.—(Tamil.) On the same gōpura, left of entrance. A damaged record, dated in Ānanda. Mentions Rāmappanāyakkar Ayyan.

610. 290 of 1903.—(Tamil.) In the same place. Dated in the reign of the Nāyaka king Viśvanātha-Nāyakkar Tirumalai-Nāyakkar Ayyan (1623—59). Records in Ś. 1564, Chitrabhānu, a gift of land. Refers to the above inscription.

611. 169 of 1907.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the central shrine in the Ādimūlēśvara temple. The Chōḷa king Rājakēsarivarman seems to record a gift of land. The date of the record is lost.

612. 170 of 1907.—(Tamil.) On the south wall. Records in the sixteenth year of the Chōḷa king Parakēsarivarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Śrī-Vikrama-Chōḷadēva (1118—35) gift of a lamp.

613. 171 of 1907.—(Tamil.) On the west wall of the same shrine. Records in the fifth year of the Chōḷa king Rājakēsarivarman a gift of land.

614. 172 of 1907.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A damaged record of the Chōla king Rājakēsarivarman, dated in his eighth year. Seems to record a gift of land.

615. 173 of 1907.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in the eighth year of the Chōla king Parakēsarivarman gift of gold for a lamp. The village is called Tiruppārrurūrai in Uttamaśīlichaturvēdimāṅgalam, a *brahmadēya* in Teṅkarai.

616. 174 of 1907.—(Tamil.) On the west wall of the central shrine in the Ādimūlēśvara temple. Records in the eighth year of the Chōla king Parakēsarivarman a copy of an inscription of the eighteenth year of Madiraikoṇḍa Parakēsarivarman (905—47) and one of the twentieth year (of the same king).

617. 175 of 1907.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the same shrine. Records in the twenty-first year of the Chōla king Rājarāja-Rājakēsarivarman *alias* Śrī-Rājarājadēva I sale of land by the *sabhā*.

618. 176 of 1907.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. The Chōla king Rājakēsarivarman records in his eighth year gift of land to the temple of Paramēśvara at Tiruppanambūdūr in Uttamaśīlichaturvēdimāṅgalam, a *brahmadēya* in Teṅkarai, by an officer of Piḷḷaiyār Arikulakēsaridēvar (son of Parāntaka I).

619. 177 of 1907.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record of the Chōla king Parakēsarivarman. Records in his ninth year an exchange of land. Refers to an image of Sūryadēva set up in the temple at Tiruppārrurūrai.

620. 178 of 1907.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in the ninth year of the Chōla king Rājakēsarivarman the land belonging to the temple of Paramēśvara at Tiruppanambūdūr.

621. 179 of 1907.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in the ninth year of the Chōla king Parakēsarivarman gift of sheep.

622. 180 of 1907.—(Tamil.) On a stone built into the north wall of the maṅṭapa in the same temple. Records in the twenty-second year of the Pallava king Nandippōttaraiyar, "who was victorious at Teḷḷāru," gift of gold for two lamps to the temple of Mahādēva Bhaṭāra at Tiruppārrurūrai. [The king was Nandivarman III, the patron of poet Perundēvanār.]

623. 562 of 1908.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the central shrine in the Ādimūlēśvara temple. Dated in the reign of the Chōla king . . . sarivarman. Records in his eighth year gift of land to provide for offerings and the sacred bath by a native of Kīranūr.

624. 563 of 1908.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A damaged record of the Chōla king Rājakēsarivarman, the date of which is lost. Records gift of land. Mentions Korovi Nārāyaṇa bhaṭṭan of Uttamaśīlichaturvēdimāṅgalam.

625. 564 of 1908.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A damaged record of the Chōla king Rājakēsarivarman, dated in his eighth year. Records gift of gold for two lamps.

626. 565 of 1908.—(Tamil.) On the west wall of the same shrine. Records in the fifth year of the Chōla king Rājakēsarivarman gift of land for offerings and a lamp to the temple of Tiruppāṟṟuraiyūr Mahādēva at Uttamaśīli-chaturvēdimaṅalam, a *brahmadēya* on the southern bank (*teṅkaṟai*) of the river Coleroon. Mentions the temple of Tiruveṅṅāvil-Uḍaiyār at Tiruvānaikkāval.

627. 566 of 1908.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in the eighth year of the Chōla king Parakēsarivarman gift of gold for a lamp to the temple of Tiruppāṟṟurai-Mahādēva-bhaṭāra.

628. 567 of 1908.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in the eighth year of the Chōla king Rājakēsarivarman gift of land for the sacred bath on the day of the Winter Solstice (*Dakṣiṇāyana samkrānti*).

629. 568 of 1908.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in the seventh year of the Chōla king Rājakēsarivarman *alias* Chakravartin Kulōttuṅga-Chōladēva gift of land to the temple of Tiruppāṟṟurai-Uḍaiya-Mahādēva at Uttamaśīli-chaturvēdimaṅalam, a *brahmadēya* in Viḷa nāḍu, a subdivision of Pāṇḍikulāśanivaḷa-nāḍu.

630. 569 of 1908.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the same shrine. A damaged record of the Chōla king Parakēsarivarman *alias* Uttama-Chōla, the date of which is lost. Seems to record a gift of land and mentions the temple Dayāparappērambalam.

631. 570 of 1908.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in the eighth year of the Chōla king Rājakēsarivarman gift of land for offerings to the temple of Tiruppanambūdūr Paramēśvara at Uttamaśīli-chaturvēdimaṅalam, by a servant of prince (*pillaiyār*) Arikulakēsaridēva. [Mr. Krishna Sastri identifies this Rājakēsarivarman with Ariṅjaya who, he surmises, was probably the elder brother of Arikulakēsari.]

632. 571 of 1908.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the central shrine in the Ādimūlēśvara temple. A damaged record of the Chōla king Rājakēsarivarman, dated in his sixth year. Mentions Tiruppāṟṟurai.

633. 572 of 1908.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Seems to record a gift of money in the reign of the Chōla king Parakēsarivarman (905—47 A.D.), who took Maḍurai and Īlam (Ceylon). The date of the record is lost. The king was Parāntaka I (906—47).

634. 573 of 1908.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in the ninth year of the Chōla king Parakēsarivarman gift of sixteen sheep for a lamp by the *upāsakas* at Tiruppāṟṟurai.

635. 574 of 1908.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record of the Chōla king Rājakēsarivarman. Records in his eighth year a gift of land to the temple of Tiruppanambūdūr-Paramēśvara by the great assembly of Uttamaśīli-chaturvēdimāṅgalam. Mentions the servant of lord (*Ālvār*) Arikulakēsaridēva, referred to in No. 631 above. Hence Mr. Krishna Sastri believes that the king referred to is Ariñjaya.

636. 575 of 1908.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the maṅṭapa in front of the same shrine. A record of the Chōla king Parakēsarivarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Vikrama-Chōladēva (1118—35). Records in his fifth year gift of land for an evening lamp to the temple of Tiruppātturāi Mahādēva at Uttamaśīli-chaturvēdimāṅgalam, a *brahmadēya* on the southern bank (*tenkarai*) of the Coleroon.

637. 576 of 1908.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record of the Chōla king Parakēsarivarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Vikramachōladēva (1118—35). Records in his fourteenth year gift of money for a lamp by a resident of Śōlamādēvi-chaturvēdimāṅgalam, a *brahmadēya* in Viḷā-nāḍu, a subdivision of Pāṇḍikulāśani-vaḷanāḍu.

638. 577 of 1908.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Dated in the reign of the Chōla king Parakēsarivarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Vikramachōladēva (1118—35). Records in his fifteenth year gift of money for a lamp by a native of Kaṇḍiyūr.

639. 578 of 1908.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in the fourteenth year of the Chōla king Parakēsarivarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Vikramachōladēva (1118—35) gift of money (*dramma*) for an evening lamp. Mentions Innambar-nāḍu.

640. 579 of 1908.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in the sixteenth year of the Chōla king Parakēsarivarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Vikrama-chōladēva gift of money for a lamp.

641. 580 of 1908.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in the fifth year of the Chōla king Parakēsarivarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Vikrama-Chōladēva (1118—35) gift of fifteen cows for a lamp.

642. 581 of 1908.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in the fourth year of the Chōla king Parakēsarivarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Vikrama-Chōladēva (1118—35) gift of money for a lamp.

643. 582 of 1908.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the same maṅṭapa. A damaged record of the Hoysaḷa king Pratāpachakravartin Vīra-Rāmanāthadēva, dated in his second year. Records gift of land to the *maṭha* called Kākkunāyakan-*maḍam* on the northern side of the temple of Tiruppārturāi Uḍaiyār by the great assembly of Mummuḍiśōḷa-chaturvēdimāṅgalam. See N.A. 441 and 715 and Cg. 40.

644. 583 of 1908.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in the twenty-second year of the Chōla king Rājakēsarivarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Rājarājadēva (I) gift of land for feeding the Mahēśvaras at *Tirunāvukkaraiśudēvan-maḍam* near the same temple.

645. 584 of 1908.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in the fifth year of the Chōla king Tribhuvanachakravartin Rājēndra-Chōladēva gift of land to Āṇḍār-Embiraṇāmaḍam which belonged to the lineage (*santāna*) of Śēnbaikuḍimudaliār and was situated at Tiruvānaikkā.

646. 585 of 1908.—(Tamil.) On the east wall of the Nityakalyāṇi shrine in the same temple. Records in the twenty-first year of the Chōla king Tribhuvanachakravartin Rājarājadēva gift of land for feeding the Mahēśvaras in the Tirujnānasambandan-tirumaḍam situated at Tiruvānaikkā. The land was in Karuman-guṟai *alias* Parakēsarimaṅgalam, a hamlet of Uttamaśīli-chaturvēdimāṅgalam.

647. 586 of 1908.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the same shrine. Records in the twenty-second year of the Chōla king Tribhuvanachakravartin Rājarājadēva gift of land in the same village to the Nārppaṭṭeṇṇāyiravan-tirumaḍam at Tiruvānaikkā. *This maṭha was a branch of the lineage (santāna) of Tiruchchattimur-rattumudaliyār.* See N.A., 715 and Tj., 833.

*Tiruveḷḷarai.**

648. 512 of 1905.—(Tamil.) On the west wall of the central shrine in the Śiva temple. A record in the twenty-fourth year of the Chōla king Parakēsarivarman *alias* Uḍaiyār Śrī Rājēndra-Chōladēva (I, 1011—53). Records sale of land to a temple called Gaṅgairkoṇḍa-Chōlēśvaram-Uḍaiyār.

649. 513 of 1905.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record in the thirty-ninth year of the Chōla king Madiraikoṇḍa Parakēsarivarman (905—47). Registers an endowment in gold for feeding two Brāhmaṇas versed in the *Vēdās*. The temple is called Tiruvānaikkāval-Bhaṭṭāraakar at Tiruveḷḷarai.

650. 514 of 1905.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record in the second year of the Chōla king Rājakēsarivarman. Records gift of gold for one lamp. The temple is here named as in the above epigraph.

651. 515 of 1905.—(Tamil.) On the rock in front of the same temple. A record in the thirtieth year of the Chōla king Madiraikoṇḍa Parakēsarivarman (905—47). The king's name is engraved over an erasure. Records gift of gold for offerings at noon and

* This place is one of the Vaishṇavite places of worship, north of the Kāvēri. It has been sung by Periyālvār and Tirumaṅgai Ālvār. The Vaishṇavite Saint Puṇḍarikākshā, the successor of Nātha Muni, was a native of this place.

for a lamp. The temple is called Tiruvāṇaikaṛperumāṇaḍigaḷ at Tiruvellārai.

652. 516 of 1905.—(Tamil.) On the same rock. A record in the fifteenth year of the Chōḷa king Madiraikoṇḍa Parakēsarivarman (A.D. 905—47). Records gift of gold for a lamp.

653. 517 of 1905.—(Tamil.) On the same rock. A record in the twenty-first year of the Chōḷa king Madiraikoṇḍa Parakēsarivarman (905—47). Records gift of gold for a lamp by a merchant of Tiruvellārai.

654. 518 of 1905.—(Tamil.) On the same rock. A record in the thirtieth year of the Chōḷa king Rājakēsarivarman. Records gift of gold for feeding* at noon a Brāhmaṇa versed in the *Vēdās*.

655. 519 of 1905.—(Tamil.) On the same rock. A record in the third year of the Chōḷa king Rājakēsarivarman. Records gift of gold for feeding at noon Brāhmaṇas versed in the *Vēdās*.

656. 520 of 1905.—(Tamil.) On the rock in front of the Śiva temple at Tiruvellārai. An unfinished record in the fortieth year of the Chōḷa king Madiraikoṇḍa Parakēsarivarman (905—47). The inscription stops with the name of the temple, viz., Tiruvāṇaikalperumāṇaḍigaḷ.

657. 521 of 1905.—(Tamil.) On the same rock. A record in the fifteenth year of the Chōḷa king Vikrama-Chōḷa (1118—35). Records gift of land for a flower garden to the temple of Tirvāṇaikkal Mahādēvar by a person who bore the title Pāṇḍināḍu-koṇḍān.

658. 522 of 1905.—(Tamil.) On the same rock. A record in the twenty-fifth year of the Chōḷa king Rājakēsarivarman. Records gift of thirty cows for a lamp by Śembiyan Maḷanāṭṭu Vēḷān *alias* Korraṇ Māran.

659. 523 of 1905.—(Tamil.) On the same rock. A record in the thirteenth year of the Chōḷa king Madiraikoṇḍa Parakēsarivarman (905—47). Records gift of gold for a lamp.

660. 524 of 1905.—(Tamil.) On the same rock. A record in the ninth year of the Chōḷa king Parakēsarivarman. Records gift of gold for a lamp by a native of Iḍaikkāḍu, a village in Kīranūr-nāḍu, a district of Pāṇḍināḍu, who was an officer in the employ of the king. Iḍaikkāḍu is well known in the history of Tamil literature as the native place of two Siddhar poets.

661. 525 of 1905.—(Tamil.) On the same rock. A record in the fourteenth year of the Chōḷa king Madiraikoṇḍa Parakēsarivarman (905—47). Records gift of gold for a lamp by a native of Nāṅgūr, a *dēvadāna* in the Nāṅgūr-nāḍu.

662. 526 of 1905.—(Tamil.) On the same rock. A record in the thirty-sixth year of the Chōḷa king Madiraikoṇḍa Parakēsarivarman (905—47). Records gift of gold for a lamp by the arbitrator of the village.

663. 527 of 1905.—(Tamil.) On the same rock. A record in the twenty-third year of the Chōla king Madiraikoṇḍa Parakēsarivarman (905—47). Records gift of a lamp. Built in at the end.

664. 528 of 1905.—(Tamil.) On the same rock. A record of the Chōla king Parakēsarivarman. Built in at the end.

665. 529 of 1905.—(Tamil.) On the same rock. A record of the Pallava . . . ntivarman. The king is called Pallavamahārāja in the portion now accessible. End built in.

666. 530 of 1905.—(Tamil.) On another portion of the same rock. A record in the thirtieth year of the Chōla king Madiraikoṇḍa-Parakēsarivarman. Records a gift of gold. Built in at the beginning.

667. 531 of 1905.—(Tamil.) In the rock-cut cave in the Puṇḍarīkāksha-Perumāḷ temple in the same village, left of entrance. A much damaged record of the Chōla king Rājarāja I. Words and phrases belonging to the historical introduction of Rājarāja I can be traced here and there.

668. 532 of 1905.—(Tamil.) On one of the pillars in the same cave. A much damaged record in the second year of the Chōla king Rājakēsarivarman. Only the name of the king can be made out.

669. 533 of 1905.—(Tamil.) On the same pillar. A damaged record of the Chōla king Rājarāja-Rājakēsarivarman I (985—1013). Seems to register allotments for the daily requirements of a temple.

670. 534 of 1905.—(Tamil.) On the second pillar in the same cave. A record in the eighth year of the Chōla king Parakēsarivarman. Registers a gift made by the queen of Uḍaiyār Ānaimēṟṟuñjinār to the God Śrī-Kṛishṇa and his consort Rukmiṇi of the temple at Tiruveḷḷarai. [Venkayya says that this is the earliest epigraphical mention of a shrine to Kṛishṇa and Rukmiṇi.]

671. 535 of 1905.—(Tamil.) On the same pillar. A damaged record in the fifteenth year of the Chōla king Parakēsarivarman. Mentions the big temple at Tiruveḷḷarai.

672. 536 of 1905.—(Tamil.) On the third pillar in the same cave. A damaged record in the fifth year of the Chōla king Parakēsarivarman “who took the head of the Pāṇḍya.” See No. 708.

673. 537 of 1905.—(Tamil.) On the same pillar. A record in the tenth year of the Pallava king Nandivarman. Mentions Nandivarman, who is described as the forehead ornament of the Pallava family and a certain Viśayanallūḷan.

674. 538 of 1905.—(Tamil.) On the fourth pillar in the same cave. A damaged record in the thirteenth year of the Chōla king Rājakēsarivarman (Rājarāja I, 985—1013) “who destroyed the ships at Kāṇḍalūr.” Records gift of gold.

675. 539 of 1905.—(Tamil.) On the same pillar. A mutilated and damaged record. Seems to make provision for offerings.

676. 540 of 1905.—(Tamil.) On the same pillar. A damaged record. Mentions the God Śrī-Kṛishṇa and refers to the setting up of an image of his consort Rukmiṇi in the big temple at Tiruveḷḷarai; registers provision made for offerings to the latter. See No. 670 above.

677. 541 of 1905.—(Tamil.) On the margin of the well called Nālumūlaikēṇi in the same village. A record in the fifth year of the Pallava king Dantivarman. Records the building of the well. The inscription has been edited in *Ep. Ind.*, Vol. XI, p. 154 ff.

678. 542 of 1915.—(Tamil.) In the same place. A record in the eighth year of the Hoysaḷa king Vīra-Rāmanāthadēva. Records that a merchant (*vāṇigan*) repaired the well here called "the big well built by a merchant" which had suffered considerable damage from floods and other causes.

679. 543 of 1905.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the ruined temple in the same village. A fragmentary record. Seems to register a sale of land.

680. 81 of 1910.—(Tamil.) On the rock in front of the Jambunāthasvāmin temple. A mutilated record of the Chōḷa king Parakēsarivarman, dated in his third year. Seems to record a gift of land to the temple of Tiruvāṇaikkal-Perumāṇaḍigaḷ at Tiruveḷḷarai. The land was situated to the west of the channel Mīyūr-vāyttaḷai of the *brahmadēya* village Nṛipatuṅgamaṅgala, evidently founded by or named after the Pallava king Nṛipatuṅga-varman.

681. 82 of 1910.—(Tamil.) On the same rock. Records in the thirty-second year of the Chōḷa king Madiraikoṇḍa Parakēsarivarman (Parāntaka I) gift of gold for a lamp to the same temple.

682. 83 of 1910.—(Tamil.) On the same rock. A mutilated and damaged record of the Chōḷa king Rājarājakēsarivarman (985—1013) "who was pleased to destroy the ships at Kāṇdalūr-Śālai," dated in his eleventh year. Records gift of gold for offerings to the temple of Paramēśvara of Śrī-Āṇaikkal.

683. 84 of 1910.—(Tamil of the ninth century.) On the same rock. Records in the thirteenth year of the Pāṇḍya king Māraṅjadaiyan gift of gold for a lamp to the temple of Tiruvāṇaikkal-Perumāṇaḍigaḷ at Tiruveḷḷarai by king Pāṇḍya Mahārāja *alias* Māraṅjadaiyan. A portion of the historical introduction of Rājendra Chōḷa I is engraved below the inscription. The Government Epigraphist identifies Māraṅjadaiyan with his namesake of the Trichinopoly cave inscription and Varaguṇa-Pāṇḍya who ascended the throne in A.D. 862. See *Ep. Ind.*, Vol. XI, p. 253, where Mr. Sewell discusses the date and points out that the details (Monday, Aśvini, in Vriśchika) corresponded to 22nd November

A.D. 874. Mr. Sewell deduces from this that he should have succeeded to the throne between March 22nd and November 22nd, A.D. 862.

684. 85 of 1910.—(Tamil.) On the same rock. A mutilated record of the Chōla king Vikrama-Chōladēva (1118—35), dated in his fourteenth year. Seems to register a gift of land to a minor shrine.

685. 86 of 1910.—(Tamil.) On the same rock. Dated in the reign of the Chōla king Madiraikoṇḍa-Parakēsarivarman (905—47). Provides in his thirty-seventh year gold for feeding in the same temple a Brāhmaṇa who was well versed in the *Vēdās*.

686. 87 of 1910.—(Tamil.) On the same rock. Records in the fifteenth year of the Chōla king Vikrama-Chōladēva gift of gold for a lamp to the temple of Tiruvāṇaikkal-Uḍaiyār at Tiruveḷḷarai, in Vaḍagarai-nāḍu, a subdivision of Tribhuvanamuḷuduḍai vaḷanāḍu.

687. 88 of 1910.—(Tamil.) On the same rock. A record of the Pallava king Pallava-Mahārāja *alias* Danti-Nandivarman (i.e., Nandivarman III, son of Danti). Mentions in his sixth year, the assembly of Tiruveḷḷarai, a certain feudatory Mārapiḍugu-Ilaṅgōvēḷān Śāttan and the temple Perungāvīḍi-Śaḍaiyanpaḷḷi. As the rock-cut tank in this village was called *mārpiḍuguperuṅkiṇaru* it is evident that he must have excavated it. Nandivaram was the victor at Teḷḷāru and the hero of *Nandikkalambakam*.

688. 89 of 1910.—(Tamil.) On the same rock. A mutilated record of the Chōla king Parakēsarivarman, dated in his eighth year. Records gift of gold for a lamp.

689. 90 of 1910.—(Tamil.) On the same rock. A mutilated record of the Chōla king Madiraikoṇḍa-Parakēsarivarman (905—47), dated in his second year. Records gift of gold for a lamp.

690. 91 of 1910.—(Tamil.) On the same rock. A mutilated record of the Chōla king Madiraikoṇḍa-Parakēsarivarman (905—47), dated in his eleventh year. Records gift of gold for a lamp.

Uyyakoṇḍān Tirumalai.

The ancient name of this place was Nandivarma-maṅgalam evidently as a result of its foundation by the Pallava Nandivarman. After the tenth year of Rājarāja (I) it seems to have been changed into Rājāśraya-chaturvēdi-maṅgalam. See No. 701 below. It has been identified with Kaṅkuḍi of the *Periapurāṇa*.

691. 455 of 1908.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the central shrine in the Ujjīvanāthasvāmin temple. An incomplete record of the Chōla king Rājarāja-Rājakēsarivarman *alias* Rājarājadēva (I), dated in his twenty-seventh year. Records gift of ninety sheep for a lamp to the temple of Viḷumiyār at Kaṅkuḍi in Rājāśraya-chaturvēdimāṅgalam in Pāṇḍikulāśanivaḷanāḍu. The donor was the queen Nakkan Arumoḷi *alias* Piridimādēviyār.

692. 454 of 1908.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the same shrine. Dated in the reign of the Chōla king Uttama-Chōla *alias* Parakēsarivarman. Seems to register in Ś. 901 and Kāliyuga 4080 a gift of land for offerings. Built in at the end.

693. 457 of 1908.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the central shrine in the same temple. Records in the seventh year of the Chōla king Uḍaiyār-Rājarājadēva gift of gold for festivals to the temple of Uyyakoṇḍanāyanār in Rājāśraya-chaturvēdimāṅalam, a *brahmadēya* in Uraiyūr-kūrṅam, a subdivision of Tenkarai Kēraḷāntakavaḷanāḍu.

694. 458 of 1908.—(Tamil.) On the south and east walls of the same shrine. Built in at the beginning and in the middle. Records gift of land for offerings to the temple of Tirukaṅkuḍi Paramēśvara in Nandivanmamaṅalam, a *brahmadēya* on the southern bank (*tenkarai*), by Parāntakan Mādēvaḍigaḷ *alias* Śembiyanmādēvi. Mentions the channel Vairamēgha-vāyakkāl. The name of the king and the date of the record are lost. [Vairamēghavāyakkāl was not improbably named after the Pallava king Nandivarman III who had the surname Vairamēgha after his maternal grandfather Gōvinda III.]

695. 459 of 1908.—(Tamil.) On the east wall of the same shrine. Records in the tenth year of the Chōla king Rājarājakēsari-varman “who destroyed the ships at Kāndaḷūr,” gift of a gold crown set with pearls, rubies and diamonds to the temple of Tirukkaṅkuḍi-Āḷvār-Viḷumiyār (an earlier name for Ujjīvanātha) at Nandivanmamaṅalam, by queen Pirāntakan Mādēvaḍigaḷ *alias* Śembiyan-Mādēviyār, who gave birth to Gaṇḍan Madhurāntakan *alias* Uttamachōladēva.

696. 460 of 1908.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the first prākāra in the same temple. Records in the thirtieth year of the Chōla king Kulōttuṅga-Chōladēva gift of land to the temple of Tirukkaṅkuḍi-Viḷumiyadēva at Rājāśraya-chaturvēdimāṅalam, a *brahmadēya* in Uraiyūr-kūrṅam, a subdivision of Rājamahēndravaḷanāḍu. Mentions Nerkuṅṅam, hamlet to the north of *Kuṇḍūr* *alias* Rājanārāyaṇa-chaturvēdimāṅalam, which was a *brahmadēya* in Urattūr-kūrṅam, a subdivision of Irattapāḍikoṇḍa-Chōlavaḷanāḍu.

697. 461 of 1908.—(Tamil.) On the east wall of the same prākāra. Records in the tenth year of the Chōla king Parakēsari-varman *alias* Rājēndra-Chōladēva (I, 1011—53) gift of ninety-six sheep for a lamp to the temple of Śrī-Kaṅkuḍi-Viḷumiyadēva in Uraiyūr-kūrṅam, a subdivision of Kēraḷāntaka-Vaḷanāḍu.

698. 462 of 1908.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in the third year of the Chōla king Rājakēsari-varman *alias* Uḍaiyār Śrī-Vīra-rājēndradēva gift of taxes for a festival in the same temple

from the two *dēvadāna* villages of Tirukkaṅkuḍi and Śrī-Kārai-nallūr. The king granted this while he was seated on the throne called *Abhimānarāman* at Tiruvāṇaikkāval. *Dāśabanda* is one of the taxes enumerated.

699. 463 of 1908.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Refers in the third year of the Chōla king Parakēsarivarman *alias* Rājendra Chōladēva (I, 1011—53) to the survey of the lands belonging to the temple and to the change of tenants holding these lands under orders of the king who was residing in his place at Paḷaiyāru.

700. 464 of 1908.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in the tenth year of the Chōla king Parakēsarivarman *alias* Rājendra-Chōladēva gift of paddy for the requirements of the bathing ceremony of the good on the birthday of the king (Tiruvādirai).

701. 465 of 1908.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the same *prākāra*. Records in the second year of the Chōla king Rājākēsarivarman *alias* Uḍaiyār Śrī-Rājendra-Chōladēva gift of money for three lamps by a Brāhmaṇi of Rājāśraya-chaturvēdimāṅalam.

702. 466 of 1908.—(Tamil.) On the rock near the north-east corner of the central shrine in the same temple. A damaged record. Records gift of gold for the purchase of a land by a certain Mayilaittiṇḍan. Mentions the weight called *Vidēlviḍugu-kal* and the channel *Vayiramēgha-vāyakkāl*. See No. 694 above.

703. 467 of 1908.—(Tamil.) On a pillar in the inner enclosure of the same temple. An unfinished record of the Chōla king Parakēsarivarman *alias* Rājendra-Chōladēva (I, 1011—53), dated in twelfth year. Records that a native of Muruganallūr in Puliyūr-kōttam, a district of Arumolīdēva-vaḷanāḍu, made provision for the feeding of ascetics at the foot of the sacred hill (*tirumalai*) on which the temple stands.

704. 468 of 1908.—(Tamil.) On another pillar in the same place. Records in the twenty-ninth year of the Chōla king Rājākēsarivarman *alias* Rājarājadēva (I, 985—1013) gift of a gold ornament (*paṭṭam*) called Jayaṅḡḍaśōḷa to the God Viḷumiyadēva at Tirukkaṅkuḍi.

705. 469 of 1908.—(Tamil.) On the third pillar in the same place. Records in the twenty-ninth year of the Chōla king Rājarājakēsarivarman *alias* Rājarājadēva gift of ninety sheep for lamps by a native of Urattūr-kūrṅam in Kō-nāḍu.

706. 470 of 1908.—(Tamil.) On the fourth pillar in the same place. Dated in the reign of the Chōla king Parakēsarivarman. Records in his tenth year gift of 140 sheep for two lamps to the temple of Tirukkaṅkuḍi-Paramēśvara in Nandivanmamaṅalam, a *brahmadēya* on the southern bank (of the Kāvēri) by Vīranārāyaṇan Śembiyan Mārāyan, a servant of Viraśōḷa-Iḷaṅḡovelār of Koḍambālūr in Urattūr-kūrṅam. The Government Epigraphist suggests that Parāntaka I should have been the king intended.

For another reference to Viraśōḷa Ilaṅgōvēḷar see No. 323 of 1903 at Tiruchchenduṛai.

707. 471 of 1908.—(Tamil.) On the fifth pillar in the same place. Records in the thirteenth year of the Chōḷa king Parakēsarivarman (evidently Parāntaka I) gift of ninety sheep for a lamp by a Brāhmaṇi.

708. 472 of 1908.—(Tamil.) On the same pillar. Records in the second year of the Chōḷa king Parakēsarivarman “who took the head of Vira-Pāṇḍya” gift of ninety sheep for a lamp by Irungōlakkōn *alias* Pugaḷvippiragaṇḍan Avanivallan. [Mr. Krishna Sastri identifies this king with Sundarachōḷa Parāntaka II.]

709. 473 of 1908.—(Tamil.) On the sixth pillar in the same place. An incomplete record of the Chōḷa king Parakēsarivarman *alias* Rājendra-Chōḷadēva (I, 1012—43), dated in his third year. Records the survey of the temple lands mentioned in No. 699 above.

710. 474 of 1908.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the shrine of the Goddess in the same temple. A record of the Vijayanagara king Mallikārjunarāya-Mahārāya, son of Vīrapratāpa Dēvarāya-Mahārāya, “who was pleased to witness the elephant hunt.” Records in Ś. 1377, Yuvan, gift of land for offerings and festivals to the temple of Viḷumiya-Nāyanār at Uyyakoṇḍār Tirumalai, a *brahmadēya* in Tenkarai Rājagambhīra-vaḷanāḍu, by a certain Dēvarāya-Nāyaka.

711. 475 of 1908.—(Tamil.) On two fragments of stones lying in the courtyard of the same temple. Records gift by a native of Kūrūr in Kunṛa-kkūrām, a subdivision of Vaḍagarai Uttuṅga-tuṅga vaḷanāḍu.

712. 476 of 1908.—(Tamil.) On the inner gōpura of the same temple, left of entrance. An unfinished record of Tribhuvana-chakravartin Kōnērinmaikoṇḍān, dated in his twenty-first year. Records gift of land to the temple of Viḷumiyadēvar at Tirukkarḷkudi, a village in Uraiyūr-kūrām, a subdivision of Rāja-gambhīra-vaḷanāḍu. Mentions Jagadēkavīra-chaturvēdimāṅgalam and its hamlets Jayaṅgoṇḍaśōḷanallūr and Śōḷakulanallūr.

713. 477 of 1908.—(Tamil.) In the same place. An unfinished record of the Chōḷa king Rājakēsarivarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Kulōttuṅga-Chōḷadēva. Contains only the historical introduction beginning with *pūmannu-padumam*.

714. 478 of 1908.—(Tamil.) On the east wall of the same gōpura. An unfinished record of the Chōḷa king Rājakēsarivarman *alias* Chakravartin Kulōttuṅga-Chōḷadēva (I), dated in his forty-eighth year.

715. 479 of 1908.—(Tamil and Grantha.) On the east and north walls of the same gōpura. Records in the fourth year of the

Chōla king Tribhuvanachakravartin Kulōttuṅga-Chōladēva, that the *bhattas* of Rājāśraya-chaturvēdimāṅgalam laid down, on the authority of the *śāstrās*, the profession to be followed by the anulōma-sect called Rathakāras. [The inscription is of high value and interest as it illustrates the way in which social and caste questions were settled in those days. For a full summary of it, which is too long to be quoted here, see *Mad. Ep. Rep.*, 1909, pp. 95-6.]

716. 95 of 1892.—(Tamil.) On the east wall of the first prākāra of the Ujjivanātha temple. A record of the tenth year of Kō-Rājarājakēsarivarman.

717. 96 of 1892.—(Tamil.) On a pillar in the south-east corner of the verandah surrounding the shrine. A gift of a lamp in the thirty-fourth year of Maduraikoṇḍa Parakēsarivarman (Parāntaka I) by Parāntaka Mādēvaḍigaḷār, queen of Kaṇḍarādittanār (the son of Parāntaka). Gaṇḍarāditya was the author of the *Tiruvīśaippā*. *S.I.I.*, Vol. II, No. 75, pp. 374-5.

718. 97 of 1892.—(Tamil.) On the outside of the first prākāra of the same temple, right of entrance. A record of the seventh year of Parakēsarivarman Rājēndrachōḷa (I, ? 1012—43).

719. 98 of 1892.—(Tamil.) In front of No. 97. A record of the fifth year of Rājakēsarivarman Vīra Rājēndradēva (I, ? 1064—70).

720. 99 of 1892.—(Tamil.) In the gōpura of the second prākāra of the same temple, left of entrance. A record of Rājakēsarivarman Kulōttuṅgachōladēva, date of which is lost.

Tiruverumbūr.

721. 100 of 1892.—(Tamil.) On the base of the north wall of the first prākāra of the Pipīlikēśvara temple. A record of the Chōla king Madiraikoṇḍa Kō-Parakēsarivarman, dated in his thirty-sixth year (i.e., A.D. 942).

722. 101 of 1892.—(Tamil.) On the base of the south wall of the first prākāra. A record of the Chōla king Kō-Rājakēsarivarman, dated in his sixth year.

723. 96 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the central shrine. A record, dated in the twenty-third year (of a certain king), regarding the construction of, and the opening of, a channel for irrigation, on payment of 410 *kaḷaṅjus* of gold.

724. 97 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record of the Chōla king Rājakēsarivarman *alias* Rājarājadēva (I), dated in his twenty-fifth year. Records gift of 5 *kaḷaṅjus* of gold for a lamp to the temple of the Ālvār on the hill (Tirūmalai-Ālvār) at Tiruverumbiyūr in Śrī-Kāṅṭha-chaturvēdimāṅgalam which was a *brahmadēya* in Viḷa-nāḍu, a subdivision of Teṅkarai-Pāṇḍikulāśani-vaḷanāḍu.

725. 98 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record of the Chōla king Rājarājakēsarivarman, “who destroyed the ships at

Kāndaḷūr-śālai," dated eleventh year. Records gift of 34 sheep for a lamp to the shrine of Gaṇapati in the same temple. The donor was one of the managing members of the village assembly (*āluṅgaṇattār*).

726. 99 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record of the Chōḷa king Parakēsarivarman *alias* Śrī-Rājēndra-Chōḷadēva I, dated in his fifth year. Registers a gift of land for offerings to the temple of Tirumalai Āḷvār by the residents of Tiruveṇṇumbiyūr in Vaḍakavīra-nāḍu, a subdivision of Tenkarai-Pāṇḍikulāśani-vaḷa-nāḍu. The grant was made in the twenty-first year of Rājarāja I. Mentions the measuring rod *māḷigai-kōl*.

727. 100 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record of the Chōḷa king Parakēsarivarman *alias* Śrī-Rājēndra-Chōḷadēva I, dated in his third year. Records gift of eight *kāśus* for a lamp to the temple of Tiruveṇṇumbīśvaramuḍaiya-Mahādēva, by one of the managing members of the assembly (*āluṅgaṇattār*) of Śrīkaṇṭhachaturvēdimaṅgalam, a *brahmadēya* in Vilānāḍu which was a subdivision of Pāṇḍi-kulāśani-vaḷanāḍu.

728. 101 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record of the Chōḷa king Rājakēsarivarman, dated seventh year, Makara, Tuesday, Ārdra. Records gift of land for feeding three Śivayōgins and two Brāhmaṇas in the choultry on the sacred hill of the Āḷvār at Tiruveṇṇumbiyūr. A portion of the inscription is covered by the water cistern. The Epigraphist believes that the Rājakēsarivarman of this inscription is the same as the one referred to in 731, 732, 754, 757 and 760 below and that he should be earlier than Parāntaka I not only on palæographical grounds, but on the ground that these inscriptions refer to the place as Eṇṇumbiyūr and not Ten-Kāilāsa as in Parāntaka's records. Mr. Swamikannu Pillai shows from the chronological data of these that there are five possibilities of chronological sequence among them between 850 and 907 A.D., viz., (1) 29th May 866 to 13th January 889; (2) 25th May 869 to 10th January 872; (3) 15th June 886 to 2nd January 889; (4) 30th May 893 to 16th January 896; and (5) 26th May 896 to 11th January 899. See *Ep. Rep.*, 1915, p. 72. So the possible dates of the present inscription are 29th May 866, 25th May 869, 15th June 886, 30th May 893 and 26th May 896. It should thus belong to a Rājakēsarivarman before Parāntakā I,—not improbably Āditya I.

729. 102 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record of the Chōḷa king Rājakēsarivarman, dated in his seventh year. Records sale of land for digging a channel from the tank at Śrīkaṇṭhachaturvēdimaṅgalam for irrigating the lands purchased from the assembly of Peruveṅgūr.

730. 103 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record of the Chōḷa king Rājakēsarivarman, dated in his fifth year. Registers

gift of land for feeding fifteen Brāhmaṇas by Vēḷān Viranāraṇan *alias* Śembiyan Vēdivēḷār of Śirudavūr in Kīḷiyūr-nāḍu.

731. 104 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record of the Chōḷa king Rājakēsarivarman, dated in his seventh year Makara, Thursday, Mūla. Records sale of land by the assembly of Peruveṅgūr to Vēḷān Viranāraṇan *alias* Śembiyan Vēdivēḷān mentioned in the above epigraph. He is here stated to have constructed the *śrīvimāna* of Tiruveṅumbiyūr-Āḷvār. Mentions Murukkūr, a hamlet of Uttamaśīli-chaturvēdimaṅgalam. Corresponding to the five dates given in No. 728 above, this inscription has the five possible dates 13th January 869, 10th January 872, 2nd January 889, 15th January 896 and 11th January 899.

732. 105 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record of the Chōḷa king Rājakēsarivarman, dated in his seventh year Simha, Saturday, Rōhiṇi. Records sale of the right of levying a definite quantity of paddy on lands by the assembly of Śrīkaṇṭha-chaturvēdimaṅgalam, to Śembiyan Vēdivēḷān mentioned above for the purpose of digging the village tank. Corresponding to the five dates given in 728 and 731 this inscription has the five possible dates 14th August 868, 11th August 871, 3rd August 889, 16th August 895 and 12th August 898.

733. 106 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A damaged record of the Chōḷa king Rājakēsarivarman *alias* Chakravartin Kulōttuṅga-Chōḷadēva I, dated in his thirty-seventh year.

734. 107 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A damaged record. Seems to record a gift of land for offerings to Piḷḷaiyār Kshētrapālādēvan in the same temple. It is stated that Śrīkaṇṭha-chaturvēdimaṅgalam was a *brahmadēya* in Mīgōḷai-nāḍu, a subdivision of Pāṇḍikulāśani-vaḷanāḍu.

735. 108 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the north and west wall of the same shrine. A record of the Chōḷa king Madiraikoṇḍa Parakēsarivarman, dated in his thirty-sixth year. Records a sale of land to Śāttan Taṇakkan of Śiruvaḷi-nāḍu who set up the image of Umābhattāraki in the temple of Tiruveṅumbiyūr-Āḷvār.

736. 109 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record of the Chōḷa king Rājarājakēsarivarman *alias* Rājarājadēva I, dated in his twenty-seventh year. Records gift of land for two lamps. Reference is made to a general tour of inspection by the king (*dēvargal*) when Kāḷi Ādittan appears to have audited the accounts of the temple. [The inscription is of value in showing that the financial control of the temples lay in the hands of the king.]

737. 110 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the west wall of the same shrine. A record of the Chōḷa king Rājakēsarivarman, dated in nineteenth year, registering a gift of land for a lamp.

738. 111 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record of the Chōḷa king Madiraikoṇḍa Parakēsarivarman (Parāntaka I),

dated in his thirtieth year, registering a gift of land for a lamp by a native of Erumbiyūr to the temple of Tenkayilāyattu-Mahādēva at Śrīkaṅṭha-chaturvēdimāṅalam.

739. 112 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record of the Chōḷa king Rājakēsarivarman, dated in his seventh year. Registers gift of land for the maintenance of a watchman. The land was purchased from the money granted by Veḷān Viranāraṇan *alias* Śembiyan Vēdivēḷān of Śiruduvūr in Kīḷiyūr-nāḍu, who had built the central shrine. [The king was probably the same as in 731 and 732.]

740. 113 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. An unfinished record of the Chōḷa king Parakēsarivarman, dated in his fifteenth year. Records gift of land for offerings to Āḷvār Tribhuvana-sundarar at Tiruveṇṇumbiyūr.

741. 114 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record of the Chōḷa king Rājakēsarivarman, dated in his fourth year. Records gift of fifteen *kalañjus* of gold for burning a lamp and for bringing a pot of water from the river every day to the temple of Tenkailāyattu-Mahādēva at Śrī-kaṅṭhachaturvēdimāṅalam. The Government Epigraphist points out that as the name Ten-Kailāsa came to be given to the temple in the time of Parāntaka I, the Rājakēsarivarman of this inscription should have been some *successor* of his, not improbably Rājarāja I.

742. 115 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. An unfinished record of the Chōḷa king Madiraikoṇḍa Parakēsarivarman (Parāntaka I), dated in his twenty-sixth year. Provides for offerings to the same God.

743. 116 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record of the Chōḷa king Rājarājakēsarivarman (Rājarāja I), dated in his seventh year. Registers gift of money for feeding on the sacred hill six Brāhmaṇas versed in the *Vēdās*, by Ilāḍarāyar Puḡaḷvippavargaṅḍan Vīraśōḷan. [This feudatory of Rājarāja I presented a gift to a temple at Tiruppānmalai in North Arcot district. See *Ep. Ind.*, Vol. IV, p. 136 ff., and N.A. 632.]

744. 117 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record of the Chōḷa king Rājakēsarivarman, dated in his fifth year. Registers gift of land by Tāyan Kaṅamuḍaiyān for a lamp to the temple of Mahādēva on the sacred hill at Śrīkaṅṭha-chaturvēdimāṅalam, which was a *brahmadēya* on the southern bank of the river Kāvēri.

745. 118 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record of the Chōḷa king Rājakēsarivarman, dated in his nineteenth year. Records gift of land for a lamp and offerings by a Brāhmaṇa lady of Timmigudi who built the shrine of Ādittabhaṭṭāraka on the hill.

746. 119 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record of the Chōla king Rājakēsarivarman, dated in his eighteenth year, registering gift of land for a lamp to the temple of Tenkayilāyattu Mahādēva at Śrīkaṅṭhachaturvēdimaṅgalam. See No. 741 above.

747. 120 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the west and south walls of the same shrine. A record of the Chōla king Parakēsarivarman *alias* Rājēndra-Chōladēva I, dated in his seventh year, granting remission of taxes to the temple of Eṟumbiyūr Ālvār at Śrīkaṅṭhachaturvēdimaṅgalam, a *brahmadēya* in Mīgōlai which was a subdivision of Tenkarai Paṅḍikulāśani-vaḷanāḍu by the assembly (which received 202 *kāśus*).

748. 121 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the same shrine. A record of the Chōla king Parakēsarivarman *alias* Uḍaiyār Śrī-Rājēndradēva (1050—62), dated in his fifth year, recording gift of money for a lamp-stand by a woman servant (*peṇḍāṭṭi*) belonging to *Uyyakonḍān-terinda-tirumañjanattār-vēlam* at Gaṅgairkonḍaśōḷapuram.

749. 122 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record of the Chōla king Rājarājakēsarivarman (Rājarāja I), dated in his sixteenth year. Remission of taxes on the *dēvadānā* lands belonging to the temple on payment of a fixed sum of money. The assembly receives fifty *kaḷaṅjus* from the temple and undertakes to pay the tax on $7\frac{3}{4}$ *mās* of its land.

750. 123 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record of the Chōla king Rājakēsarivarman, dated in his third year, registering sale of land by the residents of Eṟumbiyūr and the assembly of Śrīkaṅṭhachaturvēdimaṅgalam. Built in in the middle.

751. 124 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record of Rājēndra-Chōla I. Built in at the beginning. Records gift of ninety sheep for a lamp by Māran Kāri. The same individual seems to have made a gift of lamp to the God Chandēśvara.

752. 125 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. An incomplete record of the Chōla king Rājarājakēsarivarman *alias* Rājarājadēva I, dated in his twenty-fourth year. Records gift of gold ($7\frac{1}{2}$ *kaḷaṅjus*).

753. 126 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record of the Chōla king Rājakēsarivarman, dated in his fifth year, recording gift of forty-five sheep for a lamp.

754. 127 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record of the Chōla king Rājakēsarivarman, dated in his sixth year, Makara, Tuesday, Svāti, recording gift of land for feeding in the choultry on the sacred hill of Tiruveṟumbiyūr-Ālvār, a Brāhmaṇa versed in the *Vēdās*. The assembly met in the hall (*tiruchitrakūṭa*) of this village.

755. 128 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record of the Chōla king Parakēsarivarman, dated in his sixteenth year, registering gift of land for offerings to the temple of the Ālvār on the sacred hill at Tiruveṟumbiyūr by the residents of the same village which is here stated to be in Kavira-nāḍu.

756. 129 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record of Chōla king Rājakēsarivarman, dated in his third year, registering gift of land by the assembly for singing the *tiruppadiyam* in the temple accompanied by *uḍukkai* and *tālam*. The person mentioned in No. 731 above made the purchase and assigned it to the temple. Refers also to a boundary dispute (*śīma-vivādam*).

757. 130 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record of the Chōla king Rājakēsarivarman, dated in his sixth year, Makara, Tuesday, Ārdra, registering gift of land for feeding Brāhmaṇas versed in the *Vēdās*.

758. 131 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record of the Chōla king Rājakēsarivarman, dated in his sixth year, registering sale of land by the assembly of Śrī-Kaṅṭha-chaturvēdimāṅgalam for the *madaivilāgam* of the temple.

759. 132 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record of the Chōla king Rājakēsarivarman, dated in his fifth year, registering gift of thirty-four sheep for a lamp and a lamp-stand.

760. 133 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record of the Chōla king Rājakēsarivarman, dated in his fifth year, Mithuna, Wednesday, Svāti, registering a decision of the village assembly that no taxes should be levied on the temple belongings.

761. 134 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record giving in detail all the items of expenditure for which land had been purchased by Śembiyan Vēdivēḷān from the assembly of Peruveṅgūr. See No. 730 above.

762. 135 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the maṅṭapa in front of the same shrine. A record of the Chōla king Rājarājadēva, dated in his fourth year, registering gift of a lamp-stand to the temple of Tiru-Eṟumbiyūr-uḍaiya-Nāyanār by a native of Tirunelvēli in Pāṅḍimaṅḍalam.

763. 136 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record of the Chōla king Tribhuvanachakravartin Rājarājadēva (III), dated in his third year, Kumbha, ba. di. 12, Wednesday, Uttarāshāḍa, registering a gift of land. Śrīkaṅṭhachaturvēdimāṅgalam also called Malari, was a *brahmadēya* in Mīgōḷai-nāḍu, a subdivision of Tenkarai-Pāṅḍyakulāśani-vaḷanāḍu. The date corresponded to February 13, A.D. 1219.

764. 137 of 1914.—(Tamil.) At entrance into the kitchen in the same temple, right side. A record of the Chōla king Para-

kēsarivarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Vikrama-Chōladēva (1118--35), dated in his ninth year, registering a sale of land to the temple of Tiruverumbiyūr-malai-Mahādēva and states that the assembly met together in the temple of Tirumērkōyil Ālvār when ordering the sale. Beginning lost.

765. 138 of 1914.—(Tamil.) In the same place. A record of the Chōla king Rājakēsarivarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Vikrama-Chōladēva (1118—35), dated in his seventh year, recording gift of land for offerings and for feeding five strangers every day in the temple of Tiruverumbiyūr Āṇḍār.

766. 139 of 1914.—(Tamil.) At the same entrance, left side. A badly damaged record of the Chōla king Rājakēsarivarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Kulōttuṅga-Chōladēva, dated in his fourth year. Begins with the introduction *Pūmēvuvalāra*, etc.

767. 140 of 1914.—(Tamil.) In the same place. A damaged record of the Chōla king Vikrama-Chōla. Seems to register a gift of land for offerings.

768. 141 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the first prākāra of the same temple. A record of the Pāṇḍya king Māravarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Sundarapāṇḍyadēva, dated in his eighth year, and one thousand and ninth day, gift of the village of Erumaikkulam in Ten-Kalavaḷi-nāḍu for a festival called after Piḷḷaiyār Bagavadi-Ālvār. The order was issued by Maḷavarāyan.

769. 142 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A damaged record of the Chōla king Parakēsarivarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Rājarājadēva III, dated in his twenty-ninth year, śu. di. 14, Monday, Magha. Records gift of land. The week day, it has been suggested, should be *Sunday* and the date would then correspond to 12th February, A.D. 1245.

Trichinopoly.

770-771. 411 of 1904.—(Pallava Grantha and Tamil.) On the outer row of pillars in the upper rock-cut cave. A partly damaged record. The inscription contains a number of *birudas* in Sanskrit, a few in Tamil and the rest apparently in Telugu. This inscription seems to have been continued on the pillar forming part of the outer wall of the central shrine to its left, but a few letters only of the first line can now be seen on it. See *Ep. Ind.*, Vol. I, pp. 58—60, where Dr. Hultzsch edits the two inscriptions on the pillar, and also *S.I.I.*, Vol. I, Nos. 33 and 34, pp. 28—30.

772. 412 of 1904.—(Tamil.) On third pillar of the same row. A partly damaged record of the Chōla king Rājarājakēsarivarman (985—1013), dated in his sixteenth year. Records sale of waste land for five *kaḷañjus* to a person to be reclaimed for cultivation, so

as to feed Brahmans and devotees in nine days' Chitrai festival. The shrine is called Tiruchchirāppaḷi at Śirrambar in Uṛaiyūr-kūṛram.

773. 413 of 1904.—(Tamil.) On the last pillar of the same row. A much damaged record of the Pāṇḍya king Mārañjaḍaiyan, dated in his fourth year. Mentions the Pāṇḍyādhipati Varaguṇa and the temple of Tirumalaipperumānaḍigaḷ. [The king was the same as the invader of Iḍavai and Vembil, the enemy of Aparājita and Western Gaṅga Prithvīpati I in the battle of Tiruppirāmbiyam, who ascended the throne in 862. See *Ep. Ind.*, Vol. IX, p. 84 ff. Also Ambāsamudram and Tillaisthānam inscriptions.]

774. 414 of 1904.—(Grantha and Tamil.) On the east wall, right of entrance into the same cave. A record of the Pāṇḍya king Mārañjaḍaiyan, dated in his fourth year. Records gift of gold by the king who is called the Pāṇḍyādhirāja Varaguṇadēva in the grant portion. [See note to the above.]

775. 134 of 1905.—(Tamil.) On a rock in Mātribhūtēśvara temple. A damaged record of the Vijayanagara king Veṅkaṭadēva-Mahārāya, dated Ś. 1539, expired, Piṅgaḷa. Records a gift for the merit of Vīrappa-Nāyaka. [The Government Epigraphist surmises that Veṅkaṭadēva was Veṅkaṭapati I (1586—1616). Vīrappa was evidently the Madura Nāik who ruled from 1609 to 1623. For the relations between him and Veṅkaṭa I, see *Ind. Antq.*, 1916, pp. 133-34.]

776. 62 of 1888.—(Tamil.) On the back wall of a rock-cut cave near the top of the Trichinopoly rock.

777-778. 63 and 64 of 1888.—On the pillars on the left side of the same cave. "Each of the two pillars contains four Sanskrit verses which record that a king Guṇabhara who bore the *birudas* Purushōttama, Śatrumalla and Satyasandha, built a temple of Śiva on the top of the mountain and placed in it a liṅga and statue of himself." The river Kāvēri is called the beloved of the Pallava. This together with the palæographical similarity of this epigraph with the Pallava inscriptions of Māmallāpuram and Conjeeveram, made Dr. Hultzsch recognize in Guṇabhara, a Pallava king who ruled over the Chōḷa country; and the later researches of Venkayya and others have decided that Guṇabhara was the famous Mahēndra-varman I.]

779. *C.P. No. 41 of Mr. Sewell's List.*—Records grant in Ś. 1714 (A.D. 1792), Kaliyuga 4893, Paridhāvi, by "Śrī Muttu Vīrappa Nāyakkan, grandson of Śinna Lakka Nāyakkan and son of Chokkanātha Lakkaya Nāyakkan," conferring certain lands and an annuity on a Mussalman priest.

780. *C.P. No. 42 of Mr. Sewell's List.*—(Tamil.) Records an agreement by four private people, bearing the surname

"Nāyakkan," to conduct the religious ceremonies of their village temple in Ś. 1602, A.D. 1680, Raudri.

781. *C.P. No. 43 of Mr. Sewell's List.*—(Tamil.) Records grant of lands to a Mussalman priest for the maintenance of a Paḷlivāśal or place of worship, by Kāmākshi Nāyakkan, in Ś. 1661 (A.D. 1739), Prabhava, Kaliyuga 4841. The grant states that Rāma Rāya was then ruling over the world.

782. *C.P. No. 44 of Mr. Sewell's List.*—(Tamil.) Records grant by the Madura Nāyakkan, Vijaya Raṅga Chokkanātha, here called, Vijaya Chokka Raṅganātha Nāyakkan"—mentioning his father Muttu Virappa and grandfather Chokkanātha—to a Paṇḍāram (Śūdra priest), for worship at a Durga Kālī temple at the south gate of the Trichinopoly Fort, in Ś. 1649 (A.D. 1727), Kaliyuga 4828, Parābhava. The grant states that Venkāṭa Vēma Mahā Rāya was then reigning at Kannakāma. For a detailed account of Vijaya Raṅga's reign see *Ind. Antq.*, 1917, p. 186 ff. Nothing is known about Venkāṭa Vēma of Kannakāma.

783. *C.P. No. 47 of Mr. Sewell's List.*—(Telugu.) Records grant of land to a Brahman in Ś. 1613 (A.D. 1691), Kaliyuga 4792, Prajōt-patti, by Maṅgammāl, widow of Chokkanātha of the Madura Nāyakkan dynasty. See *Ind. Antq.*, 1917, p. 156 ff., for a detailed account of Maṅgammāl's administration.

784. *C.P. No. 49 of Mr. Sewell's List.*—(Telugu.) Records grant of land for a charitable object, at the Trichinopoly Fort gate, in Ś. 1654 (A.D. 1732), Kaliyuga 4833, Pramādīcha, by Mīnākshi, widow of Vijaya Raṅga Chokkanātha, the son of Raṅga-Kṛishṇa Muttu Virappa and grandson of Chokkanātha. For Mīnākshi's reign and the downfall of the Madura Nāik dynasty see *Ind. Antq.*, 1917 (October-November).

784-A. *C.P. No. 1 of 1908-9.*—A forged plate, dated in Ś. 1098, K. 4421, Sarvadhāri (wrong), referring to the defalcation of four lakhs of rupees by two *Achāris* and its recoupment by the community, to which they belonged.

785. *C.P. No. 2 of 1911-12.*—(Tamil.) A record, dated in Ś. 1272, Bhava (which is inconsistent), recording the gift of two bullocks to the temple of Subrahmaṇya at Āyipālaiyam by an agent of Nallappa Kālāṭka Tōḷar named Muttu-Vaidyanātha Piḷḷai who made them tax-free wherever they were taken, carrying loads: Records also the gift of a cow for a lamp to the same temple by a certain Vaḍuganātha Piḷḷai.

786. *C.P. No. 3 of 1911-12.*—(Telugu.) Dated in Ś. 1600, K. 4779, Kālayukti. Records gift of the village of Amuttarāṅgōṭa to the temples of Kṛishṇēśvara and Aruṇāchalēśvara at Śrītāḷavanam or Tiruppanandāl by Kachchi Kalyāṇa Raṅgappa Kālāka Tōḷa Udaiyār, in the *pālayāsima* between the Uttara Kāvēri and Śvētā-nadi.

787. *C.P. No. 4 of 1911-12.*—(Telugu.) Dated in Ś. 1706, K. 4885, Krōdhin. Gift of land in the village of Śendōra to the temple of Sabhānāyaka at Chidambaram by Muduvijaya Raṅgappa Kālaka Tōḷa Uḍaiyār, son of Nallappa Kālaka Tōḷa Uḍaiyār.

788. *C.P. No. 1 of 1910-11.*—This plate is dated Ś. 1643, Śubhakrit (wrong by two years), in the time of Vijaya Raṅga Chokkanātha Nāik of Madura (1704—31). It is in Telugu and records a gift of rent-free land to a certain Narasa Pantulu. Mr. Krishna Sastri surmises that he was a doctor, as he was to offer prayers to Dhanvantari. [*Mad. Ep. Rep.*, 1911, p. 90.] For Vijaya Raṅga's reign see *Ind. Antq.*, 1917, p. 186 ff.

789. *C.P. No. 2 of 1910-11.*—It is a grant by Rāja Vijaya Raghunātha Toṇḍamān, son of Tirumalayappa Rāya Toṇḍamān and grandson of Tirumalairāya Toṇḍamān in Ś. 1727, K. 4906, *Krōdhana* (A.D. 1805). It records the gift of the village of Ōrāṅḍikkōḍi to a certain Irāśappa Mudaliār of Dēvaṅāmpaṭṭaṅam, for maintaining a feeding house at Trichinopoly. [Vijaya Raghunātha was evidently the Pudukkōṭṭai chief who ruled from 1719 to 1807.]

790. A C.P. in the hands of a resident of Trichinopoly named Chaik Hussain. Records grant of lands to a mosque in Ś. 1655 (A.D. 1733) by Queen Mīnākshi of the Nāik dynasty. *Antiquities*, Vol. I, p. 268. See No. 784 above.

Uṛaiyūr.

This is the well-known ancient Chōḷa capital referred to by Ptolemy. See *Antiquities*, Vol. I, p. 269.

791. 181 of 1907.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the central shrine in the Pañchavarṇēśvara temple. A fragmentary record, dated eleventh year of some king.

792. 182 of 1907.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A damaged record of the Chōḷa king Rājakēsarivarman, dated in his third year. Mentions Kīrtimārttāṇḍa Brahmādhirājan.

793. 183 of 1907.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A damaged record of the Chōḷa king Parakēsarivarman, dated in his sixteenth year. Seems to provide for the daily requirements of the temple of Tiruvuḍaitalai-Perumāḷ at Uṛaiyūr.

794. 184 of 1907.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record of the Chōḷa king Rājakēsarivarman, dated in his second year. Built in at the end.

795. 185 of 1907.—(Tamil.) On the west wall of the same shrine. A record, dated in the fourth year (of ?), relating to gift of the village of Atiguṇakarpaganallūr. A few words of the historical introduction of the Chōḷa king Rājēndradēva can be traced at the beginning of the inscription. See No. 798.

796. 186 of 1907.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the same shrine. A record of the Chōla king Parakēsarivarman *alias* Uḍaiyār Śrī-Rājarājadēva, dated in his seventh year, mentioning Rājāśraya-chaturvēdimāṅgalam in Uḗaiyūr-kūrṅgam, a subdivision of Kēraḷāntaka-vaḷanāḍu. The temple is called Uḍaiyār Tirunḍaitalai-Mahādēva at Tiru-Uḗaiyūr.

797. 187 of 1907.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record of Tribhuvanachakravartin Kōnērinmaikoṇḍān, dated in his thirty-second year, registering a gift of land to the temple of Vēndan Mūkkīśvaramuḍaiyār at Uḗaiyūr in Rājagambhīravaḷanāḍu. Mentions Atiguṇakalpaganallūr.

798. 188 of 1907.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the central shrine in the Pañchavarṇēśvara temple. A damaged record of the Chōla king Parakēsarivarman *alias* Uḍaiyār Śrī-Rājēndradēva (1050—63), the date of which is doubtful.

799. 51 of 1890.—On a rock, called Chōlampārai, close to Uḗaiyūr near Trichinopoly. A record of Tribhuvanachakravartin Tribhuvanavīra-Vikramadēva. See No. 435 above.

Uyyakoṇḍān Channel near Vettuvāyttalai.

800. 71 of 1890.—(Tamil.) On a pillar at the head sluice of the Uyyakoṇḍān channel. A record, dated in Ś. 1608, expired, when the channel was evidently repaired by Rāṇi Maṅgammāl of the Nāik dynasty.

801. 72 of 1890.—(Tamil.) On a broken stone on the bridge over the same sluice. A record of the Chōla king Tribhuvana-chakravartin Śrī-Kulōttuṅga-Chōladēva, in his twenty-eighth year (i.e., Kulōttuṅga III, in A.D. 1205-6).

UDAIYĀRPĀLAIYAM TALUK.

Ariyalūr.

802. C.P. No. 169 of Mr. Sewell's List.—Records grant by Raṅgappa Maḷava Rāya, Zamindar of Ariyalūr, to the Vishṇu temple at Ariyalūr, authorizing the temple authorities to collect certain taxes, in Ś. 1652 (A.D. 1730), Kaliyuga 4830, Sādhāraṇa. One *panam* on each marriage was to be paid to them. [See *Ins., S. Dts.*, p. 216, No. 41, where this epigraph is given. There is reference to Āyappāḍi Gōpāla vamśattār.]

803. C.P. No. 170 of Mr. Sewell's List.—Records grant of land and privileges to a goldsmith, by the then Zamindar of Ariyalūr, Kumāra-Vijaya Raṅgappa Maḷava Rāya, in Ś. 1431 (A.D. 1509), Kaliyuga 4610, Vibhava. Mr. Sewell believes that the characters are so modern that the plate is either a copy of another grant or a forgery.

803-A. A C.P. in the Paṇḍāram *maṭha* in the local temple of Subrahmaṇya. Records that "Arasonallayatta Maḷava Royer Ruṅgappa Maḷava Royer" gave in Ś. 1625, Svabhānu, the grant of

one *kāśu* on each bag in a weekly market, to the God at Chidambaram (?). See *Mack. MSS. (Ins., S. Dts., p. 211, No. 25)*.

803-B. A C.P. in the hands of Subbarāya Kurūkkal in the local Gaṅgādhareśvara temple. Records that Taṅgamuttāyi, mother of Veṅgappa Maḷavarāya, granted in Ś. 1074 some land to the deity. [The date is evidently a mistake.] *Ins., S. Dts., p. 214, No. 40.*

803-C. On the north of the mahāmaṅṭapam in the Kṛiṣṇaśvāmi temple. Records that Vijaya Oppilāda Maḷava Rāya and people granted to a Brahman Narasappa, in Ś. 1664, Dundubhi, 15 *kuḷis* of land. *Ins., S. Dts., p. 213, No. 33.*

Brahmadēśam.

803-D. On a stone in the second prākāra wall of the local Rudrakōṭīśvara temple. Records gift of three lamp-stands and the duties of Tirumaḍaviḷāgam village to the God in Ś. 1285, Śōbhakrit, in the reign of Kampaṇa Uḍaiyār II. *Ins., S. Dts., p. 193, No. 6.*

803-E. On the wall outside the Paṇḍanāthēśvara temple. Records that an individual gave 555 mango trees in a land to the God in Ś. 1499, Hēmalambi, in the reign of Achyutadēvarāya. *Ibid., No. 7.*

Gaṅgaikondachōlapuram.

For notices of this historic place see Moore's *District Manual*, p. 342; *Ind. Antq.*, Vol. IX, p. 117; J.A.S.B., 1880, Pt. I; Mr. Sewell's *Antiquities*, Vol. I, p. 264 and *Trichinopoly Gazr.*, Vol. I. Based on Elliott's collections Mr. Sewell gives twenty inscriptions in this place, but of these Nos. 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 11 and 14 are very vague and cannot be identified with any in the following list:—

804. 75 of 1892 (*No. 17 of Elliott's Lists*).—(Tamil.) East wall of the second prākāra of the Brihadīśvara temple. A record of the Pāṇḍya king Kō-Māravarmaṇa Kulaśēkharadēva (II, 1314—21) in his fourth year. See *Ep. Ind.*, Vol. VI, p. 313, where Dr. Kielhorn discusses the date and points and that Saturday, Uttarāshāḍa, Pūrvapaksha, Chaturdaśi, *Karkāṭaka*, corresponded to 23rd July, A.D. 1317.

805. 76 of 1892.—(Tamil.) South wall of the second prākāra of the Brihadīśvara temple. A record of the Pāṇḍya king Kōnērinmaikondān Vikrama-Pāṇḍyadēva in his sixth year. This is No. 15 of Elliott's Lists (*Antiquities*, Vol. I, p. 265.)

806. 77 of 1892.—(Tamil.) South wall of the second prākāra of the Brihadīśvara temple. A record of the Pāṇḍya king Kōnērinmaikondān Sundara-Pāṇḍyadēva, in his second year. [No. 18 of Elliott's Lists.]

807. 78 of 1892 (*No. 16 of Elliott's Lists*).—(Tamil.) South wall of the second prākāra of the Brihadīśvara temple. A record

of the Pāṇḍya king Kō-Māravarman Kulaśēkharadēva (II), in his fifth year. See *Ep. Ind.*, Vol. VI, p. 313, where Dr. Kielhorn calculates that the date (Monday, Pushya, Pūrvapaksha, Trayōdaśi, Simha) corresponded to Monday, 5th March, A.D. 1319.

808. 79 of 1892 (*No. 9 of Elliott's Lists*).—(Tamil.) West wall of the second prākāra of the Brihadīśvara temple, second tier. A record in Ś. 1385, expired, Subhānu.

809. 80 of 1892 (*No. 10 of Elliott's Lists*).—(Tamil.) West wall of the second prākāra of the Brihadīśvara temple, first tier. A record of Chōḷa king Kulōttuṅga-Chōḷadēva (I?) in his forty-ninth year. Beginning of each line lost.

810. 81 of 1892 (*No. 13 of Elliott's Lists*).—(Tamil.) West wall of the second prākāra of the Brihadīśvara temple, second tier. Records in Subhānud gift by Tiruvēṅgaḍamuḍaiyaṅ; see *S.I.I.*, Vol. I, p. 78.

811. 82 of 1892.—(Tamil.) North and west walls of the second prākāra of the Brihadīśvara temple. A considerably mutilated record of the Chōḷa king Kō-Rājakēsarivarman *alias* Vīra-Rājēndradēva in his fifth (twenty-third?) year, two hundred and seventy-fourth day. [This seems to correspond to Nos. 1 and 2 in Elliott's Lists. It records a grant by sixty-eight chiefs and refers to the king's conquest of the Veṅgi country.]

812. 83 of 1892 (*No. 19 of Elliott's Lists*).—(Tamil.) Right of entrance to the north wall of the second prākāra of the Brihadīśvara temple. A record of the Vijayanagara king Virūpāksharāya (son of Mallikārjuna) in Ś. 1405, expired, Śōbhakrit.

813. 29 of 1908.—(Tamil and Grantha.) On the west wall of the central shrine in the Brihadīśvara temple. An unfinished record of the Chōḷa king Rājakēsarivarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Śrī-Kulōttuṅga-Chōḷadēva (I?) in his forty-first year. After the date is the Sanskrit passage *Akunṭhōtkanṭha*, etc. [This is perhaps No. 20 of Mr. Elliott's List given in the *Antiquities*, Vol. I, p. 265. But the date given there is fortieth year.]

814. 30 of 1908.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A much damaged record in Ś. 1384, expired, Chitrabhānu of the Vijayanagara king. Mentions Dēvarāya once and Mallikārjunarāya twice.

815. 31 of 1908.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the same shrine. A record of the Pāṇḍya king Tribhuvanachakravartin, the date of which is lost. The inscription probably belongs to the reign of Sundara-Pāṇḍya. But the name Perumāḷ Parākrama Pāṇḍya occurs in a damaged line above the inscription.

816. 32 of 1908.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the maṅṭapa in front of the same shrine. A record of the Chōḷa king Kulōttuṅga

III. Fragment containing a portion of the historical introduction of the king.

817. 33 of 1908.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the same maṅṭapa. A record of Tribhuvanachakravartin Kōnērinmai-kōṇḍān, the date of which is lost. Registers an order of the king relating to the emoluments of a temple servant.

818. 34 of 1908.—(Tamil.) On the east wall of the same maṅṭapa. A record of Tribhuvanachakravartin, the date of which is lost. End of each line mutilated.

Kālaiyūr.

818-A. On a stone near the local Agastyēśvara Swāmi temple. Records in the reign of "Aunayagar Saroovacarun" grant of a grove of trees. *Ins., S. Dts., p. 207, No. 16.*

Kallumōḍu.

819. 148 of 1898.—(Tamil.) On a stone in the Kumārasvāmin temple. Records in Ś. 1332, expired, Sādhāraṇa, a grant of land by a Nāyaka.

Kāmarasavalli.

820. 61 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the central shrine in the Kārkoṭakēśvara temple. Records in the seventeenth year of the Chōla king Parakēsarivarman *alias* Vīra-Rājēndra-Chōladēva (i.e., Rājēndra Chōla I) gift of land to the temple of Tirunallūr Mahādēva.

821. 62 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. An incomplete record of the Chōla king Rājakēsarivarman *alias* Rājarājadēva I, dated in his twentieth year, Kanyā, Wednesday, Krittika, corresponding to 20th September, A.D. 1004. Mentions an assembly of eighty persons. (ஆழ்வார் தியோகத்தால் கூட்டம் செய்கின்ற எண்பதின் மா கூட்டப்பெருமக்களோம்.)

822. 63 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in the twenty-ninth year of the Chōla king Rājarājakēsarivarman *alias* Rājarājadēva I gift of fifteen *kaḷaṅjus* of gold for a lamp to the temple of Tirunallūr Mahādēva at Kāmaravalli-chaturvēdimaṅgalam, a *brahmadēya* in Miṛai-kūṛṛam which was a subdivision of Vaḍagarai-Rājēndra-simha-vaḷanāḍu.

823. 64 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in the twenty-sixth year of the Chōla king Rājarāja-Rājakēsarivarman (Rājarāja I) gift of ten *kaḷaṅjus* of gold to the temple treasury for a lamp to Mahādēva of Tirukkārkoṭakiśvaram at Tirunallūr in Kāmaravalli-chaturvēdimaṅgalam, a *brahmadēya* in Viṛai-kūṛṛam.

824. 65 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Dated in the reign of the Chōla king Parakēsarivarman *alias* Uḍaiyār Śrī Rājēndra-Chōladēva I. Records in his twenty-ninth year, Rishabha,

Wednesday, Ārdra, corresponding to May 6, A.D. 1041, gift of land by the great assembly of Kāmaravalli-chaturvēdimāṅalam to Śakkai Māraṅyan Vikramaśōḷan for performing the dance (*Śakkai kūttu*) thrice on each of the festivals Mārgaḷi-tiruvādirai and Vaigāṣitiruvādirai. Mr. Swamikannu Pillai points out that the date shows that this king began to rule between 6th May and 7th July, 1012.

825. 66 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the north, west and south walls of the same shrine. A record of the Chōḷa king Rājakēsarivarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Kulōttuṅga-Chōḷadēva I. Records in his twenty-seventh year, Tulā, śu. di. 10, Sunday, Śatabhishaj, corresponding to 18th October 1097, gift of land for a flower garden by the assembly of Kāmaravalli-chaturvēdimāṅalam, a *brahma-dēya* in Viṛaikūṛram which was a subdivision of Gēyavinōdavaḷanāḍu. The land had been waste and it was now given for the garden tax-free, and the assembly resolved to bear the burden in case the tax (*iṛai*) was levied.

826. 67 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the west wall of the same shrine. Records in seventeenth year (of ?) a sale of land in Vanṇam *alias* Madhurāntakanallūr, a *dēvadāna* village belonging to the temple of Kārkōṭīśvaram-Uḍaiyār, in Viṛai-kūṛram, a subdivision of Vikrama-śōḷa-vaḷanāḍu.

827. 68 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in the fifteenth year of the Chōḷa king Rājarāja-Rājakēsarivarman (Rājarāja I) gift of land for the offering of *akkāradalai* on the festival day of Mārgaḷi-tiruvādirai.

828. 69 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record of the Chōḷa king Rājarāja-Rājakēsarivarman *alias* Rājarājadēva I. Records in his twenty-second year, Dhanus, su. di. 9, Monday, Rēvati, gift of tanks and ponds by the Mahāsabhā for supplying red lotuses daily during the month of Dhanus to the Mahādēva temple. The date corresponded to December 2, A.D. 1006.

829. 70 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in the twenty-fourth year of Rājakēsarivarman *alias* Rāja-Rājarājadēva I gift of 4 *mās* of land for sandal paste (1 *pala* every *śandi*) to Tirunallūr-Mahādēva of the temple of Tirukkārkōṭīśvaram at Kāmaravalli-chaturvēdimāṅalam by a native of Priyadhīramaṅalam.

830. 71 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in seventeenth year and thirty-seventh day of king Rājarājadēva (III) a sale of land. The transaction was the same as in No. 826 above.

831. 72 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the west and south walls of the same shrine. A record of the Chōḷa king Parakēsarivarman *alias* Rājendra-Chōḷadēva I, dated in his eighth year, Tulā, Friday 9, Śravaṇa, corresponding to October 9, A.D. 1019. Records gift of land. The assembly is stated to have met at the temple of Śrī-Kayilāsamudaiyār in this village.

832. 73 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same walls. A record of the Chōla king Rājakēsarivarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Kulōttuṅga-Chōladēva I, dated in his twenty-sixth year, Makara, śu. di. 13, Thursday, Ārdra (=January 10, A.D. 1096). The assembly makes provision for festivals and *śri-bali* in the temple of Śrīkailāsa *alias* Rājēndraśōla-Īśvaramudaiyār. It resolved that one *kuruni* of paddy from irrigated fields, one *kuruni* from lands growing *varagu* and *sesamum*, one nut from every *kamugu* and one lamp-oil from the owners of every *manai* was to be collected from the village.

833. 74 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the same shrine. Dated in the reign of the Chōla king Rājakēsarivarman. Records in his fifth year, Makara, Friday, Punarvasu, gift of land for *Śidāri* by Bālāśiriya-Bhaṭṭan Śīlan Kūttan of Ādanūr, a *dēva-dāna* and *brahmadēya* in Innambarnādu.

834. 75 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records gift of two stones by Kāḍan Adigaḷ of Arunalūr.

835. 76 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in the thirteenth year of the Chōla king Rājarāja-Rājakēsarivarman, “who destroyed the ships at śālai” (Rājarāja I) gift of fifteen *kaḷañjus* of gold, the interest on which was to be given to those who recited the *Talavakārasāmaveda* on the day of Tiruvādirai in the month of Mārgaḷi before the God’s bath. Details of the method of recitation given.

836. 77 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in the seventeenth year of the Chōla king Rājarāja-Rājakēsarivarman (Rājarāja I) gift of gold for the midday offerings by the *madhyastha* of the village on the new-moon days. Kāmaravalli-chaturvēdi-maṅgalam is mentioned as a *brahmadēya* in Vaḍagarai Rājarāja-vaḷanādu.

837. 78 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record of the Chōla king Parakēsarivarman, dated in his ninth year, Dhanus, Thursday, Krittika. Registers gift of land for conducting the services of *śribali* and *tiruppalli eluchchi*. Mentions Kōḍaṇḍarāma-vāykkāl.

838. 79 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the maṅṭapa in front of the same shrine. Records that the maṅṭapa was constructed by Araiyan Tiruvaraṅgamudaiyān Appaninum-nalla Śembiyadaraiyan of Pudukkuḍi.

839. 80 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record of the Chōla king . . . Chakravartin Vikrama-Chōladēva (1118—1135). Records in his fourteenth year gift of land. Built in at the end. Mentions that Vēṅkāḍan Pāṇḍaraṅgamudaiyān *alias* Neriyaichchōla Pallavarāyar, a native of a village in Marudāḍunādu, a subdivision of Venkuṅṅakōṭṭam in Jayaṅṅaṅḍaśōla-maṅḍalam, was also present in the assembly.

840. 81 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record of the Chōla king Parakēsarivarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Vikrama-Chōladēva (III 8—35) in his fourteenth year, relating gift of ten *kaḷañjus* of gold for a lamp to the temple of Tirukkāl-kōḍīśvaramuḍaiya-Nāyanār at Kāmaravalli-chaturvēdimaṅgalam in Viṛaikūrṅam, a subdivision of Vikramachōla-vaḷanāḍu.

841. 82 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the same maṅṭapa. An incomplete record of the Chōla king Tribhuvana-chakravartin Kulōttuṅga Chōladēva (I), dated in his fiftieth year. Records gift of money for three lamps. States that Kāmaravalli-chaturvēdimaṅgalam was a *brahmadēya* in Viṛaikūrṅam, a subdivision of Vaḍagarai-Ulaguyyavandaśōla-vaḷanāḍu.

842. 83 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in the tenth year of the Chōla king Tribhuvanachakravartin Kulōttuṅga Chōladēva (III), “who was pleased to take Madurai (Madura),” gift of money for a lamp and midnight offerings and for betel-leaves, areca-nuts, a knife (*kiḷikatti*) and a pair of scissors to the God and Goddess by a native of Ālaṅguḍi.

843. 84 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in the fiftieth year of the Chōla king Rājakēsarivarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Kulōttuṅga-Chōladēva I, gift of land for worship by the assembly to the temple of Tiruvagattīśvaramuḍaiya-Mahādēva at Vaḷavan-Puḷiyaṅguḍi in Vaḍagarai-Ulaguyyavandaśōla-vaḷanāḍu. Mentions the irrigation channels Kōdaṅḍarāma-peruvāykkāl and Avanigandharva-vāykkāl. See No. 837 above.

844. 85 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in fourth year of the Chōla king Vikrama-Chōladēva gift of money for a lamp to the temple of Tirukkārḱōṭi-Īśvaramuḍaiyār at Kāmadavalli-chaturvēdimaṅgalam in Miṛaikūrṅam, a subdivision of Gēyavinōda-vaḷanāḍu.

845. 86 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records that Araiyan Tiruvaraṅgamuḍaiyār *alias* Śembiyadaraiyar of Pudukuḍi covered this maṅṭapa with flat tiles.

846. 87 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Dated in the reign of the Chōla king Rājakēsarivarman *alias* Tribhuvana-chakravartin Kulōttuṅga-Chōladēva II. Records in his third year, Simha, su. di. 12, Thursday, Śravaṇa (= August 22, A.D. 1135), gift of land for two lamps.

847. 88 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the east wall of the first prakāra of the same temple. Records in the tenth year of the Pāṇḍya king Jaṭavarman Tribhuvanachakravartin Vira-Pāṇḍya-dēva assignment of certain customs duties on articles of merchandise for repairs to the temple of Tirukkārḱōṭiśuramuḍaiya-Nāyanār at Kāmadavalli-chaturvēdimaṅgalam, by *the people of the eighteen countries and the seventy-nine vaḷanāḍus*.

848. 89 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the entrance into the gōpura of the same temple, right side. Records in the twenty-second year of the Chōla king Tribhuvanachakravartin Rājarājadēva, gift of oil by the oil merchants for bathing the God with it, on Saturdays.

849. 90 of 1914.—(Tamil.) In the same place. Records in the sixteenth year of the Chōla king Tribhuvanachakravartin Rājarājadēva, gift of a silver forehead-plate by a native of Tolūmūr.

850. 91 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same entrance, left side. A record of the Chōla king Tribhuvanachakravartin Rājarājadēva, III. Records in his nineteenth year, Vrischika, su. di. 11, Wednesday, Śatabishaj, corresponding to October 4, A.D. 1234 [*Vrischika* is wrong for Tulā], gift of oil for lamps.

851. 92 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the east wall of the Gaṇapati shrine in the same temple. Records in the eleventh year of the Chōla king Tribhuvanachakravartin Rājarājadēva that the assembly of Kāmadavalli-Chaturvēdimāṅgalam arranged to have the village administration (*grāma-kārya*) attended to by those who consented to vacate their seats by the year, according to the old custom.

852. 93 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the same shrine. A record of the Chōla king Tribhuvanachakravartin Rājēndra Chōladēva III. Records in his fourteenth year, Vrischika, ba. di. 5, Thursday, Punarvasu (= November 6, A.D. 1259), gift of land for maintaining a flower-garden to the temple of Kāmadavalli-chaturvēdimāṅgalam in Viṛai-kūrṅam in Vaḍagarai-Vikrama-Chōla-valanāḍu.

853. 94 of 1914.—(Grantha and Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in the fifth year of the Hoysala king Pratāpachakravartin Vīra-Sōmēśvara that the king in settling the dispute between the temple managers and a private individual regarding the ownership of the village Vaṅṅam *alias* Madhurāntaka-nallūr, decided that it should be enjoyed as a temple property.

854. 95 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the east, north and west walls of the Chaṇḍikēśvara shrine in the same temple. A record of the Chōla king Tribhuvanachakravartin Rājēndra-Chōladēva, dated in his twelfth year . . . su. di., Friday. Registers gift of land to the Tirujñānasambandan-tirumaḍam by Kuṅṅraṅkiḷān Tirunāvukkaraśudēvan, a native of Ūṅṅukkāṭṭu-kōṭṭam in Jayaṅgoṇḍaśōla-maṇḍalam and a devotee of the temple.

Kāvēripālayam.

854-A. On a stone in the local temple. Records that Śingaraṅja, prime minister of “Coṇḍava Nāiker,” granted some land to the south of Kāliṅgarāyan-kuḷam to God Varadarāja of Śenni-vanam. *Ins., S. Dts., p. 203, No. 5.*

Kilakkulattūr.

854-B. On the eastern gōpura in the local Vēṅugōpāla temple. Records that Rāmayya, the minister of Viśvanātha Nāyakar, granted 1,000 *kulis* of land in the village to the God in S. 1545, Srīmukha. *Ins., S. Dts.*, p. 207, No. 15. [Rāmayya was not improbably the celebrated Daḷavāi Rāmappayya who distinguished himself in the reign of Tirumal Nāik, the son and successor of Muttu Vīrappa (1609—23). See my *His. of Nāik kingdom*, in *Ind. Antq.*, 1916, p. 149 ff.]

Kilappaluvūr.

This is called Tiruppaluvūr in the *Periapurāṇa* and Śīrupaluvūr in inscriptions. It was in Kuṅṅa-kūṅṅam in Uttuṅga-tuṅga-vaḷanāḍu.

855. 100 of 1895.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the second prākāra of the Vaṭamūlēśvara (Tiruvālanduṅṅai Mahādēva) temple. A record in the sixth year of the Chōḷa king Kulōttuṅga-Chōḷadēva. Records gift of a betel-tray.

856. 101 of 1895.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record in the fifth year of the Chōḷa king Tribhuvanachakravartin Kulōttuṅga-Chōḷadēva. Records gift of land.

857. 102 of 1895.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record in the eleventh year of the Chōḷa king Tribhuvanachakravartin Rājādhirājadēva. Records gift of land.

858. 103 of 1895.—(Tamil.) On the west wall of the same prākāra. A record in the tenth year of the Chōḷa king Kō-Parakēsarivarman. In comparatively modern characters; records gift of land. Ten *śey* of land was given for two offerings of food of two *nālis*.

859. 104 of 1895.—(Tamil.) A record in the eighth year of the Chōḷa king Kō-Parakēsarivarman *alias* Rājendra-Chōḷadēva (I, 1012—43). Records gift of money (fifty *kāśus*) to the *sabhā* for *tirumañjana* on certain occasions. The annual interest on this is thirty *kalam*s by *ilaghuvannamarakkāl* which was to be measured by the *sabhā*.

860. 105 of 1895.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record in the twentieth year of the Chōḷa king Kō-Rājakēsarivarman *alias* Kulōttuṅga-Chōḷadēva (I). Records gift of land ($\frac{1}{20}$ of a *vēli* purchased from the assembly of Śīrupaluvūr for one *kāśu*) by the mother of a certain Virudarājabhayaṅkara Vāṅakōvarayar (evidently called after the *biruḍa* of Kulōttuṅga I), probably chief of Vānagoppāḍi (around Tirukkōyilūr). *S.I.I.*, Vol. III, No. 71, pp. 152—5.

861. 106 of 1895.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record in the tenth year of the Chōḷa king Kō-Rājakēsarivarman. Records gift of land.

862. 107 of 1895.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record in the tenth year of the Chōḷa king Kō-Rājarājakēsarivarman (Rājarāja I). Records sale of land.

863. 108 of 1895.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record in the eleventh year of the Chōḷa king Kō-Rājarājakēsarivarman (985—1013). Records sale of land to the temple.

864. 109 of 1895.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record in the eighth year of the Chōḷa king Kō-Rājarājakēsarivarman (985—1013). Records gift of a lamp.

865. 110 of 1895.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record in the third year of the Chōḷa king Kō-Rājakēsarivarman. Records gift of two silver vessels.

866. 111 of 1895.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record in the third year of the Chōḷa king Kō-Rājakēsarivarman. Records gift of gold ornaments.

867. 112 of 1895.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the same prakāra. A record in the sixth year of the Chōḷa king Vikrama-Chōḷadēva (1118—35). Records gift of land.

868. 113 of 1895.—(Tamil.) On the east wall of the maṅṭapa in front of the shrine in the same temple, right of entrance. A record in the thirteenth year of the Chōḷa king Kō-Parakēsarivarman. Records gift of copper vessels by a merchant.

869. 114 of 1895.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the same maṅṭapa. A record in the sixteenth year of the Chōḷa king Kō-Parakēsarivarman. Records gift of a lamp.

870. 115 of 1895.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the same maṅṭapa. A record in the fourth year of the Chōḷa king Kō-Rājakēsarivarman *alias* Mummudi-Chōḷa (i.e., Rājarāja I). Records gift of gold twelve *kaḷaṅjus* for a lamp.

871. 116 of 1895.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record in the twelfth year of the Chōḷa king Kō-Rājarājakēsarivarman (985—1013). Records gift of land. Village *sabhā* mentioned.

872. 117 of 1895.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record in the fourth year of the Chōḷa king Kō-Parakēsarivarman *alias* Rājendra-Chōḷadēva (1012—53). Records gift of land ($3\frac{1}{2}$ *mās*) of temple lands leased by a person to supply two *nālīs* of rice for daily offering.

873. 118 of 1895.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the shrine in the same temple. A record in the fifth year of the Chōḷa king Kō-Rājakēsarivarman. Records gift of land.

874. 119 of 1895.—(Tamil.) On the west wall of the same shrine. A record in the tenth year of the Chōḷa king Madurakonḍa Kō-Parakēsarivarman (905—47). Records gift of a lamp.

875. 120 of 1895.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the same shrine. A record in the twelfth year of the Chōḷa king Kō-Parakēsarivarman. Records gift of two lamps.

876. 121 of 1895.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record in the eighth year of the Chōla king Kō-Rājakēsarivarman. Records gift of a lamp.

877. 122 of 1895.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record in the twelfth year of the Chōla king Kō-Rājarājakēsarivarman (985—1013). Records gift for a lamp.

877-A. On a pillar of the Sōmanāthēśvara pagoda. Records that in Ś. 1375, Paravanūr Uḍaiyār Banda Rāja Nāyanār Narasimhadēva built the sōpānamaṅṭapa in the temple. *Ins., S. Dts., p. 253, No. 145.*

Kōvilūr (Coovaloor).

877-B. A paper grant in the local Īśvara temple. Records that in Ś. 1711, Akshaya, a Rāmayya Maṅigār granted four pagodas per year in a village and similar grants in two villages to God Agastyēśvara. *Ibid., p. 214, No. 35.*

877-C. On a stone west of the village. Records that in “Hayaruttkeblakhan” Saheb’s rule the local people gave a garden in Ś. 1650, Pramādi. *Ibid., No. 36.*

Kuḷattūr.

877-D. On the east, south and north sides of the *prākāram* of the Aḷagiyanār temple. Records that in Ś. 1072, Vikriti, Mallikārjuna Rāya gave the village to God Tirumaṅi Aḷagiyanār. *Ibid., p. 209, No. 20.* [The date Ś. 1072 is evidently a mistake for Ś. 1372.]

Mēlapalūr.

877-E. On a stone in the northern gate of the local Chokkanātha temple. Records that a woman granted to the God in Paritāpi forty *kuḷis* of dry field in Valayaṅkuḷam. *Ibid., p. 207, No. 17.*

Mēlūr.

877-F. On a stone west of the village. Records grant of 110 *kānis* of land in the village to God Prasanna Veṅkaṭēśvara Perumāḷ at “Sadayar Palam.” *Ibid., p. 215, No. 39.*

Peruvalappūr.

877-G. On a stone under the banyan tree on the banks of the local tank. Records that “Sadaparoomapela” granted in Viḷambi, in the reign of Muttukṛishṇappa Nāyakar, the village of “Vattadi-cooppum” and the fee of one *kāśu* on every bullock for the God Tirunandēśvara. *Ibid., p. 208, No. 18.*

Śennivanam.

877-H. On a stone in the *nandavana* of the local Śeniyaṅdasvāmi temple. Records that Kāḷiṅgarāya granted fifty *kuḷis* of land in the village to God Śennivana Tambirānār. *Ibid., p. 203, No. 4.*

Tirukkalappūr.

878. 147 of 1898.—(Tamil.) On a stone built into the floor close to the sacred bull in front of the Īśvara temple. Records in Dundubhi a grant to the temple of Koḍivanasvāmi.

Tirumalavādi.

This place figures in the *Periapurāṇa* and in the inscriptions as Tirumalāpādi.

879. 70 of 1895.—(Tamil.) On the first gōpura of the Vaidyanātha temple, right of entrance. A record in the fifteenth year of the Hoysala king Vīra-Rāmanāthadēva. Records gift of salt by salt dealers.

880. 71 of 1895.—(Tamil.) In the same place, left of entrance. A record (incomplete) in the eleventh year of the Pāṇḍya king Kō-Jaṭavarman *alias* Sundara-Pāṇḍyadēva I. See *Ep. Ind.*, Vol. VI, p. 308, where Prof. Kielhorn points out that the date of this inscription (Thursday, Aśvini, Aparapaksha, Shashṭhi, Karkaṭaka) corresponded to 19th July 1261, but the week day, it has been suggested, should be Tuesday.

881. 72 of 1895.—(Tamil.) On the second gōpura of the same temple, right of entrance. A record in the twenty-third year of the Hoysala king Vīra-Sōmēśvaradēva. Records gift of land by an officer of Śinganna-daṇḍanāyaka.

882. 73 of 1895.—(Tamil.) In the same place. A record in the second year of the Hoysala king Vīra-Sōmēśvaradēva. Records gift of land by an officer of Kōva-Sōmaya-daṇḍanāyaka.

883. 74 of 1895.—(Tamil.) In the same place. A record in the thirty-fourth year of the Chōla king Kō-Parakēsarivarman *alias* Tribhuvanavīradēva (1178--1216), "who took Madurai, Ceylon, Karuvūr and the crowned head of the Pāṇḍya." Records gift of land. See *Ep. Ind.*, Vol. IV, p. 220, where Prof. Kielhorn points out that the date of the inscription (Monday, Śravaṇa, Pūrvapaksha, Daśami, Kanyā) corresponded to Monday, the 19th September, A.D. 1211.

884. 75 of 1895.—(Tamil.) On the third gōpura of the same temple, right of entrance. A record in the twenty-sixth year of the Chōla king Kō-Rājakēsarivarman *alias* Rājādhirājadēva (I). Records gift of land. See *Ep. Ind.*, Vol. IV, p. 216, where Prof. Kielhorn points out that the date of the inscription (Wednesday, Uttara Phalguni, at night, month of Mīna) corresponded to Wednesday, the 14th of March, A.D. 1044. The inscription shows that Rājādhirāja ascended the throne in 1018, during the life-time of his predecessor Rājendra Chōla, whom the people refer to as "our Emperor." The exact relationship of the two is not known. See No. 279 of 1895 at Miṇḍigal (Kolar district) which corroborates this.

885. 76 of 1895.—(Tamil.) In the same place, left of entrance. A record in the fifteenth year of the Hoysala king Vira-Rāmanāthadēva. Records gift of land by Gaṅgaṇadaṇḍanāyaka.

886. 77 of 1895.—(Tamil.) On the east wall of the second prakāra of the same temple, right of entrance. A record in the sixteenth year of the Chōla king Kō-Parakēsarivarman *alias* Rājēndra-Chōladēva. Records gift of lamp by a daughter of the king Arumōli-Naṅgai.

887. 78 of 1895.—(Tamil.) In the same place, left of entrance. A record of the sixteenth year of the Chōla king Kō-Parakēsarivarman *alias* Rājēndra-Chōladēva (I, 1012--43), mentioning the gift of a lamp by the wife of the officer referred to in No. 900 below.

888. 79 of 1895.—(Tamil.) In the same place. A record in the nineteenth year of the Chōla king Kō-Parakēsarivarman *alias* Rājēndra-Chōladēva. Records gift of two vessels of gold and silver by his queen Kṛishṇa Kausalyā (100 *kaśus* = ninety sheep).

889. 80 of 1895.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the same prakāra. A record in the forty-fifth year of the Chōla king Kō-Rājakēsarivarman *alias* Kulōttuṅga-Chōladēva (I?). Records gift of a lamp by a princess.

890. 81 of 1895.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record in the thirty-second year of the Chōla king Kō-Rājakēsarivarman *alias* Rājādhirājadēva (I). Records gift of a lamp. See *Ep. Ind.*, Vol. IV, p. 218, where Mr. Kielhorn points out that the date of the inscription (Thursday, Śravaṇa, Vriśchika) cannot be true as it is, that the 22nd year and not the 32nd is more consistent, and that in that case the date is Thursday, the 22nd November, A.D. 1039. Dr. Hultzsch believes that "22" may be a correct reading.

891. 82 of 1895.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. An incomplete record in the fifteenth year of the Chōla king Kō-Parakēsarivarman *alias* Vikrama Chōladēva. See *Ep. Ind.*, Vol. VII, p. 5, where Prof. Kielhorn points out that the date of the inscription (Sunday, Hasta, thirteenth *tithi* of the waxing moon, Śittirai) is Sunday, the 15th April, A.D. 1128, but the *nakshatra* should be *Chitra*. But if it be taken to be the thirteenth year of Vikramachōla's reign it may be Sunday, 12th April, A.D. 1131. The inscription has been edited in *S.I.I.*, Vol. III, No. 79, pp. 182—6.

892. 83 of 1895.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record in the fifteenth year of the Chōla king Kō-Rājakēsarivarman *alias* Kulōttuṅga Chōladēva (II). Records gift of lamps. See *Ep. Ind.*, Vol. XI, p. 290, where Mr. Swamikannu Pillai points out that the date (Thursday, Uttarāshāḍha, Pūrvapaksha, Pratipada, Makara) corresponded to Thursday, the 25th December, A.D. 1147.

893. 84 of 1895.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record in the eighth year of the Chōla king Kō-Parakēsarivarman *alias* Rājēndradēva (1050--62). Records gift of lamps.

894. 85 of 1895.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. An incomplete record of the Chōḷa king Kō-Rājakēsarivarman *alias* Kulōttuṅga-Chōḷadēva. See *Ep. Ind.*, Vol. XI, p. 288, where Mr. Swamikannu Pillai points out that the date of the inscription (Monday, Hasta, Aparapaksha, Navami, Dhanus) corresponded to Monday, the 10th December, A.D. 1134.

895. 86 of 1895.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record in the fourth year of the Chōḷa king Kō-Parakēsarivarman *alias* Rājādhirājadēva (II?). Records gift of a lamp.

896. 87 of 1895.—(Tamil.) On the west wall of the same prakāra. A record in the ninth year of the Chōḷa king Kō-Parakēsarivarman *alias* Rājēndradēva, “the younger brother” of Rājādhirāja (1050--62). The inscription is interesting for the fact that the ninth year of Rājēndradēva is also called the third year of Vīra Rājēndra and therefore proves that the latter’s reign overlapped that of the former.

897. 88 of 1895.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. An incomplete record of the Chōḷa king Rājēndra Chōḷadēva in his thirty-first year.

898. 89 of 1895.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the utsava-vigraha shrine in the same temple. An incomplete record in the third year of the Pāṇḍya king Kō-Jaṭāvarman *alias* Sundara-Pāṇḍyadēva. See *Ep. Ind.*, Vol. VI, p. 306, where Kielhorn points out that the date of this inscription (Wednesday, Uttarāshāḍha, Pūrvapaksha, Shashṭhi, Vrischika) corresponded to Wednesday, the 29th October, A.D. 1253.

899. 90 of 1895.—(Tamil.) On the west wall of the same shrine. An incomplete record in the second year of the Pāṇḍya king Kō-Jaṭāvarman *alias* Sundara-Pāṇḍyadēva (I). See *Ep. Ind.*, Vol. VI, p. 306, where Dr. Kielhorn points out that the date of this inscription (Saturday, Mūla, Aparapaksha, Chaturthi, Mēsha) corresponded to Saturday, the 19th April, A.D. 1253.

900. 91 of 1895.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the central shrine in the same temple. A record in the fourteenth year of the Chōḷa king Kō-Parakēsarivarman *alias* Rājēndra-Chōḷadēva (1012—1053), the successor of Rājārājadēva. Records the repairs of the *vimāna* at the express orders of the king, and gives the interesting information that the royal order referred to in the next inscription was re-copied on stone. “This was done by order of Narakkaṅ Rāma, who, as we know from the Tanjore inscriptions, built the enclosure of the Tanjore temple.”

901. 92 of 1895.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record in the twenty-eighth year of the Chōḷa king Kō-Rājārājakēsarivarman *alias* Rājārājadēva (I, 985—1013), saying that the central shrine was re-built and that the inscriptions engraved in the original building should be preserved by copying them in a book.

902. 93 of 1895.—(Tamil.) On the west wall of the same shrine. A record in the twenty-second year of the Hoysala king Vīra-Rāmanāthadēva. Provides for the bathing of the image.

903. 94 of 1895.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. An incomplete record in the twentieth year of the Chōla king Madiraikoṇḍa-Kō-Parakēsarivarman.

904. 95 of 1895.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record in the fifth year of the Chōla king Kō-Parakēsarivarman. Records gift of a lamp.

905. 96 of 1895.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. An incomplete record in the twelfth year of the Chōla king Madiraikoṇḍa-Kō-Parakēsarivarman (905—47).

906. 97 of 1895.—(Tamil.) On the west wall of the Junēśvara shrine in the same temple, left of entrance. A record in the thirteenth year of the Hoysala king Vīra-Rāmanāthadēva. Records gift of land.

907. 98 of 1895.—(Grantha.) On the south wall of the maṅṭapa, between the second and third gōpura in the same temple. Records the building of a shrine by Vallaya, an officer of the Hoysala king Narasiṁha.

908. 99 of 1895.—(Tamil.) On the west wall of a ruined maṅṭapa to the north of the shrine of the Goddess in the same temple. A fragmentary record of the Chōla king Kō-Rājarājakēsarivarman, the date of which is lost.

909. *C.P. No. 5 of 1909-10.*—A copper-plate grant, dated in Ś. 1662, *Rudhirōdgārin*, and making a gift to the temple of Ponnārmēniyar, which was left unclaimed in the Madras High Court and deposited in the museum. The record is to the effect that three private individuals made over to a certain Kumārasvāmi Paṇḍāram a piece of land situated in Poygaivalanāḍu for worship in the temple of Nantambirānār or Ponnārmēniyar at Tirumaḷapāḍi. The trust was conveyed, it is said, in accordance with a previous charter issued by Vijaya Oppilāda Maḷavarāyar of Tirumalai. The Government Epigraphist points out that the Śaka date and the cyclic year do not correspond ; that the inscriptions recorded above do not mention any person as Vijaya Oppilāda Maḷavarāyar ; but that *Ponnārmēniya* occurs as a surname of the local deity in a hymn of Sundaramūrti Nāyanār. See *Mad. Ep., Rep.*, 1910, p. 11. I have traced this inscription to the *Mack. MSS., Ins., S. Dts.*, p. 206, No. 12.

Uḍaiyār pālaiyam.

910. A palm-leaf grant in the hands of "Raingamalagengar," worshipper in the local Varadarāja temple. Records that "Moottoocamapilla, Muttu Uḍaiyār, Vēlāyuda Uḍaiyār and Periya

Uḍaiyār " gave 25 *kuḷis* of *nañja* land and 50 *kuḷis* of *puñja* land in two villages to God Varadarāja in Ś. 1685, Śvabhānu. *Ins., S. Dts., p. 202, No. 1.*

911. In the same place. Records in the same date the grant of land by Muttu Redḍi and Paṭṭu Redḍi. *Ibid., No. 2.*

912. A C.P. in the hands of Perumāḷ Aiyāṅār in the local temple. Records that Kumāra Vijaya Oppillāda Maḷavarāya granted to God Varadarāja 90 *kuḷis* of land in Ś. 1685, Svabhānu. *Ibid., No. 3.*

Vilandai.

913. 146 of 1898.—(Tamil.) In the gōpura of the Īśvara temple. Records in Ś. 1713, expired, Paridhāvin, certain repairs to the temple of Agastyēśvara.

Supplement.

Yērkkuḍi (Yeraguḍi).

198-A. In a field bearing survey No. 310 is a stone with an inscription, dated Ś. 1634 (A.D. 1712), recording a private gift of lands to the temple. *Antiquities, Vol. I, p. 266.*

PUDUKKÖTTAI STATE.

Ambukövil.

1. 223 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the maṅṭapa in front of the central shrine in the Bhaktalaḷitēśvara temple. Records in the thirty-second year of the Pāṇḍya king Tribhuvanachakravartin Kulaśēkharadēva a gift of land by the citizens of Kōdaṇḍarāmapuram, to the temple of Vīrarājendra-Chōḷēśvaram-uḍaiya-Nāyanār at Aḷumbil. The king has not been identified.

2. 224 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record of the Pāṇḍya king Tribhuvanachakravartin Kōnērimēḷkoṇḍān Vīra-Pāṇḍyadēva (unidentified). Records in his fourteenth year Rishabha, śu. di. 5, Monday, remission of taxes in the village of Māñjiyūr in Paṇṇi-kūrṅam, for offerings and repairs to the same temple. Aḷumbil is stated to be situated in Paṇṇiyūr-nāḍu. [Mr. Swamikannu Pillai discusses the date in *Ep. Rep.*, 1915, p. 76, and concludes that a king of this name began to rule in 1202 or 1231. The date of the present record is either May 18th, 1215 or May 19th, 1242.]

3. 225 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A damaged, incomplete record of the Pāṇḍya king Jaṭavarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Kulaśēkharadēva (I or II?) in his sixth year Kanya.

4. 226 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record of the Vijayanagara king Mallikārjunarāya (1449—65) in Ś. 1499, Pramādi, Vaikāśi. Unfinished.

5. 227 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record of the Pāṇḍya king Tribhuvanachakravartin Śrīvallabhadēva. Records in his seventeenth year Simha the gift of paddy to the temple of Vīrarājendra-Chōḷēśvaram-uḍaiya-Nāyanār at Aḷumbil in Paṇṇiyūr-nāḍu, a subdivision of Rājarāja-vaḷanāḍu, by the residents of Kuḷattūr-nāḍu in Poyyir-kūrṅam. [Was Śrīvallabha the contemporary of Māravarman Sundara Pāṇḍya I? Mr. Swamikannu Pillai believes that he was the king who came to the throne in 1257 and equates the present date to Monday, 5th August, 1275.]

6. 228 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A damaged record of the Pāṇḍya king Jaṭavarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Kulaśēkharadēva (I? 1190—1217) in his twenty-fourth year.

7. 229 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the east wall of the same maṅṭapa. Records in the fourteenth year of the Pāṇḍya king Sundara-Pāṇḍyadēva (unidentified) the gift of a moiety of the taxes for repairs in the temple at Aḷumbil by the *araiyagaḷ* of Añjukuḍi.

8. 230 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in Śobhakrit, Tai, 9, the gift of land by the three sons of Pāṇḍya-perumāḷ *alias* Māvali-Vāṇadarāyar, chief of Neḍuvāśālśīmai in Kānavanāḍu.

9. 231 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records a gift in Kshaya, Āvaṇi, 30.

10. 232 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the gōpura of the same temple, right of entrance. Records in Jaya, Śittirai 25, the gift of a portion of the rents collected on bazaar stalls to the temple for offerings and repairs.

11. 233 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same gōpura, left of entrance. Records in Kālayukta, Tai 8, a gift to make provision for offerings.

Ammankurichchi.

12. 220 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On a slab set up in the maṇṭapa in front of the Sundarēśvara temple. Records in Ś. 1613, Prajōtpatti, Śittirai, 2, an assignment of certain taxes levied in the villages belonging to the temple, exclusively for the purposes of the temple.

13. 221 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On a slab set up in front of a maṇṭapa. A record of the "Sāḷuva king" Rāmadēva-Mahārāya (1620--30) in Ś. 1542, Raudri, Uttarāyaṇa, Mithuna. Records that a certain Aṅgālamman dug a tank, constructed a maṇṭapa with a Vināyaka image set up in it, and made a gift of paddy for offerings to the temple of Śokkanāthasvāmin at Namankurichchi *alias* Vaḍavēli-Ambalavāṇartuṛai for the merit of Vīra-Pūchchaya Nāyaka. The latter bore several high-sounding titles of which Śammatti-Nārāyaṇa is one.

14. 222 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On a slab set up in a field. Records in Ānanda, Śittirai, 17, the construction of a *maṭha* by Vīra-Pūchchaya-Nāyaka, son of Ōbaḷa Pūchchaya who was the brother of Tirumalai Pūchchaya. These were the descendants of the Pūchchaya mentioned in the previous epigraph.

Ammāsatram.

15. 364 of 1904.—At the entrance of the natural cave, east of the rock known as Āḷuruṭṭimalai. An incomplete and damaged Tamil record of Tribhuvanachakravartin Sundara-Pāṇḍya, mentioning one Dharmadēva Āchārya, the pupil of Kanakachandra Paṇḍita (who was evidently a Jain teacher).

Dēvamalai.

16. 157 of 1907.—On a rock to the left of the maṇṭapa in the rock-cut temple. A Tamil record of unknown dynasty and king, dated evidently in a certain *Manmatha* and mentioning Kānanāḍu *alias* Virudarājabhayaṅkara-vaḷanāḍu.

Kodumbālūr.

17. 129 of 1907.—On the south wall of the central shrine in the Mūvarkōvil., Records in Grantha and Sanskrit the building of three temples (*vimāna*) by a chief named Vikramakēsarīn.

18. 130 of 1907.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the same shrine. A mutilated record of the Chōla king Rājendra Chōla I.

19. 131 of 1907.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the maṅṭapa in front of the Muchukundēśvara temple in the same village. A record of the Pāṇḍya king Jaṭavarman Vīra-Pāṇḍyadēva in his seventeenth year. The temple is called Tirumuduguṅṅramudaiya-Nāyanār at Kodumbālūr in Urattūr-kūrṅam, a subdivision of Kōṇāḍu *alias* Kaḍaladaiyād-Ilaṅgaikoṇḍa Chōla-vaḷanāḍu. [Was Vīra Pāṇḍya the king who ascended the throne in 1253?]

20. 132 of 1907.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A damaged record of the Pāṇḍya king Jaṭavarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Sundara-Pāṇḍyadēva. It is not known which of the three kings of this name is referred to.

21. 133 of 1907.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the same maṅṭapa. A record of the Pāṇḍya king Māravarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Sundara-Pāṇḍyadēva (I, 1216—35), “who was pleased to present the Chōla country.” Seems to record a gift of land. Mentions Kārayūr in Śōla-Pāṇḍya-vaḷanāḍu.

22. 134 of 1907.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in the seventh year of Parakēsarī-varman *alias* Vīraśōla Irukkuvēl a gift of land.

23. 135 of 1907.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the kitchen in the same temple. Records in the fifth year of the Pāṇḍya king Māravarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Kulaśēkharadēva (I?) the building of the kitchen. The temple is called Tirumuduguṅṅramudaiya-Nāyanār at Vaḍakōṇāḍu in Urattūr-kūrṅam.

24. 136 of 1907.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record of the Pāṇḍya king Māravarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Kulaśēkharadēva (I, 1268—1308) in his forty-second year. Records the gift of the village of Iluppaikkudi by Vikkīra-Pāṇḍiyappanmar.

25. 137 of 1907.—(Tamil.) On a pillar in the maṅṭapa in front of the same temple. Records the gift of the pillar.

26. 138 of 1907.—On another pillar in the same place. A record of the fifth year of a king whose name is not mentioned. Mentions Rishabha-Perumāṇaḍigaḷ of the Tiruppūdiśvara temple.

27. 139 of 1907.—On the base of the same maṅṭapa. A fragmentary record of the Chōla king Madhurāntaka Sundara Chōla. Mentions Pūḍipattāḷagan.

28. 140 of 1907.—(Kanarese.) On three stones built into the pond in front of the same temple. A fragmentary record in

ancient characters ; the king's name is lost. Mentions Koḍumbalur and Vikramakēsarīśvara.

29. 141 of 1907.—On another stone built into the same pond. A record in Grantha which seems to be the beginning of a genealogy. Atri is mentioned.

Koḷattūr.

30. 377 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the ruined Śiva temple. Records in the ninth year of the Pāṇḍya king Tribhuvanachakravartin Sundara-Pāṇḍyadēva, "who was pleased to take the Chōḷa country," a gift of land to the temple of Sundara-Chōḷīśvaramudaiya Nāyanār. [The king was evidently Māra-varman Sundara Pāṇḍya I who ruled from 1216 to 1235.]

31. 378 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in the seventeenth year of the Pāṇḍya king Māra-varman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Sundara Pāṇḍyadēva, "who was pleased to distribute the Chōḷa country," the gift of land to the temple of Sundara Chōḷīśvaramudaiya Nāyanār at Kūlai Kuḷattūr in Urattūr-kūrṅam, a subdivision of Iraṭṭapāḍi koṇḍaśōḷa vaḷanāḍu.

32. 379 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in the thirty-third year (of a certain king) that the temple lands were lying uncultivated owing to a breach in the tank and that these were let out on permanent tenancy in order that the tank might be repaired and the lands cultivated.

33. 380 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record of the Pāṇḍya king Māra-varman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Sundara Pāṇḍyadēva (I?) in his seventh year, Paṅguni, twentieth day. Records that the inhabitants of Kuḷattūr together with the temple trustees disputed a certain Vikkiramaśōḷa Nāḍālvān's ownership of a river. The former asserted that it belonged to the temple. It was agreed that water might be baled out from the river within specified boundary limits, that one-half of the taxes on fishing should be paid to the temple and the other half to Vikkiramaśōḷa Nāḍālvān.

34. 381 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the east wall of the same temple. Records in the second year of the Pāṇḍya king Kōyil Kulaśēkhara-dēva a gift of land for providing offerings at a service called Pallavan-śandi in the same temple.

35. 382 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records an order probably of a king that no inscriptions should be engraved on the central shrine and on the agramaṅṭapa.

36. 383 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the same temple. Dated in the reign of the Chōḷa king Tribhuvanachakravartin Tribhuvanavīradēva (Kulōttuṅga III, 1178—1216) who having taken Madurai (Madura), Iḷam (Ceylon), Karuvūr and the crowned head of the Pāṇḍyas was pleased to perform the anointment of

heroes and the anointment of victors. Records in his thirtieth year 116th day the fixed periods of the day when each dancing girl had to perform her daily services in the temple.

37. 384 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record of the Vijayanagara king Vira-Bukkaṇa-Uḍaiyār in Svabhānu, Paṅguni. Records the gift of the right of levying certain taxes to goldsmiths by the people of Kūlai Kuḷattūr, Kīḷaipuduvayal and Vikkiramāśōḷa-Muttaraiyar.

38. 385 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in the thirty-ninth year of the Pāṇḍya king Jaṭavarman *alias* Tribhuvana-chakravartin Kulaśēkharadēva a gift of land for a lamp by one of the Kaikōḷa-mudalis of Tiruppanaṅgāḍu in Chōḷa-maṇḍalam. [The record shows that the king ruled for ten years after 1217, the usual terminal year given to him.]

39. 386 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in the twenty-first year of the Pāṇḍya king Kōyil Kulaśēkharadēva a gift of land. See No. 34 above.

40. 387 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. An unfinished record of the Chōḷa king Tribhuvanachakravartin Tribhuvana-vīradēva (1178—1216) “who having taken Madurai (Madura), Iḷam (Ceylon), Karuvūr and the crowned head of the Pāṇḍya was pleased to perform the anointment of heroes and the anointment of victors,” in his thirty-second year.

Kōttūr (near Malaikkoyil).

41. 155 of 1907.—(Tamil.) On the bund of the local tank. Records in the forty-seventh year of the Chōḷa king Tribhuvana-chakravartin Śrī-Kulōttuṅga Chōḷa dēva (I, ? 1070—1118), the repair of a tank by a certain Kulōttuṅga-Chōḷa Kanakarājan. The village was included in the Kāna-nāḍu.

Kudumiyāmalai.

42. 313 of 1904.—(Tamil.) On the east face of the north pillar of the rock-cut shrine in the Mēlaikkōyil temple. A record of the Pāṇḍya king Māraṅjaḍaiyan in his twenty-third year. Mentions Tirunīlakuṅṅam. The king has not been identified.

43. 314 of 1904.—(Tamil.) On the same face. A record of the Chōḷa king Rājakēsarivarman in his twentieth year. Registers the gift of gold for a lamp by a female relation of Perumbiḍugu Muttaraiyar (a feudatory of Nṛipatuṅga).

44. 315 of 1904.—(Tamil.) On the south face of the same pillar. Records in the sixth year of the Chōḷa king Parakēsarivarman a gift of gold for a lamp out of the amount realized by sale of cows given by donors, which the temple authorities were unable to protect against robbers.

45. 316 of 1904.—(Tamil.) On the same face. A record of the Chōla king Rājakēsarivarman. A gift of gold.

46. 317 of 1904.—(Tamil.) On the same face. Records in the sixth year of Pāṇḍya king Parakēsarivarman the gift of gold by a native of Koḍumbālūr in Urattūr-kūṅṅam.

47. 318 of 1904.—(Tamil.) On the west face of the same pillar. A record of the Chōla king Madiraikoṇḍa Parakēsarivarman (Parāntaka I) Śōla-Perumānadiḡaḡ and Śrī-Pirāntakar; recording the gift of gold for a lamp by his son Śrī-Kōdaṇḍarāman, which was a surname of his son Rājāditya. See Ct. 144.

48. 319 of 1904.—(Tamil.) On the same face. A record of king Parakēsarivarman in his fifteenth year. The grant was made apparently to (the temple of) Tirumūlaṭṭānattu-Perumānadiḡaḡ at Tirunalakkuṅṅam in Kuṅṅiyūr-nāḍu.

49. 320 of 1904.—(Tamil.) On the north face of the same pillar. A private record.

50. 321 of 1904.—(Tamil.) On the same face. Records in the tenth year of the Chōla king Parakēsarivarman the gift of gold for a lamp by the queen of Śembiyan Irukkuvēlār.

51. 322 of 1904.—(Tamil.) On the south and east faces of the same pillar. A record of the Chōla king Parakēsarivarman in his thirty-second year. Registers the gift of gold for a lamp by Mayilai-Tiṇḍan *alias* Avandiyakōvappallavaraiyar of Pudukkuḍi.

52. 323 of 1904.—(Tamil.) On the east face of the south pillar of the same shrine. A record of the Pāṇḍya king Śaḍaiyamāran. Records the gift of gold for a lamp by a person who bore the title Parāntaka Aḍalaiyūr-nāḍālvān. The gift was placed under the protection of the villagers of Puḷḷaṅḡuḍi and Parambai. [The king has not been identified.]

53. 324 of 1904.—(Tamil.) On the same face. Records in the twenty-second year of the Chōla king Rājakēsarivarman a gift of gold.

54. 325 of 1904.—(Tamil.) On the south face of the same pillar. Records in the seventh year of the Chōla king Parakēsarivarman a gift of gold for a lamp.

55. 326 of 1904.—(Tamil.) On the same face. The Chōla king Parakēsarivarman records a gift of gold for lamps.

56. 327 of 1904.—(Tamil.) On the west face of the same pillar. Records a gift of gold in the reign of a Chōla king.

57. 328 of 1904.—(Tamil.) On the same face. Records in the fifteenth year of the Chōla king Parakēsarivarman a gift of gold for a lamp by a native of Malaināḍu.

58. 329 of 1904.—(Tamil.) On the north face of the south pillar of the rock-cut shrine in the Mēlaikkōyil temple at Kuḍumiyāmalai.

Registers in the tenth year of the Chōla king Rājakēsarivarman, gift of gold for a lamp by a native of Kūttakudi in Kuṅṅiyūr-nāḍu.

59. 330 of 1904.—(Tamil.) On the same face. Dated in the reign of the Chōla king Rājakēsarivarman. Records gift of gold for a lamp.

60. 331 of 1904.—(Tamil.) On the same face. An incomplete record of the Chōla king Parakēsarivarman in his thirty-eighth year.

61. 332 of 1904.—On the south and east faces of the same pillar. Gift of gold for a lamp in the reign of the Chōla king Parakēsarivarman.

62. 333 of 1904.—On the east wall of the same shrine, right of entrance. Records in the sixth year of the Chōla king Parakēsarivarman gift of gold for a lamp.

63. 334 of 1904.—(Tamil.) In the same place. Records in the fourteenth year of the Chōla king Parakēsarivarman gift of gold for feeding fifteen Śaivas for seven days during the Māsi-Magam festival in connexion with (the temple of) Tirumēṅṅali-Perumānaḍigaḷ at Tirunīlakkunṅam, a *dēvadāna* of Kuṅṅiyūr-nāḍu.

64. 335 of 1904.—(Tamil.) In the same place. A record of the Chōla king Parakēsarivarman in his twenty-first year. Mentions Madhurāntaka-Irukkuvēḷār *alias* Āchchan Vikkiramakēsariyār.

65. 336 of 1904.—(Tamil.) In the same place. Records in the twenty-first year of the Chōla king Parakēsarivarman gift of a village by Madhurāntaka-Irukkuvēḷār *alias* Ādittan Vikkiramakēsari.

66. 337 of 1904.—(Tamil.) In the same place. Records in the sixth year of the Chōla king Parakēsarivarman gift of gold for a lamp by Varaguṅṅanāṅṅi, daughter of Muttaraiyar and queen of Śembiyan Irukkuvēḷār.

67. 338 of 1904.—(Tamil.) In the same place. Records in the sixteenth year of the Chōla king Parakēsarivarman gift of gold for a lamp.

68. 339 of 1904.—(Tamil.) In the same place. Records in the reign of the Chōla king Parakēsarivarman gift of cows by Madhurāntaka-Irukkuvēḷār.

69. 340 of 1904.—(Tamil.) In the same place. Records in the twenty-first year of the Chōla king Parakēsarivarman gift of gold for a lamp.

70. 341 of 1904.—(Tamil.) On the same wall, left of entrance. Records in the twenty-third year of the Chōla king Parakēsarivarman gift of gold for a lamp.

71. 342 of 1904.—(Tamil.) In the same place. Records in the twenty-third year of the Chōla king Parakēsarivarman gift of gold for a lamp for the merit of Viḷuppēraiyyar Vēḷan Puḷaḷan of Manṅaikudi.

72. 343 of 1904.—In the same place. A fragmentary record in Pallava-Grantha characters.

73. 344 of 1904.—(Tamil.) In the same place. Records in the twenty-first year of the Chōla king Parakēsarivarman gift of gold for a lamp.

74. 345 of 1904.—(Tamil.) In the same place. Records in the fifteenth year of the Chōla king Madiraikoṇḍa Parakēsarivarman (905—47) a gift of gold for a lamp at each of the two temples of Tirumūlaṭṭānattu-Perumānaḍigaḷ. Mentions a person who bore the surname Arikulāntavāraṇa-Pēraraiyan.

75. 346 of 1904.—(Tamil.) In the same place. A record of the time of the Chōla king Parakēsarivarman. Registers a gift of gold for a lamp by a native of Pulivalam in Uraiyūr-kūṛṛam.

76. 347 of 1904.—(Tamil.) On the east wall of the rock-cut shrine in the Mēlaikkōyil temple at Kuḍumiyāmalai, left of entrance. A record of the Chōla king Madiraikoṇḍa Parakēsarivarman in his fifteenth year. Records two gifts, viz., gold for a lamp to the temple of Tirumūlaṭṭānattu-Perumānaḍigaḷ by a servant of prince Kōdaṇḍan who was a native of Maṅgalavaśal in Paṅṅiyūr-nāḍu and a similar gift to the Tirumēṛraḷi-Perumānaḍigaḷ temple by another servant of the same prince from Adiyaraiya-maṅgalam in Muṇaippāḍi. With regard to prince Kōdaṇḍan see No. 318 of 1904, i.e., No. 47 above.

77. 348 of 1904.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in the twelfth year of a Chōla king gift of gold by a woman who bore the title Pāṇḍiyadiyaraśi.

78. 349 of 1904.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the same shrine. Records in the third year of the Chōla king Rājakēsarivarman the gift of thirty-one cows.

79. 350 of 1904.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in the sixteenth year of the Chōla king Parakēsarivarman gift of gold for a lamp by a native of Malainādu.

80. 351 of 1904.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in the sixteenth year of the Chōla king Madiraikoṇḍa Parakēsarivarman gift of gold for a lamp by a native of Koḍuṅgōḷūr in Malaināḍu.

81. 352 of 1904.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the same shrine. Records in the twentieth year of the Chōla king Rājakēsarivarman gift of gold for a lamp by a native of Puḷḷaṅguḍi.

82. 353 of 1904.—(Tamil.) On the east wall of the maṅṭapa in front of the same temple. Records in the thirty-sixth year of the Chōla king Rājakēsarivarman *alias* Chakravartin Śrī-Kulōtuṅga-Chōḷadēva (I, 1070—1118) provision for the annual supply of areca-nuts and betel-leaves to the temple of Tirunalakkuṅṅam-uḍaiya-Mahādēvar. Says that the people of the Raṭṭapāḍikoṇḍa-chōḷavaḷanāḍu made an agreement with two persons by which,

in return for the privilege of levying brokerage on all the betel-leaf imported into the district, they should supply 30,000 areca-nuts and 750 betel-bundles every year. The people of the district and "the 500 constituting the *padai* (army) of the district" were to supervise.

83. 354 of 1904.—(Pallava-Grantha.) On the rock south of the same temple. A very interesting and valuable record consisting of seven sections of varying length treating about the various *svaras* (musical sounds). It was composed by an unnamed king (a Pallava, in the opinion of Venkayya) for the benefit of his disciples. The king was himself the pupil of a certain Rudrāchārya. For a short analysis see *Ep. Rep.*, 1905, p. 47. The inscription has been edited in *Ep. Ind.*, Vol. XII, pp. 236-7. See Cg. 286 in p. 470.

84. 355 of 1904.—On the same rock. An epigraph of the Chōla king Parakēsarivarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Śrī-Rājarājadēva (III). Records in his eleventh year in Tamil gift of the gold for two lamps by Kulōttuṅga-Chōla-Kaḍambarāyan. The gift was made to the temple of Tirumēṅṅaḷi-Mahādēva at Tirunalakkunṅam in Kunṅiyūr, a village in Irattapādikoṅḍa-Chōla-valanāḍu. See No. 92 below.

85. 356 of 1904.—On the south wall of the Akhilāṅḍēśvari shrine in the Śikhānāthasvāmin temple in the same village. Records in Grantha the building of the central shrine by a certain Sundarēśa.

86. 356-A of 1904.—(Sanskrit and Telugu.) On the same wall. Dated in the reign of Rāmachandra Mahārāja (i.e., Rāmachandra Toṅḍamān). Records in Ś. 1787, Kali. 4966, Krōdhana, the celebration of the Kumbhābhishēka of the God and Goddess.

87. 352 of 1906.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the Akhilāṅḍēśvari shrine in the Śikhānāthasvāmin temple. Registers in the thirteenth year of the Pāṅḍya king Tribhuvanachakravartin Vīra-Pāṅḍyadēva (unidentifiable) sale of temple land for the purpose of repairing the temple.

88. 353 of 1906.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in the thirteenth year of the Pāṅḍya king Tribhuvanachakravartin Vīra-Pāṅḍyadēva that the proceeds of the sale described in the above inscription were deposited in the temple.

89. 354 of 1906.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the same shrine. A record of the Pāṅḍya king Māravarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Sundara-Pāṅḍyadēva (I, 1216—35), "who was pleased to present the Chōla country." Records in his fourteenth year a gift of land.

90. 355 of 1906.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record of the Pāṅḍya king Tribhuvanachakravartin Sundara-Pāṅḍyadēva (I, 1216—35) "who was pleased to present the Chōla country." Records in his fourteenth year a gift of land.

91. 356 of 1906.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in the eleventh year of the Pāṇḍya king Jaṭavarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Vira-Pāṇḍyadēva, a gift of land. [He, was probably the king who ascended the throne in 1253. See No. 95 below.]

92. 357 of 1906.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the second prakāra of the same temple. Records in the eighteenth year of the Chōḷa king Tribhuvanachakravartin Kulōttuṅga Chōḷadēva, a gift of land by Kulōttuṅga-Chōḷa Kaḍambarāyan.

93. 358 of 1906.—On the same wall. A record of the Chōḷa king Parakēsarivarman in his eighth year, in Tamil. A copy of an older document.

94. 359 of 1906.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record of the Chōḷa king Tirubhuvanachakravartin Kulōttuṅga-Chōḷadēva (III?) in his fifteenth year. A gift of land. See No. 84 above.

95. 360 of 1906.—On the south wall of the same prakāra. Records a sale of land in the fifteenth year of the Pāṇḍya king Jaṭavarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Vira-Pāṇḍyadēva, “who took Īlam (Ceylon), Koṅgu and Śōḷa-maṇḍalam and after conquering the powerful (king) was pleased to perform the anointment of heroes and the anointment of victors at Perumbarrapuliyūr.” The king ascended the throne in 1253.

96. 361 of 1906.—On the same wall. Records a gift of land in the fifteenth year of king Jaṭavarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Vira-Pāṇḍyadēva, “who took Īlam (Ceylon), Koṅgu and Śōḷa-maṇḍalam and after conquering the powerful (king) was pleased to perform the anointment of heroes and the anointment of victors at Perumbarrapuliyūr.” The village belonged apparently to Kōnādu *alias* Kaḍalaḍaiyādilaṅgaikoṇḍa Chōḷa-vaḷanāḍu.

97. 362 of 1906.—On the same wall. Records in the third year of the Pāṇḍya king Māravarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Sundara-Pāṇḍyadēva (I, 1216—35), “who was pleased to take the Chōḷa country,” a public sale of land and its purchase by Uḍaiyār Gaṅgēyarāyar, a native of Ārrūr in Chōḷa-Pāṇḍya-vaḷanāḍu.

98. 363 of 1904.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A damaged inscription of the Chōḷa king Tribhuvanachakravartin Rājarājadēva in his eighth year.

99. 364 of 1906.—On the same wall. A record of the Chōḷa king Tribhuvanachakravartin Kulōttuṅga-Chōḷadēva in his thirty-fifth year. The inscription was copied over in the third year of Sundara-Pāṇḍyadēva when a new maṇṭapa was built.

100. 365 of 1906.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in the seventh year of the Pāṇḍya king Tribhuvanachakravartin Vira-Pāṇḍyadēva a public sale of land. See No. 95 above.

101. 366 of 1906.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in the tenth year of the Chōḷa king Parakēsarivarman loans of gold

for supplying ghee in payment of interest. Probably a copy of an older document.

102. 367 of 1906.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in the fifth year of the Chōla king Tribhuvanachakravartin Rājarājadēva a gift of land to the temple of Trivikrama-Chōlīśvara-muḍaiya-Mādēvar at Mēlmaṇinallūr.

103. 368 of 1906.—(Tamil.) On the rock to the north of the rock-cut cave called Mēlai-Kōyil in the same temple. Records in the sixteenth year of the Chōla king Rājakēsarivarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Rājarājadēva(I?) a gift of land.

104. 369 of 1906.—(Tamil.) On the rock to the south of the same shrine. A record of the ninth year of a king. Built in at the beginning.

105. 370 of 1906.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the maṇṭapa in front of the same shrine. A damaged record of the fifth year of the Chōla king Tribhuvanachakravartin Rājarājadēva.

106. 371 of 1906.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. An inscription of the Chōla king Tribhuvanachakravartin Kulōttuṅga-Chōladēva (I?). Records in his forty-fifth year the gift of 96 sheep for map.

107. 372 of 1906.—(Tamil.) On the second gōpura of the same temple, right of the entrance. Records in the second year of the Pāṇḍya king Tribhuvanachakravartin Vīra-Pāṇḍyadēva the theft of temple treasury and temple jewels by the *pūjāris* and their trial by the method of red-hot ploughshare ordeal. See No. 95 above for the probable identity of the king.

108. 373 of 1906.—In the same place. A record in Tamil verse, mentioning the Pāṇḍya (*tennavan*) Śeyyaperumāl, ruler of Madura.

109. 374 of 1906.—In the same place. A record in Tamil verse in praise of a Pāṇḍya king.

110. 375 of 1906.—(Tamil.) On the same gōpura, left of entrance. An epigraph of the Pāṇḍya king Jaṭavarman Tribhuvanachakravartin Vīra-Pāṇḍyadēva in his twenty-seventh year. Mentions Śikānallūr in Kōnāḍu.

111. 376 of 1906.—In the same place. A record in Tamil verse. Refers to the defeat of the Chōla king Karikāla.

112. 377 of 1906.—In the same place. Records in Tamil verse a verse by the poet Ādinādar, making fun of the God Śiva.

113. 378 of 1906.—(Tamil.) In the same place. A record of Tirumalaidēva-Mahārāja in Vikramā. Inaccessible in the middle on account of the temple door.

114. 379 of 1906.—(Tamil.) On the rock behind the Vināyaka shrine in the same temple. Records in the twenty-first year of the Pāṇḍya king Tribhuvanachakravartin Śundara-Pāṇḍyadēva (unidentified) a sale of land.

115. 380 of 1906.—(Tamil.) In the same place. Records in the twenty-second year of the Pāṇḍya king Māravarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Sundara-Pāṇḍyadēva (I, 1216^a—35), “who was pleased to take the Chōḷa country” a sale of land. Mentions the temple of Tiruvikrama-Chōḷīśvaramudaiya-Nāyanār.

116. 381 of 1906.—(Tamil verse.) On the rock behind the Aiyānār temple in the same village. A record in praise of a Pāṇḍya king who boasts of having defeated both the Chōḷas and a certain Vaḍugeṇḍa Magadēśan.

117. 382 of 1906.—In the same place. A record in Tamil verse, in praise of Vāṇakulōttaman.

118. 383 of 1906.—In the same place. A record in Tamil verse and prose, in praise of a chief named Vīramāgadan Rājarājadēvan Ponparappinān Magadaiperumāḷ.

119. 384 of 1906.—(Tamil.) On the northern side of the hill in the same village, near a well. Records the construction of the well by Talaiyūr-nādālvān.

120. 385 of 1906.—On the southern side of the same hill near another well. A record in Tamil verse, in praise of the chief Rājarāja and his son Ponparappina-Perumāḷ. See No. 118 above.

Kunṇāṇḍarkōyil.

121. 345 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the rock south of the rock-cut central shrine in the Parvatagirīśvara temple. A record of the Pāṇḍya king Jaṭavarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Sundara-Pāṇḍyadēva. Records in his twelfth year a gift of land. [It is not known which of the Sundara Pāṇḍyas is referred to.]

122. 346 of 1914.—On a pillar of the rock-cut cave of the same temple. Records in Tamil the gift of rice by Kōdai Mayindan (evidently a Chēra) for feeding 110 Brāhmaṇas on the day of Tiruvādirai festival of the God Kuṇṇakkudittēvar. Mr. Krishna Sastri would assign the inscription on palæographical grounds to the eighth century.

123. 347 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the south end of the same cave. A record of the Pallava king Nandippōttaraiyar (Nandivarman III?). Records in his third year the gift of rice for feeding 100 persons on the day of Tiruvādirai, by a native of Vaḍuvūr in Mīpuḷaināḍu. [This as well as the next inscription gives the southern limits of the Pallava Empire.]

124. 348 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the north end of the same cave. Records in the fifth year of the Pallava king Dantippōttaraiyar the digging of the tank Vāli-ēri by Vāli-Vaḍugan *alias* Kalimūrka Iḷavaraiyan, a servant of Mārappiḍuvinār *alias* Pēradiairaiyar.

125. 349 of 1914.—On the south wall of the maṅṭapa in front of the same cave. A record of the Vijayanagara king Mallikārjuna-Virūpāksharāya, son of Dēvarāya II, “who was pleased to take every country and to institute the elephant hunt,” dated in Ś. 1415, Ānanda, Vriśchika, śu. di., Monday, the gift of land to the temple of Kuṅṅakkudi-udaiya-Nāyanār in Vaḍa-Panaṅgāḍu-nāḍu, a subdivision of Kāṭṭu-nāḍu *alias* Jayaśiṅgakulakāla-vaḷanāḍu. “Details of date not enough for calculation.”

126. 350 of 1914.—On the east wall of the same maṅṭapa. Records in the fourteenth year of Tribhuvanachakravartin Konērimēlkoṇḍān, the gift of money for offerings at the service Sundara-Pāṇḍyan-śāndi, so called after the king.

127. 351 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in Piṅgaḷa an agreement between the residents of Peruṅgoḷiyūr and Iraṅḍu-malai-nāḍu to protect each other against loss of life and property during times of adversity.

128. 352 of 1914.—On the north wall of the same maṅṭapa. A record of the Pāṇḍya king Jaṭāvarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Parākrama-Pāṇḍyadēva in his ninth year Āvaṇi, Kanyā, ba. di., Saturday, 11, Punarvasu, corresponding to 27th August, A.D. 1323. Registers a gift of land to Vyāpakaśiva, one of the disciples of the *Naḍuvil-maḍam* at Tiruvānaikkā and of the Lakshādhyāya lineage, by Aṅgarāyan, a native of Perumbuliyūr in Tenmalai-nāḍu, a subdivision of Vaḍa-Panaṅgāḍu-nāḍu in the district of Jayaśiṅga-kulakāla-vaḷanāḍu. According to Mr. Swamikannu Pillai this king began to rule between 15th April and 10th August 1315. See *Ind. Antq.*, June 1913.

129. 353 of 1914.—On the same wall. A record of the Vijayanagara king Viruppaṅa-Uḍaiyār in Āṅgiraśa. Damaged.

130. 354 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records that in the reign of the Vijayanagara king Viruppaṅa-Uḍaiyār II, i.e., Virūpāksha I, son of Ariyaṅa-Uḍaiyār (Harihara II), in Vibhava, that a dancing girl repaired the northern wall of the temple which had fallen down.

131. 355 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. An epigraph of the Pāṇḍya king Tribhuvanachakravartin Kōnarimaikoṇḍān Kulaśēkharadēva. Records in his third year the gift of the village of Nāṅgūr in Purakkilīyūr-nāḍu by Vaḷattuvālvitta Perumā *alias* Toṅḍaimānār for instituting a service in his own name.

132. 356 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in the eighteenth year of the Pāṇḍya king Jaṭāvarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Sundara-Pāṇḍyadēva a gift of land as *pādik-kāvat*. [It is not known which of the kings of this name is referred to.]

133. 357 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records the building of the *nṛitta-maṅṭapa* and another by a certain *Aḷagiya-śoḷa-nāḍālvān*.

134. 358 of 1914.—On the same wall. A record of the Pāṇḍya king *Jaṭāvarman alias Tribhuvanachakravartin Parākrama-Pāṇḍyadēva* in his ninth year, ba. di. 6, Wednesday, Rōhiṇi. Registers the gift of land to *Vyāpakaśiva* referred to in No. 128 above, by a native of *Perumalaiyūr* in *Tenmalaināḍu*, a subdivision of *Vaḍa-Panaṅgāḍu-nāḍu* in *Jayaśiṅgakulakāla-vaḷanāḍu*.

135. 359 of 1914.—On the cross wall of the east *prākāra* of the same temple. An inscription of the twelfth year of the Pāṇḍya king *Jaṭāvarman alias Tribhuvanachakravartin Sundara-Pāṇḍyadēva* (unidentified). Records that the *Araiya*s of *Iraṇḍu-malai-nāḍu* gave an agreement to the headman of *Kuṇṇāṇḍārkōyil* that during the times of enmity and war amongst themselves they will in no way molest the tenants and other inhabitants of the villages which they were guarding. "If, however, any person is so injured they would pay a fine of 100 *paṇams* and if a village is destroyed they would pay a fine of 500 *paṇams*. Doing this they still agreed to protect (the villagers and cultivators) though there may be cutting, piercing and dying (in their communal fights)." *Ep. Rep.*, 1915, p. 103.

136. 360 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in the fourth year of *Tribhuvanachakravartin Kōnērinmaikoṇḍān* a gift of money for offerings during the service *Sundara-Pāṇḍyan-śandi*, so called after the king.

137. 361 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record of the *Vijayanagara* king *Dēvarāya Mahārāya*. Records in *Viśva-vasu* gift of land.

138. 362 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Dated in the reign of the *Vijayanagara* king *Dēvarāya-Mahārāya*. Records in Ś. 1354, *Rākshasa*, a transaction similar to that in No. 196 below.

139. 363 of 1914.—On the same wall. A record of *Tribhuvanachakravartin Kōnērinmaikoṇḍān* in his twelfth year *Mithuna*, śu. di., Friday, 1, *Pushya*. Registers the gift of money for offerings at the service *Rājarājan-Sundara-Pāṇḍyan-śandi* (so called after the king), out of the savings of the temple, which annually amounted to 101 gold pieces. So this sum was ordered to be deducted from the village accounts and from the accounts of the State. [See No. 298 below for details of the king.]

140. 364 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On three pillars of the *vāhana-maṅṭapa* in the same temple. Records the names of the persons who had made a gift of the pillars.

141. 365 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the second *gōpura* of the same temple, right of entrance. A record of the *Vijayanagara* king

Bukkana Uḍaiyār in Subhānu, Āvaṇi, 22nd. Registers a gift of land by Naraśiṅgadēva, a chief of Perambūr in Vaḍakōnāḍu, a subdivision of Kōnāḍu *alias* Kaḍaladaiyād-Ilaṅgaikoṇḍaśōḷa-vaḷanāḍu.

142. 366 of 1914.—(Tamil.) In the same place. A damaged record of the Vijayanagara king Irāyaṇa-Uḍaiyār, son of Ariyaṇa-Uḍaiyār.

143. 367 of 1914.—In the same place. Records in the seventh year of Tribhuvanachakravartin Kōnērinmaikoṇḍān the gift of a number of taxes.

144. 368 of 1914.—On the same gōpura, left of entrance. A record of the Vijayanagara king Viruppaṇa Uḍaiyār in Bhava, fixing the fee to be paid to the temple by Kaḷḷa Vēlaikkārar for the protection afforded to them. Mentions Rājagambhīra-vaḷanāḍu, Rājarāja-vaḷanāḍu, Pāṇḍyakulāśani-vaḷanāḍu and Nittavinōḍa-vaḷanāḍu which were on the southern bank (of the Kāvēri).

145. 369 of 1914.—In the same place. A record of the Vijayanagara king Bukkaṇa-Uḍaiyār I in Naḷa (Ś. 1298), Vaigāsi, sixth day. Records that a certain Vikramaśōḷa-Muttarayan of Kīḷaippuduvayal made an assignment of one-fifth of his profits as *kāṇiyākshi* and *araśu* over his estate to the temple and stipulated that in the absence of any male issue the remaining four-fifths should also belong to the temple.

146. 370 of 1914.—In the same place. Records in the thirty-ninth year of the Chōḷa king Tribhuvanachakravartin Kulōttuṅga-chōḷadēva III, who was pleased to take Madurai (Madura) and the crowned head of Vīra Pāṇḍya (i.e., Kulōttuṅga III) the gift of land to a temple musician (*vājyamārāyan*).

147. 371 of 1914.—In the same place. Records in Tamil the employment in the temple of a washerman and his wife.

148. 372 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the north side of the same gōpura. Records in the second year of the Chōḷa king Rājarājadēva the gift of 1,000 *kāśus* every year to the temple of Kuṅṅrap-perumāl by the inhabitants of Peruṅguḍi *alias* Virudarājabhayaṅkarapuram who were the tenants of the temple.

149. 373 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the south side of the same gōpura. Records in the third year of the Chōḷa king Rājarājadēva that the residents of Panaṅgāḍu-nāḍu fixed one *mā* of land to be assigned to the temple as a fine for any damage caused to the arable land at Nalvayalūr or for any injury done on the high way.

150. 374 of 1914.—(Tamil.) In the hundred-pillared maṅṭapa of the same temple. A record mentioning Kuṅṅran Koppili Śiṅgadēva, son of Peruṅgalūr Nāḍalvān.

151. 375 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On sixteen pillars of the same maṅṭapa. Records that the pillars were the gift of private individuals mentioned therein.

152. 376 of 1914.—(Tamil, modern characters.) On the doorpost of the unfinished gōpura of the same temple. Records in Pārthiva, Arpaśi, an assignment of customs duty on every package coming from or going into Tanjore and Trichinopoly for midday offerings.

Malaikkōyil.

153. 152 of 1907.—(Tamil.) At the right entrance into the local cave. A record of the Pāṇḍya king Jaṭāvarman *alias* Tribhuvana-chakravartin Kulaśēkharadēva (I or II?) in his third year mentioning Kānanāḍu *alias* Virudarājabhayamkaravaḷanāḍu.

154. 153 of 1907.—On the left side of the same cave. A Tamil and Grantha inscription in the ancient characters of the Pallava period.

155. 154 of 1907.—On the south wall of another cave. Records apparently a gift of land by the Chōḷa Parakēsarivarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Śrī-Kulōttuṅga-Chōḷa-dēva (II or III?). (Date lost.)

Mallaṅguḍi.

156. 156 of 1907.—(Tamil.) On a stone set up in the village. A record of the Vijayanagara king Viruppaṇa Uḍaiyār (I or II?), dated on a Piṅgaḷa and damaged.

Nāṅgupatti.

157. 332 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the entrance into the first prakāra of the Maḍattukkōyil at Nāṅgupatti, right side. A record of the Pāṇḍya king Māravarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Sundara-Pāṇḍyadēva I (1216--35), "who was pleased to distribute the Chōḷa country." Records in his thirteenth year, Mēsha 14, śu. di. 7, Saturday, Uttaraphalguni, a gift of money by a dancing girl belonging to the temple of Tiruvagattīśuram-uḍaiya-nāyanār for celebrating a festival in the temple of Tirupperumānanda-Nāyanār in Vaḍa-Kōnāḍu, a subdivision of Urattūr-kūṅṅam in Irattapādikoṇḍaśōḷa-vaḷanāḍu. [According to Mr. Swamikannu Pillai the date corresponded to 7th April 1229.]

158. 333 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same entrance. Records in the fourteenth year of the Chōḷa king Tribhuvanachakravartin Kulōttuṅgachōḷadēva gift of money for the celebration of the new-moon day festival.

159. 334 of 1914.—Records in the twentieth year of the Chōḷa king Parakēsarivarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Kulōttuṅga-Chōḷadēva II, the gift of 100 sheep for a lamp. Mr. Swamikannu

Pillai calculates the date (Thursday, Śravaṇa, śu. di. 11, Kanyā) to be Thursday, September 11, A.D. 1152. As the accession of Kulōttuṅga II was between 9th May and 17th August 1133 the present date is in agreement with it. It is the latest date of his reign and shows that it continued into the reign of his successor Rājarāja II whose initial date was 1146.

160. 335 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same entrance. A record of the Chōla king Rājakēsarivarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Kulōttuṅga-Chōladēva (I?). Records in his thirteenth year (Kanyā 7, Monday, Uttara-Bhādrapada) gift of land by a native of Marudattūr in Kallāttūr-kōṭṭam, a subdivision of Jayaṅgaśōla-maṇḍalam. The land was received by the donor as a present for composing verses in praise of a certain Vēdavanamuḍaiyān. Mr. Swamikannu Pillai corrects Bhādrapada into Phalguni and then arrives at the date 2nd September 1084.

161. 336 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same entrance, left side. An inscription of the Chōla king Tribhuvanachakravartin Rājādhirājadēva II, in his twelfth year. Registers a gift of land for offerings to the Periyānāchchiyār, by a merchant of Śārappaṭṭaṇam *alias* Vikramaśōlapperunderu.

162. 337 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same entrance, left side. A record of the Chōla king Rājakēsarivarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Rājādhirājadēva II, in his second year, Makara, 7th day, Monday, Svāti. Registers the gift of the village of Nedungiraikkudi by Edirilapperumāl *alias* Kulōttuṅgaśōla Kaḍambarāyan. [The date has been pointed out to be unsuitable to the second year of the king.]

163. 338 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the west wall of the same prakāra. Records the construction of the parapet? (*eduttukatti*) by Viraśiṅgapanman.

164. 339 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record of the Chōla king Parakēsarivarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Tribhuvanavīradēva, "who having taken Īlam (Ceylon), Madurai (Madura) and the crowned head of the Pāṇḍya, was pleased to perform the anointment of heroes and the anointment of victors at Madura" (Kulōttuṅga III). Records in his thirty-fifth year the gift of the village Punnaṅgudi to the temple of Tirupperumānanda-Nāyanār for worship and repairs by Ūruḍaipperumāl *alias* Edirilīśōla Kaḍambarāyan for the merit of the king during his stay at Madura. The village was subsequently renamed Uḍaiyaperumāl-nallūr after the king. Mentions the road Tribhuvanavīranperuvaḷi.

165. 340 of 1914.—On the four sides of a pillar of the west verandah of the same prakāra. A record of the Chōla king Rājādhirājadēva II (1171—86), "who was pleased to take Īlam

(Ceylon) and Madurai (Madura)," in his thirteenth year regarding the building of the *nṛitta-maṅṭapa*.

166. 341 of 1914.—On the wall of the north verandah of the same *prākāra*. An inscription of the Chōḷa king Parakēsarivarman in his thirteenth year in Tamil. Mentions Viraśōḷan Uttamaśīlan and the temple of Tirupperumānkōyil-Mahādēva in Urattūr-kūṛram.

167. 342 of 1914.—On the same wall. A record of the seventeenth year (Mithuna, śu. di. 10, Friday, Svāti) of the Pāṇḍya king Jaṭavarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Sundara-Pāṇḍyadēva I (1251—64) "who was pleased to take all countries." Registers the gift of land for festivals and repairs in the temple of Tirupperumānanda-Nāyanār for the merit of the king and the country by the people of Vaḍakōnāḍu. The date, according to Mr. Swamikannu Pillai, corresponded to July 1, A.D. 1267.

168. 343 of 1914.—On the niches of the central shrine in the same temple. Records in Grantha the names of the *rishis* who worshipped the God in this temple, viz., Jamadagni, Parāśara, Agastya and Viśvāmitra.

169. 344 of 1914.—On the west base of the Amman shrine in the same temple. A record of the Vijayanagara king Vira-Rāyaṅṇa-Uḍaiyār, "who was pleased to take every country," in Vikāri, registering a political compact between the residents of Perambūr and Kīḷaikkurichchi by which they agreed to be no longer enemies but to be friends and even to combine in any common cause. Reference is also made to a similar compact engraved in the temple of Araṅgulavar (at Tiruvaraṅḷam).

Nārttāmalai.

170. 357 of 1904.—On the rock which forms the north wall of the Tirumalaikkaḍambar temple. Records in the seventh year of the Chōḷa king Tribhuvanachakravartin Śrī-Rājendra-Chōḷadēva a gift of land to a carpenter who had built certain temples. The temple at Nārttāmalai is called Tirumalaikaḍambūr-Uḍaiya-Nāyanār at Teliṅgakulakālapuram *alias* Kulōttuṅga-Chōḷa-paṭṭaṅam.

171. 358 of 1904.—On the same rock. A record of the third year of the Chōḷa king Rājakēsarivarman *alias* Uḍaiyār Śrī-Rājendra-Chōḷadēva. The historical introduction belongs to Parakēsarivarman *alias* Rājendradēva (1050—62).

172. 359 of 1904.—(Tamil.) On the same rock. The Chōḷa king Parakēsarivarman *alias* Uḍaiyār Śrī-Rājendradēva (1050—63) records in his fourth year gift of gold for lamp.

173. 360 of 1904.—(Tamil.) On the same rock. Dated in the reign of the Chōḷa king Parakēsarivarman *alias* Tribhuvana-chakravartin Śrī-Kulōttuṅga Chōḷadēva (III) "who took Madura, the

crowned head of the Pāṇḍya and Kañchi." Records in the twenty-seventh year of his reign a gift of land. Mentions Teliṅgakulakālapuram. *See S.A. 863. Some time before 1196 Conjeeveram should have been lost and it was now retaken.

174. 361 of 1904.—(Tamil.) On the same rock. A record of the Pāṇḍya king Tribhuvanachakravartin Śrī-Sundara-Pāṇḍyadēva. Records in his third year a gift of gold.

175. 362 of 1904.—On the east wall of the prakāra of the same temple. Records in the thirty-first year of the Pāṇḍya king Māravarman Tribhuvanachakravartin Kulaśēkharadēva (I, 1268—1308) a sale of land. The temple is called Tirumalaikkadam-būruḍaiya-Nāyanār in Teliṅgakulakālapuram *alias* Kulōttuṅga-Chōlapaṭṭaṇam, a city in Kōnāḍu *alias* Kaḍaladaiyād-Ilaṅgaikoṇḍa-Chōla-vaḷanāḍu.

176. 363 of 1904.—(Tamil.) On the rock north of the pond situated to the west of the same temple. A record of the Pāṇḍya king Jaṭavarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Śrī-Parākrama-Pāṇḍyadēva in his sixth year. Registers the distribution of certain temple lands among the dancing girls of the temple. The name of the village and the district in which it was situated are given as in the above inscription. [Was he the king who ascended the throne in 1315?] See No. 128 above.

177. 364 of 1904.—(Tamil.) On a rock of the big rock-cut hall known as Kshamaṇāḷ-kuḍagu on the Mēlamalai hill in the same village. Records in the eighteenth year of the Pāṇḍya king Māravarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Śrī-Sundara-Pāṇḍyadēva I (1216—35) "who was pleased to present the Chōla country," a gift of land. Refers to the setting up of the images of Pāḍinēnbū-miviṇṇagar-Emberumān and his consorts at the city of Teliṅgakulakālapuram *alias* Kulōttuṅga-Śōlapaṭṭiṇam in Irattapāḍikoṇḍa-Śōlavaḷanāḍu.

178. 365 of 1904.—(Tamil.) On the north base of a ruined maṇṭapa in front of the rock-cut Śiva shrine in the same place. Records in the seventh year of the "Gaṅga Pallava king," Vijaya-Nṛipatuṅgavarman the excavation of the temple (*śrikōyil*) by Śattan Paḷiyili, son of Viḍēlviḍugu Muttaraiyan and of the maṇṭapa in front of the temple, the bull with its maṇṭapa and the *balipiṭha*.

179. 366 of 1904.—On a rock north of the Arumaikkulam pond in the same village. A record in Tamil, archaic characters. The excavation of the pond by Tamiḷadiyaraiyan *alias* Mallan Viḍaman.

Pēraiṅyūr.

180. 158 of 1907.—(Tamil.) On the east wall of the maṇṭapa in front of the central shrine in the Nāganāthasvāmin temple. A

record of the Vijayanagara king Dēvarāya-Mahārāya (I), son of Ariyarāya (Harihara II), in Ś. 1343, Plava.

181. 159 of 1907.—On the same wall. Dated in the reign of the Chōla king Tribhuvanachakravartin Śrī-Rājarājadēva in his twentieth year. The temple is called Tirunāgīśvaramuḍaiya-Nāyanār at Tiruppērai-yūr. Another damaged inscription of the same king is found below.

182. 160 of 1907.—On the same wall. Records in thirteenth year of Tribhuvanachakravartin Māravarman *alias* Sundara-Pāṇḍyadēva I (1216—35) “who was pleased to present the Chōla country,” the sale of a village site for occupation under the name Kulaśēkharapperunderu. A later inscription is engraved below this.

183. 161 of 1907.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record of the Pāṇḍya king Tribhuvanachakravartin Vikrama-Pāṇḍyadēva (unidentified) in his fifth year, mentioning horse-dealers (*kudirai-ṣetti*) from Malaimaṇḍalam. Damaged.

184. 162 of 1907.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record of the Vijayanagara king Achyutadēva-Mahārāya in Ś. 1458, expired, Durmukha, mentioning Kānanāḍu *alias* Virudarājabhayaṁkaravaḷaṇāḍu and Tiruppērai.

185. 163 of 1907.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the same maṇṭapa. A record of the Pāṇḍya king Māravarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Kulaśēkharadēva I (1268—1308) “who was pleased to take every country,” in his twenty-second year. Mentions Malaiyālaṅguḍi in Kāna-nāḍu *alias* Virudarājabhayaṁkara-vaḷaṇāḍu.

186. 164 of 1907.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record of the Pāṇḍya king Māravarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Kulaśēkharadēva I (1268—1308) “who was pleased to take every country,” in his thirty-third year. A portion of this inscription could not be traced. Seems to record a gift of land.

187. 165 of 1907.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the Kāchi-koḍutta-Nāyanār shrine in the same temple. A sale of land in twenty-second year of the Pāṇḍya king Māravarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Kulaśēkharadēva I (1268—1308) “who was pleased to take every country.”

188. 166 of 1907.—On the rock in front of the same temple. A damaged record of Parakēsarivarman *alias* Śrī-Rājendra-Chōladēva I (1011—53).

189. 167 of 1907.—On the same rock. A damaged record of the Chōla king Rājakēsarivarman *alias* Chakravartin Śrī-Kulōttuṅga-Chōladēva (I?) in his fifteenth year mentioning Kānanāḍu in Virudarājabhayaṁkara-vaḷaṇāḍu and (the temple of) Tirunāgīśvaramuḍaiya-Mahādēvar.

190. 168 of 1907.—(Tamil.) On the same rock. Records in thirty-sixth year of the Chōla king Chakravartin Śrī-Kulōttuṅga-Chōladēva (I?) a sale of land.

Perundurāi.

191. 404 of 1906.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the ruined Śiva temple near the village. A record of the Chōla-Pāṇḍya king Jaṭavarman *alias* Śrī-Sundara-Chōla-Pāṇḍyadēva, the viceroy of Madura under (his father) Rājēndrachōla I, in his twelfth year. The village is called Perundurāi in Kānanāḍu, a subdivision of Rājēndra-Chōla-vaḷanāḍu (a district of) Rājarāja-Pāṇḍi-nāḍu. Mentions (the temple of) Sundara-Chōla-Pāṇḍya-Īśvaramuḍaiyār.

192. 405 of 1906.—On the west wall of the Satyanārāyaṇa-Perumāḷ temple in the same village. Records in the twenty-sixth year of Tribhuvanachakravartin Kulaśēkharadēva (unidentified) a gift of land. Mentions the temple of Kaṇḍi-dēva-Viṇṇagar-Emberumān. The stones are not in their original order.

193. 406 of 1906.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record of the Pāṇḍya king Tribhuvanachakravartin Kulaśēkharadēva in his twenty-second year. The stones are not in their original order. Gift of land.

Peruṅgaḷūr.

194. 192 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the east wall of the central shrine in the Vamśōddhāraṅkanātha temple. Dated in the reign of the Pāṇḍya king Jaṭavarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Vīra-Pāṇḍyadēva. Records in his fourteenth year, Āni, a dispute between the residents of Peruṅgaḷūr and Maṅgalam regarding the rightful ownership of Ariyūr, a *dēvadāna* village. [Was he the king who came to the throne in 1253?]

195. 193 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the same shrine. Records in the forty-fifth year of the Chōla king Tribhuvanachakravartin Kulōttuṅgachōladēva a gift of land to the temple of Kulōttuṅgachōlīśvaram-Uḍaiyār.

196. 194 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the west wall of the same shrine. An inscription of the Pāṇḍya king Vīra Pāṇḍya-dēva in his twenty-ninth year. Registers the gift of paddy to the residents of Peruṅgaḷūr in Ten-Panaṅgāḍu-nāḍu, a subdivision of Jaya-śiṅgakulakāla-vaḷanāḍu, by two chiefs of Vaṭṭāṇḍārkōṭṭai. The gift is called *aśariyapramāṇam*.

197. 195 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the maṅṭapa in front of the same shrine. Records that the swing maṅṭapa and the images of Sundaraperumāḷ and Sūrya were the gifts of a private individual.

198. 196 of 1914.—On the same wall. Records gift of land for a lamp.

199. 197 of 1914.—On the same wall. Records a gift of lamp to the Kūttādumdēvar in the temple of Kulōttuṅga-Chōḷīśvaram-Uḍaiyār at Peruṅgalūr.

200. 198 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in Naḷa Vaigāśi, twenty-third, a gift of land by a native of Peruṅgōḷiyūr as a compensation to a private individual for falsely incriminating the latter before the royal residence.

201. 199 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the west wall of the same maṅṭapa. A record in Siddhārthi, Puraṭṭāśi. Much damaged.

202. 200 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the same maṅṭapa. A record of the Vijayanagara king Bukkaṇa-Uḍaiyār II, son of Ariyaṇa-Uḍaiyār (Harihara II), in Chitrabhānu, Pūraṭṭādi 7. Registers a gift of land for offerings to the temple of Kulōttuṅga Chōḷīśvaram-uḍaiya-Nāyanār at Peruṅgōḷiyūr in Ten-Panaṅgāḍu-nāḍu, a subdivision of Jayaśiṅgakulakāla-vaḷanāḍu.

203. 201 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record of the Vijayanagara king Bhūpatirāya. Records in Sarvadhāri, Pūraṭṭādi 12, a gift of land in Munnattūr for offerings to the same temple, by a native of Vaḍa-Panaṅgāḍu.

204. 202 of 1914.—(Tamil.) At the entrance into the same maṅṭapa. Records a gift of land for offerings to the temple of Aḷagiya-Kulōttuṅgar.

205. 203 of 1914.—On stones built into the Maṅḷa-Nāyaki shrine in the same temple. Mention the Chōḷa king Rājakēsari-varman. One records a gift of gold; another mentions the temple of Mahādēva at Śōḷachūḷāmaṇi-chaturvēdi maṅḷalam and a third refers to the village of Peruṅgōḷūr.

Pon Amarāvati.

206. 2 of 1909.—On the south wall of the central shrine in the Chōḷēśvara temple. Records in the twenty-first year of the Pāṇḍya king Māravarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Sundara-Pāṇḍya-dēva I, “who was pleased to distribute the Chōḷa country” (1216—1235) a gift of land for offerings at a festival (*śandi*) called after the king, in the temple of Rājendra Śōḷichchuramuḍaiya-Nāyanār at Ponnamarāpadi in Puramalai-nāḍu.

207. 3 of 1909.—On the south wall of the central shrine in the same temple. A record of the Chōḷa king Tribhuvanachakravartin Kulōttuṅga-Chōḷadēva, twelfth year. Records the gift of a village to the temple of Rājendra-Chōḷīśvaram-uḍaiyār at Ponnamarāpadi.

208. 4 of 1909.—On the south wall of the central shrine in the same temple. A record of the Chōḷa king Tribhuvanachakravartin Rājarāja-dēva (III?) in his eighth year. Mentions a certain

Nishadarāja, who appears to have built a *vimāna* and set up a *Siva-liṅga*.¹ Puramalaināḍu was a subdivision of Rājēndrāśōḷa-valānāḍu in Rājarāja-Pāṇḍināḍu.

209. 5 of 1909.—On the south wall of the central shrine in the same temple. A record of the Chōḷa king Tribhuvanachakravartin Kulōttuṅga-Chōḷadēva. Records in his eighteenth year a gift of land to a *matha* called Nilamai-Aḷagiyan-tirumaḍam by Koḍuṅguṅṅamudaiyān Aḷagiya-dēvan *alias* Nishadharājan.

210. 6 of 1909.—On the south wall of the central shrine in the same temple. A record of the Pāṇḍya king Sundara-Pāṇḍyadēva, “who was pleased to distribute the Chōḷa country” (1216—35). Refers in his twelfth year to Ponnamarāpadi in Puramalaināḍu.

211. 7 of 1909.—On the west wall of the same shrine. A record of the Pāṇḍya king Sundara-Pāṇḍyadēva in Ś. 1293, Virōḍi (for Virōdhakrit). Records a gift to the temple of Rājēndiraśōḷīśvaramudaiya-Nāyanār at Ponnamarāpadi in Puramalaināḍu for the merit of Sundara-Pāṇḍya-chakravartin.

212. 8 of 1909.—On the north wall of the same shrine. A record of the Pāṇḍya king Sundara-Pāṇḍyadēva in Ś. 1400, Viḷambi. Registers a gift of land for the merit of a certain *Kaik-kōḷa* of the Aḷagiyaśōkkanār temple at Madura.

213. 9 of 1909.—On the north wall of the same shrine. Records in the nineteenth year of the Chōḷa king Tribhuvanachakravartin Rājarājadēva in his nineteenth year the consecration of Rājēndrachōḷīśvaramudaiya-Mahādēva and the building of the central shrine (*śrivimāna*) by Vīman Rājēndraśōḷan *alias* Nishadarājan.

214. 10 of 1909.—On the north wall of the same shrine. Records in the twenty-third year of the Pāṇḍya king Jaṭavarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Kulaśēkharadēva a gift of land situated in Velkūr *alias* Malayadhvaja-chaturvēdi maṅgalam in Puramalaināḍu to the shrine of Tirukkāmakkōṭṭamudaiya-Āḷudaiya-Nāchchiyār in the temple of Rājēndrachōḷīśvaram-Uḍaiyār by Koḍuṅguṅṅam Uḍaiyān Kēraḷan *alias* Nishadharāja.

215. 11 of 1909.—On the north wall of the same shrine. Dated in the reign of the Pāṇḍya king Jaṭavarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Kulaśēkharadēva (unidentified). Records a gift of tools.

216. 12 of 1909.—On the north wall of the same shrine. Records in the third year of the Pāṇḍya king Tribhuvanachakravartin Kōnērmaikoṇḍān a gift of land for the maintenance of a water-shed at Ponnamarāpadi by Ārkāḍu-kiḷār Tiruveṅgāḍudaiyār *alias* Vāṇadarāyar.

217. 13 of 1909.—On a pillar in the maṅṭapa in the south prakāra of the same temple. Belongs to the reign of the Pāṇḍya

king Tribhuvanachakravartin Kōnērimaikōṇḍān ; records that the steps and the verandah round the shrine (*tirunadai māligai*) were built by Nilaimaiy-Aḷagiyan.

218. 14 of 1909.—On the gōpura of the same temple, right of entrance. Records in the eighth year of the Pāṇḍya king Tribhuvanachakravartin Sundara-Pāṇḍyadēva an order to the temple authorities in Ponnamarāpadi-pparṟu, not to take water from *Idaṅgalikāman* (for purpose of irrigation?).

219. 15 of 1909.—Inside the Sundararāja-Perumāḷ temple in the same village. A record of the Pāṇḍya king Tribhuvanachakravartin Sundara-Pāṇḍyadēva in Ś. 1367, Krōdhana. Mentions the temple of Aḷagapperumāḷ-Viṅṅagara-Emberumān at Ponnamarāpadi.

220. 16 of 1909.—On the south wall of the same temple. Records in the second year of the Pāṇḍya king Tribhuvanachakravartin Sundara-Pāṇḍyadēva an order of Nishadharāya that the people of Śēvūr *alias* Aḷagapperumāḷnallūr were to burn two lamps in the temple of Aḷagapperumāḷ Viṅṅagarememberumān, situated to the west of the village of Ponnamarāpadi.

221. 17 of 1909.—On the south wall of the same temple. Dated in the reign of the Pāṇḍya king Tribhuvanachakravartin Sundara-Pāṇḍyadēva. Records in Ś. 1368 a gift of land to Śrīraṅganāchchi, a servant (*aḷiyāl*) of the temple.

222. 18 of 1909.—On the north wall of the same temple. Dated in the reign of the Pāṇḍya king Māravarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Sundara-Pāṇḍyadēva (I, 1216—35), “who was pleased to distribute the Chōḷa country.” Records in his fourteenth year a gift of land in the two villages of Śēvūr and Muruṅaikkudi in Puramalaināḍu to the same temple.

223. 19 of 1909.—On the north wall of the same temple. Dated in the reign of the Pāṇḍya king Māravarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Sundara-Pāṇḍyadēva. Records in Ś. 1375 a gift to two women who were the servants (*aḷiyāl*) of the temple.

224. 20 of 1909.—On the north wall of the same temple. Dated in the reign of the Pāṇḍya king Māravarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Sundara-Pāṇḍyadēva. Records in Ś. 1371, Śukla, the gift of the village of Manattāṅ *alias* Śiṟutāmpuram to a servant of the temple who sang the hymns of Śaḍagōpan (i.e., Nāmmālvār).

225. 21 of 1909.—On the north wall of the Sundararāja-Perumāḷ temple. Records in the eighteenth year of the Pāṇḍya king Māravarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Kulaśēkharadēva I (1268—1308), “who was pleased to take every country,” a gift of land and mentions Śēvūr *alias* Aḷagapperumāḷnallūr.

226. 22 of 1909.—On a slab set up in a field. A record of the Pāṇḍya king Tribhuvanachakravartin Kōnērimaikōṇḍān. Refers to the water-shed mentioned in No. 216 above.

227. 23 of 1909.—On a slab set up in another field. A record of the Pāṇḍya king Tribhuvanachakravartin Kōṇērinmaikoṇḍān. Refers in Chitrabhānu to a certain Vāṇadarāja Mahārāja Sundarattōḷudaiyān who bore many royal titles.

228. 24 of 1909.—On a pillar of rock-cut cave in the hill at Kunnakkudi. A record of the Chōḷa king Tribhuvanachakravartin Kulōttuṅgachōḷadēva (I?) in his forty-eighth year. Mentions the temple of Tirumalai-uḍaiya-Mahādēva at Tirukkuṅṅakkudi, one of the villages irrigated by (the river) Tēnāru in Rājēndraśōḷa-vaḷanāḍu in Rājarāja-Pāṇḍināḍu.

229. 25 of 1909.—On the second pillar in the same cave. Records in the sixth year of the Pāṇḍya king Tribhuvanachakravartin Vikrama-Pāṇḍyadēva a gift of land for offerings to the temple of Tirumalai-uḍaiya Tēnāṅṅu-Nāyakar at Tirukkuṅṅakkudi in Adalaiyūr-nāḍu, a subdivision of Kēraḷaśiṅga vaḷanāḍu.

230. 26 of 1909.—On the same pillar in the same place. Records in the sixth year of the Pāṇḍya king Tribhuvanachakravartin Vikrama Pāṇḍyadēva a gift of land to the same temple by Uyyavandān Gaṇḍan *alias* Gāṅgēyan *alias* Tiāgamīgāman.

231. 27 of 1909.—On the third pillar in the same place. Records in the fortieth year of the Pāṇḍya king Jaṭavarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Śrīvallabhavadēva a gift of land to the temple of Mūlasthānamuḍaiya-Nāyanār on the hill in the same village. [Was the king the contemporary of Māravarman Sundara Pāṇḍya I?].

232. 28 of 1909.—On the fourth pillar in the same place. Records in the fortieth year of the Chōḷa king Tribhuvanachakravartin Kulōttuṅga Chōḷadēva (I?) a gift of land by a certain Adalaiyūr-nāḍāḷvān to the temple.

233. 29 of 1909.—On the same pillar in the same place. Dated in the reign of the Chōḷa king Tribhuvanachakravartin Kulōttuṅgachōḷadēva. Records in Plavaṅga the sale of a sluice (*marugāl*).

234. 30 of 1909.—On the rock, left of entrance into the same cave. Records in the fourth year of the Pāṇḍya king Jaṭavarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Śrīvallabhadēva a gift to the temple mentioned in the next inscription by Adalaiyūr-nāḍāḷvān Mummuḍi-śōḷan Vīraśēkharan.

235. 31 of 1909.—In the verandah of the same cave, north side. Dated in the reign of the Pāṇḍya king Śrīvallabhadēva. Records a gift of land for a lamp to the temple of Tirumalai Uḍaiya-Nāyanār.

236. 32 of 1909.—In the verandah of the same cave, north side. Records in the forty-ninth year of the Chōḷa king Tribhuvanachakravartin Kulōttuṅga-Chōḷadēva (I?) gift of taxes for offerings

to the temple of Tirumalai-uḍaiya-Nāyanār by Viraśēkharan *alias* Adalaiyūr-Nāḍālvān.

237. 33 of 1909.—In the same verandah, south side. A record of the Chōla king Chakravartin Kulōttuṅgachōladēva (I?) in his fortieth year, referring to the residents of Iḍaikkūḍi *alias* Ravikulamānikkanallūr and other villages irrigated by (the river) Tēnāru in Rājēndraśōla-vaḷanāḍu, a subdivision of Rājarāja-Pāṇḍināḍu. At the bottom is an inscription in modern characters dated in the cyclic year Āṅgiras.

238. 34 of 1909.—On a pillar of another rock-cut cave in the same hill. Records in the twenty-second year of the Chōla king Tribhuvanachakravartin Kulōttuṅgachōladēva a gift of land to the temple of Tirumalai-uḍaiya-Mahādēva by the villagers of Kuṅṅakkūḍi *alias* Tenpugallūr.

239. 35 of 1909.—On the second pillar in the same cave. Records in the fortieth year of the Chōla king Tribhuvanachakravartin Kulōttuṅgachōladēva (I?) that Viraśēkharan *alias* Virudarāja-bhayaṅkara Adalaiyūr Nāḍālvān granted a remission of taxes on all the *dēvadāna* lands belonging to the same temple.

240. 36 of 1909.—On the second and third pillars in the same place. A record of the Pāṇḍya king Māravarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Sundara-Pāṇḍyadēva (I, 1216—35), “who was pleased to distribute the Chōla country.” Records a long historical introduction.

241. 37 of 1909.—On the third pillar in the same place. A record of the Pāṇḍya king Māravarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Sundara-Pāṇḍyadēva (I, ? 1216—35). Bears the single word Māsilichchuram.

242. 38 of 1909.—On the fourth pillar in the same place. Records in the eighth year of the Pāṇḍya king Jaṭavarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Śrīvallabhādēva a gift of land for the maintenance of a garden to the temple of Tēnāṅṅu Nāyakar by Kaṭṭiaraśa, a resident of Tirukkuṅṅakuḍi. See No. 231 above.

243. 39 of 1909.—In the verandah of the same cave below two images. Records in the seventh year of the Pāṇḍya king Tribhuvanachakravartin Sundara-Pāṇḍyadēva (I, 1216—35), who was pleased to distribute the Chōla country, a gift of land to Āḷuḍaiya Pillaiyār, i.e., Tirugṅānasambanda.

244. 40 of 1909.—On a wall in front of the same cave. Records in the sixteenth year of the Pāṇḍya king Māravarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Sundara-Pāṇḍyadēva (I, 1216—35), “who took the Chōla country and was pleased to perform the anointment of heroes and the anointment of victors at Muḍigonḍaśōlapuram,” a gift of land for offerings to the temple of Tēnāṅṅu Nāyakar.

245. 41 of 1909.—On the north wall of the Agastyēśvara shrine at the foot of the hill in the same village. A record of the Pāṇḍya

king Māraṅgarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Kulaśēkharadēva (I, 1268—1308), “who was pleased to take every country,” in his twenty-second year. Mentions the temple of Tēnāṅṅu Nāyakar.

246. 42 of 1909.—On the north wall. A record of the Pāṇḍya king Jaṭavarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Rājarājan Sundara-Pāṇḍyadēva. Built in and damaged. See No. 298 below.

Pūvālaikkūḍi.

247. 142 of 1907.—(Tamil.) At the entrance into the rock-cut cave. A record mentioning Pūdikāḷari *alias* Amarūṅṅi Mutta-raiyan.

248. 143 of 1907.—(Tamil.) At the same entrance, left side. Records in the twenty-seventh year of the Chōḷa king Rājakēsari-varman *alias* Uḍaiyār Rājarāja-Rājādhirājadēva the gift of a lamp to the temple of Mahādēva at Pūvālaikkūḍi in Kūḍalūr-nāḍu, which belonged to Kēraḷāntaka-nāḍu. The king was apparently Rājādhirāja II, the son of Rājarāja II.

249. 144 of 1907.—On the south wall of the maṅṭapa in front of the rock-cut cave. A record in the eighteenth year of the Pāṇḍya king Māraṅgarman Tribhuvanachakravartin Kulaśēkharadēva (I, 1268—1308), “who was pleased to take every country.” Mentions Sundaraśōḷapuram in Ollaiyūr-kūṅṅam, a subdivision of Teṅ-kōnāḍu, a district of Kōnāḍu *alias* Kaḍalaḍaiyād-Ilaṅgai-koṇḍa-Chōḷa-vaḷanāḍu.

250. 145 of 1907.—On the same wall. Records in the fifth year of the Chōḷa king Parakēsari-varman *alias* Uḍaiyār Śrī-Rājēndradēva (1050—63), the gift of a lamp. Two fragments.

251. 146 of 1907.—On the same wall. A record of the Chōḷa king Kulōttuṅga-Chōḷadēva. The first digit of the date is lost.

252. 147 of 1907.—On the same wall. Records in the fifth year of the Chōḷa king Parakēsari-varman the construction of the maṅṭapa.

253. 148 of 1907.—On the east wall of the same maṅṭapa. A record of the Vijayanagara king Vīrapratāpa Sadāśivadēva-Mahārāya in Ś. 1471, expired, Saumya. Records a gift of land. The village seems to be described as in No. 256 below. The king claims to have conquered every country and to have overcome the army of the Tulukkar (i.e., the Muhammadans).

254. 149 of 1907.—On the south wall of the shrine of the Goddess in Śiva temple in the same village. Records in the sixteenth year (Vriśchika, śu. 5, Wednesday, Rēvati) of the Pāṇḍya king Māraṅgarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Kulaśēkharadēva (I, 1268—1308), “who was pleased to take every country,” the gift of the village of Pūvālaikkūḍi. Mentions the festival called *Māramānikkan-śandi* and a certain Śōlai-Koyilāyamudayān *alias*

Kalikaḍinda Paṇḍiyadēvar. The deity is called Uḍaiyār Tiruppūvālaikkudi-uḍaiya-Nāyanār in Vaḍappaṛṇāḍu including Śevvalūr, a subdivision of Kūḍalūr-nāḍu, a district of Ten-Kōnāḍu. [An irregular date. See *Ind. Antq.*, 1913, p. 229. Mr. Swamikannu Pillai would attribute the epigraph to Māravarman Kulaśekhara II.]

255. 150 of 1907.—On the west wall of the same shrine—Records in the seventeenth year of the Pāṇḍya king Jaṭavarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Sundara-Pāṇḍyadēva the appointment of three men as drummers (*uvachhar*). The temple is called Uḍaiyār Tiruppūvālaikkudi-uḍaiya-Nāyanār at Vaḍappaṛṇu in Pon-Amarāpadi-nāḍu.

256. 151 of 1907.—On the north wall of the Bhairava shrine in the same temple. A record of the Vijayanagara king Vīrapratāpa Achyutarāya, "who was pleased to take every country," in Ś. 1454, expired, Khara. The village is called Tiruppūvālaikkudi at Vaḍappaṛṇu, a subdivision of Ponnamarāpadināḍu.

Śēmbattūr.

257. 210 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the central shrine in the Tiruvāruḍaiyār temple. Records the construction of the stone temple by Aḷagiya-Śēman Araśagaṇḍa Rāman *alias* Nāvilaṅgādān.

258. 211 of 1914.—On the same wall. Records in the fourth year of the Pāṇḍya king Jaṭavarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Sundara Pāṇḍyadēva a gift of land for the maintenance of a tank (*kuḷappatti*) by the residents of the three villages Śēmbāḍu, Kōraikkurichi and Puttāmbūr. Śēmbāḍu was situated in Kuḷamaṅgala-nāḍu, a subdivision of Jayaśiṅgakulakāla-vaḷanāḍu. [It is not known which of the kings of this name is referred to.]

259. 212 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the maṅṭapa in front of the same shrine. A record of the Pāṇḍya king Sundara Pāṇḍyadēva. A gift of land for a lamp to the temple of Tiruvaiyāruḍaiya-Nāyanār at Śēmbāḍu *alias* Śēmbiyan Puttāmbūr.

260. 213 of 1914.—On the same wall. Records in the nineteenth year of the Pāṇḍya king Tribhuvanachakravartin Sundara-Pāṇḍyadēva a gift of land to the image of Tirukkāmakoṭṭa-Nāchchiyar in the same temple.

261. 214 of 1914.—On the same wall. Records in the twenty-seventh year of the Chōḷa king Tribhuvanachakravartin Kulōtuṅga-Chōḷadēva (I or III?) a gift of land for offerings.

262. 215 of 1914.—On the same wall. A record of the Hoysala king Sārvabhaumachakravartin Viraśōmēśvaradēva in his twenty-third year, Tai, 14 Thursday. Records that Śiṅgaṅṅa Daṇḍanāyaka, son of Śingaradēva-Daṇḍanāyaka, set up the image of Tiruppaḷiyarai-Nāchchiyar.

263. 216 of 1914.—On the same wall. A record of Tribhuvanachakravartin Kōnērinmaikōṇḍān in his seventeenth year and three hundred and sixtieth day. Records a gift of land for offerings to the God Tiruvaiyārudaiya-Nāyanār, Kūttāḍundēvar and Tambirāṭṭiyār. Mentions Aḷagapperumāḷ, the son-in-law (*marumaganār*) probably of the king.

264. 217 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in the tenth year a gift of land for offerings to Tiruppaḷiyarai-Nāchchiyār of the temple.

265. 218 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the west wall of the same maṅṭapa. Records in the sixteenth year of the Pāṇḍya king Tribhuvanachakravartin Sundara-Pāṇḍyadēva a gift of land for offerings to the images of Āḷudaiyār, Āṇḍakūttar and Tambirāṭṭiyār in the temple.

266. 219 of 1914.—On the same wall. Records in the sixth year of the Pāṇḍya king Tribhuvanachakravartin Sundara-Pāṇḍyadēva a gift of land by a native of Kōraikkuruchchi.

Śittannāvāśal.

267. 368 of 1904.—(Tamil.) On the rock south of the rock-cut Jaina temple. A record of the Pāṇḍya king Avanīpaśēgaran who was called Śirivalluvan (i.e., Śrīvallabha). Records that Iḷaṅgautaman known as Madiraiāśiriyān repaired the inner maṅṭapa and built another maṅṭapa in front of the temple. [Iḷaṅgautama was one of the poets of the last Madura Śaṅgam, and the inscription is of value in showing that he was the contemporary of Śrīvallabha Pāṇḍya. For a copper coin of Avanīpasēkhara see *Ind. Antq.*, Vol. XXI, p. 323 f. Māravarma Śrīvallabha was (the father of Varaguṇa II and Parāntaka but probably an ancestor of his is here intended.

268. 369 of 1904.—On the same rock. A record in Tamil archaic characters.

269. 370 of 1904.—(Tamil.) On the same rock. Records the renewal of the temple.

270. Round the top and left side of one of the seventeen beds in the cavern, locally known as Eḷadipāṭṭam. A record in Brāhmi. The Government Epigraphist gives the plate and tentative reading of it in *Ep. Rep.*, 1915, p. 86, but no interpretation has been suggested. It is to this effect :—

“Other epigraphs found in the adjoining beds in the cavern are engraved in early Tamil characters of about the eighth century

A.D. Proper names of six individuals are mentioned " and they "perhaps commemorate the names of mendicants who had resolved to spend the last days of their lives in retired seclusion."

Tirugōkarnam.

271. 304 of 1904.—On the south face of the first pillar (from the right) in front of the rock-cut central shrine in the Gōkarṇēśvara temple. Records in the third year of the Chōla king Parakēsarivarman gift of gold for a lamp.

272. 305 of 1904.—(Tamil.) On the second pillar in the same place, north face. A record of the Chōla king Parakēsarivarman in his thirteenth year, mentioning Tirugōkarnam in Ten-Kavira-nāḍu.

273. 306 of 1904.—On the same pillar, east face. A record of the Chōla king Rājakēsarivarman in his eighth year, mentioning Śrī-Gōkarnam (in) Tiruveḷppūr, a *dēvadāna* in Kavira-nāḍu.

274. 307 of 1904.—On the third pillar in the same place, south face. Records in the ninth year of the Chōla king Rājarājakēsarivarman a gift of land for the upkeep of the (tank called) Kavirakkulam at Tiruveḷppūr in Tenkavira-nāḍu by a Brāhmaṇa from the Chōla country.

275. 308 of 1904.—On the same pillar, east face. Records in the thirty-seventh year of the Chōla king Parakēsarivarman a gift of gold.

276. 309 of 1904.—(Tamil.) On the fourth pillar in the same place, north face. Records in the fourth year of the Chōla king Parakēsarivarman a gift of gold for a lamp.

277. 310 of 1904.—On the south wall of the same shrine. Records in the thirteenth year of the Chōla king Rājarājakēsarivarman (I, 985—1013), "who destroyed the ships at Kāndalūr-Śālai," gift of money for payment of taxes.

278. 311 of 1904.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in the seventeenth year of the Pāṇḍya king Mārañjaḍaiyan gift of gold for a lamp by Varaguṇavadiaraiyan *alias* Nakkañjeṭṭi of Kalkurichchi in Kavirappāl (a village) in Valla-nāḍu. [Is Mārañjaḍayan Parāntaka Vīra Nārāyana Śaḍayan, the brother of Varaguna (862—94?) ?]

279. 312 of 1904.—On the south wall of the rock-cut central shrine in the Gōkarṇēśvara temple at Tirugōkarnam. A fragment consisting of a single line in Pallava-Grantha characters.

Tirumaiyam.

280. 386 of 1906.—On the north and south walls of the rock-cut Śiva temple. A fragmentary record in Pallava Grantha and Tamil.

281. 387 of 1906.—On the south wall of the same temple. A record of the Pāṇḍya king Māravarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Sundara-Pāṇḍyadēva (II?). Records in his seventh year a settlement of disputes between the Śaivas and Vaishṇavas, by Appaṇṇa Daṇḍanāyaka, one of the officers of the Hoysala king Vīra Sōmēśvara, the father-in-law or uncle of Sundara Pāṇḍya II. See 156 of 1894 at Tinnevely and 435 of 1906 at Murappu-nāḍu.

282. 388 of 1906.—On the same wall. Records in the eleventh year of the Pāṇḍya king Sundara-Pāṇḍya-dēva a gift of land. The village is called Tirumeyam, a *dēvadāna* and *brahmadēya* in Kāna-nāḍu, a district of Kāna-nāḍu *alias* Virudarājabhayaṅkara-valanāḍu.

283. 389 of 1906.—At the entrance into the same temple, right side. A record of the Pāṇḍya king Māravarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Sundara-Pāṇḍyadēva (unidentified) in his eighth year. Mentions a feudatory of Rājarājadēva who had given money to the temple.

284. 390 of 1906.—At the same entrance, left side. A damaged record of the Chōla king Parakēsarivarman *alias* Uḍaiyār Śrī Rājendra-Chōla-dēva (1012—53) in his twenty-first year.

285. 391 of 1906.—In the same place. An incomplete record of the Chōla king Rājarājakēsarivarman *alias* Śrī Rājarājadēva I in his nineteenth year.

286. 392 of 1906.—(Tamil.) On the rock to the west of the same temple. A record built in at the beginning. Seems to be connected with No. 281 above.

287. 393 of 1906.—On the north wall of the maṇṭapa in front of the Satyagirinātha Perumāḷ temple in the same village. Records in the forty-fifth year (Dhanus, ba. 8, Wednesday, Hasta) of the Pāṇḍya king Jaṭavarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Vīra-Pāṇḍyadēva the sale of all rights connected with *pāḍikāval*. [He was the king who ascended the throne in 1295. The date corresponded to 13th December 1340.]

288. 394 of 1906.—(Tamil.) On the west wall of the same maṇṭapa. Records in Ś. 1591, expired, Saumya, a gift for the merit of Raghunāthanārēndra, evidently the Sētupati. See No. 292 below.

289. 395 of 1906.—On the same wall. Records in the twelfth year (Kumbha, ba. 12, Sunday, Uttarāshāḍa) of the Pāṇḍya king Jaṭavarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Parākrama-Pāṇḍyadēva (1295—1342) a sale of land for marriage expenses. [The date according to Mr. Swamikannu Pillai corresponded to 11th February 1325. The regnal year, however, he points out should be 10 and not 12. *Ind. Antq.*, 1913, p. 229.]

290. 396 of 1906.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record of the Pāṇḍya king Jaṭavarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Parākrama-Pāṇḍyadēva in his fifth year. See the above epigraph.

291. 397 of 1906.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record in Raudra, of Daḷavāy Vaiyappa-Nāyakkar, agent of Timmappa-Nāyakkar of Iruñjiraiyūr.

292. 398 of 1906.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in Ś. 1591, expired, Saumya, a gift for the merit of Tirumalai Sētopati Kāṭṭa Daḷavāy Raghunāthanārēndra. See *Ind. Antq.*, 1916, pp. 201-2.

293. 399 of 1906.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the same maṅṭapa. A record of the Vijayanagara king Kṛishṇadēva-Mahārāja. Records in Ś. 1444, expired, Chitrabhānu, a gift by Vīranaraṣiṅgarāya-Nāyakkar.

294. 400 of 1906.—(Tamil.) On the east wall of the Śēnaimudaliār shrine in the same temple. Records in Ś. 1383, expired, Vrisha, provision for the celebration of a festival called Sundara-Pāṇḍya Vijayālayan-śandi.

295. 401 of 1906.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in Jaya a transfer of land.

296. 402 of 1906.—(Tamil.) On a stone set up in the same temple. Records that Perumbiḍugu-Perundēvi, the mother of Viḍēlviḍugu Viḷuppēradi-Araiśan *alias* Śāttan Māran repaired (the temple) and granted a village.

297. 403 of 1906.—(Tamil.) On the same stone. A record of the Chōḷa king Rājarāja I containing a few words of the introduction of the king. Refers to the donor in the above inscription.

Tiruvaraṅguḷam.

298. 255 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the central shrine in the Haratīrthēśvara temple. Dated in the reign of the Pāṇḍya king Jaṭavarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Rājarājan Sundara-Pāṇḍyadēva in his fourteenth year Vaikāśi, 22. Records a gift of land for a lamp to the temple of Tiruvaraṅkuḷam-uḍaiya-Nāyanār, by the citizens of Arumolīdēvapuram in Virudarājabhayaṅkaravaḷanāḍu *alias* Kānanāḍu. Mentions the coin called *Vālālvaḷi-tiṇḍān paṇam*. [The identity of the king is not known. The Government Epigraphist identifies the king with his namesake figuring in Tj. 476 and 478. According to the former of these (which gives astronomical details, which have been examined by Mr. Swamikannu Pillai in *Mad. Ep. Rep.*, 1915, p. 77) he has to be identified with Jaṭavarman Śundara Pāṇḍya who came to the throne on the 24th June 1276. But the irregularity of the chronology of the latter makes the identity somewhat suspicious. No. 139 above refers to the same king. See also No. 246 above for probably the same king.]

299. §56 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in the fourteenth year of the Pāṇḍya king Rājarājan Sundara-Pāṇḍyadēva in Āni, that the temple trustees (*tānattār*) agreed to supply oil to the two lamps to which the citizens of Arumolīdēva-puram had made a gift of land. See note to the above epigraph.

300. 257 of 1914.—On the south wall of the maṅṭapa in front of the same shrine. Records in the reign of a Pāṇḍya king the gift of a silver *kolgai* by a native of Kulaśēkharapaṭṭanam.

301. 258 of 1914.—On the same wall. Records in the ninth year of the Pāṇḍya king Tribhuvanachakravartin Vīra-Pāṇḍyadēva a gift of land to the temple of Tiruvaraṅḡulam-uḍaiya-Nāyanār.

302. 259 of 1914.—On the same wall. Records in the second year of the Pāṇḍya king Tribhuvanachakravartin Kulaśēkhara-dēva a gift of land to the same temple by the residents of Peruṅgāraikkūḍi *alias* Trivaraṅḡulanallūr in Kāna-nāḍu.

303. 260 of 1914.—On the same wall. Records in the fifth year of the Pāṇḍya king Tribhuvanachakravartin Vīra-Pāṇḍyadēva a gift of money (*achchu*) for a lamp for the merit of Śēmapillaiyār.

304. 261 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in Ś. 1378, Dhātu, Vaikāśi, 20, that the image of Kaṇṇappa Nāyanār set up within the temple was the gift of a native of Rājarājēndrachōḷapuram in Kōnāḍu.

305. 262 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in the gift of a silver pitcher for bathing the God, by a native of Sundara-Pāṇḍyapuram.

306. 263 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records the digging of a well.

307. 264 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Dated in the reign of the Pāṇḍya king Tribhuvanachakravartin Vīra-Pāṇḍyadēva. Records in his fourth year a gift of land for offering of puddings to goddess in the temple of Tiruvaraṅḡulam-uḍaiya-Nāyanār by Bhuvanaśiṅgadēvan. The same donor also made a gift of two lamp-stands, one girdle and one fore-head-plate made of gold. Reference is made to the levying of two *kāśus* on every smithery. These gifts were made for the merit of Śēmapillaiyār.

308. 265 of 1914.—On the same wall. Records in the ninth year of the Pāṇḍya king Tribhuvanachakravartin Vīra-Pāṇḍyadēva a gift of land to the temple of Tiruvaraṅḡulam-uḍaiya-Nāyanār in Rājarāja-vaḷanāḍu.

309. 266 of 1914.—On the same wall. Records in the tenth year of the Pāṇḍya king Tribhuvanachakravartin Vīra-Pāṇḍyadēva a gift of land.

310. 267 of 1914.—On the west wall of the same maṅṭapa. Records in the fourth year of the Pāṇḍya king Tribhuvanachakravartin Vīra-Pāṇḍyadēva the gift of the village of Kuḷattūr by the inhabitants of Ten-Kavi-nāḍu for celebrating a festival and a service in the name of Araśagaṇḍarāman, a feudatory chief (*sāmantanār*). The festival had to be celebrated on the day of the asterism Śatabhishaj, in the month of Pūrattāsi, under which the chief was born.

311. 268 of 1914.—On the north wall of the same maṅṭapa. Records in the fourth year of the Pāṇḍya king Tribhuvanachakravartin Vīra-Pāṇḍyadēva a sale of land by a Kaikkōḷa named Rājagambhīramārāyan.

312. 269 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records the gift of some land for a flower garden and for its maintenance.

313. 270 of 1914.—On the same wall. Records in the fourth year of the Pāṇḍya king Tribhuvanachakravartin Vīra-Pāṇḍyadēva a gift of land for offerings, of four cows for the supply of milk, and of two lamp-stands and a gold belt. Appears to be almost a copy of No. 307 above.

314. 271 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record of the Vijayanagara king Kṛishṇarāya “who was pleased to take all countries.” Records in Ś. 1445, Subhānu (Uttarāyaṇa, ba. di., Friday, Mūla), that it was covenanted by the inhabitants of Vallanāḍu that the Veḷḷāḷa tenants of the three villages Pālaikkūḍi, Kaḷaṅguḍi and Kiḷinallūr should pay their obligations and render service to the temple of Araṅguḷanāthar. Tiruvaraṅguḷam is said to be situated in Vallanāḍu, a subdivision of Rājarāja-vaḷanāḍu. [Mr. Swamikannu Pillai corrects Friday into Sunday and then equates the date to 31st January 1524.]

315. 272 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record of the Vijayanagara king Kṛishṇarāya in Ś. 1442, Pramādi, Simha, su. di. 10, Friday, Ardra. Records a sale of land by the Veḷḷāḷa tenants and the recipients of *pāḍikāval* in the three villages mentioned above for clearing up certain dues which they were otherwise unable to pay. The date was “presumably Friday, 19th August 1519.”

316. 273 of 1914.—On the east wall of the same maṅṭapa. Dated in the reign of the Chōḷa king Tribhuvanachakravartin Tribhuvanavīradēva (i.e., Kulōttuṅga III), “who having taken Madurai (Madura), Īlam (Ceylon), Karuvūr and the crowned head of the Pāṇḍya was pleased to perform the anointment of heroes and the anointment of victors at Madura.” Records in his fortieth year Karkaṭaka that the assembly of the inhabitants of Vallanāḍu met together and bound themselves to protect the cultivators (*kuḍimakkal*) of this and other *dēvadāna* villages. “If any one of

the assembly was found to rob, capture the cows, or do other mischief to cultivators, the assembly agreed to assign two *mās* of wet land to the temple by way of fine for the offence committed. Also the Śeṭṭis, Kaikkōlars, smiths and shepherds and others of the sacred village who had acquired lands, wet or dry, from the assembly, were allowed to enjoy them on permanent lease and pay their dues direct to the temple." *Ep. Rep.*, 1915, pp. 99-100. [Mr. Krishna Sastri believes that the inscription affords an evidence of the disturbed state of the Chōla dominions in this reign.]

317. 274 of 1914.—On the same wall. A record of the Pāṇḍya king Tribhuvanachakravartin Kulaśēkharadēva in his eleventh year, recording gift of money for growing red lotuses and for providing offerings, by Aḷagan Kaliyugameyyan *alias* Kalikaḍinda Pāṇḍyadēva of Viḷattūr in Miḷalaikūrṅam.

318. 275 of 1914.—On the same wall. Records the construction of the maṅṭapa by a native of Kuḷattūr.

319. 276 of 1914.—On the wall of the south verandah of the first prākāra of the same shrine. Dated in the reign of the Pāṇḍya king Vīra-Pāṇḍyadēva in Dhātu. Records a political compact between Inban Ariyachakravartin and Śūriyan on one side and Aḍiyārkunallān Aṅgarāyan and Kuppān on the other.

320. 277 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in Pramādi, Purattāṣi, 25, that two chiefs had been long unfriendly and that in the settlement of their disputes one of them made a gift of land to the other. It was also agreed that they and their progeny should not think ill of each other, but remain friendly. If anybody violated this arrangement his land will be confiscated to the temple as a *dēvadāna* on permanent tenancy.

321. 278 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record of the Pāṇḍya king Jaṭavarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Vīra-Pāṇḍyadēva. Records in his seventeenth year, Karkāṭaka 25, ba. di. 7, Sunday, Aśvini, corresponding to Sunday, 21st July 1269, a gift of land. Mentions Arandāṅgi in Pāṇḍya-vaḷanāḍu.

322. 279 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the wall of the north verandah of the same prākāra. The Vijayanagara king records in Ś. 1384. Chitrabhānu, Āvaṇi, 12, a gift of land. Mentions Vīra-Pāṇḍya Vijayālayadēva.

323. 280 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in the twenty-fourth year of Śittirai, the Pāṇḍya king Kulaśēkharadēva, a gift of land as *vaidya-vritti* (physician's fee) to a certain Vayichchiyāchāriyan of Nimbavana.

324. 281 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Dated in the reign of the Vijayanagara king Mallikārjunarāya, son of Dēvarāya Mahārāya II. Records in Ś. 1380 a gift of land for offerings by Tirumēniaḷagan *alias* Vīra-Pāṇḍya Viśāiyalayadēva.

325. 282 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record of the Vijayanagara king Bhūpati-Uḍaiyār in Hēmalambi. A political compact.

326. 283 of 1914.—On the same wall. Records in the reign of Kōnērīmēlkoṇḍān a gift of land for offerings at a special service called *Sundara-Pāṇḍyan-śandi*.

327. 284 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Dated in the time of the Vijayanagara king Bhūpati Uḍaiyār, son of Bukkaṇa Uḍaiyār II. Records a gift of land in the village of Sāmantanallūr for offerings.

328. 285 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Belongs to the reign of the Vijayanagara king Kampaṇa-Uḍaiyār. Records in Rākshasa, Vaikāśi, a gift of land.

329. 286 of 1914.—On the same wall. Records in the reign of a Vijayanagara king a gift of land.

330. 287 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in Kaḷayukta, Vaikāśi, a sale of land.

331. 288 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the wall of the west verandah of the same prākāra. A record of the Pāṇḍya king Vira-Pāṇḍya-dēva in his thirty-ninth year. Refers to an enmity existing between two parties of chiefs and registers a political compact of compromise.

332. 289 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the Sabhā-pati-maṇṭapa in the same prākāra. Dated in the reign of the Pāṇḍya king Tribhuvanachakravartin Vira-Pāṇḍyadēva. Records in his seventh year Kumbha that certain taxes that had to be paid to the temple not being collected by the temple priests were being misappropriated by the residents of the country. These were now assigned to the temple for daily worship and repairs.

333. 290 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record of the Pāṇḍya king Jaṭavarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Vira-Pāṇḍya. Records in his fifteenth year that the residents of Vallanāḍu agreed to pay all the dues to the State? which the priests of the temple at Tiruvaraṅgulaṃ had to pay.

334. 291 of 1914.—On the west wall of the same maṇṭapa. Records in the fourteenth year of the Pāṇḍya king Vira-Pāṇḍya-dēva the gift of an elephant vehicle (*kaḷirruppaḍi*) for the God to ride upon. Mentions Śemapillai. See No. 344 below.

335. 292 of 1914.—On the wall of the Bhairavamaṇṭapa in the same prākāra. Records in the thirty-fifth year of the Pāṇḍya king Vira Pāṇḍya a compact between a number of persons covenanting to be friendly towards one another.

336. 293 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall, Records in Kaḷayukta a similar compact.

337. 294 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records the construction of a tank by a native of Ten-kavirai-nāḍu.

338. 295 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Dated in the reign of the Vijayanagara king Achyutadēva-Mahārāya, “who was pleased to take every country and who instituted the elephant hunt.” Records in Ś. 146, a gift of land for offerings.

339. 296 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the old kitchen in the same prākāra. Records in Vibhava, Pūraṭṭādi, 1, the assignment of *pāḍikkāval* by the residents of the three villages Irumbāḷi, Marudāntanilai and Vaḍa-Mayilāppur to the temple of Tiruvaraṅḡulam-uḍaiya-Nāyanār in return for protection offered by the people of Valla-nāḍu.

340. 297 of 1914.—On the same wall. Records in the ninth year of the Pāṇḍya king Tribhuvanachakravartin Vīra-Pāṇḍya-dēva a gift of land and of a silver *koḷgai* by the residents of Valla-nāḍu. The land belonged to a certain Perunarkilichchōḷa-nāḍāḷvān, but was purchased from him on payment of 11,000 *kāśus*, the amount of accumulated taxes.

341. 298 of 1914.—On the same wall. Records in the tenth year of the Pāṇḍya king Tribhuvanachakravartin Vīra-Pāṇḍya-dēva the fixing of the *vāram* on temple lands held by all classes of tenants residing within the sacred village.

342. 299 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the north and west walls of the same kitchen. A record of a Pāṇḍya king in Ś. 1305, registering the gift of land by three chiefs residing at Arandāṅgi in Iḷaṅḡēśura-nāḍu, a subdivision of Vaḍa-Vellār *alias* Sundara-Pāṇḍya-nallūr for providing offerings at the service called Malvallān-śandi.

343. 300 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the west wall of the same kitchen. A record of the Pāṇḍya king Māravarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Vīra-Pāṇḍyadēva in his twenty-ninth year. [Was he the king who ruled from 1253 to 1278?]

344. 301 of 1914.—On the same wall. Records in the ninth year of the Pāṇḍya king Tribhuvanachakravartin Vīra-Pāṇḍya-dēva the building of the kitchen by Uḍayān Bhuvanaśingadēva for the merit of lord Sēmappiḷḷaiyār between the seventeenth day of Māśi and Āni of the tenth year. See No. 334 above.

345. 302 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in the tenth year of the Pāṇḍya king Tribhuvanachakravartin Vīra-Pāṇḍyadēva the rate of taxes to be levied by the temple overseers on certain *dēvadāna* lands enumerated herein. The proceeds had to be utilized towards offerings and ten lamps for the merit of the individual mentioned in the above inscription.

346. 303 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On a slab built into the wall of the same prākāra. Records the building of the wall to an extent of two cubits.

347. 304 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On a slab built into the south wall of the second prakāra of the same temple. Records the construction of the south wall by the trustees of the temple treasury, the residents of Valla-nāḍu and the nine *nagarattāṅ*.

348. 305 of 1914.—On the south wall of the Gaṇapati shrine in the same temple. Records in the fourteenth year of the Pāṇḍya king Tribhuvanachakravartin Vīra-Pāṇḍyadēva the building of the shrine by Uḍayān Bhuvanaśiṅgan for the merit of Śēmappillaiyār. See No. 344 above.

349. 306 of 1914.—On the same wall. Records in the twenty-eighth year of the Pāṇḍya king Śrīvallabhadēva the consecration ceremony of the shrine (*tirumalai*) of Mūtta-Pillaiyār (Viḡhnēśvara) by a Brāhmaṇa of Naṭṭāṅruppōkku.

350. 307 of 1914.—On the west wall of the Chaṇḍēśvara shrine in the same temple. Records in the seventeenth year of the Pāṇḍya king Jaṭāvarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Sundara-Pāṇḍyadēva (I, ? 1251--64) that torches were provided for during the festivals by Valittuṇai-Perumāl *alias* Vilāḍarāyar for the merit Śāmantanār.

351. 308 of 1914.—On the north wall of the same shrine. A mutilated record of the Pāṇḍya king Jaṭāvarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Sundara-Pāṇḍyadēva in his twelfth year. See the above inscription.

352. 309 of 1914.—On a slab set up near the Gaṇapati shrine in the same temple. The slab bears the figure of a chief on horseback followed by two attendants on foot. The inscription contains the name Vīrapratāpan Muḷuchēvagan (servant) of Vijayarāyaramiṇḍan *alias* Kaṇḍiyadēvar of Irājēndram.

353. 310 of 1914.—On the wall of the second gōpura of the temple, right of entrance. Records in the ninth year of the Pāṇḍya king Māravarman Sundara-Pāṇḍyadēva (I, ? 1216--35) the building of the wall with stones by a certain Gāṅgēyarāyar.

354. 311 of 1914.—On the same wall. Records in Grantha a Sanskrit verse in praise of the God Haratīrthēśvara.

355. 312 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record of the Vijayanagara king Mallikārjunarāya, son of Pratāpadēvarāya II. Records in Ś. 1436, Bhava (Uttarāyaṇa, Makara, śu. di. II, Friday, Ārdṛā), the gift of land for offerings by Ponnambala Toṇḍaimān at the service *Alaiviḷanjādan-śandi* called after him. The date corresponded to January 26, A.D. 1515.

356. 313 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Dated in the reign of the Vijayanagara king Mallikārjunarāya, son of Dēva-Mahārāya. Records in Ś. 1444, Chitrabhānu (Vrischika, śu. di. II, Saturday, Rēvati), the sale of the villages Pālaikkūḍi, Kalāṅgūḍi and Kiḷinallūr to the temple. The amount of *kaḍamui* dues

payable by these villages had been settled by Narasa-Nāyakkar; but as the villagers were unable to pay the tax, these villages had to be sold. The *araiyars* of Valla-nāḍu who were the mortgagees were also a party to this transaction. [The date was October 31, A.D. 1522.]

357. 314 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same gōpura, left of entrance. Dated in the reign of the Vijayanagara king Kṛishṇa-dēva-Mahārāya. Records in Ś. 1447, Pārthiva (Dakshināyana, Tulā, śu. di. 5, Friday, Mrigaśīrsha), a gift of land. The date corresponded to October 6, A.D. 1525.

358. 315 of 1914.—In the same place. Records in the reign of the Pāṇḍya king Māravarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Kulaśēkharadēva the gift of a gold forehead plate.

359. 316 of 1914.—(Tamil.) In the same place. Records that a native of Peruñjuṇaiyūr constructed this gōpura and named it after Gāṅgēyarāya.

360. 317 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the west wall of the Brihadāmba shrine in the same temple. Dated in the reign of the Vijayanagara king Achyutadēva-Mahārāya. Records in Ś. 1453, Nandana, Dhanus, śu. di. 11, Friday, Rēvati, a gift of land for a *matha* situated in the bazaar called Vallanāḍu-perunderu in the village Araṅḡaṇādar-tiruppaḍaivīḍu. An irregular date. See *Ep. Rep.*, 1915, p. 80.

361. 318 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the north and west walls of the same shrine. A record of the Vijayanagara king Achyutadēva Mahārāya in Ś. 1452, Vikriti. Records that the residents of Valla-nāḍu in Rājarājavaḷanāḍu gave certain lands as *kāṇiyātchi* to Śokkanār Pallavarāyar, a native of Paḍāipaṛṛu in Kāna-nāḍu which was a subdivision of Kāna-nāḍu *alias* Virudarājabhayaṅkara-vaḷanāḍu.

362. 319 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the east wall of the same shrine. Records in Ś. 1439, Īsvara, the gift of certain taxes for celebrating the car festival of Araṅḡaṇādar, by Kamalālayappadi Moṇṇaiyappan of Tiruvārūr for the merit of Vīra-Naraśiṅgarāya-Nāyakkar.

363. 320 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in the thirty-ninth year of the Chōla king Tribhuvanachakravartin Kulottuṅga-Chōladēva III, "who was pleased to take Madurai (Madura) and the crowned head of the Pāṇḍya," the building of the shrine by Kaṇṇuḍaiya-Perumāḷ *alias* Pirāṭṭi-Āḷvār, the queen of Koduṅḡuṅḡamuḍaiyār *alias* Nishādharaāja and daughter of Kōnāṇḍār *alias* Nishadharāya of Ponnamarāpadi in Perumalaināḍu, a subdivision of Rājēndraśōḷa-vaḷanāḍu in Rājarāja-Pāṇḍināḍu.

364. 321 of 1914.—On the south wall of the same shrine. A damaged record in Ś. 1452, Vikrita.

365. 322 of 1914.—On the same wall. Records in the fifteenth year of the Pāṇḍya king Māravarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Sundarapāṇḍyadēva I (1216—35) “who having been pleased to take the Chōḷa country, was pleased to perform the anointment of heroes at Muḍigoṇḍachōḷapuram,” gift of paddy for offerings to the image of Tirukkāmakkōṭṭamuḍaiya-Nambirāṭṭiyār.

366. 323 of 1914.—On the same wall. Records in the ninth year, Vrischika 22, Wednesday, Svāti, of the Pāṇḍya king Jaṭavarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Sundara-Pāṇḍyadēva a gift of land for offerings to the Tirukkāmakkōṭṭa-Nāchchiyār. Mr. Swamikannu Pillai believes that the king referred to in this record was he who ascended the throne in 1318. See Pd. 52.

367. 324 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the verandah of the same shrine. Records in S. 1466, Pramādīcha, the provision for the swinging festival.

368. 325 of 1914.—(Sanskrit and Telugu.) On the first gōpura of the same temple, left of entrance. Records in Ś. 1789, Kali, that king Rāmachandra had the kumbhābhishēka ceremony of the God Haratīrthēśvara and of the Goddess Brihadāmba performed. [Rāmachandra was the Toṇḍamān who ruled from 1839 to 1885?]

369. 326 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On a pillar in the Idaiya-maṇṭapa in the same village. Records the setting up of the pillar by a Bayirāgi.

Tiruvēṅgavāśal.

370. 234 of 1914.—On the south wall of the maṇṭapa in front of the central shrine in the Vyāghrapurīśvara temple. Records in the twenty-sixth year of the Chōḷa king Parakēsarivarman *alias* Uḍaiyār Rājendra-Chōḷadēva (I, 1011—53) a gift of land for offerings to the image of Nittaśūlāmaṇi viṇṇagar, by the assembly of Tiruvēṅgaivāyil, a *dēvadāna* in Peruvāyil-nāḍu, a subdivision of Jayaśiṅga-kulakālavaḷanāḍu.

371. 235 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record of the Pāṇḍya king Māravarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Sundara-Pāṇḍyadēva, I (1216—35), “who distributed the Chōḷa country.” Records a gift of land for offerings to the image of Chandraśēkharadēva *alias* Dēvapperumāḷ set up by Pillaiyār Aḷagapperumāḷ. The latter is stated to have determined the landed interest of the country amicably in the presence of Śēra Pāṇḍyadēva who took the eastern country.

372. 236 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the same maṇṭapa. Records in the thirtieth year of the Chōḷa king Rājākēsarivarman *alias* Rājādhirājadēva I a list of all the *dēvadāna* lands belonging to the temple. Mentions Agakkīyūr-nāḍu in Pāṇḍya-kulāśanivaḷa-nāḍu.

373. 237 of 1914.—On the same wall. Records in the twenty-third year (Karkaṭaka śu. di., Thursday) of the Pāṇḍya king

Jaṭavarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Vīra-Pāṇḍyadēva a gift of land.

374. 238 of 1914.—On the same wall. Records in the twenty-eighth year of the Chōḷa king Parakēsarivarman the gift of a lamp to the temple of Tirumēṟṟaḷi-Mahādēva.

375. 239 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in the fifth year of the Chōḷa king Parakēsarivarman the gift of a lamp to the temple of Tiruveṅgaivāyil-Śiva by a native of Malanāḍu.

376. 240 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the door-posts of the entrance into the same maṅṭapa. A record of the Chōḷa king Rājarājakēsarivarman *alias* Rājarājadēva I in his twenty-sixth year. Registers gift of money for a lamp by merchant, to the temple of Tirumēṟṟaḷi-Mahādēva at Tiruveṅgaivāyil, a *dēvadāna* in Peruvāyināḍu, a subdivision of Pāṇḍi-kulāśani-vaḷanāḍu.

377. 241 of 1914.—On the west wall of the Brihannāyaki shrine. Records in the thirty-fourth year of the Pāṇḍya king Jaṭavarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Śrīvallabhadēva a gift of land. [Was he the contemporary of Māravarman Sundara Pāṇḍya I, ? 1216—35 ?]

378. 242 of 1914.—On the same wall. Records in the thirteenth year of the Pāṇḍya king Jaṭavarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Sundara-Pāṇḍyadēva a gift of land for lamps. [It is not known which of the kings of this name is referred to.]

379. 243 of 1914.—On the same wall. Records in the thirty-fourth year of the Pāṇḍya king Jaṭavarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Śrīvallabhadēva a gift of land. See No. 377 above.

380. 244 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the same shrine. Dated in the reign of the king of Vijayanagara, Kampaṇa-Uḍaiyār. Records in Ānanda an assignment of the tax *pāḍikkāval* probably for the repair of the tank at Tiruveṅgaivāśal which had become desolate on account of the breaches in the tank.

381. 245 of 1914.—On the east wall of the same shrine. Records in the seventh year (of ?) the levying of the tax (*kaḍamai*).

382. 246 of 1914.—On the south wall of the first prākāra of the same temple. Records in the twelfth year of the Chōḷa king Tribhuvanachakravartin Rājarājadēva a gift of land for offerings to the images of Śadiraviḍaṅgadēva and his consort (*pirāttiyār*) set up by the chief Kulōttuṅga-Chōḷa-Kiḍāraraiyar.

383. 247 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record of the Chōḷa king Tribhuvanachakravartin Rājarājadēva (III?), dated in his twentieth year. Records that one of the taxes from the eighteen *mās* of land presented should be assigned to the temple of Tiruveṅgaivāyil-uḍaiya-Nāyanār and the other half used for celebrating festivals in the shrines of Śadiraviḍaṅga-Nāyakar and his Nāchchiyār in the same temple.

384. 248 of 1914.—On the same wall. Records in the seventh year of the Chōla king Rājarājadēva a gift of land for offerings.

385. 249 of 1914.—On the west wall of the same prakāra. Records in the tenth year of the Pāṇḍya king Māravarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Sundara-Pāṇḍyadēva (I, 1216—35), “who distributed the Chōla country,” a gift of land to Śandikkūttan Ariyan Onṛāyiram.

386. 250 of 1914.—On the same wall. Records in the eighth year of the Chōla king Tribhuvanachakravartin Rājādhirājadēva that the *dēvadāna* lands of the temple were lying waste for want of tenants and that, consequently, certain private individuals purchased them from the temple authorities and agreed to measure out the specified quantity of paddy to the temple.

387. 251 of 1914.—On the west wall of the kitchen in the same temple. Records in the seventh year of the Pāṇḍya king Jatāvarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Sundara-Pāṇḍyadēva (unidentified) a sale of land.

388. 252 of 1914.—On the outer west wall of the first prakāra of the same temple. An incomplete record in the fourteenth year of the Chōla king Tribhuvanachakravartin Vikrama-Chōladēva (1118—35).

389. 253 of 1914.—On the same wall. Records in the fourteenth year of the Chōla king Tribhuvanachakravartin Vikrama Chōladēva (1118—35) gift of land to a lady for performing the dance called *śandikūttu* before the God Tiruvēṅgaivāyal Āṇḍār during the festival in the month of Śittirai.

390. 254 of 1914.—On the same wall. Records in the fifth year of the Chōla king Tribhuvanachakravartin Rājādhirājadēva II a similar gift of land for performing *śandikūttu* during the Tiruvādirai festival in the month of Vaigāśi, at the shrine of Śadira-vidāṅga Nāyakar set up by Śadiran Irājan *alias* Kulōttuṅgaśōla Kidārat taraiyan. See No. 382 above.

Vellai-nallūr.

391. 204 of 1914.—On the east wall of the maṅṭapa in front of the central shrine in the Agastyēśvara temple. Dated in the reign of the Pāṇḍya king Sundara-Pāṇḍyadēva, who was pleased to take the Chōla country. Records provision for offerings to the temple of Tiruvagattīśvaram-Uḍaiyār at Vellai-nallūr.

392. 205 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the same maṅṭapa. A record of the Pāṇḍya king Māravarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Kulaśēkharādēva (I, ? 1268—1308) in his twenty-second year, śu. di. 7. Registers a gift of land for offerings to the temple of Śrikailāsa at Vellainallūr in Ten Śiruvāyil-nāḍu.

393. 206 of 1914.—(Tamil verse.) On the same wall. Records in the seventh year of the Chōla king Vīrarājendra the building of

the ardha-maṅṭapa in the temple of Agastīśvara at Veḷḷainallūr, by the Chōla subordinate Mudigoṇḍaṇāḍāḷvan of Śīruvāyil-nāḍu.

394. 207 of 1914.—On the south and east walls of the same maṅṭapa. Records in the twenty-third year of the Pāṇḍya king Māravarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Sundara-Pāṇḍyadēva (I, 1216--35) "who was pleased to distribute the Chōla country," an agreement among themselves of the residents of Veḷḷainallūr, to conduct the festival in the month of Śittirai, and mentions the names of the individuals who should so conduct the festival on each of the ten days.

395. 208 of 1914.—On the west wall of the same maṅṭapa. Records in the reign of the Pāṇḍya king Jaṭavarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Sundara-Pāṇḍyadēva, "who was pleased to take Kōnāḍu," a gift of land by the chief Immaḍi Akkaladēva-Chōḷa-mahārāja. Also refers to the reign of Sadāśivarāya and to Ś. 1470, Saumya. The king has not been identified.

Virakkudi.

396. 327 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the south base of the maṅṭapa in front of the central shrine in the Tiruvēdanātha temple. Records in Sādhāraṇa, Vaikāśi, 10, a gift of land to Tiruvōḍaipandal-uḍaiya-Tambirānār at Viraikkudi by Immuḍi Akkalarāśar.

397. 328 of 1914.—On the east wall of the same maṅṭapa, left of entrance. Records in the seventh year of the Pāṇḍya king Māravarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Kulaśēkharadēva I? gift of land to the temple of Arumoḷīśvaram-uḍaiyār-Nāyanār at Suṇaiykkudi in Vaḍavāyil-nāḍu, a subdivision of Jayaśiṅgakula kālavalanāḍu.

398. 329 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On a pillar of the same maṅṭapa. Records in Pramōda the gift of the pillar.

399. 330 of 1914.—On a pillar of the Nandi-maṅṭapa of the same temple. Records in Bahudhānya the building of the Nandi-maṅṭapa.

400. 331 of 1914.—(Tamil.) On the west wall of the Oppilānāyaki shrine in the same temple. Records the gift of land to a mason for building the shrine and for making the image of the goddess.

VIZAGAPATAM DISTRICT.

ANAKĀPALLE TALUK.

Kāsimkōṭa.

1. *C.P. No. 14 of 1908-9.*—A grant of the Eastern Chālukya Vishṇuvardhana Bhīma I, discovered in this village. It gives the usual genealogy of the dynasty and says that the king who conquered his *dāyādās*, including the Rāshtrakūṭa Kṛishṇa II, granted a village in Elamañcha Kaliṅgadēśa and Dēvarāshṭra Vishaya. The grant is incomplete. Elamañchi was perhaps the capital. The grant gives the last verse of Bhavabhūti's *Māla-timādhava*, thereby showing that Bhavabhūti lived before Chālukya Bhīma I. [Dēvarāṣṭra Vishaya is mentioned in the Allahabad pillar inscription of Samudragupta. See Fleet's *Corpus Ins. Indic.*, Vol. III, p. 13.] *Ep. Rep.*, 1909, pp. 108-9.

BIMLIPATAM TALUK.

Bhōgapuram.

In his *Antiquities* Mr. Sewell mentions two inscriptions in this place dated ŚŚ. 1106 and 1097. These seem to be the same as Nos. 2 and 4, but with the dates misread.

2. 363 of 1905.—(Telugu and Sanskrit.) On a slab lying in the middle of the village. Records in Ś. 1109, eleventh year, of the Eastern Gaṅga king Anantavarmadēva that the merchant Kaṇṇamanāyaka constructed the Jaina temple called Rājarāja Jīnālaya at Bhōgapura and gave two *puṭtis* of land to that temple with the consent of the Dēśi-Raṭṭaḍlu (i.e., the villagers who belonged to the mercantile class).

3. 364 of 1905.—(Telugu.) On another slab lying in the same place. Records in Ś. 1205, seventh year, of the Eastern Gaṅga king Anantavarma Śrī-Vīra-Naranarasimha gift of land to the temple of Durgādēvi at Bhōgapura. [He was evidently Narasimha II, sixth in descent from Anantavarman Chōḍagaṅga (1076—1146).]

4. 365 of 1905.—(Telugu.) On the third slab lying in the same place. A partly damaged record of the Eastern Gaṅga king Anantavarmadēva (1076—1146), dated Ś. 1027, thirty-first year. Records gift of land measured by the *Jinakōla* rod, below the tank at Bhōgapuramu by Lōkanikkaśeṭṭi, who seems to have purchased it from Dēśi-Raṭṭaḍlu.

Bimlipatam.

4-A-B. Mr. Sewell gives a stone epigraph in the local Vishṇu temple and a C.P. in the Munsif's Court. The former records repairs to the temple by a private party. The latter records grant of a village to Brahmans in Ś. 1655 by Pūsapāṭi Venkatapati Rāja.

Bōni.

In his *Antiquities* Mr. Sewell gives four inscriptions in this place, dated in Ś. 1168, 1249, 1163 and 1113. The first two of these are evidently identical with Nos. 6 and 9. The third is said to be in the reign of a Viyaya Rāja. The fourth might be No. 5 with the misreading of the date.

5. 358 of 1905.—(Sanskrit in Telugu.) On a beam in the āsthāna-maṅṭapa of the Amarēśvara temple. Belongs to the reign of the Eastern Gaṅga king Bhānudēva. Records in Ś. 1193 gift of a lamp and a garden to the temple of Amaranātha by the general Umāpati. The king's father was Vīra-Narasimhadēva (I) and his grandfather Bhīma, i.e., Anangabhīma II. [The latter was the great-grandson of Anantavarman Chōḍagaṅga.]

6. 359 of 1905.—(Sanskrit in Telugu.) On a pillar in the same maṅṭapa. Records in Ś. 1168 gift of goats for two lamps by Mēru-Mādhavārya, who was "the head jewel of all learned men."

7. 360 of 1905.—(Telugu.) On a mutilated slab lying in the same maṅṭapa. Mentions the village Brōni (Bōni) and the Mahā-maṅḍalēśvara Vīra-Savaranātadēva of Jantaṅṅa-nāḍu, who was the lord of the city of Araśuvāḍa, was born in the family of Surabhivamśa and belonged to the lineage of Dūrvāsas.

8. 361 of 1905.—(Sanskrit, in Telugu character.) On another mutilated slab lying in the same maṅṭapa. Mentions the Nāgakula.

9. 362 of 1905.—(Telugu.) On the door-post of the entrance into the same maṅṭapa, right and left sides. Records in Ś. 1248 gift of sheep for a lamp to the temple of Amarēśvaradēva at Bōni by a private individual.

Dākamarri.

10. On the west bank of the local tank at the site of an old temple, on a slab. Records a grant to the temple in Ś. 1071 (A.D. 1149). *Antiquities*, Vol. I, p. 14.

Guḍivāḍa.

11. On a stone in the middle of the street. An undated private grant in the reign of Śrī Anantavarmadēva (1076—1146).

12. In the same place. Grant by a Gōkarṇarāja of Guḍivāḍa in the reign of Anantavarmadēva.

Muñjeru.

12-A. C.P. No. 10 of 1908-9.—(Sanskrit in old Telugu character.) A grant of the Eastern Chālukyan (?) king Kōkilivarma Mahārāja or (Kakkuli Mahārāja) who had the titles of *Sarvalōkāśraya* and *Anivāritaśaktitrayasampannā*. Records grant of a village called Boḍḍēri in Bhōgipura Vishaya, in Madhyama Kaliṅga, to a Brahman of Muñjeru on the day of a lunar eclipse. It was made by the king from his residence at Elamañchi, the modern Yellamanchili, in Sarvasiddhi taluk. [Kōkili is said to be the son

of Vinayādityavarman and grandson of Mangivarman. The introductory portions of the epigraph are like those of the Eastern Chālukyan kings Vishṇuwardhana I, Jayasinha I, Vishṇuwardhana II and Maṅgiyuvarāja. These together with the title *Sarvalōkāśraya*, show that the king was an early Eastern Chālukya.]

12-B. *C.P. No. 11 of 1908-9.*—(Sanskrit in old Telugu.) A record of Kōkilimahārāja. Grant of the village of Veṭṭuvāḍa in the same district to a certain Aśvaśarman of the same place on the same occasion. The donee distributed the village among hundred Brāhmaṇas of Muñjeṛu. [The language is not quite correct, as in the previous one. Madhyama Kaliṅga has been identified with Modocalingæ of Magasthenes. See *Ep. Rep.*, 1909, pp. 105-6, for details.]

12-C. *C.P. No. 12 of 1908-9.*—A grant of Vijayasiddhi Maṅgiyuvarāja II, son of Kōkuḷi Vikramāditya Bhaṭṭāraka and grandson of Maṅgiyuvarāja I. Records the gift of the village of Koṇḍuka-vilaṅgavāḍa in Bhōgapura-vishaya on a lunar eclipse to 103 Brāhmaṇas of Muñjeṛu and the building of a Śiva temple.

12-D. *C.P. No. 13 of 1908-9.*—A grant by Vijayasiddhi Kōkuḷi, Vikramāditya Bhaṭṭāraka (father of Maṅgiyuvarāja II) of the village of Muñjeṛu to the Brāhmaṇas of Dēpūḍi in his *Āturakāla* (day of anxiety for life) of Vikramāditya Mahārāja. [The Government Epigraphist surmises that the name *Vikramāditya* might have been taken from the first Western Chālukyan king of that name.]

Rāvada.

13. In a stone in the village. Undated and private grant to temple.

BOBBILI TALUK.

Bobbili.

14. *C.P. No. 34 of Mr. Sewell's List.*—Records a document in Naḷa, given by Śrī Vēṅkaṭa Raṅgarāya Baṅgaru (Rāja of Bobbili), to a certain person, granting certain privileges in the Rājam Perganah of the Bobbili Zamindari.

Nārāyaṇapuram.

15. A C.P. grant in the possession of the temple priest, recording a gift of land to the temple.

CHIPURUPALLE TALUK.

Chipurupalle.

16. A C.P. grant of the Eastern Chālukyan king Mahārāja Vishṇuwardhana I) Vishamasiddhi, the younger brother of Pula-kēśin II), issued from Cherupura in the eighteenth year of his reign, sam. 10, 8 mā (?) 4 (?) di. 105, corresponding to the 7th July A.D. 632. See *Ind. Antq.*, Vol. XX, p. 16; *S. Ind. Palæo.*, plate 27; and Kielhorn's *Southern List*, No. 548. See also No. 35 below.

Kōtāpaḷem.

16-A. C.P. grant in Telugu characters in the possession of one of the Mutta family. No details given.

GAJAPATINAGARAM TALUK.

Garbham.

17. 188 of 1913.—(Telugu.) On the cross beam of the inner entrance into the Mallikārjuna temple. Seems to mention the name or names of persons who had the image of Vināyaka cut on the cross beam.

Lōtugedḍa.

18. 189 of 1913.—(Telugu.) On a stone in front of the Virabhadrasvāmin temple. Records that a certain Sōmaya-Paṇḍālu founded this temple of Virēśvara and gave to it a grove of trees and a garden at Bīmanapalli.

PĀRVATIPURAM TALUK.

19-A--F.—In his *Antiquities* Mr. Sewell says that the local Tahsildar sent him seven copper-plate grants. One of these is dated Ś. 1594 and records a grant by a Jeypore Rāja. Two others are undated and private. [No information is given of the others.] The last four are said to be in the possession of a person at Garugibilli.

SARVASIDDHI TALUK.

Dimile.

20. On a pillar in the Nagnēśvarasvāmi temple. Grant by a private party in honour of Jaya Mahādēvi, mother of Mahāmaṇḍalēśvara-Kulōttuṅga Prithviśvaradēva. See Gd. 63.

Pañchadhārala.

In his *Antiquities* Mr. Sewell mentions sixteen inscriptions in this place and an attempt to identify them with the following is hardly profitable.

21. 209 of 1899.—(Sanskrit and Telugu.) On a pillar at the eastern entrance into the Dharmalingēśvara temple. Records in Ś. 1339, Hēmalambin, gift of a lamp by Anyamādēvi, queen of Vishṇuwardhanamahārāja *alias* Nāgēndradēvachakravartin. See No. 27 below.

22. 210 of 1899.—(Sanskrit.) On a second pillar in the same place. The Kōna king Chōḍa records in Ś. 1325, Svabhānu, that he (of whose family a long account is given) built a gōpura for the Dharmēśvara temple. The king claims to have been descended from Kārtavīryārjuna and bears the title "Lord of Māhishmati."

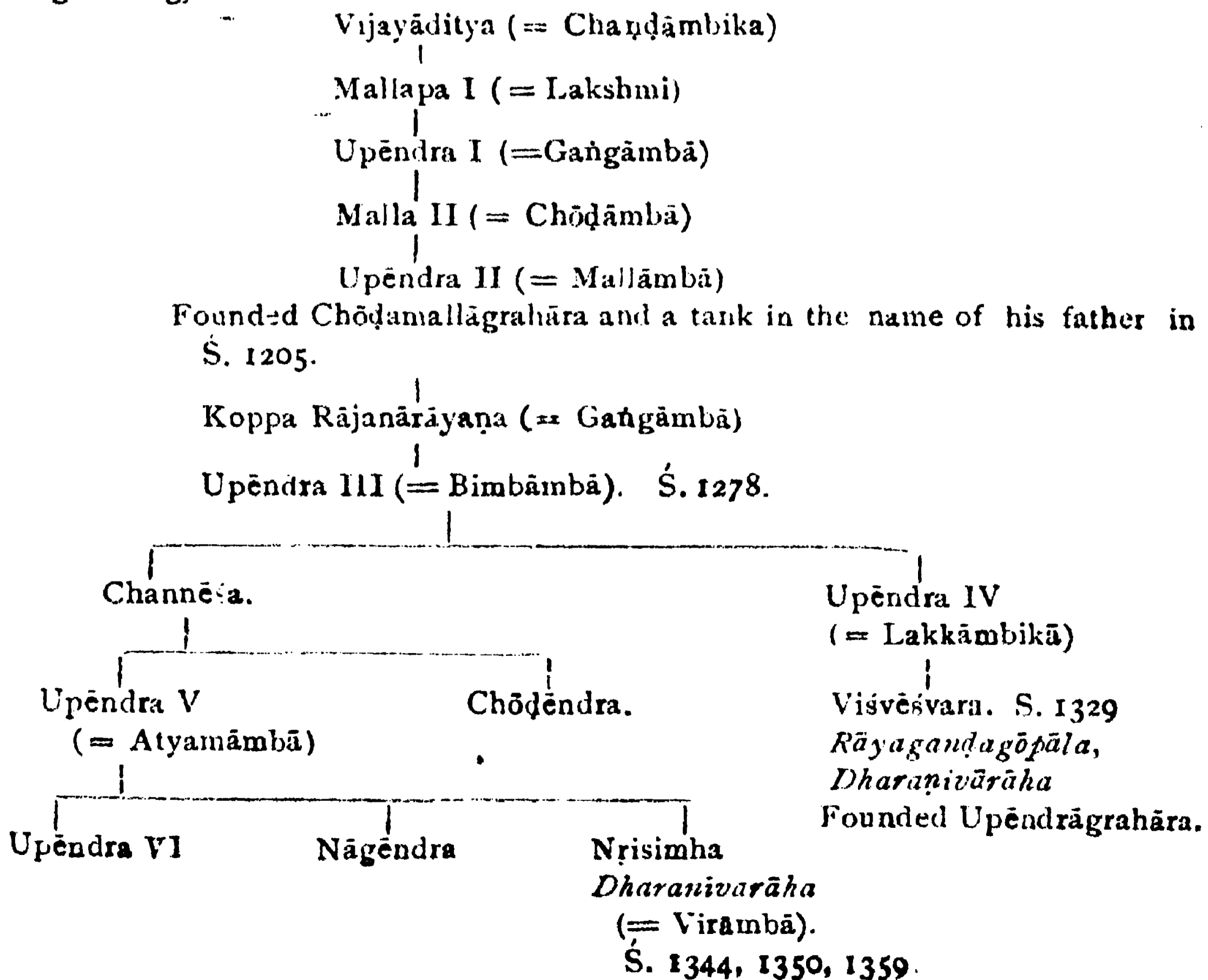
23. 211 of 1899.—(Telugu.) On a pillar at the western entrance into the same temple. Records in Ś. 1456, Śubhakrit, gift of land for offerings. Mentions a certain Chennapeggaḍa-Chennakavirāja.

24. 212 of 1899.—(Telugu.) On a pillar in the āsthāna-maṅṭapa of the same temple. Mentions in Ś. 1416, Ānanda, a chief Vīraparāja, who bore the surname Birudaṅka-Rudra and belonged to the solar race.

25. 213 of 1899.—(Sanskrit and Telugu.) On a second pillar in the same place. The Eastern Chālukya king Śīngarājamahāpātra records in Ś. 1416, Ānanda, gift of land for the merit of his parents Kumārayaṅṅama and Śīngamāmba. This king was evidently one of the numerous local chiefs who in the fifteenth century claimed an Eastern Chālukyan ancestry. Like every such chief he had the titles of Sarvalōkāśraya, Dharaṇivarāha, etc. For Kumārayaṅṅama see No. 27 below.

26. 214 of 1899.—(Sanskrit.) On a third pillar in the āsthāna-maṅṭapa of the Dharmalingēśvara temple. Dated in the reign of the Eastern Chālukya Nṛsimha. Records in Ś. 1350 (A.D. 1428) a genealogy of the king and records that his queen Vīrāmba built a tank called Vīrasāgara and that he himself built the antarāḷamaṅṭapa of the temple. This and No. 28 below introduce a distinct branch of the Eastern Chālukyas, which traces its descent from a Vijayāditya “ who was born in the family of Kulōttuṅga I.” From Vijayāditya to Nṛsimha of the present epigraph there were twelve generations.* All these chiefs bore the Eastern Chālukyan titles of Sarvalōkāśraya and Vishṇuwardhana.

* The genealogy is as follows :—



27. 215 of 1899.—(Telugu.) On the west face of the same pillar. Kumārayaṅṅama records in Ś. 1354, Parīdhavin, gift of a lamp. The king is described as belonging to the lunar race and as the son of Nāgēndradēvachakravartin. The Government Epigraphist identifies the latter with Nāgēndra, the elder brother of Nṛisimha of the previous inscription. See No. 25 above.

28. 216 of 1899.—(Sanskrit.) On the south, east and north faces of a pillar in the kalyāṇamaṅṅapa of the same temple. The Eastern Chāḷukya king Viśvēśvara records in Ś. 1329 that he built the maṅṅapa in which the pillar is found. Contains a genealogy of the king as in 26 above. See the genealogical tree in p. 1669 for the relative position of Viśvēśvara and Nṛisimha. Poet Vinnakōta Peddanna, son of Gōvindarāja and author of the *Kāvya-lankārachūdāmaṅi* dedicates his work to Viśvēśvara and so was his contemporary. [Viresaliṅgam Pantulu misreads the inscription and so arrives at a date which is earlier by a century. See his *Telugu Poets*, Vol. I, pp. 98-99.]

29. 217 of 1899.—(Telugu.) On the north face of a pillar. Records in Ś. 1359, Piṅgaḷa, gift of land.

30. 218 of 1899.—(Telugu.) On the west face of the same pillar. The Eastern Chāḷukya king Narasimhachakravartin records in Ś. 1344, Śubhakrit, several gifts made by the king and by his queen Vīramā. See the genealogical tree given as note to No. 26 above.

31. 219 of 1899.—(Telugu.) On the west face of the same pillar. The Eastern Chāḷukya king Narasimhachakravartin records in Ś. 1359, Piṅgaḷa, gift of land. See No. 26 above.

32. 220 of 1899.—(Telugu.) On a pillar at the entrance into the Vishṇu temple in the same village. Records in Ś. 1452, Hēmalambin, that Śrīdhara Rājanarēndramahāpātra built a gōpura at the southern gate of the temple, on the bank of the Pañchadhāra. The north face of this pillar contains a verse by a certain Chennakavirāja, who is also represented as having built the gōpura. [The chief was one of the numerous chiefs who claimed an Eastern Chāḷukyan ancestry in the fifteenth century.]

33. 221 of 1899.—(Sanskrit and Telugu.) On a pillar in the kalyāṇamaṅṅapa of the same temple. Records in Ś. 1460, Viḷambin, that Harinarēndramahāpātra, who bore the surnames Sarvalōkāśraya and Śrī-Vishṇuwardhana-mahārāja, and who was the son of Chāḷukya Sarvarājamahāpātra, built a maṅṅapa on the bank of the Pañchadhāra for the merit of his parents. See note to previous epigraph.

34. 222 of 1899.—(Sanskrit.) On a slab built into the east prakāra of the same temple. Built in. The portion that is copied mentions the town Māhishmati and a certain Lakkama-Chōḍa-

bhūpa, who bore the *birudas* Birudañka-Rudra and Karnāṭa-gōdhūma-gharaṭṭa.

Timmapuram.

35-A. *C.P. No. 2 of 1907-8.*—The Timmapuram plates of Vishṇu-wardhana I, edited by Dr. Hultsch in *Ep. Ind.*, Vol. IX, pp. 317—9. The inscription is in Sanskrit and records that Vishṇuwardhana (I) surnamed Vishamasiddhi, the younger brother of Satyāśraya Vallabha Mahārāja, son of Kīrtivarman, grandson of Raṇavikrama of the (Western) Chālukya family, while residing at Piṣṭapuram (Piṭhāpuram, Gōdāvari district) gave some land at a village called Kumūlūra in the Paḷaki-vishya to forty Brahmans. [The donor is the founder of the Eastern Chālukyan dynasty. See No. 16 above. Pulakēśin II captured Piṣṭapura and made his brother viceroy over it, thereby founding the eastern branch of the dynasty, about A.D. 634. See *Ep. Ind.*, Vol. VI, p. 61 and *Mad. Ep. Rep.*, 1908, p. 61.]

35-B. *C.P. No. 1 of 1907-8.*—An unfinished C.P. grant apparently of Śrī Vijayasiddhi Maṅgi Yuvarāja, son of Vishṇu-wardhana I and grandson of Indra Bhaṭṭāraka. See *Ep. Rep.*, 1908, p. 61 and Gt. 346 for two other records of the king.

SRUNGAVARAPUKŌTA TALUK.

Alamanda.

36-A. Alamanda plates of Anantavarman. Edited in *Ep. Ind.*, Vol. III, pp. 17—21, and summarized in *Ep. Rep.*, 1892, p. II, para. 12. The inscription is one of Anantavarmadēva of Kalinga-nagara, the son of Rājēndravarmān, and records that “in the year 304 of the prosperous and victorious reign of the Gāngēya race,” on the occasion of a solar eclipse, the king gave to a Brāhmaṇa the village of Medelāka in the district of Trikaṭu.

Bōnāṅgi.

36-B. A C.P. grant “in the possession of Karikiri Jānaki Rāmāyā.” Records a grant in Ś. 1508 (A.D. 1586) to a Brahman by a local chief.

Guḍivāda.

37. 48 of 1912.—(Telugu.) In the ardha-maṅṭapa of Brahma-lingasvāmin temple. A mutilated record, date of which is lost. Registers the gift of a lamp by a merchant.

38. 49 of 1912.—(Telugu.) On the wall of the āsthāna-maṅṭapa in the same temple. Registers in Ś. 1362, Raudri, that the temple and its adjuncts were constructed by a certain Basuva. He also dug a fresh water well at Lakumavarapukōṭa and set up an inscribed pillar there.

39. 50 of 1912.—(Telugu.) On a pillar of the same maṅṭapa. Registers in Ś. 1369, Prabhava, that the four pillars of the maṅṭapa were the gift of a certain Vuttaya of Poṭṇūru.

Lakkavarapukōṭa.

40. 46 of 1912.—(Telugu.) On a pillar near a well at the entrance into the village. Records in Ś. 1369, Prabhava, that the well was sunk by a native of Lakumavarapūmkōṭa in Jaṁturnāḍu.

41. 47 of 1912.—(Hindi, Nāgari.) On the pedestal of a mutilated Jaina image preserved in the Virabhadra temple in the same village. A damaged record, dated Samvat 1448. Refers to the image of Bhaṭāraka Jinachandra of *Mūla-śaṅgha*.

VIRAVILLI TALUK.

Arjunagiri.

42. On a pillar in the Viṣṇu temple. Records a grant by Śiṅgarāja, son of Raṅga Rāja, in Ś. 1392 (A.D. 1470). *Antiquities*, Vol. I, p. 15.

Chōḍavaram.

In his *Antiquities* Mr. Sewell gives six inscriptions in this place. The following departmental list is of course the more correct.

43. 51 of 1912.—(Telugu.) On a pillar in the Kēśavasvāmin temple. Records in Viśvāvasu, gift of services of the shepherds of Duttāḍa village, to the temple of Vallabharāja at Duttāḍa by the Mahāmaṅḍalēśvara Pratāpavallabharāja Mahāpātra. See No. 49 below.

44. 52 of 1912.—(Telugu.) On another pillar of the same temple. Records in Śōbhakrit gift of services of the artisans (*kamsali*) of Juttāḍa to the same temple by a friend of Vallabharāja Mahāpātra who was the chief of Voḍḍādirājya. Oḍḍavāḍi or Voḍḍāḍi has been identified with Vadḍāḍi, about 12 miles from Anakāpalle. For the Matsya kings of Oḍḍavāḍi see *Ep. Ind.*, Vol. V, pp. 106—12. Also Simhāchalam inscriptions.

45. 53 of 1912.—(Telugu.) On another pillar of the same temple. Registers that Virapratāpa Śiṅgarāja, son of the Mahāmaṅḍalēśvara Pratāpa-Śrī-raṅgarāja of Voḍḍāḍi, made the *agrahāras* and the *khandikās* in that country tax-free. See No. 50 below.

46. 54 of 1912.—(Telugu.) On another pillar of the same temple. Records in Kālayukti that a certain Mallaya set up the image of Garatmanta (i.e., Garuḍa) for the merit of Traiḍā Beharā-Mahāpātra Śrī-Bhūpatirāja Virapratāpa Vallabharāja-Mahāpātra. [The king's connexion with the earlier Matsyas is not known.]

47. 55 of 1912.—(Telugu.) On another pillar of the same temple. Mentions in Ś. 1319, Īśvara, the Mahāmaṇḍalēśvara Pratāpa Lakshmaṇadēvarāja and Śrīvallabharāja of Duttāḍa. [This chief was earlier than those referred in the other epigraphs of this place.]

48. 56 of 1912.—(Telugu.) On another pillar of the same temple. A damaged record dated in Ś. 1658 and Kali. 4837, Naḷa. Seems to record a gift for maintaining music in the temple of Kēśavasvāmin at Chōḍavaram, while Pūsapāṭi Sitārāmarāja Vijayarāmarāja was ruling the Machchha country. [This shows that Voḍḍāḍi was conquered by the Pūsapāṭis later on.]

49. 57 of 1912.—(Telugu.) On another pillar of the same temple. Records in Śārvari the gift of the village of Annavaram to the temple of Vallabharāja at Juttāḍa by a friend of the Mahāmaṇḍalēśvara Pratāpa-Vallabharāja Mahāpātra of Voḍḍāḍi. [The chief's connexion with the earlier Matsyas is not known.]

50. 58 of 1912.—(Sanskrit and Telugu.) On another pillar of the same temple. Records in Ś. 1453, Khara, gift of the village of Duttāḍa to the temple of Vallabharāja by Vīrapratāpa-Śrīraṅgarāja of Voḍḍāḍi. States that the king belonged to the Matsya vamsa, which is indicated by the figures of two fish on pedestals, cut at the end of the inscription. [The chief's connexion with the earlier Matsya chiefs of Oḍḍavāḍi is not known.]

Dibbida.

51. A C.P. grant of the Matsya king Arjuna (now deposited in the Madras Museum). It is in Śanskrit language and Telugu characters and records that on Saturday, the Akshaya tritiya of Vaiśākha in Ś. 1191, corresponding to 6th April 1269, the king Arjuna gave, for the spiritual welfare of his father Jayanta, the village of Drubbiḍi (which he re-named Jayanta-Nārāyaṇa) to certain Brāhmaṇas. The full genealogy of the line is given, Arjuna being the twenty-third in descent from Gaṅga the founder. See *Ep. Ind.*, Vol. V, pp. 106--12, for the full edition of the record.

Muddurti.

(The following have been recorded by Messrs. Sewell and Elliot.)

52. Undated grant of Mahāmaṇḍalēśvara Maṅkāditya Maharāja. [Was he the brother of Arjuna, the donor of the Dibbiḍa plates?]

52-A. Undated grant in the same reign.

53. Undated grant by a servant of the same king.

Peddipālem (Peddapūḍi!).

54—56. Elliot gives three inscriptions, recording private grants to a temple in Ś. 1079 (A.D. 1157) in the reign of Anantavarmadēva. *Antiquities*, Vol. I, p. 15.

Tādiṣṣarti.

57. On the *Śiṅganibanda* rock. A grant to the local temple in Ś. 1074 during the reign of Anantavarma.

Yuttāda.

58—60. Elliot gives three inscriptions here. The first is a private grant, dated in Ś. 1271, the second undated and private and the third a grant to the temple by Mahāmaṇḍalēśvara Pratāpavallabha Rāja in Ś. 1354. See Nos. 43 and 49 above.

VIZAGAPATAM TALUK.

Viṣagapatam.

61. 97 of 1909.—(Telugu.) On a slab fixed into the wall at the entrance into the Jaggarao observatory. The Velanāṇḍu king Kulōttuṅga Prithvīśvara Mahārāja records in Ś. 1121, gift of land and a house to a merchant. Mentions the “Perumballi of the 500” at Viśākhavattāṇa *alias* Kulōttuṅga Chōḷa vattāṇa.

62. 98 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On a stone lying near Paravastu Raṅgācharya’s house in the same village. Records in Ś. 1172, and fifteenth year of the Eastern Gaṅga king Vīra Naraśiṅgadēva gift of a maṇḍapa by a merchant who was a native of Pandalāyani Kollam to the temple of Karumāṅikka Āḷvār at Viśākapattinam *alias* Kulōttuṅgaśōḷapattāṇam.

63. 99 of 1909.—(Telugu.) On a second stone in the same place. Records in Ś. 1012 and thirteenth year of the Eastern Gaṅga king Anantavarma dēva gift of “Perumballi of the 500” at Viśākhapattāṇa to a native of Malamāṇḍala, by a merchant of Mātōttam *alias* Rāmakulavallipattāṇam and by “the twelve” of Viśākhapattāṇa *alias* Kulōttuṅga-Chōḷapattāṇa.

64. 100 of 1909.—(Tamil.) On the back of the same stone. A damaged record, dated in Ś. 1102. Refers to the gift mentioned in No. 62.

65. 101 of 1909.—(Arabic.) On a tomb stone on the Darga-hill in the same village. A record, dated Hijrah 1012 (= A.D. 1603). Sent to Dr. J. Horovitz for publication in the *Epigraphia Moslemica*.

66—68. 102—104 of 1909.—(Arabic.) On two other tomb stones in the same place. Sent to Dr. J. Horovitz for publication in the *Epigraphia Moslemica*.

68-A. C.P. No. 4 of 1912—13.—A C.P. grant of the Eastern Gaṅga Mahārāja Dēvēndravarmaṇ, son of Guṇārṇava, dated in Kaliṅgāṅka era 195, Śrāvaṇa, ba. di. 5, Dakṣiṇāyana. Records gift of land in the village Siddhārtaka to a Brāhmaṇa named Tamparaśarma Dīkshita, a resident of Ēraṇḍapalli. [Only one C.P. of this king has been thus far edited. See *Ep. Ind.*, Vol. III, 130 f. It is dated in the year 183 of the same era. The village Siddhārtaka

figures in the Achyutapuram plates of Indravarman also. *Ep. Ind.*, Vol. III, p. 127. "Ēraṇḍapalli is perhaps identical with Ēraṇḍapalla, whose chief Damana was captured and liberated by the Gupta king Samudragupta in or about the fourth century A.D."]

Simhāchalam.

See *Antiquities*, Vol. I, p. 16, and *Vizag. Manual*, p. 70, for the history of the place. Mr. Sewell gives six inscriptions here, but the following is a more detailed and accurate list.

69. 241 of 1899.—(Sanskrit and Telugu.) Above the southern entrance into the kalyāṇamaṇḍapa of the Lakshmīnarasiṁhasvāmin temple. Records in Ś. 1188, that Lakshmīdēvi, wife of a certain Maṅgirāja, granted two lamps for the merit of her son Upēndrarāja. [The genealogy of the Pañchadhārta branch of the Eastern Chālukyas seems to show that Maṅgirāja was the same as Mallapa I, the father of Upēndra I.]

70. 242 of 1899.—(Sanskrit.) On the south wall of the same maṇḍapa. A record of the Eastern Gaṅga king Narasiṁha, mentions in Ś. 1184, Gaṇēśvarachamūnātha of the Vaiśvānara family and son of Sōmēśvaranāyaka. The inscription, which is called a *praśasti*, was composed by Chitsukhārya. [Was Narasiṁha the second of that name and the son of Bhānudēva I?]

71. 243 of 1899.—(Telugu.) On the base of the āsthānamaṇḍapa in the first enclosure of the same temple. Dated in the reign of the Vijayanagara king Kṛishṇarāya. Records in Ś. 1438, Dhātri, the presentation of a number of jewels to the temple.

72. 244 of 1899.—(Telugu.) On the base of the āsthānamaṇḍapa in the first enclosure of the Lakshmīnarasiṁhasvāmin temple. Dated in the reign of the Vijayanagara king Kṛishṇarāya. Records in Ś. 1441, Pramāthin, gift of several villages.

73. 245 of 1899.—(Telugu.) On a round pillar on the verandah running round the *garbhagriha* of the same temple, south. Dated in the reign of the Vijayanagara king Kṛishṇarāya. Records in Ś. 1438, Dhātri, gifts of jewels by himself and by his two queens Chinnadēvamma and Tirumaladēvamma. See Ct. 20.

74. 246 of 1899.—(Telugu.) On another round pillar in the same place. Records in Ś. 1447, Pārthiva, the gift by purchase of the village of Uttārapalli in Jantarunāṇḍu, by Sarvalōkāśraya Vishṇuwardhanamahārāja *alias* Beharāmahāpātra-Śrī-Sarvarājamahāpātra.

75. 247 of 1899.—(Telugu.) On a third round pillar in the same verandah, north. Records in Ś. 1457, Jaya, gift of gold by a private individual.

76. 248 of 1899.—(Sanskrit and Telugu.) On the first pillar built in to the back wall of the same verandah. Records in Ś. 1192 gift of a lamp by a merchant of the Sāntāla gōtra.

- 77.** 249 of 1899.—(Sanskrit and Telugu.) In the first niche of the same verandah. Mentions in Ś. 1313, Sarvalōkāśraya-Śrī-Vishṇuwardhanamahārāja *alias* Chōḍagaṅga of Elamachchi. He was one of the later chiefs who claimed descent from the Eastern Chālukyas. See No. 12-A—D above for other chiefs of Elamañchi.
- 78.** 250 of 1899.—(Sanskrit and Telugu.) In the first niche of the same verandah. Records in Ś. 1220 gift of gold by a Nāyaka.
- 79.** 251 of 1899.—(Sanskrit and Telugu.) In the second niche of the same verandah. Records in Ś. 1207 gift of gold for a flower garden by Gaṅgarāja of Jantaru-nāṇḍu, born in the Surabhivamśa.
- 80.** 252 of 1899.—(Sanskrit and Telugu.) In the second niche of the same verandah. A record of the Eastern Gaṅga king Dēvādīdēva Śrī-Jagannāthadēva. Records in his thirteenth year and Ś. 1241 gift of a lamp by Lakshmīdēvi, queen of Pratāpa-Gaṅgarāja of Jantaru-nāṇḍu. [So Jagannātha came to the throne in 1306.]
- 81.** 253 of 1899.—(Sanskrit and Telugu.) On the third pillar in the same verandah. The Eastern Gaṅga king Anantavarma Pratāpavīra-Śrī-Bāṇudēva I records in his eighteenth year and Ś. 1200 gift of a lamp. [So the king came to the throne in A.D. 1260.]
- 82.** 254 of 1899.—(Sanskrit and Telugu.) On the fourth pillar in the same verandah. Records in Ś. 1192 gift of two lamps.
- 83.** 255 of 1899.—(Telugu.) On the fourth pillar in the same verandah. Records in Ś. 1387, Pārthiva, that the Mahāmaṇḍalēśvara Śrīvallabharāja of Oḍḍāḍi provided for offerings to be made to the temple. See No. 49 above.
- 84.** 256 of 1899.—(Sanskrit and Telugu.) On the sixth pillar in the same verandah. Records in Ś. 1192 gift of a lamp by Śūrepeggaḍa of the Bhāradvāja gōtra.
- 85.** 257 of 1899.—(Telugu.) In the sixth niche of the same verandah. The Eastern Gaṅga king Pratāpavīra Narasimhadēva records in Ś. 1301 a gift of land. [This king came to the throne in A.D. 1376. See Gj. 204 and 207.]
- 86.** 258 of 1899.—(Sanskrit and Telugu.) In the sixth niche of the same verandah. Records in Ś. 1323 gift of gold by Pārvatīdēvi, queen of Pratāpavīra-Narasimhadēva. See note to the above inscription.
- 87.** 259 of 1899.—(Sanskrit and Telugu.) In the sixth niche of the same verandah. Records in Ś. 1301 that provision was made by a certain Kāmanamahāpātrā for the daily supply to the temple of a flower-garland.
- 88.** 260 of 1899.—(Telugu.) In the seventh niche of the verandah running round the *garbhagriha* of the Lakshmīnarasimhasvāmin temple. Records in Ś. 1303 gift of gold.

89. 261 of 1899.—(Sanskrit and Telugu.) In the seventh niche of the verandah running round the *garbhagriha* of the same temple. Records in Ś. 1306 gift of gold by Sāṅkarajīyana, son of Svapnēśvaramahāpātra.

90. 262 of 1899.—(Sanskrit and Telugu.) In the seventh niche of the verandah running round the *garbhagriha* of the same temple. Records in Ś. 1291 gift of gold for a *chāmara* by Sōmanāthamahāpasāti.

91. 263 of 1899.—(Telugu.) In the seventh niche of the verandah running round the *garbhagriha* of the same temple. The Eastern Gaṅga king Vīra-Narasimhadēva records in Ś. 1302 gift of gold for oblations. See No. 85 above.

92. 264 of 1899.—(Sanskrit and Telugu.) In the seventh niche of the verandah running round the *garbhagriha* of the same temple. Records in Ś. 1294 gift of gold by Śrīvatsanāyaka, son of Hērammahāsēnāpati.

93. 265 of 1899.—(Telugu.) In the seventh niche of the verandah running round the *garbhagriha* of the same temple. Records in Ś. 1350 gift of a lamp by a certain Sāhasamalla. See No. 101 below.

94. 266 of 1899.—(Telugu.) On the eighth pillar in the same verandah. Records in Ś. 1227 gift of a lamp by Akhaṇḍānanda, pupil of Varadagiriśrīpāda. See No. 135 below.

95. 267 of 1899.—(Telugu.) In the eighth niche of the same verandah. Records in Ś. 1313 that an endowment was made by Pōlu-mahāsēnāpati for the supply of a garland of *tulasi* leaves to the temple.

96. 268 of 1899.—(Telugu.) In the eighth niche of the same verandah. The Eastern Gaṅga king Vīra-Bhānudēva records in his thirty-first year and Ś. 1298 gift of land by Śiṣṭukavu Mahāsēnāpati. [So the king came to the throne in A.D. 1345 and ruled till at least 1376.]

97. 267 of 1899.—(Telugu.) In the eighth niche of the same verandah. Records in Ś. 1305 gift of two *chāmaras* by Birujādēvi, queen of Gajapati-Pedanarasimhadēva and by Tārādēvi, queen of Vīra-Bhānudēva. [Vīra-Bhānu is perhaps the same as the one referred to in the above epigraph, and Peda Narasimha his probable successor.]

98. 270 of 1899.—(Sanskrit and Telugu.) In the eighth niche of the same verandah. Records in Ś. 1305 gift of a *chāmara* by Tārādēvi, queen of Gajapati-Vīranarasimhadēva. See the above inscription.

99. 271 of 1899.—(Telugu.) In the ninth niche of the same verandah. Records in Ś. 1298 gift of gold.

100. 272 of 1899.—(Telugu.) In the ninth niche of the same verandah. Records in Ś. 1320 gift of a lamp by a Nāyaka.

101. 273 of 1899.—(Sanskrit and Telugu.) In the ninth niche of the same verandah. Records in Ś. 1282 gift of a lamp by Dharmadāsa-Sāhasamalla. See No. 93 above.

102. 274 of 1899.—(Telugu.) On the eleventh pillar in the same verandah. Records in Ś. 1383 gift of a *chūmara* by a private individual.

103. 275 of 1899.—(Telugu.) In the eleventh niche of the same verandah. Records in Ś. 1343 gift of land by a resident of Kurakēni-Kollam (Quilon).

104. 276 of 1899.—(Sanskrit and Telugu.) In the eleventh niche of the same verandah. Records in Ś. 1299 gift of gold by a certain Kṛishṇadēva who was well versed in music.

105. 277 of 1899.—(Sanskrit and Telugu.) In the eleventh niche of the verandah running round the *garbhagriha* of the same temple. Records in Ś. 1308 gift of gold by the Redḍi king Kāṭamareḍḍi-Vēmireḍḍi for providing the temple with garlands for the merit of Kāṭamareḍḍi and his wife Dodḍasāni. [The ruler referred to was the founder of the Rājahundry Redḍi line and the author of the *Kumāragiri rājīyam*.]

106. 278 of 1899.—(Telugu.) On the twelfth pillar in the same verandah. A damaged record of the Gajapati king Pratāpa Kapilēśvara, dated in his thirty-second year. See GJ. 162 for details.

107. 279 of 1899.—(Sanskrit and Telugu.) In the twelfth niche of the same verandah. Records in Ś. 1297 gift of a lamp by Varadanapeggaḍa, son of Peddanapeggaḍa of Oḍḍavāḍi.

108. 280 of 1899.—(Sanskrit and Telugu.) In the twelfth niche of the same verandah. Records in Ś. 1278 gift of a lamp by Purushōttamadēvarāja of Vīrakūṭa. See 147 below.

109. 281 of 1899.—(Telugu.) In the twelfth niche of the same verandah. Mentions in Ś. 1352, Sādhāraṇa, a certain Paramapurusha, pupil of Jñānātmatīrtha, the head of a *maṭha* in the Kanarese country.

110. 282 of 1899.—(Sanskrit and Telugu.) Records in Ś. 1297 gift of gold by the donor in No. 107 above.

111. 283 of 1899.—(Telugu.) In the fourteenth niche of the same verandah. Records in Ś. 1309 an endowment by Satyamahādēvi of Jantaṅ-nāṅḍu for the daily supply of a garland. See next inscription.

112. 284 of 1899.—(Telugu.) In the fifteenth niche of the verandah. Records in Ś. 1338 gift of a lamp by Satyamahādēvi, queen of Pratāpa-Arjunadēva of Oḍḍavāḍi. [He was a later prince of the Matsya line of Oḍḍavāḍi, whose connexion with the earlier rulers is not known. See No. 140 below.]

113. 285 of 1899.—(Telugu.) On the seventeenth pillar in the same verandah. A damaged record of the Gajapati king Pratāpa-Purushōttamadēvarāja, dated Ś. 1394, Nandana. See Gj. 152.

114. 286 of 1899.—(Telugu.) In the seventeenth niche of the same verandah. Mentions in Ś. 1195 certain ministers and a copper-plate grant issued during the time of a certain Rājarāja-dēva.

115. 287 of 1899.—(Sanskrit and Telugu.) In the nineteenth niche of the same verandah. The Matsya king Jayantarāja *alias* Kṛishṇavardhana records in Ś. 1261 gift of cows.

116. 288 of 1899.—(Sanskrit and Telugu.) In the nineteenth niche of the same verandah. Records in Ś. 1218 gift of gold.

117. 289 of 1899.—(Sanskrit and Telugu.) In the twenty-first niche of the same verandah. Records in Ś. 1208 gift of gold by the wife of Tañchināyaka. Contains also another donation by the same lady in Ś. 1210.

118. 290 of 1899.—(Sanskrit and Telugu.) In the twenty-second niche of the same verandah. Records in Ś. 1209 gift of gold by Purushōttamanāyaka.

119. 291 of 1899.—(Sanskrit and Telugu.) In the twenty-second niche of the same verandah. Records in Ś. 1220 gift of a flower-garden by Lakkaṇanāyaka, son of Charapati-Thakkūru of the Kauśika gōtra.

120. 292 of 1899.—(Sanskrit and Telugu.) In the twenty-third niche of the same verandah. Dated in the reign of the Eastern Gaṅga king Anantavarma-Pratāpavīra-Narasimhadēva. Records in his fifteenth year and Ś. 1213 gift of vessels by Nārāyaṇasēnāpati *alias* Narasimhadāsa, son of Gōpāla mahāsēnāpati. [The king came to the throne in A.D. 1276 and so he was evidently Narasimha II. It follows that he should have ruled from 1276 to 1310.]

121. 293 of 1899.—(Telugu.) In the twenty-third niche of the same verandah. Records in Ś. 1350, Plavaṅga, gift of a lamp by Teluṅgurāya, son of Śamburāya of Kannaḍa-dēśa. See Gt. 128.

122. 294 of 1899.—(Sanskrit and Telugu.) In the twenty-fourth niche of the verandah. The Eastern Chālukya king Sarvalōkāśraya Śrī-Vishṇuwardhanamahārāja *alias* Upēndradēvachakravartin records in Ś. 1278 gift of a lamp. The Epigraphist identifies this king with Upēndra III of the Pañchahārāla branch of the Eastern Chālukyas. See p. 1669.

123. 295 of 1899.—(Sanskrit and Telugu.) In the twenty-fourth niche of the verandah. Records in Ś. 1271 gift of a lamp by Tammayanāyaka, son of Śaṅkamanāyaka.

124. 296 of 1899.—(Sanskrit and Telugu.) In the twenty-fourth niche of the verandah. Records in Ś. 1200 gift of a flower-garden by Rāmāyipasāyiti, son of Kailāsapasāyiti,

125. 297 of 1899.—(Sanskrit and Telugu.) In the twenty-fifth niche of the same verandah. Records in the fiftcenth year, Ś. 1213, of the Eastern Gaṅga king Anantavarma-Pratāpavīra-Narasimhadēva gift of two lamps by Nāgumaṇḍalika, leader of the Kalinga forces. See No. 120 above.

126. 298 of 1899.—(Telugu.) In the twenty-fifth niche of the same verandah. Records in Ś. 1309 gift of gold by Lakumādēvi, daughter of Rāmadēva of the Gaṅga family in Kaṭaka.

127. 299 of 1899.—(Sanskrit and Telugu.) On the twenty-sixth pillar in the same verandah. Records in Ś. 1205 gift of two lamps by the Eastern Chālukya king Upēndradēvachakravartin and his mother Chōlamahādēvi, queen of Sarvalōkāśraya Śrī-Vishṇuwardhanamahārāja Mallapadēva. [The king was Upēndra II, son of Malla II, of the Pañchadhārāla branch of the Eastern Chālukyan line, referred to in the Pañchadhārāla inscriptions. See p. 1669.]

128. 300 of 1899.—(Sanskrit and Telugu.) In the twenty-sixth niche of the same verandah. Records in Ś. 1219, the twenty-third year of the Eastern Gaṅga king Anantavarma Pratāpavīra-Narasimhadēva gift of a lamp by Nirbhayamalla Dharmāyisēnāpati of the Śālasya gōtra.

129. 301 of 1899.—(Sanskrit and Telugu.) In the twenty-sixth niche of the same verandah. Records in Ś. 1202 gift of gold by Vasudēvapadīrāya, son of Rāyavallabha-mahāsēnāpati.

130. 302 of 1899.—(Sanskrit and Telugu.) In the twenty-sixth niche of the same verandah. Dated in the reign of the Matsya king Arjunadēva *alias* Narasimhavardhana of Oḍḍavāḍi. Records in Ś. 1211 gift of gold for the merit of the king's younger brother Annamarāja *alias* Gōpālavardhana. [Arjuna was the donor of the Dibbiḍa plates. See Vg. 51 above.]

131. 303 of 1899.—(Sanskrit and Telugu.) In the twenty-seventh niche of the same verandah. Records in Ś. 1221 the twenty-fifth year of the Eastern Gaṅga king Anantavarma-Pratāpavīra-Narasimhadēva gift of a flower-garden by Varadagirimuni. See Vg. No. 120 above.

132. 304 of 1899.—(Sanskrit and Telugu.) In the twenty-seventh niche of the same verandah. Records in Ś. 1218 gift of a lamp by Chimmādēvi, queen of Jayantarāja of Oḍḍavāḍi. [Jayanta was either the son of Arjuna, referred to in No. 130 above or more probably his nephew, the son of Maṅkāditya, referred to in the next epigraph.]

133. 305 of 1899.—(Sanskrit and Telugu.) In the twenty-seventh niche of the same verandah. The Matsya king Jayanta records in Ś. 1211 gift of a flower-garden at the instance of Nara-haritīrthaśrīpāda. See *Ep. Ind.*, Vol. VI, p. 267, where Dr. Kielhorn finds out from the details of the date that the English equivalent is Saturday, 26th July, A.D. 1292. See Gj. 168, 169, 245 and 247.

134. 306 of 1899.—(Sanskrit and Telugu.) On the twenty-eighth pillar in the same verandah. Records in Ś. 1206 gift of gold by Brāhmaṇadāsapāṇḍya while Chitsukhasōmayājin was managing the temple. See Vg. 193 below.

135. 307 of 1899.—(Sanskrit.) On the twenty-eighth pillar in the same verandah. Records in Ś. 1220 gift of gold for offerings by the donor in the above epigraph. Mentions Varadādrimuni. See Vg. 94 above.

136. 308 of 1899.—(Sanskrit and Telugu.) In the twenty-eighth niche of the same verandah. Records in Ś. 1208 gift of a lamp.

137. 309 of 1899.—(Sanskrit and Telugu.) In the twenty-eighth niche of the same verandah. Records in Ś. 1349 gift of two lamps by Pratāpa-Gaṅgarāja, son of Bayyarāja of the Śīlavamśa reigning at Nandapura. The donor's maternal uncle was Śiṅgarāja, son of Jayantarāja of the Matsya family of Oḍḍādi.

138. 310 of 1899.—(Sanskrit and Telugu.) In the twenty-ninth niche of the verandah. Records in the twenty-third year of the Eastern Gaṅga king Anantavarma-Pratāpavīra-Narasimhadēva, in Ś. 1219 gift of a lamp by a woman from the Drāviḍa country. See No. 120 above.

139. 311 of 1899.—(Sanskrit and Telugu.) In the thirtieth niche of the same verandah. Records in Ś. 1213 gift of four lamps by Naraharitīrtha on the occasion of an Ardhōdaya. See *Ep. Ind.*, Vol. VI, p. 267, where Dr. Kielhorn shows that the details of the date lead to Sunday, 20th January or Monday, 21st January of 1292. See No. 133 above and references given therein.

140. 312 of 1899.—(Telugu.) In the thirtieth niche of the same verandah. Records in Ś. 1343 gift of 510 cows by Pratāpa-Arjunadēvarāja on his return from the conquest of Jantaṅgu-nāṇḍu. See No. 112 above.

141. 313 of 1899.—(Sanskrit and Telugu.) In the thirtieth niche of the same verandah. A damaged record, dated Ś. 1226. Records gift of gold by a Nāyaka.

142. 314 of 1899.—(Sanskrit and Telugu.) In the thirtieth niche of the same verandah. A record of the Matsya king Jayantikadēva in Ś. 1271. Gift of a lamp by queen Cheṅgamādēvi.

143. 315 of 1899.—(Sanskrit and Telugu.) In the thirty-first niche of the same verandah. The Matsya king Mankādityadēva *alias* Śrīraṅgavardhana records in Ś. 1210 gift of a flower garden.

144. 316 of 1899.—(Sanskrit and Telugu.) In the thirty-first niche of the same verandah. The Matsya king Jayantikadēva records in Ś. 1220 gift of five lamps and a flower garden. See No. 133 above.

145. 317 of 1899.—(Sanskrit and Telugu.) In the thirty-second niche of the same verandah. Records in Ś. 1218 the twenty-second year of the Eastern Gaṅga king Anantavarma Pratāpavīra-Narasimhadēva gift of a flower-garden by Nārāyaṇavājapēyayājin of the Atrēya gōtra. See No. 120 above.

146. 318 of 1899.—(Telugu.) In the thirty-second niche of the same verandah. Records in Ś. 1264 gift of ornaments by Kommidēvi for the merit of her daughter Sītādēvi; see Gj. 223 for the same persons.

147. 319 of 1899.—(Sanskrit and Telugu.) In the thirty-third niche of the same verandah. Records in Ś. 1270 gift of a lamp by Narasimharāja, son of Purushōttamarāja of the Vīrakūṭa race and of the Bhāradvāja gōtra. See Vg. 108 above.

148. 320 of 1899.—(Sanskrit and Telugu.) In the thirty-third niche of the same verandah. Records in Ś. 1268 gift of a lamp by Sarvalōkāśraya Vishṇuvardhanamahārāja *alias* Lakumarāja of Bīragoṭṭa, son of Viñjamadēva; mentions also his queen Śrīyādēvi. Lakumarāja claims to be descended from the race of the Mānavyas. [He was one of the later chiefs who claimed descent from the Eastern Chālukyas.]

149. 321 of 1899.—(Sanskrit and Telugu.) In the twenty-third niche of the same verandah. Records in Ś. 1268 gift of a lamp by Annamanāyaka of Bīragoṭṭa, son of Dhanapatīnāyaka who belonged to the Ātrēya gōtra.

150. 322 of 1899.—(Sanskrit and Telugu.) In the twenty-third niche of the same verandah. Records in Ś. 1230 gift of a lamp by Śrīraṅgalakshmi, mother of Purushōttama of Vīrakūṭa. [This Purushōttama must have been different from his namesake referred to in No. 147 above.]

151. 323 of 1899.—(Sanskrit and Telugu.) In the twenty-third niche of the same verandah. Records in Ś. 1265 gift of gold by a military officer.

152. 324 of 1899.—(Telugu.) In the thirty-third niche of the verandah. Records in Ś. 1274 gift of a lamp by Narasimharāja, son of Purushōttama of Bīrakūṭa. See No. 147 above.

153. 325 of 1899.—(Sanskrit and Telugu.) In the thirty-third niche of the same verandah. Records in Ś. 1209 gift of a lamp by Tallepaggada, son of Prōlepeggada, who was a minister of the Oḍḍavāḍi kings.

154. 326 of 1899.—(Sanskrit and Telugu.) In the thirty-third niche of the same verandah. Records in Ś. 1265 gift of a lamp by Sōmapaḍirāya of the Kāśyapa gōtra.

155. 327 of 1899.—(Telugu.) In the thirty-fourth niche of the same verandah. Dated in the reign of the Eastern Gaṅga king Anantavarma-Pratāpavīra-Bāṇudēva. Records in his third year and Ś. 1229 gift of cows by several chiefs, among whom figures

Sarvalōkāśraya Vishṇuwardhanamahārāja Viśvanātha. [As the king came to the throne in A.D. 1304 we may suppose that he was the son of Narasiṃha II, and the opponent of Ghias-ud-din Toglak Shah.]

156. 328 of 1899.—(Sanskrit and Telugu.) In the thirty-fourth niche of the same verandah. Records in Ś. 1249 gift of a lamp and a flower-garden by a Nāyaka.

157. 329 of 1899.—(Sanskrit and Telugu.) In the thirty-fourth niche of the same verandah. Dated in the third year of the Eastern Gaṅga king Anantavarma-Pratāpavīra-Bāṇudēva in Ś. 1229. Gift of a flower-garden by Sarvalōkāśraya Vishṇuwardhana-Mahārāja Viśvanātha. See No. 155 above.

158. 330 of 1899.—(Sanskrit and Telugu.) In the thirty-fourth niche of the same verandah. Vīranarasimhadēva (III?) records in Ś. 1263, an endowment for offerings. [This Vīra Narasiṃha was not improbably the immediate successor of Bāṇudēva II.]

159. 331 of 1899.—(Sanskrit and Telugu.) In the thirty-fifth niche of the same verandah. The Gajapati king Vīranarasimhadēva records in Ś. 1311 endowments for offerings by the king's paternal grandmother Birijādēvi, his mother Tārādēvi, his queen and his preceptor.

160. 332 of 1899.—(Telugu.) In the thirty-sixth niche of the same verandah. Records in Ś. 1343 gifts by Pratāpa-Gaṅgarāja of Jantaṅga-nāṇḍu.

161. 333 of 1899.—(Sanskrit and Telugu.) In the fortieth niche of the same verandah. Records in Ś. 1296 an endowment for the daily supply of a garland by Kṛishṇadāsa *alias* Sāhasamalla for the merit of his wife.

162. 334 of 1899.—(Telugu.) In the fortieth niche of the same verandah. Records in Ś. 1338 gift of a lamp by the daughter's son of Oddāḍi-Arjunadēva. See Nos. 112 and 140 above.

163. 335 of 1899.—(Telugu.) In the fortieth niche of the same verandah. Records in Ś. 1308 gift of a fan (*ālavaṭṭam*) by a Nāyaka.

164. 336 of 1899.—(Telugu.) In the fortieth niche of the same verandah. A damaged record of the Eastern Gaṅga king Vīradivīra-Vīrabāṇudēva, dated in his eighth year. Appears to give a list of lands belonging to the temple.

165. 337 of 1899.—(Telugu.) In the forty-third niche of the same verandah. Records in Ś. 1348, Parābhava, gift of money by Rāmadāsajīyana.

166. 338 of 1899.—(Sanskrit and Telugu.) In the forty-third niche of the same verandah. Records in Ś. 1308 gift of gold by the son of Jōgēśvarajīyana.

167. 339 of 1899.—(Telugu.) In the forty-third niche of the same verandah. Records in Ś. 1303 gift of gold by the wife of

Anavōtanāyaka. On the same stone is another inscription, dated in Ś. 1309, which mentions Anavōta's son Chiṅgamanāyaka. [Was Anavōta chief of Venkatagiri? If so he must be the chief who traditionally ruled about 1,300 and vanquished 101 chiefs. Chiṅgamanāyaka apparently was his son Peddaśingama.]

168. 340 of 1899.—(Telugu.) On the forty-fourth pillar in the same verandah. Records in Ś. 1381 gift of land by Hambīra Komāra-mahāpātra.

169. 341 of 1899.—(Telugu.) In the forty-fourth niche of the same verandah. Records in Ś. 1310 several gifts by Mummaḍi Nāyaka of Maṅgipūṇḍi.

170. 342 of 1899.—(Telugu.) In the forty-fourth niche of the same verandah. Records in Ś. 1348 gift of money by Parsarāma-jīyana; mentions *Abhinava-Bharatāchārya* Tōḍaramalla-Ranganātha. [The Tōḍaramalla family seem to have distinguished themselves in music. A later member, for instance, Tōḍaramalla Timma composed the *Svaramēlakalānidhi* about 1550. See Dr. Hultzsch's *Rep., San. MSS.*, No. I, p. VIII.]

171. 343 of 1899.—(Sanskrit and Telugu.) In the forty-fourth niche of the same verandah. Records in Ś. 1337 gift of a lamp.

172. 344 of 1899.—(Telugu.) On the forty-sixth pillar in the same verandah. Records in Ś. 1377 an endowment for oblations by Kuṇḍalēśvaramahāpātra.

173. 345 of 1899.—(Telugu.) On the forty-seventh niche of the same verandah. Records in Ś. 1336 an endowment for the daily supply of garlands by Chandanamahāpātra and Bhadrēśvara-jīyana.

174. 346 of 1899.—(Telugu.) On the forty-seventh niche of the same verandah. Records in Ś. 1346 gift of money.

175. 347 of 1899.—(Telugu.) On the forty-seventh niche of the same verandah. Records in Ś. 1336 provision for the supply of garlands made of the leaves of the *tulasi* plant.

176. 348 of 1899.—(Sanskrit and Telugu.) In the forty-eighth niche of the same verandah. Dated in the reign of the Gajapati king Pratāpavīra-Niśśaṅka-Bāṇudēva. Records in Ś. 1336 gift of garlands by the king's aunt Kamalādēvi.

177. 349 of 1899.—(Sanskrit and Telugu.) In the forty-eighth niche of the same verandah. Records in Ś. 1298 gift of a lamp by Errayapeggaḍa of the Kāśyapagōtra. [He ought not to be confounded with the poet Errā Peggāḍa of Guḍlūr who belonged to the Śrīvatsagōtra. See Viresalingam's *Lives of Telugu poets*, p. 62.]

178. 350 of 1899.—(Telugu.) On the forty-ninth pillar in the same verandah. The Eastern Gaṅga king Anantavarma-Naranāra-siṃharāvutudēva records in his third year, and Ś. 1203, the renewal of a copper-plate grant made by Pōtāṅkuśa. The renewal was

brought about by several chiefs, among whom figures Ananta-jīyana, governor of Chīkaṭi and minister of the Gaṅga kings.

179. 351 of 1899.—(Sanskrit and Telugu.) In the fiftieth niche of the same verandah. Records in Ś. 1307 gift of a lamp by Nallurājurāvuturāya who bore the *birudas* Sarvalōkāśraya and Vishṇuvardhanamahārāja.

180. 352 of 1899.—(Sanskrit and Telugu.) In the fiftieth niche of the same verandah. Records in Ś. 1299 gift of gold by Dharmadāsajīyana. See No. 182.

181. 353 of 1899.—(Telugu.) In the fiftieth niche of the same verandah. Vīra-Śrī-Narasimhadēvarāja records in Ś. 1309 an endowment for oblations.

182. 354 of 1899.—(Telugu.) In the fiftieth niche of the same verandah. Records in Ś. 1298 an endowment for oblations by Dharmadāsajīyana. See No. 180 above.

183. 355 of 1899.—(Sanskrit and Telugu.) In the fiftieth niche of the same verandah. Records in Ś. 1298 an endowment for the supply of garlands by the son-in-law of Dharmadāsajīyana. See the above inscription.

184. 356 of 1899.—(Sanskrit and Telugu.) In the fiftieth niche of the same verandah. Mentions in Ś. 129 (6) Dharmadāsajīyana.

185. 357 of 1899.—(Sanskrit.) On the fifty-first pillar in the same verandah. Dated in the reign of the Eastern Gaṅga king Naraharinṛipati (Narasimhadēva). Records in Ś. 1212 gift of gold for maintaining temple musicians by the minister Anantāṅgamahāpātra, son of Rāmadēva of the Vatsa gōtra. [The king was evidently Narasimha II, the son of Bāṇudēva I.]

186. 358 of 1899.—(Sanskrit and Telugu.) In the fifty-second niche of the same verandah. The Matsya king Annamarāja *alias* Gōpālavardhada records in Ś. 1208 gift of a lamp by the king. See No. 130 above.

187. 359 of 1899.—(Sanskrit and Telugu.) On the fifty-third pillar in the same verandah. Records in Ś. 1203 in the reign of Arjuna gift of a lamp by Śrīraṅapergaḍa, minister of the king. See No. 130 above.

188. 360 of 1899.—(Sanskrit and Telugu.) On the fifty-fourth pillar in the same verandah. Records in Ś. 1192 gift of a lamp by Gōka of the Nāga family for the merit of his mother Jāyama.

189. 361 of 1899.—(Sanskrit and Telugu.) On the fifty-fifth pillar in the same verandah. Dated in the reign of the Eastern Gaṅga king Vīra-Śrī-Narasimhadēva. Records in Ś. 1190 gift of a flower-garden by Akhtāyisēnāpati. See No. 185 above.

190. 362 of 1899.—(Sanskrit and Telugu.) On the fifty-sixth pillar in the same verandah. The Matsya king Arjuna records in S. 1191 gift of a lamp. See No. 130 above.

191. 363 of 1899.—(Tamil.) On a slab lying in the maṅṭapa in front of the central shrine of the same temple. A damaged record of the Chōḷa king Kulōttuṅga I, dated Ś. 1021. Mentions a minister (Samvighi grahin) named Madurāntaka Brahma-mārayar). [The inscription is of interest in proving that the literary traditions of Kulōttuṅga's Kalinga conquest as given in the *Kalingattuppurāni* are true.

192. 364 of 1899.—(Telugu.) On the east wall of the same maṅṭapa. Records in Ś. 1120 gift of a lamp by a merchant.

193. 365 of 1899.—(Sanskrit and Telugu.) On the east wall of the same maṅṭapa. Records in Ś. 1142 gift of land by Chit-śukhabhaṭṭāraka *alias* Narasiṃhamuni. See No. 134 above.

194. 373 of 1905.—(Telugu.) On a round pillar in the āsthāna-maṅṭapa of the same temple. Records in Ś. 1526, Krōdhin, in the reign of Hajarati-Mahamada-Khulli-Kutubu-Padasaha-Vodaya gift of the village of Narava to Nṛsiṃha of Simhādri by Padmanāyaka Sarvappa-Aśvarāyaniṅāru. This chief, under orders from the Mussalman king, drove Mukunda-Bāhubalīndra beyond the boundary. It is also stated that he granted the village of Kūrmam (i.e., Śrīkūrmam) to the temple and to the Vaishṇavas of that place. [Venkayya identifies Mukunda with Mukunda Harichandana, the Telugu usurper of the Gajapati sovereignty about 1565. See Gj. 250.]

195. 374 of 1905.—(Telugu.) On another round pillar in the same maṅṭapa. Records in Ś. 1717, Ānanda, that Rāyaparāju, son of Chintalapāṭi-Simhādrirāju, dramatized the *Kayīśikapurāna* and had it recited with the permission of Rāyamānya Sultan Pūsapāṭi Narasiṃha-Gajapatirāju-Mahārāju.

196. 375 of 1905.—(Telugu.) On a third round pillar in the same maṅṭapa. Records in Ś. 1720, Piṅgaḷa, gift of a golden śathagōpa by Chaṅgalvarāya, son of Gōḍē-Jaggarāya, to the temple of Varāhanṛisimhasvāmin at Simhāchalam.

197. 376 of 1905.—(Sanskrit in Telugu.) On a round pillar in the raised verandah (*tiruchuttumāla*) round the central shrine of the same temple. Dated in the reign of Teluṅgunṛipa or Telugurāya. Records in Ś. 1512, Vikrita, that the king built a golden maṅṭapa and presented to the temple at Simhāchalam golden aureola (*prabhā*). He was a member of the Vatsavāya family.

198. 377 of 1905.—(Sanskrit and Telugu.) On another round pillar in the same verandah. Dated in the reign of the Gajapati king Rudra (afterwards defeated by Kṛishṇarāya). Records in Ś. 1432, Pramōda, gift of the village of Anantakapalli by Timma, son of Rāvu-Nṛisimha. He also presented two lamps and a dish for waving lights.

199. 378 of 1905.—(Sanskrit and Telugu.) At the entrance into the Āḷvār shrine in the same temple. Dated in the time of

the Redḍi king Vīrabhadra (of the Rājahundry branch). Records the gift of a village, a golden vessel, pearl necklaces, a golden fillet, two brilliant chauris and a number of cows to the lord of Siṃhādri, by the king, who was the son of Allāda, son-in-law of Kāṭaya-Vēma and husband of Aniṭalli. A partially damaged inscription of Kapilēśvara in Uriya characters, belonging to his twenty-seventh year, is found at the bottom of the inscription.

200. 379 of 1905.—(Sanskrit and Telugu.) On four faces of a pillar at the entrance into the āsthānamaṅṭapa of the same temple. A damaged record, dated in Ś. 1519, Hēmalamba. Records gift by a certain Pratāparāya.

201. 380 of 1905.—(Telugu.) On the south outer wall of the same maṅṭapa. Records in Ś. 1138, seventh year of the Eastern Gaṅga king Anantavarmadēva, gift of five *Nandi-māda* for offerings in the temple of Narasiṃhadēva by the minister (*pradhānin*) Saptaya for the merit of his mother Śivarāṇi, who belonged to the Goṅka family.

Vizagapatam.

202. C.P. No. 35 of Mr. Sewell's List.—Records a deed executed by Śrī Vijaya Rāmarāzu Mahārāja, Rājā of Vizianagaram, conferring certain benefits on a private person.

203. C.P. No. 36 of Mr. Sewell's List.—Records a grant in Kālayukti, by which some ryots, with the permission of the Navab Sayyad Mustafa, made a grant of land.

204. C.P. No. 37 of Mr. Sewell's List.—Records grant of land by some ryots in fasli 1116 (A.D. 1706), by permission of "Mahādikha Bēgu," for charitable object, in Vyaya.

205. C.P. No. 38 of Mr. Sewell's List.—Records grant of land by the villagers of Kaupaḍā to a Mussalman in fasli 1036, Krōdhana (A.D. 1626). It mentions that Shir Muhammad Khan had given some land in the same village for a mosque. [Mr. Sewell points out that this was probably the same man that built the great mosque at Chicacole.] See Gj. 139.

206. C.P. No. 39 of Mr. Sewell's List.—Records grant by Śrī Lāla Kṛishṇadēva Mahārāja in Ś. 1570 (A.D. 1648) to the commander of his forces conferring on him two villages. The grantor is probably a local chieftain.

207. C.P. No. 93 of Mr. Sewell's List.—Records an order of Śrī Dēvēndravarma, son of Anantavarma of the Gaṅga family, in year 254, issued from Kaliṅganagara to the Kuṭumbis of some un-named) villages in the district of Dāvadā madavaṃ, which were given away by the king's maternal uncle Dharmakhēdi. The record is in Chālukyan-Uriya transitional script.

208. C.P. No. 161 of Mr. Sewell's List.—Records the fact of a marriage, where the bridegroom (*mahigādu*) is said to have won his bride after performing a miraculous action in killing a dragon who

defended an island in the sea, by which he secured a precious stone that lay there.

209. *C.P. No. 153 of Mr. Sewell's List.*—(Uriya.) Records that by permission of Rājādhirāja Śrī Kṛishṇadēva Mahārāja (i.e., probably the Vijayanagar sovereign of that name), the village of Tuḍumu was granted for temple purposes, and for the endowment of a charity for supplying food to travellers, in Īśvara, which, if the Kṛishṇadēva mentioned was the Vijayanagara sovereign, fixes its issue in the year A.D. 1517–18.

210. *C.P. No. 154 of Mr. Sewell's List.*—(Uriya.) Records that by permission of Kṛishṇadēva Mahārāja the village of Tuḍumu was placed in the possession of one Mātamayya, who was to fulfil the charity for which the endowment was made. The grant is dated in Śārvari.

211. *C.P. No. 212 of Mr. Sewell's List.*—(Dēvanāgari of the northern type.) Records grant of the village of Chākivāḍa in the country of Saṁvā to the temple in the village of Reṅgujeḍ in Ś. 1003 (A.D. 1081) by the Gaṅga king Anantavarma Chōḷa Gaṅga Dēva, reigning at Kaliṅganagara (1074–1146). A full genealogy of the dynasty is given.

212. *C.P. No. 213 of Mr. Sewell's List.*—(Dēvanāgari.) Records grant of the village Tidimastachata in charity by Anantavarma Chōḷa Gaṅga Dēva, whose *abhishēka* in Ś. 999 is referred to. Gives the genealogy of the king as in the previous epigraph.

213. *C.P. No. 219 of Mr. Sewell's List.*—(Telugu and Kanarese.) This grant and Nos. 212 and 213 must be read together. “The series is very interesting, partly because the dynasty referred to is entirely unknown, and partly because we have here grants of the same sovereign in two different alphabets. The date is the end of the eleventh and beginning of the twelfth century A.D.; the place Kaliṅgapatam, or its neighbourhood on the east coast of the peninsula not far south of Orissa.” It records the grant by Anantavarma Chōḷagaṅga (whose *abhishēka* took place in Ś. 999) in A.D. 1119, of the village of Tāmaraśuṅṭhi, in the Saṁvā country, to a Brahman named Mādharma. The epigraph gives an elaborate genealogy of the dynasty which is more detailed than, and in some respects different from, that in the above record.

213-A. *C.P. No. 16 of 1908–9.*—A C.P. grant (received from Narasapatam taluk) of the Eastern Gaṅga king Vajrahasta III (1038–1070). Registers the grant of the district of Gaurasatta Vishaya (which consisted of 35 villages) to a certain Mānādātiya Chotta, who was the grandson of Chotta Chōḷaparāja who had a Vaiḍumba princess as his wife. The donee was thus highly connected with the royal family. The grant was made from Dantipura in Ś. 967. [The present epigraph is the earliest of Vajrahasta III's grants. The two others are Gj.143-A and Mc. 188.]

VIZIANAGRAM TALUK.

Bhōgapuram.

214. On the *Rāchabaṇḍa* stone alleged to be planted by Kṛishṇadēva Rāya. Apparently says that it was erected as a pillar of victory.

215. On a slab in the centre of the street. A grant to the temple in Ś. 1106, the eleventh year of king Vijaya Rāja.

216. In the same place. Records construction of a tank in Ś. 1097.

Dvārapureddipālayam.

217. 366 of 1905.—(Telugu.) On a slab set up on a mound called Gudipādadeppe on the bank of river. Records in Ś. 1077 gift of land for a lamp to the temple of Chōḍagaṅgīśvara at Dharmavoramu, which was included in the Tālaṇḍa twelve, a subdivision of Ēradapampu. The measuring rod *Aniyaṅka-Bhimakōla* is mentioned.

Mallicharla.

218. On two stones. "Both record grants in the same year, viz., Ś. 1061 (A.D. 1139) by private parties in the reign of Sri Anantavarma dēva (1077—1146)." *Antiquities*, Vol. I, p. 13.

Rāmatirtham.

219. 372 of 1905.—On the back wall of the Durga-paṅcha. A much damaged record of the Eastern Chālukyan king Sarvalōkāśraya Vishṇuwardhana-Mahārāja Rājamārtāṇḍa Mummadi-Bhīma. This is evidently the inscription referred to by Mr. Sewell under date Ś. 1055. See *Antiquities*, Vol. I, p. 13.

220. C.P. No. 15 of 1908-9.—(Sanskrit.) A grant of Indravarman of the Vishṇukunḍin family, noticed in *Mad. Ep. Rep.*, 1908-9, p. 110, and *Ep. Ind.*, Vol. XII, pp. 133--6. Records that king Indravarman granted in his twenty-seventh year to a Brahman the village of Peruvāṭaka in Plakirāshṭra. Indravarman was the son of Vikramēndra I and grandson of Mādhavarman of the Vishṇukunḍin family. His son Vikramēndravarman II was the donor of the Chikkulla plates (Gd. 365). His power is attested by the fact that he had a capital as far south as Dendalūru in Ellore taluk while his father's capital was Puraṅisaṅgama, somewhere in Vizagapatam district. The lion was the royal emblem of the Vishṇukunḍins.

Rellivalasa.

221. 367 of 1905.—(Telugu.) On a huge stone lying in the middle of the village of Rellivalasa. Records in Ś. 1053, fifty-seventh year of the Eastern Gaṅga king Anantavarmadēva (1077—1146), gift of gold for a lamp. Tālaṇḍanāṇḍu, a subdivision of Ēradapampu is mentioned. [Mr. Sewell gives the wrong date of Ś. 1073.]

222. 368 of 1905.—(Telugu.) On a pillar lying near a private threshing floor south-west of the same village. Records in Ś. 1075,

eighth year of the Eastern Gaṅga king Anantavarmadēva, gift of land in the village of Taṭara in Tālaṇḍa twelve, a subdivision of Ēradapampu to the temple of Chōḍagaṅga Mādhavadēva. The grant was made by Rāchamaṅḍi (i.e., king's brother-in-law) Ārusa-ḡaḡala-Rāvuta in the presence of the God Vīrabhadreśvara on the bank of the Vamśadhāra river, for the merit of Kāmārṇavadēva. The Gaṅga capital Nakara (i.e., Mukhaliṅgam) is mentioned.

223. 369 of 1905.—(Telugu.) On the same pillar. Records in Ś. 1105, fifteenth year (of ?), gift of land for a lamp to the temple of Chōḍagaṅga Mādhavadēva at Tālaṇḍa, by a merchant.

224. 370 of 1905.—(Telugu.) On the same pillar. Records in Ś. 1075, eighth year of the Eastern Gaṅga king Anantavarmadēva, gift of gold for a lamp to the same temple by a Nāyaka. Tālaṇḍa is said to have been in Ēradapampu.

225. 371 of 1905.—(Telugu.) On the same pillar. A record of the Eastern Gaṅga king Anantavarmadēva (1077—1146), in Ś. 1082, fifth year. Mentions the same temple and a certain Vidvajjana-priya-Brahmamārāya.

Sārike.

226. On a fallen stone in the village. A private grant to the temple in Ś. 1075 (A.D. 1153) in the reign of "Anantavarmadēva."

Śiripuram.

227. On a stone in a field south of the village. Records a grant to the temple by "Anantavarma" in Ś. 1075 (A.D. 1153).

Vizianagram.

228. 354 of 1905.—(Telugu.) On a slab lying in the compound of the College. Records in Ś. 1060, sixty-fifth year of the Eastern Gaṅga king Anantavarmadēva, gift of land below a tank dug at the village Māṛucherṅvu, in Sāraki-nāṇḍu, to the temple of Sōmēśvara (at the same village). The grant was made with the approval of Chōḍagaṅga-Rāvutarāja on the occasion of the king's "bathing in the Ganges" at Vihāravāḍa.

229. 355 of 1905.—(Telugu.) On another mutilated slab lying in the same place. A record of the sixty-first year of the Eastern Gaṅga king Anantavarmadēva. Mentions Sāreki.

230. 356 of 1905.—(Telugu.) On the third slab lying in the same place. Records in Ś. 1204 the consecration of an image of Gōpinātha (i.e., Kṛishṇa).

231. 357 of 1905.—(Telugu.) On the fourth slab lying in the same place. Records in Ś. 1061, sixty-fifth year of the Eastern Gaṅga king Anantavarmadēva (1077—1146), gift of land to the temple of Sōmēśvara at Maṛucherṅvu in the Sārekināṇḍu (a district of Ēradapampu), by the son-in-law Chōḍagaṅgarāju with the approval of His Majesty on the occasion of his "bathing in the Ganges" at Vihāravāḍa.

COCHIN STATE.

Chēndamaṅgalam.

1. The Pāliyam plates of the 322nd year of the *Puduvaippu* era. These belong to the "Pālayattu Āchchan of Chēndamaṅgalam in the Cochin State; the members of this family were the hereditary ministers of the Rājās of Cochin, but lost their position after the transportation to Madras of one of the Valiya Āchchans who joined the insurgents headed by Vēlu Tambi, Daḷavāy of Travancore" in the war of the latter against Cochin and the British resident Macaulay. The epigraph is in Vatteḷuttu and the date is 14th Mīnam in 322 of the Puduvaippu era, i.e., 22nd March A.D. 1663 (as the *Puduvaippu* era commemorates the appearance of the island of Vypeen from the sea in 1341). The inscription records an agreement between the royal family of Cochin and the Dutch—the first of its kind—as against internal and external enemies (like the Portuguese). For the terms and details see *Trav. Arch. Ser.*, Vol. I, No. IV. For the war between Pāliyattu Achchan and the English see *Trav. Manual*, Vol. I, p. 433.

2. (Tamil and Sanskrit). Pāliyam plates of Vikramāditya Varaguṇa of the Vrishṇikula. Records that the king Varaguṇa who belonged to the Vrishṇikula granted some land to Tirumūlapādattu Bhaṭṭāraka (Lord of Tirumūlapādam) on Thursday, Mrigaśīrsha, Pushya, etc., corresponding to Thursday, 30th December A.D. 868, in the fifteenth year of his life. Mr. Gopinatha Rao believes that this king was probably the son of Kōkkarunandaḍakkan of the Trivandrum plates. See *Trav. Arch. Ser.*, Vol. I, pp. 187--93, and *Tvc.* 186 and 215.

Cochin.

3. In the hands of the local Jews. A C.P. grant of Bhāskara Ravivarman which is edited by Dr. Hultzsch in *Ep. Ind.*, Vol. III, pp. 65--70. It is a record in Chēra-Pāṇḍya Vatteḷuttu and in Tamil language of ordinary, colloquial type, throwing incidental light on the development of the Tamil language into Malayālam. It records that Bhāskara Ravivarman Kōgōnmaikoṇḍān gave to Īssuppu Irappān (Joseph Rabbān) and descendants in his thirty-eighth year, the village of Añjuvaṇṇam (the quarter of the five classes of artisans?) at Muyirikkōḍu (Cranganore) together with the 72 proprietary rights, the tolls on elephants and other riding animals and balances, etc., besides various paraphernalia (which are enumerated). [Venkayya believes that the king is the same as the donor of the Tirunelli plates. Joseph Rabbān was probably a member of the old Jewish colony at Cranganore, which, in later times,

migrated to Cochin on account of Portuguese oppression. The record exists also in Hebrew translation. Dr. Burnell attributes it to the eighth century at latest. According to Mr. Swamikannu Pillai Bhāskara Ravivarman came to the throne in A.D. 978. See Tvc. 180 below. For other editions of the present plate see *Madras Journal*, Vol. XIII, Part I, p. 135 ff; *Ibid.*, Vol. II, p. 1 ff.; *Ibid.*, Vol. XXI, p. 42 f.; *Ind. Antq.*, Vol. XIII, p. 334 and *Malabar Manual*, Vol. II, pp. CXV ff.]

Pārōla.

4. 224 of 1895.—(Vaṭṭeḷuttu.) A record on a rock close to the temple. No details given.

Tirukkulaśēkharapuram.

5. 226 of 1895.—(Vaṭṭeḷuttu.) At the entrance into the courtyard of the Vishṇu temple. Records in K.A. 195 gift of gold.

6. 227 of 1895.—(Vaṭṭeḷuttu.) A record on a stone built into the courtyard of the same temple. No details given.

Tiruppūñittura.

7. 1 of 1903.—(Vaṭṭeḷuttu and Grantha.) On the right of the entrance into the first prākāra of the ambalam. A record in the thirtieth year of the Chēra king Kōdai Ravi. Mentions a certain Iravi Ādichchan and the temple of Tiruppūñitturai. See Ml. 4 for an inscription of a king of the same name.

Tiruvañjikulam.

8. 225 of 1895.—(Vaṭṭeḷuttu.) On the base of a shrine in front of the west entrance into the first prākāra of the temple. Mentions Tiruvañjakkalam.

Triśūr.

9. 221 of 1895.—(Vaṭṭeḷuttu.) On a stone to the right of the middle entrance into the first prākāra of the Vaḍakku nāthan temple. Mentions the temple at Tiruchchuppērūr.

10. 222 of 1895.—(Vaṭṭeḷuttu.) On the base of the west wall of the Gaṇapati shrine in the same temple. Mentions Tiruchchuppērūr.

11. 223 of 1895.—(Sanskrit and Malayālam.) On the base of the platform called *mūlasthāna* in the same temple. Records that Ravi-vīra of Sitaśaila or Venkuṅṅanāḍu built of stone the *mūlasthāna* of Śivapurānātha.

Vekkam.

12. 228 of 1895.—(Vaṭṭeḷuttu.) A record on the base of the maṅṭapa in front of the central shrine of the Śiva temple. No details given.

FRENCH TERRITORY.

Bāhūr.

The antiquity of the place is shown by the fact that six of its inscriptions belong to Rāshtrakūṭa Kṛishṇa III and the other eleven to Chōḷa kings.

1. 171 of 1902.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the Mūlēsvara shrine. A record in the tenth year of the Chōḷa king Parakēsarivarman *alias* Uḍaiyār Rājēndradēva (1050—63). Records gift of paddy for offerings.

2. 172 of 1902.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record in the twenty-sixth year of the Rāshtrakūṭa king of Kaṇṇaradēva (Kṛishṇa III). Records the placing of four stones in the wall.

3. 173 of 1902.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record in the fifth year of the Chōḷa king Parakēsarivarman (Parāntaka II?) who cut off the head of the Pāṇḍya. Records gift of a lamp.

4. 174 of 1902.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record in the seventeenth year of the Chōḷa king Parakēsarivarman *alias* Uḍaiyār Rājēndra-Chōḷadēva (I, 1011—53). Records gift of land and sheep for lamps.

5. 175 of 1902.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record in the twenty-second year of the Rāshtrakūṭa king Kaṇṇaradēva (Kṛishṇa III). Records sale of land.

6. 176 of 1902.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record in the twenty-second year of the Rāshtrakūṭa king Kaṇṇaradēva (Kṛishṇa III). Records gift of a lamp.

7. 177 of 1902.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record in the twenty-second year of the Rāshtrakūṭa king Kaṇṇaradēva (Kṛishṇa III). Records gift of sheep.

8. 178 of 1902.—(Tamil.) On the west wall of the same shrine. A record in the eleventh year (Mithuna, Aparā, Sunday, Krittika) of the Chōḷa king Rājarājakēsarivarman (Rājarāja I). Provides for the annual repairs of the tank at Bāhūr. See *Ep. Ind.*, Vol. VII, p. 169, where Kielhorn calculates the exact date to be Sunday, 14th June, A.D. 996.

9. 179 of 1902.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record in the fifth year of the Chōḷa king Rājakēsarivarman *alias* Tribhuvana-chakravartin Vikrama-Chōḷadēva. [Vikramachōḷa who ruled from 1118 to 1135 was a Parakēsarivarman. The present epigraph is therefore anomalous.]

10. 180 of 1902.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record in the fourth year of the Chōḷa king Rājakēsarivarman *alias* Uḍaiyār

Rājendra-Chōladēva. Records gift of a lamp. The king referred to was apparently Kulōttuṅga I (1070—1118).

11. 181 of 1902.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the same shrine. A record in the twenty-fifth year of the Chōla king Rājarājakēsari-varman *alias* Rājarājadēva I. Records gift of a lamp by a merchant of Tañjāvūr.

12. 182 of 1902.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record in the twelfth year of the Chōla king Rājarājakēsari-varman (I, 985—1013). Records gift of land.

13. 183 of 1902.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record in the twenty-seventh year of the Rākshtrakūṭa king Kaṇṇaradēva (Kṛishṇa III). Records gift of land.

14. 184 of 1902.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record in the twenty-seventh year of the Rāshtrakūṭa king Kaṇṇaradēva (Kṛishṇa III). Records gift of land.

15. 185 of 1902.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record in the sixth year of the Chōla king Parakēsari-varman *alias* Rājendra Chōladēva (I, 1011—53). Records gift of twelve sheep for a lamp.

16. 185 of 1902.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record in the thirty-fifth year of the Chōla king Rājakēsari-varman *alias* Chakravartin Kulōttuṅga-Chōladēva (1070—1118). Records gift of paddy.

17. 187 of 1902.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record in the fifth year of the Chōla king Parakēsari-varman *alias* Rājendra Chōladēva (I, 1011—53). Records gift of seventy-two sheep for a lamp.

18. A C.P. grant of the Pallava king Nṛipatuṅgavarman. It is both in Sanskrit and Tamil and records that Nṛipatuṅga, the son of Nandivarman (III) and Śaṅkha (of the Rāshtrakūṭa family) gave, at the request of his minister, three villages to a college (*vidyāsthāna*) at Bāhūr. The Tamil portion is dated in the eighth year of Kō-Vijaya-Nṛipatuṅgavarman and says that he is a devoted Vaishṇavite. See *Ep. Ind.*, Vol. IV, pp. 180-1, where a summary of the plates is given by Dr. Hultsch. [The plates were discovered by Mr. J. Delaton and sent to Paris. Dr. Hultsch's summary is based on a pandit's version of the epigraph. The text alone is given in *S.I.I.*, Vol. II, p. 514 and a translation of the Sanskrit portion in Prof. J. Dabreuil's *Pallavas*, pp. 48—51. This is Prof. Kielhorn's *Southern List*, No. 652.

Kiḷ-Kāsakudī.

19. 392 of 1902.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the Ādiyappan shrine. A record in the tenth year (Mēsha, Aparā. 8, Tuesday, Sravishṭha) of the Chōla king Rājarājadēva (III). Records gift of

land for a lamp. Beginning built in. See *Ep. Ind.*, Vol. VII, p. 175, where Prof. Kielhorn points out that the equivalent English date is Tuesday, 21st April, A.D. 1226.

20. 393 of 1902.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record in the eleventh year of the Chōḷa king Tribhuvanachakravartin Rājāradēva (III). Quotes the eleventh year of Rājādhirājadēva (II). Records gift of land.

21. A Pallava copper-plate grant (discovered in 1879 and published in *S.I.I.*, Vol. II, No. 73, pp. 342--61). It is in Grantha and Tamil, similar to the Kūram plates, and records the grant of a village by the Pallava king Nandivarman II, the successor of Paramēśvaravarman II. [According to the Udayēndiram plates Nandi was the son of Paramēśvaravarman, but the present epigraph attributes his accession to the popular choice as he was apparently only a remote kinsman. For, he was the son of Hiraṇya by Rōhiṇi and belonged to the branch of Bhīma, the younger brother of Simhavishṇu. See *S.I.I.*, Vol. II, p. 344, where Dr. Hultzsch gives the genealogy of this line side by side with the Pallava genealogy proper.] The village granted was Kōḍukolli or Ēkadhīramāṅgalam in Ūṛṅukkāṭṭu-kōṭṭam in Toṇḍakarāshṭra (i.e., Toṇḍamaṇḍalam) in Chingleput district. The donee was a Brahman named Jyēshṭhapāda Sōmayājin of the Bhāradvāja gōtra and Chhāṇḍōgya Sūtra who was a resident of Pūṇḍi (Pūniya). The gift was made at the instance of the king's Prime Minister Brahmaśrī rāja. See Prof. Kielhorn's *Southern List*, No. 635.

Tirunallār.

22. 394 of 1902.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the maṅṭapa in front of the Darbhāraṇyēśvara shrine. An incomplete record in the eleventh year of the Chōḷa king Rājākēsarivarman *alias* Tribhuvanachakravartin Rājādhirājadēva (I or II?).

23. 395 of 1902.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. An incomplete record in the seventeenth year (Kumbha, Pūrva 2, Monday, Uttara bhādrapada) of the Chōḷa king Tribhuvanachakravartin Kulōttuṅga-Chōḷadēva (III) who took Madura and the crowned head of the Pāṇḍya. See *Ep. Ind.*, Vol. VII, p. 172, where it is shown that the date corresponded to Monday, 13th February A.D. 1195.

Villiyānūr.

24. 188 of 1902.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the Kāmēśvara shrine. A record of the Vijayanagara king Virūpāksharāya, son of Dēvarāya (II) in Ś. 1394, Nandana. Records gift of land for the merit of Śāluva-Narasimharāya. See *Ep. Ind.*, Vol. VII, p. 79.

25. 189 of 1902.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record in the thirteenth year of the Chōḷa king Tribhuvanachakravartin Kōnēri-mēlkoṇḍān Kulōttuṅga-Chōḷadēva. Records gift of land.

TRAVANCORE STATE.

The list of inscriptions in the State given below are incomplete, owing to my want of access to the materials collected by the late Professor Sundaram Pillai and by the present Superintendent of Epigraphy. The following are taken from the Epigraphical Reports, *Mack. MSS.* and the detailed publications of the officers abovementioned. See *Trav. Manual*, Vol. I, pp. 175--9, for an excellent classification and digest of the 450 epigraphs collected by Sundaram Pillai.

Agastyēśvaram.

1. On the north wall of the ardha-maṅṭapa of the Śiva temple. (Tamil, Vaṭṭeḷuttu.) A record of the thirty-eighth year of king Kulōttuṅga-chōḷa, recording the gift of some salt pans by some subordinates of the king. See *Trav. Arch. Ser.*, Vol. I, pp. 243-4.

Cheṅganavādu.

1-A. In the local temple.—(Kōleḷuttu and Grantha). Gift of 116 *panams* for feeding Brahmans in K.A. 622. *Trav. Manual*, Vol. I, p. 185.

Chitaral.

2. In the Tiruchchāṇattumalai (i.e., the mountain of the Chāraṇas, Śramaṇas or Jains), later on the centre of a Bhagavati temple. A record in Tamil language and Vaṭṭeḷuttu character belonging to the twenty-eighth year of the reign of Vikramāditya Varaguṇa, saying that Guṇandāṅgi Kurattigaḷ, the disciple of Ariṭṭanēmi Bhaṭāra of Pērāyakkudi, gave some golden ornaments to the goddess. *Ibid.*, pp. 194-5. For a full description of the temple (which was originally a Buddhistic one). See *Trav. Manual*, Vol. II, pp. 224-5.

3. In a rock south of the temple. Says that in K.A. 425 (A.D. 1250) one Nārāyaṇan Tamiḷappallavaraiyan of Rājavallapuram in Kīḷ-vēmbanādu, gave some money for the expenses of the Bhagavati temple. See *Ibid.*, p. 194.

4. On the four faces of a pillar now built into the steps of the kitchen in the Bhagavati temple. Records that one Nārāyaṇan Kāḷikan *alias* Dharmachetti Nāyanār made certain arrangements for service in the temple, in Mēsha 17 of K.A. 584. See *Ibid.*, pp. 297--9.

Chōlapuram (ancient Kōṭṭāru near Nāgarkōyil).

Called in ancient days Mummudichōḷanallūr or Mummudichōḷapuram, evidently after Rājarāja I.

5. 30 of 1896.—(Tamil.) On the east wall of the first prakāra of the Chōlēsvara temple, right of entrance. A record of the fifteenth year of Kō-Jaṭavarman Parākrama Paṇḍya, Ś. 1293 (expired). Records repairs to the temple by the king. So the king came to the throne in 1356.

6. 31 of 1896.—(Tamil.) On the north, east and south walls of the same prakāra. A gift of land in the thirtieth year of Rājakēsarivarman Kulōttuṅgachōladēva I. Records that the temple was built by a certain Madhurāntaka and the deity called Rājendra Chōlēsvara. See *Ibid.*, pp. 244-6 and *S.I.I.*, Vol. III, pp. 159-63.

7. 32 of 1896.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the same prakāra. A gift of land in the eleventh year of Jaṭavarman Sundarachōla-Paṇḍya (1021-44), the son of Rājendrachōla I and the viceroy over the south.

8. 33 of 1896.—(Tamil.) A record of king Vīrakēraḷavarman, dated in K.A. 301 (Ś. 1047-48) when the sun was in Simha. See Sundaram Pillai's *Sovereigns of Travancore*, p. 11 f.; Prof. Kielhorn's *Southern List*, No. 943, and *Ind. Antq.*, Vol. XXIV, p. 253.

9. 34 of 1896.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the same. A gift of lamp in the nineteenth year of Jaṭavarman Sundara Chōla Paṇḍya (1021-44). See No. 7 above.

10. 35 of 1896.—On the south wall of the same prakāra. A gift of land, dated in K.A. 427. The place is called Chōla Kēraḷapuram.

11. 36 of 1896.—On the same wall. A gift of land in K.A. 419.

12. 37 of 1896.—On the same wall. Gift of a lamp in K.A. 440.

13. 38 of 1896.—On the same wall. Date obliterated. Gift of two lamps by Jaṭavarman Sundarachōla Paṇḍya (1021-44). See No. 7 above.

14. 39 of 1896.—On the same wall. A gift of lamp in the eleventh year of Jaṭavarman Sundarachōla Paṇḍya (1021-44).

15. 40 of 1896.—On the same wall. Records a gift of lamp in K.A. 392 and K. 4317.

16. 41 of 1896.—In the same place. Records the setting up of an image of Subrahmaṇya and endowments to it in K.A. 396.

17. 42 of 1896.—In the same place. Records the setting up of the image of Subrahmaṇya's consort and endowments in K.A. 428.

18. 43 of 1896.—In the same place. Records gift of a lamp in the eleventh year of Jaṭavarman Sundara Chōla Paṇḍya (1021-44).

19. 44 of 1896.—In the same place. A record of the eleventh year of Sundara Chōla Paṇḍya. Gift of lamp by a certain Sarvalōkāśraya Śrī Vishṇuwardhana Mahārāja *alias* Śālukki Vijayadittan Vikkiannaṅṅan. [Dr. Hultzsch points out that he must be a relative of the king from the Veṅgi country. Was he the uncle of Kulōttuṅga Chōla I who was Viceroy of Veṅgi for fifteen years?]

20. 45 of 1896.—In the same place. An incomplete record of the twelfth year of Jaṭavarman Sundara Chōḷa Pāṇḍya (1021—44).

21. 46 of 1896.—In the same place. Records gift of lamp in the thirty-ninth year of Rājakēsarivarman Kulōttuṅga Chōḷa I. The donor was one Chōḷa-Vichchāḍara Pallavaraiyar. See *Trav. Arch. Ser.*, Vol. I, pp. 246-7.

Cape Comorin.

Of the fifty epigraphs collected in this place the details of the following alone are available to me.

22. 92 of 1896.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the Bhuvanandīśvara temple. A record of the Chōḷa king Kō-Rājakēsarivarman *alias* Rājādhirājadēva, the date of which is lost. Records gift of land. Mentions conquest of the Kūpaka country. *Ibid.*, p. 242.

23. 93 of 1896.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record in the thirtieth year of the Chōḷa king Kō-Rājakēsarivarman *alias* Rājādhirājadēva (I, 1018—53) who took the head of Vīra Pāṇḍya, Ḽam and Śālai of the Chēra. Records that the king revived at the request of an officer of his queen, the supply of salt from the salt pans of Maṇarkuḍi for the Rājarājapperunjālai in the village of Kāḷikkūḍi (Cape Comorin). *Trav. Arch. Ser.*, Vol. I, pp. 162—4.

24. 94 of 1896.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record in the thirty-first year of the Chōḷa king Kō-Parakēsarivarman *alias* Rājēndra-Chōḷadēva (I). Records gift of a lamp. *Trav. Arch. Ser.*, pp. 240-1.

25. 95 of 1896.—(Tamil.) On the north and west walls of the same temple. A record in the twenty-ninth year of the Chōḷa king Kō-Parakēsarivarman *alias* Rājēndra-Chōḷadēva (I, 1011—43). Records gift of a lamp. *Trav. Arch. Ser.*, Vol. I, pp. 240-1.

26. 96 of 1896.—(Tamil.) On west wall of the same temple. A record in the thirty-first year of the Chōḷa king Kō-Rājakēsarivarman *alias* Rājādhirājadēva I. Records gift of land. Refers to the conquest of the Kūpaka kingdom. See Tp. 884 which also refers to this and *Ibid.*, p. 241.

27. 97 of 1896.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records gift of paddy for a water-shed at Kumari by one Aiyan Maṅgalakkāḷavan. *Ibid.*, p. 170.

28. 98 of 1896.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records the establishment of a water-shed by a minister of the Chōḷa king named Ayyanambi or Maṅgalakkāḷavan. *Ibid.*, pp. 169-70.

29. 99 of 1896.—(Tamil.) On the west and south walls of the same temple. A record in the twenty-eighth year of the Chōḷa king Kō-Parakēsarivarman *alias* Rājēndra-Chōḷadēva (I). Records gift of a lamp. *Ibid.*, p. 240.

30. 100 of 1896.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the same temple. A record in the twenty-fourth year of Kō-Māravarman *alias* Vikrama Chōḷa-Pāṇḍyadēva. Records gift of money by a merchant of Kanyākumāri, Āchchan Maṅṅili. See *Trav. Arch. Ser.*, Vol. I, pp. 249-50. [Vikrama was, like Jaṭavarman Sundara Chōḷa Pāṇḍya, one of the Chōḷa-Pāṇḍya viceroys of the age. Was he the son of Rājādhirāja I? It has been suggested that he might be the same as Mumuḍi Chōḷa Pāṇḍya, the younger brother of Parakēsarivarman Rājēndra (1050—63) referred to in Śuchindram epigraph, but it is doubtful.]

31. 101 of 1896.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record in the twenty-fourth year of the Chōḷa king Kō-Parakēsarivarman *alias* Rājēndra-Chōḷadēva (1011—43). Records gift of a lamp by Śōlakulavalli, the king's cook, a native of Pālaiyūr-Tiṭṭai in Puliyūrṇāḍu. *Ibid.*, pp. 161-2.

32. 102 of 1896.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record in the twenty-eighth year of the Chōḷa king Kō-Parakēsarivarman *alias* Rājēndra-Chōḷadēva (1011—43). Records gift of a lamp. See also *Ibid.*, pp. 239-40.

33. 103 of 1896.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record in the fifth year of the Chōḷa king Kō-Parakēsarivarman *alias* Rājēndradēva (1050—63). Records gift of a lamp. *Ibid.*, pp. 242-3 and *Trav. Manual*, p. 181.

34. 104 of 1896.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. An incomplete record in the thirtieth year of the Chōḷa king Kō-Parakēsarivarman *alias* Rājēndra-Chōḷadēva (I). *Ibid.*, pp. 240-1.

35. 105 of 1896.—(Tamil.) On the inner side of the west wall of the second prākāra of the Kanyākumāri temple. An incomplete record in the fourth year of Parakēsarivarman *alias* Rājēndradēva (1050—63). Records that, while seated on the cot *Kāḍuvetti* in the palace *Kēralan Māligai*, he settled the expenditure of the income of *dēvadāna* villages which belonged to the temples of Kanyākumāri Rājarājēśvaram and Rājarājapperunjālai in the *janmanakshatra* festival of his queen Kiḷānaḍigaḷ. *Ibid.*, pp. 164-7.

36. 106 of 1896.—(Tamil.) On the inner side of the north wall of the same prākāra. Beginning and end lost.

37. 107 of 1896.—(Vatteḷuttu.) In the same place. A damaged record in the sixteenth year of the Pāṇḍya king Kō-Śaḍaiyamāran. [It is difficult to identify this king as every Māravarman of the early Pāṇḍya line distinguished himself among other things, by the conquest of Kēraḷa.]

38. 108 of 1896.—(Tamil.) On the inner side of the east wall of the same prākāra. A record in the ninth year of the Pāṇḍya king Parāntakadēva. Specifies the boundaries of the temple land. [Mr. Gopinatha Rao edits the inscription in *Trav. Arch. Ser.*, Vol. I

(No. III). He points out both palæographically and on the ground of the king's reference to the conquest of S. Kalinga country and capture of Kuḷam from Teluṅga Bhīma (as in the case of Vikrama Chōḷa), the king should have lived in the first half of the twelfth century A.D.]

39. 109 of 1896.—(Tamil.) On a pillar to the left of the entrance into the same temple. A record in K.A. 708 of Bhūtaḷavīra-Vīra-Udayamārtāṇḍavarman (1494—1535). Records gift of land. For certain coins bearing the legend Bhūtaḷavīra see *Madras Journal*, 1887-8, p. 140. For an account of the king's military exploits, his administration, etc., see *Trav. Manual*, Vol. I, p. 296.

40. On a stone built into the innermost prakāra. (Archaic Vaṭṭeḷuttu.) A record of Parakēsari. *Trav. Arch. Ser.*, Vol. I, p. 237.

40-A-B. Mr. Nagam Aiya gives two pillars at Kumari-muttam, one of which contains an epigraph, dated in K.A. 669, and granting the harbour dues to the local Roman Catholic Church. The other records an edict issued by Bhūtaḷavīra Udaya Mārtāṇḍavarman in K.A. 701 (20th Mīnam), i.e., A.D. 1526, safeguarding the rights and privileges of the Christian Parava fishermen of Kumarimuttam harbour who were ill-treated by the Hindu fishermen. It is addressed to the senior and junior Kaṅgan of the latter, commanding them not to molest the Christians "who were exempted from paying the taxes due to the village . . . such as *iḍaṅkai*, *valaṅkaipāṇam*, *paḍaippanam* and *prachandakanikkai*." *Trav. Manual*, Vol. I, p. 296 and pp. 195-96.

Darśanakoppu.

41. On the south base of the Rāghavēndrasvāmi temple (Tamil in Vaṭṭeḷuttu.) A record of the eighth year of Rājakēsari-varman Rājarāja I, apparently in connexion with the appointment of an accountant to the temple. *Trav. Arch. Ser.*, Vol. I, p. 238.

42. In the same place.—(Tamil, Vaṭṭeḷuttu.) Records gift of a perpetual lamp in the tenth year of Rājarāja I. *Ibid.*, p. 239.

Edappalli.

43. On a stone in the Kṛishṇasvāmi temple. Records in 825 the erection of the temple. *Ins., S. Dts.*, p. 308, No. 33. [For the political and religious importance of the place see *Trav. Manual*, Vol. III, p. 583.]

Ellootoor.

44. On a wall in the local "Modunātha Swāmi." Records a grant of land to the God in the seventh year of "Virabana Gurula Dēvar" (?) by "Yalature Alaghappun (Aḷagappan)." See *Ibid.*, p. 305, No. 21.

Idalakkudi.

44-A. A record in K.A. 661, bestowing privileges on the local Sayakars.

Kāmapuram (Caumpoorum.)

45. A C.P. in the temple of the Saptamātas in the village. Records that a native of Plāchēry village placed certain copper pails on the pagoda in the year 942. *Ins., S. Dts., p. 309, No. 35.*

Kaṇḍiyūr (near Māvelikkarai, Quilon Division.)

46. On the east base of the mahāmaṅṭapa of the local temple. (Vaṭṭeḷuttu.) States that Rāman Kōdavarman, Governor of Oḍanāḍu, repaired the Śiva temple from Friday, Tulā 17, K.A. 392 to Sundāy, Mēsha 8, K.A. 393. See *Trav. Arch. Ser., Vol. I, pp. 289—91.*

47. On a stone lying in the yard in front of the same temple. A record of the one hundred and twenty-third year of the Mahādēva (i.e., A.D. 946, as we are told in the previous inscription that the God was set up in A.D. 823), recording grant of lands to temple and arrangements for management. See *Trav. Arch. Ser., Vol. I, pp. 292--4.*

48. On the east base of the central shrine. (Sanskrit and Grantha.) "Records the same fact as in the previous inscription and gives the day as 15, 11564th" of the Kaliyuga. *Ibid., pp. 294-5.*

Kāviyūr.

49. On the west, south and east bases of the local Śiva temple. Dated K. 4052. Records gift of land for lamps and offerings by two private men. *Ibid., pp. 288-89.*

50. On the north and west bases of the same. Records that in K. 4051 a man named Dēvan Śēndan made certain gifts for offerings, etc. *Ibid., p. 289.*

Kēraḷapuram.

51. On the west base of the central shrine of the Śiva temple. (Tamil.) Records that king Ravivarman of the Kīḷappērūr Īllam and the Tiruppāppūr Svarūpam reconstructed the central shrine, etc., in K.A. 782. See *Ibid., p. 179.*

Kollam.

52. 257 of 1895.—(Malayāḷam.) On the base of the *dhvajastambha* of the Ānandavallīśvara temple. A record in K.A. 1067 of the Mahārāja who was born in the Mūlanakshatra. Records the erection of the *dhvajastambha*.

53. 258 of 1895.—(Sanskrit.) On the base of the maṅṭapa in front of the Gaṇapatinaḍai temple. Mentions in K.A. 671 (solar month of Mithuna, Jupiter in Tulārāśi, Vrischikalagna, Anurādha) that, in the reign of Jayasimha or Vīrakēraḷavarman, an ascetic named Nityapragñāmuni performed *abhiśhēka* to God

Gōvinda of Nētrapura. The king also makes arrangements for daily worship at the command of the Lord of Koḷamba. Mr. Swamikannu Pillai places the date on Wednesday, June 22, A.D. 1496. See *Trav. Arch. Ser.*, Vol. II, pp. 26-7. For the details of the reign of Jayasimha see *Trav. Manual*, Vol. I, pp. 278-9.]

54. 259 of 1895.—(Tamil.) On the base of the south wall of the central shrine in the same temple. Records the building of the wall by a native of Tiruviḍaimarudūr.

55. 260 of 1895.—(Tamil.) On three faces of a stone lying near the west wall of the enclosure of the same temple. A record, dated in K.A. 653. Mentions Tirunelvēli and Kurakkēṇikkollam.

56. 261 of 1895.—(Tamil.) On the base of the north wall of the central shrine of the Rāmēsvara temple. Records in K.A. 513 gift of land.

57. 262 of 1895.—(Tamil.) An obliterated record on a stone set up to the north of the same shrine.

58. 263 of 1895.—(Vaṭṭeḷuttu.) On the four faces of a stone set up near the south wall of the same shrine. Dated in K.A. 278. Mentions a certain Kulaśēkhara Chakravartin. [Is this the record which, according to the *Trav. Manual*, records the redress of grievances of the eighteen castes of the place by the assignment of special places of habitation ?]

59. 264 of 1895.—(Tamil.) On the roof of the west entrance into the same temple. Records in K.A. 566 the building of the entrance.

60. 265 of 1895.—(Vaṭṭeḷuttu.) At the entrance into the Syrian Church. A record in K.A. 826.

Koṭṭarakarai.

This place was formerly the capital of Iḷayadathu Svarūpam. See *Trav. Manual*, Vol. III, p. 588.

61. On a stone in the Maṇikuṇṭēśvara temple. Records that a Maravan Piḷḷai paved the temple with stone in year 630. *Ins., S. Dts.*, p. 311, No. 43.

62. On a stone in the same temple. Records that the wife of Mānyanambūri Brahman established the God Maṇikuṇṭēśvar in the burial-ground of her husband in year 630. *Ibid.*, p. 312, No. 44.

Koṭṭayam.

63. 229 of 1895.—(Vaṭṭeḷuttu.) A record on a stone to the left of the entrance into the courtyard of the Śiva temple.

64. 230 of 1895.—(Pahlavi and Syriac.) On the smaller cross in the Valiyapalli Church. A record practically identical with Cg. 855. See *Ind. Antq.*, Vol. III, page 311 ff. and *Ep. Ind.*, Vol. IV, p. 175. The Syriac epigraph is a quotation from *Galatians*.

65. 231 of 1895.—(Pahlavi.) A record on the larger cross in the same church. See *Ep. Ind.*, Vol. IV, p. 176.

66—69. 232—235 of 1895.—(Vatteluttu.) A record on four stones built into the north entrance of the same church.

70—88. 236—254 of 1895.—(Vatteluttu.) On stones built into the steps leading into the same church.

89. The Syrian Christian plates of Sthānu Ravi No. I.—(Vatteluttu of “about the latter half of the ninth or the beginning of the tenth century A.D.”) Records that in the fifth year of king Sthānu Ravi, Aiyanaḍigaḷ, the Governor of Vēṇāḍu, gave a number of families of the Ḽlavars, Ḽakkāiyars and Vaṇṇāns to the church called *Tariśāppalli* at Kurukkēṇi kollam (i.e., Quilon) by a certain Ḽso Tapīr. These families were freed, on the occasion, from the necessity to pay the taxes of *talaiikkāṇam*, *ēnikkāṇam*, *maṇaimēypānkollum-irai*, *mēnippon*, *polippon*, *iravuchchōru* and *kudanāḷi*. The converts were also given the privilege of taking their carts to markets within the fort and of being administered justice by the church authorities. [This epigraph together with the next, mistaken for a single one, was edited by Dr. Gundart in *Mad. Jour.*, Vol. XIII, pp. 115—42, and by Kukkil Kelu Nayar in the same journal. The former has been reproduced in *Malabar Manual*, Vol. II. It has now been edited by Mr. Gopinatha Rao in *Trav. Arch. Ser.*, Vol. II, pp. 60—70, with a history of the plates and detailed explanations of the technical terms occurring therein.

90. The Syrian Christian plates of Sthānu Ravi No. II. These are fragmentary and wanting in the first part. The earlier portion is in Vatteluttu and ends with signatures of witnesses in Pahlavi, Kufic and Hebrew. The Vatteluttu of the record is apparently of a later date, but the contents are practically the same as in 89 and so they might be a copy of the latter. The inscription begins with an enumeration of the gift to *Tariśāppalli* of some additional families of professional men like carpenters, *Vellālas*, etc., and passes on to the gift of lands, the boundary of which was determined by the limit of an elephant's walk. The gift was made by Aiyanaḍigaḷ Tiruvaḍi and Rāma Tiruvaḍi, Governor of Vēṇāḍu, in consultation with the *Kōyiladhikāri* and others. The foreign settlers should not be accused of any misdeed and in case they were, they were to be tried and punished by the churchmen only. The document then proceeds to enumerate the fiscal arrangements made for the upkeep of the church and the terms are very informing in regard to the taxation of the age. See *Ibid.*, pp. 70—85.

91. The Koṭṭayam plate of Vīra Rāghava. This inscription which is in the hands of the local Syrian Christians is both in Malayāḷam and Vatteluttu characters. The Vatteluttu is believed by Venkayya to be modern, much more modern than that of the Tirunelli and Cochin plates of Bhāskara Ravivarman. The

language of the epigraph is in Tamil prose (mixed with a few Malayālam forms). It records that Vīra Rāghava Chakravartin who claims to be a lineal descendant of Vīra Kēraḷa Chakravartin conferred, on Saturday, Mīna 22, Rōhiṇi (when Jupiter was in Makara), the title of Maṇigrāmam and certain honours and rights to one Iravikkorran of Magōdaiyarpaṭṭiṇam (Kodungōḷūr). The oil-mongers and the five classes of artisans were made his dependents and their dues to him are enumerated. Venkayya interprets Maṇigrāmam to be a *trading corporation*. Burnell attributes the inscription to the eighth century (A.D. 774). Indian astrologers ascribe it to A.D. 230. But Venkayya would assign it to the fourteenth century A.D. and surmises that Vīra Rāghava might be the same as Jayasimha Vīra Kēraḷavarman, the father of Ravivarman Kulaśekhara of the Arulāpperumāl and Raṅganātha inscriptions. Keilhorn accepts Venkayya's date and says that 15th March, A.D. 1320, is intended. The inscription is of high value for the construction of the social and economic history of the age. See *Ep. Ind.*, Vol. IV, pp. 270—7. Also *Ep. Ind.*, Vol. II, pp. 83—84. *Ind. Antq.*, Vol. VI, p. 83. For earlier editions see *Madras Journal*, Vol. XIII, Part I, p. 118-f. (reprinted in *Malabar Manual*, Appendix XII, p. CXVII f. ; *Madras Journal*, Vol. XXI, pp. 35—8. See also *Trav. Manual*, Vol. I, p. 244 and Vol. II, pp. 125—7.

Malvellore.

92. On a stone before the namaskāra-maṇṭapam in the Bhaghavati temple. Records that Vīra Balarāmavarma Kulaśekhapperumāl erected the temple. *Ibid.*, p. 306, No. 27.

Māmpalli.

93. A Vaṭṭeḷuttu C.P. grant of Śrī Vallavan Gōdai, edited in *Ep. Ind.*, Vol. IX, pp. 234—9. Records that in K. 149, Vrischika, Aśvati, Sunday (= 9th November, A.D. 973) one Umayammai of Tirukkailāyapuram, daughter of Ādichchan, set up an image in the Ayurūr temple and that king Śrīvallavan Gōdai made a gift of land to her for keeping up the service of the temple. The record is the earliest in Kollam era available.

Maṇalīkarai (near Padmanābhapuram).

93-A. A Vaṭṭeḷuttu record of Śrī Vīra Ravi Kēraḷa Varma in 27th Mēḍam in K.A. 410, when Jupiter was in Vrischika. A highly interesting and valuable edict on the amount of taxes to be collected from the people, after a solemn consultation of chiefs and people of Kōdainallūr. See *Trav. Manual*, Vol. I, pp. 256—7.

Manambūr (Chirayinkil taluk.)

93-B. A Kōleḷuttu record saying that the local temple was begun in K.A. 800 and finished in K.A. 820, Mēsha.

Maṅarkādu.

94. 255 of 1895.—(Vaṭṭeluttu.) A record on a stone built into the floor of the Syrian Church.

95. 256 of 1895.—(Vaṭṭeluttu.) A record on a stone at the tank in front of the same church.

Mannūr.

96. On the *vimānam* in the Nīlakaṅṭha temple. A record, dated in K.A. 720, regarding the gluing of the different parts of the liṅgam. *Ins., S. Dts., p. 307, No. 28.*

Mariapallicara.

97. East of the namaskāra-maṅṭapam in the local temple of Mahādēva. Records in K. 972 the erection of the maṅṭapam. *Ibid., No. 30.*

Mārttāṅḍapuram.

98. On a stone north of the village. Records that Seevalava Marun (Śivili Māran?), i.e., Ati Vīra Rāma Pāṇḍya re-established in Ś. 1522, Vyaya, in his thirty-eighth year, a ruined village in Śivalava Nellore. [The inscription says that it was in the reign of Vallabha Dēva. See *Ibid., p. 304, No. 20.*]

Miñchirai.

99. A C.P. in the Miñchirai Svāmi's *maṭham* at Miñchirai. (Malayālam, Vaṭṭeluttu.) Records an agreement between one Kunnūr Nambūri and the Svāmi about the management of the *Samudāyam* of the temple at Āviṭṭattūr. *Trav. Arch. Ser., Vol. I, pp. 301-2.*

Muruṅgūr.

99-A. On a granite pillar at Muruṅgūr. Records in K.A. 670, Tai 12, the prohibition of the lower Iḍaṅgai and Valaṅgai classes from making gifts to a temple.

Nāgercōil (ancient Kōttāru).

100. 57 of 1896.—(Tamil.) On the west wall of the Nāga-liṅga shrine. Records in K.A. 764 a gift of money.

101. 58 of 1896.—(Tamil.) On a pillar to the left of the entrance into the same shrine. A record in Ś. 1567, expired, and K.A. 820, providing for the supply of lamp oil to the temple.

102. 59 of 1896.—(Tamil.) On another pillar. Records in K.A. 692 gift of land at the request of two Jain priests Guru Vīra Paṇḍita and Kamalavāhana Paṇḍita.

103. 60 of 1896.—(Tamil.) On the same pillar. Records in K.A. 694 gift of land near Shērmādēvi.

104. 61 of 1896.—On the west face of another pillar in the same temple. Records gift of land. See No. 102 and *Trav. Manual, Vol. I, p. 195.*

105. 62 of 1896.—(Tamil.) On the east face of the same pillar. Records in K.A. 697 gift of land.

106. 63 of 1896.—(Tamil.) On the east face of another pillar in the same temple. A record of Bhūtaḷavīra-Vīra-Uḍaya-Mārtāṇḍavaram (1494--1535). Records gift of land. See *Trav. Manual*, Vol. I, p. 295.

107. On the north and east bases of the maṅṭapa in front of the Kṛishṇasvāmi temple in the suburb of Vaḍaśēri. (Sanskrit, Grantha.) Records the praise of a king Ādityavarman who acquired the *biruda* Sarvāṅganātha in consequence of his proficiency in all arts and sciences. See *Trav. Arch. Ser.*, Vol. I, p. 173, and No. 204 below. See also *Trav. Manual*, Vol. I, p. 265.

107-A. On a pillar near the Ādimūla Vināyaka temple. Records in K.A. 682, Āni 15, the remission of a number of taxes (enumerated). See *Trav. Manual*, Vol. I, p. 196.

Nāvāyakkūlam (near Attingal).

108. On the west base of the central shrine of the Saṅkara-nārāyaṇasvāmi temple. Records that king Vīra Rāma Mārttāṇḍa Varman of Kīḷappērūr, the head of Jayatuṅganāḍu branch of the Vaḍaśēri Illam, repaired the temple and performed the *kumbhābhi-shēka* in Monday, Iḍavam 24, Pañchami, K.A. 614. See *Trav. Arch. Ser.*, Vol. I, p. 299 and *Trav. Manual*, Vol. I, p. 276.

109. On the south side of the namaskāra-maṅṭapam of the temple. A record, dated in K.A. 614, saying that the Rāja of Kāyaṅkūlam re-established the God Śaṅkara Nārāyaṇasvāmi. See *Ins.*, *S. Dts.*, in *Mack. MSS.*, p. 311, No. 42.

Pallipuram.

110. On the south gate of the Bhagavati temple. Records the erection of the temple from 651 to 654. *Ins.*, *S. Dts.*, p. 310, No. 38. See *Trav. Manual*, Vol. I, p. 25.

Pārthivapuram.

111. On the base of north pial in front of the Vishṇu temple. (Sanskrit and Tamil, Vaṭṭeluttu.) Records that in K.A. 98, one Kumāran Nārāyaṇan endowed two perpetual lamps. *Ibid.*, pp. 287-8.

112. On a detached stone lying in the first prakāra. Records that one Śaṅkaran Raṇaśiṅgan set up a silver image and endowed a lamp for the merit of Vīraśōḷapperumāṇaḍigaḷ whom Mr. Gopinatha Rao identifies with Vīrarājendra "who held sway over the Paṇḍya country also." See *Trav. Arch. Ser.*, Vol. I, pp. 295-6.

Parūr.

113. On a slab set up in the north wall of the Romo-Syrian church. (Malayālam in Vaṭṭeḷuttu character.) Records the death of the bishop Francisco, A.D. 1624. See *Trav. Arch. Ser.*, Vol. I, Vol. I, pp. 299—301.

114. Round the margin of a stone fountain in the Jacobite church. Records that it was presented to the church by one Abraham Manual in A.D. 1625 (in the month of Vrischika). *Ibid.*, p. 301.

Peruneyil (suburb of Chaṅganaśēri).

115. On the base of the central shrine of the temple. (Vaṭṭeḷuttu.) A record evidently of the fourteenth year of Bhāskara Ravivarman (A.D. 978—1036). Unfinished. *Ibid.*, Vol. II, p. 34.

116. On the south base of the central shrine. (Vaṭṭeḷuttu.) Dated in the thirty-eighth year of Kōnōyinmaikoṇḍān Bhāskara Ravivarman Tiruvaḍi. Records that the king ordered, as the result of a resolution of the *urāḷars*, the *paradiyars* and *poduvāḷs* of the village, that the tenants need not pay to the king's officers any dues other than those specified in tenancy conditions. *Ibid.*, pp. 44-5.

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Periyakuḷam.

116-A. A Vaṭṭeḷuttu record of Rājarāja I regarding land revenue. See *Trav. Manual*, Vol. I, p. 184.

Puravari.

117. 47 of 1896.--(Tamil.) On the north wall of the first prakāra of the Vishṇu temple. An incomplete record in K.A. 335.

118. 48 of 1896.--(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record in the sixteenth year of the Pāṇḍya king Kōnērinmēlkoṇḍān. Records gift of land.

119. 49 of 1896.--(Tamil.) A record in the sixteenth year of the Pāṇḍya king Kō-Māravarman *alias* Śrīvallabhadēva. Connected with the above epigraph; mentions prince Kulaśēkharadēva. [Was he the predecessor of Jaṭavarman Kulaśēkhara I, 1190—1217?]

120. 50 of 1896.--(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record in the sixteenth year of the Pāṇḍya king Kō-Māravarman *alias* Śrīvallabhadēva. Connected with the above two inscriptions. One Śiṅgam Araṅgan of Paśuṅguḷam is referred to and as the latter lived in K.A. 336 (see No. 126) Dr. Hultzsch infers that this Pāṇḍyan king lived in the middle of the twelfth century.

121. 51 of 1896.—(Tamil.) On the west wall of the same prākāra. A record of the Travancore king Vīra-Ravivarman, the date of which is lost. Published by Rao Bahadur P. Sundaram Pillai in his *Sovereigns of Travancore*, p. 21.

122. 52 of 1896.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the same prākāra. A record in K.A. 3 . . . of a Travancore king, whose name is lost. Partially published. *Ibid.*, p. 23.

123. 53 of 1908.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record in K.A. 336 of the Travancore king Vīra-Ravivarman. Published in *ibid.*, p. 19 f. As this king was the contemporary of Śrīvallabha (see No. 120 above), Dr. Hultsch infers that he must have been a feudatory of the Pāṇḍya.

124. 54 of 1896.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in K.A. 663 gift of 401 *Kaliyugarāma-panas*. See Cg. 322.

125. 55 of 1896.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in K.A. 372 of the Travancore king Vīra-Rāmavaram. Records gift of land to two Brāhmaṇas for teaching the *Rigvēda* and *Yajurveda* in the temple.

126. 56 of 1896.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. An incomplete record in K.A. 336 (A.D. 1160-1). Records that eighteen Brāhmaṇas were settled in a village near the temple by a certain Śiṅgan Araṅgan of Paśuṅḷam in Tennāḍu. [The latter is referred to in No. 120 above also.]

Śāmbūr-Vaḍagarai (ancient Vindai or Vindanūr).

127. On the south wall of the mahāmaṅṭapa of the Mūlasthānēśvara temple. (Tamil.) Records that king Perumāḷ Śivala māran *alias* Varaguṇarāma Pāṇḍya Kulaśekhara Sōmayāji granted a sum of money for a lamp in Ś. 1538, his third year. See Tn. 393-A at Tenkāsi and *Trav. Arch. Ser.*, Vol. I, p. 148.

128. In the same place. A record of the thirty-fourth year of Māravarman Arikēsaridēva (Tuesday, Kārttika 5, Śukla pañchami, Uttara nakshatra), making a gift of house-site, lands, etc., to a Brahman of Vindanūr for the long life of Prince Śrīvallabhadēva, the king's younger brother. See *Trav. Arch. Ser.*, Vol. I, pp. 252-3.

129. On the north face of the mahāmaṅṭapa. Grant of land to God Mūlasthānēśvara in the twenty-fifth year of Arikēsari Parākrama Pāṇḍya dēva (Tuesday, Śukla dvitīya, Rishabha 20). *Ibid.*, pp. 254-5.

130. On the south wall of the mahāmaṅṭapa. Makes a gift of two shares in the agrahāra at Vindanūr to two Brāhmins by Parākrama Pāṇḍya dēva on Thursday, Dhanus 8, Paurṇami Mrigaśīrsha, in his thirty-third year. See *Ibid.*, p. 255.

131. On the south base of the same. A record of the thirty-fifth year of Jaṭilavarman Tribhuvanachakravartin Parākrama Pāṇḍya

dēva, on Thursday, Śuklāśṭami, Mīna 7, Mrigaśīrsha (the natal star of the king), recording the grant of 48 shares to 48 Brahmans, etc., in the village of Vindanūr. *Trav. Arch. Ser.*, Vol. I, pp. 255-6.

132. On the north wall facing the west of the mahāmaṅṭapa. (Tamil.) A record of Jaṭilavarman Tribhuvanachakravartin Parākrama Pāṇḍya *alias* Vīra Pāṇḍya (the nephew of Arikēsari Parākrama) granting lands in Vindanūr to two men (Kumāra Gōvindabhaṭṭa and Kurovi Nārāyaṇabhaṭṭa) in the seventh year of the king,—on Thursday, Anurādha, Śukla dvitīya, Tulā 14. See *Ibid.*, pp. 257-8, and *Ins.*, *S. Dts.*, p. 304, No. 19. (Here the regnal year is given as 2).

133. On the north wall of the mahāmaṅṭapa. Records a grant on Sunday, Kumbha, Kṛishṇa. 14, Aviṭṭa (the star of Vīra Pāṇḍya's nativity) of the same year to one Kārimārabhaṭṭa of Vaṅgipuram. *Ibid.*, Vol. I, pp. 259-60, and *Ins.*, *S. Dts.*, p. 304, No. 18.

134. On the north wall facing the mahāmaṅṭapa. Dated in the seventh year of Jaṭilavarman Tribhuvanachakravartin Ponnumperumāḷ Parākramadēva (1422—64). Records grant of lands to two Brāhmaṇas at Vindanūr. *Ibid.*, pp. 260--2.

135. On the east wall of the maṅṭapa in front of the Amman shrine. Dated in the ninth year of Aḷagan Perumāḷ Parākrama Pāṇḍya (Friday, Śatabhisha, Tulā 2, Śukla dvitīya). Records grant of lands to the Śrī Vaishṇavas of the temple of Aḷagia Maṅavāḷapperumāḷ at Vindanūr for the performance of the midday *pūja*. See *Ibid.*, pp. 262-3.

136. On the south wall of the mahāmaṅṭapa. Dated in the fifth year of king Śrī Vallabhadēva. Records grant of two shares at Vindanūr to two Brahmans. *Ibid.*, pp. 263-4. The date is Friday, Kanni 30, Kṛishṇapaksha 7, Tiruvādirai.

137. On the east wall of the mahāmaṅṭapa of the Mūlasthānēśvara temple. Belongs to the reign of Kulaśēkhara *alias* Parākramadēva, son of Abhīrāma Parākrama. Gift of land to the God at Vindanūr in Ś. 1471. *Ibid.*, pp. 268--70. [Kulaśēkhara's initial date was 1543.]

138. On the south wall of the maṅṭapa in front of the central shrine of Sundara Rāja Perumāḷ temple at Vindanūr-Kōṭṭai. Belongs to the reign of Jaṭilavarman Kulaśēkhara *alias* Parākrama Pāṇḍya, son of Abhirāma. Records that in his seventh year, Ś. 1472, Sādhāraṇa (Monday, Mithuna 19, Śukla 2) one Aḷagan Śokkan of the Kauśika Gōtra and Bōdhāyana Sūtra was appointed as temple accountant, on the pay of $\frac{3}{4}$ *paṇam* and $\frac{3}{4}$ *kōṭṭai* of paddy per mensem. *Ibid.*, Vol. I, pp. 271-2.

139. On the south base of the mahāmaṅṭapa of the Mūlasthānēśvara's temple. A record of the third year of Tirunelvēli Perumāḷ *alias* Dharma Perumāḷ Kulaśēkkara, Ś. 1474, regarding

the appointment of one Śokkan Kaṇḍiya Tēvan as hereditary accountant. *Trav. Arch. Ser.*, Vol. I, pp. 272-3. [He was crowned in 1552.]

140. On the east wall of the maṅṭapa of Sundararāja Perumāḷ. A record of the same king under the same date as the above. *Ibid.*, pp. 273-4.

141. On the east wall of the mahāmaṅṭapa of the Mūlasthā-nēśvara's temple. Dated Ś. 1487, Krōdhana, Thursday, Makara 6, Śukla 13, the third year of the reign of Ativīrarāma Srivallabhadēva (1562—1610). Records the appointment of an accountant. *Ibid.*, pp. 274-5.

142. On the north wall of the mahāmaṅṭapa of the same. Records in the tenth year of the reign of Ativīrarāma Pāṇḍyadēva, Ś. 1494. Āṅgīrasa, Friday, Mīna 15th, Śukla 11, the appointment of one Tiruvaṅṅāmalaipalavaṅ Chidambaranāthan *alias* Tirumūlanātha Mudali to sing the *Dēvāram*. *Ibid.*, pp. 279-80.

143. On the north wall of the same. Grant by one Kōṭṭakarai Pichchan of some of land in the village of Vēndanallūr (?) to Gods Tirumūlanātha and Kumārasvāmi. See *Ins.*, S. Dts., p. 303, No. 16.

144. On the stone in the south of the temple. A grant of land to Tirumūlanātha in "the reign of Mundru Mudeke Muria Cola devur" by "Malavukalokayun"? *Ibid.*, p. 304, No. 17.

Santhūr.

144-A. On a granite pillar. Records in K.A. 819, Āvaṇi 20, the prohibition by royal writ the punishment of villagers without the knowledge of government by the village assembly. *Trav. Manual*, Vol. I, p. 197.

Śeṅgōttai.

145. On the south wall of the central shrine of the Śiva temple. Dated Ś. 1467, Visvāvasu, on a Friday, Kṛishṇapaksha Ēkādaśi in the month of Aippaśi, in the third year of Kulaśēkharadēva (the father of Varatuṅga Rāma). Records grant of land to the temple. *Trav. Arch. Ser.*, Vol. I, pp. 103-4. See also *Ins.*, S. Dts., p. 298, No. 2.

146. On the north wall of the maṅṭapa in front of the Vishṇu temple. Records that in Ś. 1467, Friday, Kṛishṇapak. 2 of . . . month, Uttara, the third year of the king Kulaśēkhara Parākrama Pāṇḍya, son of Abhirāma Parākrama Pāṇḍya, the king granted some land to the local temple. *Trav. Arch. Ser.*, Vol. I, pp. 266-7. This inscription is apparently the one referred to in the *Mack. MSS.*, *Ins.*, S. Dts., p. 298, No. 3. [The king is the ruler whose initial date was A.D. 1543.]

147. West of the *vimāna* in the temple of Aḷagia Maṅavāḷa Perumāḷ. Records that king Vallabha Dēva re-established the

vimānam, in his second year, and granted the village of Parākrama Pāṇḍyanallūr and two tanks for God Kulaśekhara Viṅṅagara Perumāḷ and Goddess. See *Ins., S. Dts.*, p. 298, No. 1.

Śuchindram.

As many as 100 inscriptions are said to have been copied here, but the details of only the following are available :—

148. 64 of 1896.—(Tamil.) On the front gōpura of the Sthānunaṭha temple, left of entrance. A record in K.A. 722 of Bhūtaḷavīra-Rāmavarman. Records gift of land for offerings on the birthday of Viṭṭhalēśvaramahārāja. See *Trav. Manual*, Vol. I, p. 296.

149. 65 of 1896.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the second prakāra of the same temple. A record in the nineteenth year of the Pāṇḍya king Kō-Vīra Pāṇḍya, “who cut off the head of the Chōḷa.” The king has not been identified. See No. 167 below.

150. 66 of 1896.—(Vaṭṭeḷuttu.) On a boulder in the same temple. A damaged record in the fifth year of the Pāṇḍya king Kō-Māraṅjaḍaiyan. See No. 220 below.

151. 67 of 1896.—(Vaṭṭeḷuttu.) On the same boulder. An incomplete record in the tenth year of the Chōḷa king Kō-Rājarājakēsarivarman (I, 985—1013).

152. 68 of 1896.—(Vaṭṭeḷuttu.) On the same boulder. A record in the fifth year of the Pāṇḍya king Kō-Māraṅjaḍaiyan. Records gift of land. See No. 220 below.

153. 69 of 1896.—(Tamil.) [On the same boulder. A record in the twenty-fourth year of Kō-Jaṭavarman *alias* Chōḷa-Pāṇḍyadēva. Records gift of a lamp. [The Government Epigraphist identifies this Chōḷa Pāṇḍya with Mummudichōḷa who was given the title of Vīra Pāṇḍya by his elder brother Parakēsarivarman Rājendra (1052—63).]

154. 70 of 1896.—(Tamil.) On the same boulder. A record in the twenty-fifth year of Kō-Jaṭavarman *alias* Chōḷa-Pāṇḍyadēva. Records gift of land. See the above inscription.

155. 71 of 1896.—(Vaṭṭeḷuttu.) On the same boulder. A record in the tenth year by a native of Ceylon of the Chōḷa king Kō-Rājarājakēsarivarman (985—1013). Records gift of a lamp. The assembly took charge of the endowment. See *Ep. Ind.*, Vol. V, p. 44.

156. 72 of 1896.—(Vaṭṭeḷuttu.) On the same boulder. A record in the twelfth year of the Pāṇḍya king Kō-Śaḍaiyamāran. Records gift of a lamp. See No. 37 above.

157. 73 of 1896.—(Vaṭṭeḷuttu.) On the same boulder. A record in the tenth year of the Pāṇḍya king Kō-Śaḍaiyamāran. Records gift of a lamp. See No. 37 above.

158. 74 of 1896.—(Tamil.) On the same boulder. An incomplete fragment of a record of the Chōla king Abhaya (Kulōttuṅga I?).

159. 75 of 1896.—(Vaṭṭeḷuttu.) On the same boulder. A record in the fourteenth year of the Chōla king Kō-Rājarājakēsari-varman (I, 985—1013). Records gift of land. See *Ep. Ind.*, Vol. V, p. 45, where the inscription is edited.

160. 76 of 1896.—(Tamil.) On a boulder in the Kailāsanātha shrine in the same temple. A record in the ninth year of Kō-Jaṭavarman *alias* Sundara-Chōla-Pāṇḍyadēva. Records gift of a lamp. See No. 7 above.

161. 77 of 1896.—(Vaṭṭeḷuttu.) On the same boulder. A record in the sixteenth year of the Pāṇḍya king Kō-Śadaiyamāran. Records gift of a lamp. See No. 37 above.

162. 78 of 1896.—(Vaṭṭeḷuttu.) On the same boulder. A record in the second year of the Pāṇḍya king Kō-Mārañjaḍaiyan. Records gift of a lamp. See No. 220 below.

163. 79 of 1896.—(Tamil.) On the same boulder. A record in K.A. 712 of Bhūtaḷavīra-Rāvivarman. Records gift of land. See No. 39 above.

164. 80 of 1896.—(Tamil.) On the same boulder. A record of the Pāṇḍya king Kō-Māra-varman *alias* Vīra Pāṇḍyadēva (unidentified), the date of which is lost. Records gift of land.

165. 81 of 1896.—(Vaṭṭeḷuttu.) On the same boulder. Records in the thirty-fourth year of the Chōla king Kō-Parakēsari-varman (905—47). Gift of fifty ewes for a lamp to God Mahādēva of Tiruchchivandiram in Nāñjināḍu by Arayan Aravindan of Talaikkūlam. The village assembly received it. See *Ep. Ind.*, Vol. V, pp. 42-3. *Trav. Arch. Ser.*, Vol. I, p. 237.

166. 82 of 1896.—(Vaṭṭeḷuttu.) On the same boulder. A record in the fortieth year of the Chōla king Kō-Parakēsari-varman (905—47), “who took Madirai and Ceylon.” Records gift of a lamp by Oruṅgai Araṅgan of Karavandapuram in Kaḷakkādu-nādu. *Ibid.*, pp. 43-4. Also *Ibid.*, pp. 238-9.

167. 83 of 1896.—(Vaṭṭeḷuttu.) A record in the thirteenth year of the Pāṇḍya king Kō-Vīra-Pāṇḍya, “who cut off the head of the Chōla.” Records gift of a lamp. See No. 149 above.

168. 84 of 1896.—(Vaṭṭeḷuttu.) On the same boulder. A record of the Pāṇḍya king Kō-Vīra-Pāṇḍya, the date of which is lost. Partially built in. *Ibid.*, Vol. II, No. 3, pp. 15—21 (?).

169. 85 of 1896.—(Vaṭṭeḷuttu.) On the same boulder. A record in the fifteenth year of the Chōla king Kō-Rājarājakēsari-varman. Records that the members of the *Mūlaparadai sabha* felt themselves unable to collect the rent and otherwise manage

the affairs of the temple and handed over the charge to the local *mahāsabhā* who appointed two *vāriyars* and a *kāraṇattān* for the purpose. The record is dated on Tuesday, 13th of Kanni, Pūrva-shāḍha, which, according to Dr. Kielhorn, corresponded to 29th August, A.D. 999. See *Ep. Ind.*, Vol. V, pp. 45--8 and *Trav. Arch. Ser.*, Vol. II, pp. 1--8, where Mr. Gopinatha Rao identifies Kandalūr with a part of Trevandram. His interpretation of the destruction of the *sālai* as the destruction of a feeding-house seems to me to be absurd.

170. 86 of 1896.—(Tamil.) On the west wall of the Kailāsanātha shrine in the same temple. Records in K.A. 420 gift of a lamp.

171. 87 of 1896.—(Tamil.) On the north wall of the shrine of the Nandiśāstān temple in the same place. Records in K.A. 402 gift of land.

172. 88 of 1896.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. A record in K.A. 406.

173. 89 of 1896.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records in K.A. 400 gift of land for the maintenance of a lamp.

174. 90 of 1896.—(Tamil.) On the same wall. Records gift of paddy.

175. 91 of 1896.—(Tamil.) On the south wall of the same shrine. Records in K.A. 404 gift of land.

176. On the west wall of the maṇṭapa in front of Sthānunātha temple. Records that in the twenty-eighth year of Jaṭilavarman Parākramadēva, Mēsha 20, Śukla 3, Mrigaśīrsha (the king's star) some land was granted for certain special services in the temple. *Trav. Arch. Ser.*, Vol. I, pp. 281-2.

176-A. A record of the Kēraḷa king Mārttāṇḍavarman in Ś. 1312 (Rākālōkē Śakhābdē surapatisachivē simhayātē tulāyām, ārūdhē paḍminīśēpyaditidinayutē bhānuvarē), corresponding, according to Kielhorn, to perhaps Sunday, 2nd October 1390. (The date is a little irregular.) See *Ind. Antq.*, Vol. II, p. 361, and Kielhorn's *Southern List*, No. 942.

Talamana Illam (near Chaṅganāśēri).

177. A C.P. plate of Rājaśekhara who bore the imperial titles Śrīrāja, Rājādhirāja, Paramēśvara, etc. In the Vaṭṭeḷuttu alphabet "not later than the ninth century nor earlier than the eighth century." Records that under the king's presidency the people of the eighteen nāḍus of Tīruvāṅṅuvāy and of Vālaippalli met and made some arrangement regarding the *bali* ceremony, saying that those who stood in the way should be fined. [Mr. Gopinatha Rao discusses the date of the king and concludes that he should have lived in the beginning of the ninth century, that he should have been a predecessor of the poet Rājaśekhara who, he argues, was

a king of Kēraḷa, a contemporary of Raṇavigraha of the Kaḷachuri dynasty and so lived in the tenth century. See *Trav. Arch. Ser.*, Vol. II, pp. 8--3, for the full arguments.]

Tirucoonapulli.

178. On the east of the village near the temple of Śasta. Records in K.A. 826, the re-establishment of the broken image of the deity. *Ins., S. Dts.*, p. 309, No. 36.

179. South of Śubrasvāmi. Records that the Valiatamburān of "Yalemcallooroo" re-established the deity "Śastah." *Ibid.*, p. 309, No. 37.

Tirukkadittānam.

180. On the west and south bases of the central shrine of the Vishṇu temple at Tirukkadittānam (two miles east of Śengnaśēri), one of the thirteen sacred places of Vaiṣṇavism in Malaināḍu. Records that in the fourteenth year of Bhāskara Ravivarman Gōvardhana Mārttāṇḍa, Governor of Vēmāḍu, made certain gifts to the temple. [Mārttāṇḍa figures in Tirunelli plates as one of the king's feudatories. Bhāskara succeeded to the throne in A.D. 978, according to the calculations of Mr. Swamikannu Pillai. His territories evidently included British Malabar, Cochin and half of Travancore and were divided into various nāḍus. See *Trav. Arch. Ser.*, Vol. II, pp. 32-3.]

181. On the north and west walls of the central shrine. (Vaṭṭeḷuttu.) Dated in the fifteenth year of Bhāskara Ravivarman (A.D. 992). Records that the *ūrāḷar* (townsmen), *parudaiyar* (member of the parishad), etc., were not to be corrupt in the management of the shrine and collection of rents, that the temple priests should be appointed for three years only, that the expenditure on feeding the Brahmans, the reciters of the *Mahābhārata*, etc., should not be diverted into other channels, and that penalty for failure was a fine of 12 *kaḷāñjus* and 5 *kāṇams*. See the above epigraph and *Trav. Arch. Ser.*, Vol. II, pp. 34-8.

182. On the south wall of the central shrine. (Vaṭṭeḷuttu.) Dated in the twenty-sixth year of Bhāskara Ravivarman, i.e., 1010 A.D. Mentions Gōvardhana Mārttāṇḍa of Vēmāḍu, also ruling over Nanrūlaināḍu. *Ibid.*, pp. 40-1.

183. On the west base of the same shrine a badly damaged Vaṭṭeḷuttu inscription of Bhāskara Ravivarman. Records gift of a lamp. *Ibid.*, p. 45.

Tirumūlikkalam.

184. On the base of the front maṅṭapa of the Vishṇu temple (Vaṭṭeḷuttu.) A record of the forty-eighth year of Bhāskara Ravivarman [Mr. Swamikannu Pillai believes, on astronomical grounds, that this king should be different from the Ravivarman of the above inscriptions. See *Trav. Arch. Ser.*, Vol. II, pp. 45-6.

Tirunandikkarai.

185. On the east wall of the rock-cut Śiva shrine. Belongs to the eighteenth year of Rājarāja I and records grant to the temple for the celebration of a festival in Aippaṣi, Śaṭabhisha, the birthday of the king. See *Trav. Arch. Ser.*, Vol. I, pp. 291-2.

Tirupparappu.

186. A C.P. in the local Śiva temple. (Sanskrit and Tamil.) An incomplete record of a certain Yādava king (whose genealogy is traced), who seems to have been either Karunandanadaḥkan or his son Vikramāditya Varaguṇa (ninth century). See *Ibid.*, pp. 197-200. See inscription No. 2 in Cochin above.

187. A C.P. in the Kṛishṇasvāmi temple. Records in year 80 the casting of the image of the deity. See *Ins., S. Dts.*, p. 307, No. 29.

Tiruvalla.

188. A C.P. belonging to Mūviḍathu-mēr-chēri illam at Tiruvalla. (Vaṭṭeḷuttu.) Records in the seventeenth year of the king Tānu Ravi the arrangements made by the *sabhā* of Tiruvār-ruvāy regarding feeding in the Ōṇam festival for which one Śendan Śaṅkaran made grants of lands. *Trav. Arch. Ser.*, Vol. II, pp. 85-6. [Was Tānu Ravi the same as the donor of the Syrian Christian plates of Koṭṭayam? See Nos. 87 and 88 above.]

Tiruvallam (near Trivandrum).

189. On the north wall of the Brahma shrine in the Śiva temple. Dated in K.A. 420. (Vaṭṭeḷuttu.) Records gifts by some private party for offerings and feeding Brahmans on Sōmavāra *amāvāsya*s. See *Ibid.*, Vol. I, pp. 296-7.

190. A palm leaf grant in the temple. Records that the Tirunambi of Nāyar Mannūr village passed some paper in 925 to Cochi Rāja, the superintendent of the above temple. *Ins., S. Dts.*, p. 309, No. 34.

190-A. An inscription of Vīrakēraḷavarma in old Malayālam in K.A. 319 (A.D. 1144) when Jupiter was in Vrischika and the sun in Makara. See *Ind. Antq.*, Vol. XXIV, p. 255.

Tiruvaṅvaṅḍūr.

191. On the base of the Śurṛumaṅḍapa in the Vishṇu temple. (Vaṭṭeḷuttu.) Records that Srīvallavaṅ Gōdai, the governor of Vēṅḍu, made a grant of land to the God at Tiruvaṅvaṅḍūr for food offering and other purposes. The expenses were to be supervised by the 300 of Nanṛḷai-nāḍu. [See *Trav. Arch. Ser.*, Vol. II, pp. 23-4.]

192. On the outside base of the same maṅṭapa. A similar record of the same king making arrangements regarding the

Tiruvāyambādi temple (north-west of the Vishṇu temple, now in ruins). *Trav. Arch. Ser.*, Vol. II, p. 24.

Tiruvattāru.

193. A record of king Vīra Ravivarman, dated K.A. 770 (A.D. 1603--7), Saturday, Āni 26, Śukla Saptami, Hasta. Records repairs made by the king, his brother and consorts, to the temple of Ādikēśavapperumāḷ. See *Ibid.*, Vol. I, pp. 176--8. [The king ruled from 1595 to 1607. See *Trav. Manual*, Vol. I, p. 301.]

194. A record of the same king. Says that the *orraikkal* mantapa was erected in K. 4704, K.A. 778.

195. On the south wall of the central shrine. (Vatteḷuttu.) Gift of land by Vīra Udayamārttānda Tiruvādi in K.A. 398. *Ibid.*, p. 296.

Tiruvīdaikkōdu.

196. On a small rock in the south prakāra of the local Śiva temple. (Tamil in archaic Vatteḷuttu.) Records gift of twenty cows by a private person for a lamp in the fourteenth year of king Karunanandaḍakkar. *Ibid.*, Vol. I, pp. 14-15, and No. 215 below.

197. On the same rock. Dated in the twenty-second year of the same king. Records gift of a lamp. Imperfect. *Ibid.*, p. 15.

Trikākarai.

That this is a very ancient temple is proved by the fact that Nammālvār visited it. According to one inscription it was constructed in K. 3705, A.D. 603-4.

198. 2 of 1903.—(Vatteḷuttu.) A damaged record on the right of the entrance into the *ambalam*. See *Ibid.*, Vol. II, pp. 38--40, where this inscription seems to be edited. It is dated in the twenty-third year of Bhāskara Ravivarman, i.e., A.D. 1000. Seems to record gift of lands for lamps and feeding Śrī-Vaishṇava pilgrims. See No. 180 above.

199. 3 of 1903.—(Vatteḷuttu.) A damaged record on the base of the central shrine in the same *ambalam*. [This seems to be the inscription in *Ibid.*, pp. 41-2, dated in the twenty-first year of Bhāskara Ravivarman.] See No. 180 above.

200. 4 of 1903.—(Vatteḷuttu.) A damaged record on the base of the platform in front of the same *ambalam*. [This is apparently the inscription published in *Trav. Arch. Ser.*, Vol. II, pp. 42--4, dated in the thirty-first year of Bhāskara Ravivarman and recording arrangements regarding collection of rents from the tenants of the temple lands.]

201. On the base of the front mantapa. (Vatteḷuttu.) Dated after the forty-second year of Bhāskara Ravivarman (who is referred to in No. 184 above and who is different from the king of

the above inscriptions). Records gift of gold (40 *kaḷaṅjus*) for purchasing lands for offering to the God and feeding Śrī Vaishṇava pilgrims. *Trav. Arch. Ser.*, Vol. II, pp. 46--8.

202. On the base of the front maṅṭapa. (Vaṭṭeḷuttu.) Dated in the fifty-eighth year of Bhāskara Ravivarman. Records that a person took up the *kāraṇmai* of certain lands for which he bound himself to burn a perpetual lamp in the temple. *Ibid.*, pp. 49-50.

Trivandrum.

203. 269 of 1895.—(Sanskrit and Vaṭṭeḷuttu.) On the north wall of the Kṛishnasvāmin shrine in the Padmanābhasvāmin temple. Records gift of a silver drum to the Kṛishṇa temple at Syānandūra (Trevandram?) by Gōda-Mārttāṇḍa of Kolamba in Dhanus when Jupiter was in Karkāṭaka. (Sanskrit portion published by Mr. P. Sundaram Pillai, *Sovereigns of Travancore*, page 28.) See *Ep. Ind.*, Vol. IV, pp. 201—3, where Dr. Kielhorn suggests that on palæographical grounds the inscription should be assigned to the second-half of the fourteenth century A.D.

204. 270 of 1895.—(Sanskrit.) In the same place. Records in Ś. 1296 the erection of the shrine, etc., by king Ādityavarman Sarvāṅganātha. See *Ibid.*, p. 203, where Dr. Kielhorn edits the inscription and *Trav. Arch. Ser.*, Vol. I, pp. 171-2. According to Kielhorn the date was between 10th October 1374 and 26th March 1375.

205. 271 of 1895.—(Vaṭṭeḷuttu.) On the base of the south wall of the same shrine. Records gift of two lamps.

206. 272 of 1895.—(Vaṭṭeḷuttu.) On the base of the east wall of the same shrine. Records gift of land for a lamp.

207. 273 of 1895.—(Vaṭṭeḷuttu.) In the same place. Records gift of land.

208. 274 of 1895.—(Vaṭṭeḷuttu.) At the east entrance into the first prākāra of the Padmanābhasvāmin temple. A record in K.A. 384. (Published by Mr. P. Sundaram Pillai, *Sovereigns of Travancore*, p. 42 f.)

209. 275 of 1895.—(Vaṭṭeḷuttu.) On a stone lying to the left of the entrance into the museum. A record in K.A. 239. Compare *Sovereigns of Travancore*, p. 55, footnote.

210. 276 of 1895.—(Tamil.) A record on another stone in the same place.

211. 277 of 1895.—(Vaṭṭeḷuttu.) On a stone standing to the right of the entrance into the same. A record in the twenty-seventh year of the Pāṇḍya king Kō-Māraṅjadaiyān. See No. 220 below.

212. 278 of 1895.—(Tamil.) On another stone in the same place. Dated in K.A. 839. Mentions a temple of Śiva at Kāndaḷūr-śālai identified with Trevandram by Mr. Gopinatha Rao.]

213. On the two bases of the *Tulābhāṛakkal* in the Padma-nābhasvāmi temple. (Tamil.) Dated in K. 4702, K.A. 776, when Saturn stood in the Tulārāśi and Jupiter in Kanyārāśi, on Saturday, 12th Mithuna, nakshatra *Punarvasu*, which have been equated to 20th June, A.D. 1601. Records that king Vira Ravivarman performed the *Tulāpuṛuṣa* ceremony and his two queens built a maṅṭapa in commemoration of the event. [Mr. Nagam Aiya attributes the king to 1595—1607 and describes him as a member of the Jayasimhanāḍu family, while the inscription regards him as one of the Kīlappērūl illam and of Tiruppāppūr family.] *Trav. Arch. Ser.*, Vol. II, pp. 28—30.

214. On the two faces of a stone lying in the yard of the Śiva temple at Śālaigrāmam. (Grantha.) Enumerates the *birudas* of Ravivarman Sangrāmadhīra, the conqueror of South India who was crowned at Conjeeveram in A.D. 1313. [For Ravivarman's literary work and services and for the circumstances under which he invaded the Chōḷa, Pāṇḍya and Toṇḍa maṅḍalams as based on inscriptions and Telugu literature, see *Trav. Arch. Ser.*, Vol. II, pp. 53—8. See also S.A. 71 and 295 and Cg. 325 and 349.]

215. The Trevandram Huzur office plates of Kōkkaru-nandaḍakkan. (Tamil language and alphabet.) Records that on 1449087th day of the Kali era, and fifteenth day of the ninth year of king Karuṇandaḍakkan, he purchased from the *Sabhā* of Miñchirai a plot of land, erected a Vishṇu temple on it together with a *śālū* for 95 *śattars* (scholars) and endowed lands for temple services, lamps, festivals, etc. The king must have ascended the throne about A.D. 855-6. He belonged to the Yādava or Āykula dynasty who ruled over the mountain tracts of South Travancore who had Ayakuḍi for their capital and who were called the Lords of the Podiya mountain. Mr. Gopinatha Rao traces the history of the Ay king Aṇḍiran as far as it is ascertained from the *Puraṇā-nūru*. See *Trav. Arch. Ser.*, Vol. I, p. 3. He also points out that Karuṇandaḍakkan of these plates should be the same as Aḍakkan or Śrī Vallabha, the son of Karuṇandan and grandson of Śaḍayan, and contemporary of Varaguṇa Pāṇḍya, who came to the throne in A.D. 862. See *Trav. Arch. Ser.*, Vol. I, pp. 1—14 and No. 2 above.

216. The Huzur office plate of Vikramāditya Varaguṇa. (Tamil.) The record belongs to the eighth year of king Vikramāditya Varaguṇa and says that while staying at Tirunandikarai he married Murugan Śēndi or Āykula Mahādēvi, the daughter of Teṅganāḍu Kīlavan, and granted some lands for her enjoyment. Mr. T. A. Gopinatha Rao gives arguments to show that this king was the successor of Kōkkaruṇandaḍakka referred to in the previous inscription. See *Trav. Arch. Ser.*, Vol. I, No. II.

217. On the base of a maṅṭapa in front of the *orṛaikkal* maṅṭapa. Records that on Āni 29 of K.A. 904, Bālamārttāṇḍavarman, nephew's son of king Rāmavarman of Vañchi, made the

Brāhman architect Bālakānta reconstruct the Padmanābha temple and had it completed in K.A. 908. *Trav. Arch. Ser.*, Vol. I, No. V.

218. In the same place. Records that Bālakāntāra and his son and disciples made the image of Padmanābha at the instance of Bālamārttāndavarman. *Ibid.*

219. On the slab forming the base of the *oraiikkal* maṅṭapa. Records that the stone reached Trevandram in K.A. 906, Chaitra, Śuklapaksha dvādaśi, Thursday. *Ibid.*

220. On the slab set up in the southern side of the western gate of the museum. (Vaṭṭeluttu.) Belongs to the twenty-seventh year of the Pāṇḍya king Mārañjaḍaiyan and records that in the battle of Viḷiṇam the Pāṇḍya army left the Chēra's in confusion and retired to the fort of Karaikkōṭṭai, and that the Chēra army, rallying themselves, again attacked the Karaikkōṭṭai fort. In the course of this a servant of the Pāṇḍyan king named Raṇakīrti fell struck by an arrow. See *Trav. Manual*, Vol. I, pp. 182-3 and *Trav. Arch. Ser.*, Vol. I, pp. 153-9, where Mr. Gopinatha Rao gives arguments to prove that the king should be identical with the Mārañjaḍaiyan of the Anaimalai records who lived about A.D. 770.

Vadaśēri.

220-A. On a pillar in Kandiripandi Vilai. Records remission of taxes to the people of Nañjanāḍu for thirteen years in A.D. 1697 on account of the Nāyaka invasion. See *Trav. Manual*, Vol. I, pp. 197-8.

Vallappalli.

221. On the south-east pillar of *namaskāra* maṅṭapam in the temple of Mahādēva in the village. Records that Tupparam of Machari village erected on the south-eastern pillar a *namaskāra* maṅṭapam to the God Mahādēva. *Ins., Ced. Dts.*, p. 305, No. 22.

222. On the western pillar of the temple. Records that Kēśavan of Teruvanpaḷḷi village raised the western pillar in the *namaskāra* maṅṭapam to the God Mahādēva. *Ibid.*, No. 23.

223. On the eastern pillar of the temple. Records that Subban of Pālakkuḍi village raised the eastern pillar in the *namaskāra* maṅṭapam. *Ins., Ced. Dts.*, p. 305, No. 24.

224. On the northern pillar of the temple. Records that Mādhavan Trivikraman of Talamāṇa village raised the northern pillar in the *namaskāra* maṅṭapam. *Ibid.*, p. 306, No. 25.

Vāriyūr (3 miles N.E. of Cape Comorin).

225. On three faces of a stone lying in a garden near the salt factory. A record of the fourth year of king Kulōttuṅgachōḷa, recording gift of lamp in the name of the king by one Ponpaṅḡi Uḍaiyan Arayan. He granted two salt pans for the maintenance of the lamp. See *Trav. Arch. Ser.*, Vol. I, pp. 247-8.

Varkkalai.

226. 266 of 1895.—(Vatteluttu.) On the base of the central shrine in the Janārdanasvāmin temple. A record in K.A. 427 of Vira Padmanābha Mārttāṇḍavarman of Vēṇāḍu. [Published in Mr. P. Sundaram Pillai's *Sovereigns of Travancore*, p. 56 f. I find this inscription mentioned in *Ins., S. Dts.*, p. 310, No. 40, but the number of the year is wrongly given as 127.]

227. 267 of 1895.—(Sanskrit.) On the base of the maṅṭapa in front of the same shrine. Records that in K.A. 655 (Vrīshabha 2, Thursday, Mrigaśīrsha, Simhalagna) the king Mārttāṇḍa had the God bathed by Brāhmaṇas. See *Ep. Ind.*, Vol. IV, p. 204, where the date is calculated to be Thursday, 11th May, A.D. 1480. Also *Ins., S. Dts.*, p. 311, No. 41.

228. 268 of 1895.—(Malayalam.) On the base of the enclosure of the same temple. Refers to a Ravikulaśēkhara who performed the *hiranyagarbha* and *tulābhāra*. See No. 214 above.

Vatasseri.

228-A—C. On a granite pillar in front of Karutta Vināyaka temple. Records in K.A. 911, Āni 4, that the temple belonged to the Sāliars and not to the Chetṭis. *Trav. Manual*, Vol. I, p. 197. Two other records in K.A. 849 and 793 mention the term Vēli.

Vēndanellore.

229. On a stone in the old fort on the maṅṭapam belonging to the pagoda in the village. Records that Vallabhadēva granted ten *mās* of land in the village as free gift to the God Aḷagiya Maṅavāla Perumāḷ for the worship and offering food during the second year of his reign. *Ins., Ced. Dts.*, p. 302, No. 13.

230. On the north wall of the *vimānam* in the temple. Records that Parākrama Pāṇḍyadēva granted some land and produce in the village as free gift to the Srī-Vaishṇava Brahmans during the second year of his reign. *Ibid.*, p. 303, No. 14.

231. On the western wall of the *vimānam* in the temple. Records that Parākrama Pāṇḍya employed Sundaradēva Uḍaiyān as an accountant of the pagoda in the village, fixed $3\frac{1}{4}$ *kōtas* of grain and $23\frac{1}{2}$ *paṇams* for his allowance in Ś. 1472, Sādhāraṇa. *Ibid.*, p. 303, No. 15.

Yalaṅḡavu.

232. On the *vimānam* in the temple of Bhaghavati in the village. Records that Rāmavarman re-established the pagoda in the village in K.A. 811. *Ibid.*, p. 306, No. 26.

THE BRITISH MUSEUM.

The following inscriptions which belong to the Madras Presidency are at present in the British Museum. I give them here for the sake of convenience. The list may be incomplete.

1. The British Museum* (formerly Sir W. Elliot's) plates of Sadāśiva Rāya.* (Sanskrit in Nandināgari character.) Records at the request of Rāmarāja, the ruler of the Karnāṭa kingdom, who in turn was requested by Koṇḍarāja, descendant of Aravīdu Bukka (in Ś. 1478, Naḷa, Māśi, Mrigaśīrsha, Sunday, new-moon, solar eclipse, the grant of many villages to the great sage Rāmānuja in the presence of God Viṭṭhalēśvara, on the banks of the Tuṅgabhadra. The record gives the genealogy of Sadāśiva as well as the other donors and an elaborate list of the political divisions. See *Ep. Ind.*, Vol. IV, pp. 1—22, where Dr. Kielhorn edits the inscription. The date is irregular.

2. The Nellore district (formerly Sir W. Elliot's, now British Museum?) plates of the second year of the Eastern Chālukyan king Viṣṇuwardhana II Viṣhamasiddhi, the grandson of Viṣṇuwardhana I and son of Indra Bhaṭṭāraka, the younger brother of Jayasīma I. The record is dated in Ś. 586, Chitra, Śukla 10, Maghā, Wednesday, corresponding to 13th March A.D. 664. See *Ind. Antq.*, Vol. VII, p. 186 and Vol. VIII, p. 320. See also Kielhorn's *Southern List*, No. 550.

3. The Maṭṭewāḍa first and second plates of the fifth year of the king referred to in the above epigraph, in Ś. 589, Phalguna, *amāvāsya*, solar eclipse, corresponding to 17th February A.D. 668. See *Ind. Antq.*, Vol. VII, p. 191 and *Ibid.*, Vol. XX, p. 9. See also Kielhorn's *Southern List*, No. 551.

4. The British Museum (formerly Sir W. Elliot's) plates of the Eastern Chālukya king Vijayāditya II Narēndramriga Rāja, son of Viṣṇuwardhana IV and grandson of Vijayāditya I, who, on the occasion of a lunar eclipse, gave the village of Korraparu to twenty-four Brahmans. The *dūtaka* of the grant was the king's brother Nṛipa-Rāma, born, it is said, in the Haihaya family. See *S.I.I.*, Vol. I, No. 35, pp. 31—6, and Kielhorn's *Southern List*, No. 553.

5. The Ahadanakaram Sanskrit and Telugu plates of the Eastern Chālukya king Viṣṇuwardhana V, son of Vijayāditya II, and grandson of Viṣṇuwardhana IV. See *Ind. Antq.*, Vol. XIII, p. 186, and Kielhorn's *Southern List*, No. 555.

6. The Pāganavaram plates of the Eastern Chālukya king Chālukya Bhīma II (Gaṇḍamahēndra), son of Vijayāditya IV, and

* Originally obtained from a Deputy Sherishtadar of Chingleput.

Mēlamba. Gives a genealogy of the line. See *Ind. Antq.*, Vol. XIII, p. 213 and Kielhorn's *Southern List*, No. 560.

7. The British Museum plates of Ammarāja (Vijayāditya VI), son of Chālukya Bhīma II and Lōkamahādēvi. Records the grant of Padālakaluru in the Pennātavādi district. It gives a genealogy of the dynasty and says that the king's coronation took place in S. 867, Mrigaśrīsha, Kṛishṇa 13, Friday, corresponding to 5th December 945. See *Ind. Antq.*, Vol. VII, p. 15; *Ibid.*, Vol. XXIII, p. 123, No. 62, and Kielhorn's *Southern List*, No. 503.

8. The British Museum plates of the same king (surnamed Rājamahēndra) recording a grant made at the request of the king's wife's parents Kāma and Nāyamāmbā. See *Ind. Antq.*, Vol. XIII, p. 249, and Kielhorn's *Southern List*, No. 566.

9. The Korumelli (now British Museum) plates of the Eastern Chālukya Rājarāja I Vishṇuvardhana, the son of Vimalāditya by the Chōla Princess Kundavā (daughter of Rājarāja the Great). It records the grant on an occasion of lunar eclipse, of the village of Korumelli in Guḍḍavādi *vishaya* to a Brāhmaṇa named Chidamārya who belonged to the Āpastamba Sūtra and Bhāradvājagōtra. The record is important for the fact that it mentions the date of Rājarāja's coronation, viz., Ś. 944, Simha, Kṛishṇa 2, Uttarabhādrapada, Thursday, corresponding to 16th August A.D. 1022. See *Ind. Antq.*, Vol. XIV, p. 50 and *Ibid.*, Vol. XXIII, p. 131, No. 110. Also Kielhorn's *Southern List*, No. 569.

10. The Guṇṭūr district Prākṛit plates of Chārudēvi, the queen of the Pallava Yuvamahārāja Vijaya Buddhavarman (Buddhyan-kurā), in the reign of Mahārāja Vijaya Skandavarman. Records evidently an order to an official in Kāṭaka, granting a field near the *King's tank* to a temple of Nārāyaṇa at Dāturu (unidentified). The Agñāpti was Rōhinigupta. See *Ind. Antq.*, Vol. IX, p. 101 and Kielhorn's *Southern List*, No. 616, and *Ep. Ind.*, Vol. VIII, pp. 143—6.

11. The Guṇṭūr district plates (discovered at Gōranṭla) of Rāja Attivarman, of the family of king Kandara of the *vamśa* of the great sage Ānanda. Undated. Dr. Kielhorn believes that the early Grantha character of the epigraph shows that it is not later than A.D. 650. It records the grant of the village of Antukkūr and a field of 800 *paṭṭis* south of the Kṛishṇabeṇṇa to a Brāhmaṇa named Kōṭṭisarma. See *Ind. Antq.*, Vol. IX, p. 102, and Kielhorn's *Southern List*, No. 1015.

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
